RODGERS UPHOLDS ORDER BITTERLY DENOUNCING FERGUSON "REGIME"

In accordance with the circular announcements and other publicity, that the Cyclops of the Lubbock Klan would address the people of the city, a large number of people were present to hear him, and through curiosity many went to see who he was.

Rev. Rogers spoke forcefully, reading a great deal of his speech from manuscript. Among many other things, he declared that only one member of the Klan had been arrested in Lubbock, and that that member was immediately thrown out of the organization.

The speaker was heard by more than one thousand people.

The speaker opened his address by explaining the purpose for appearing before his audience, defending his ministry and upholding the principles of the invisible empire.

"I come first as a minister of the gospel, in defense of myself and the other men of my calling in the state of Texas," he said.

"I come second in the hope of helping you to understand the motives, and realize the purposes of the greatest American, non-political, religious organization in existence in this country, or that ever has existed here or any where else.

"In my very earliest ministry I was assailed by an old man as to my religious belief, and forced to surrender my religious convictions which were sacred to me because I made no effort to defend myself; and I promised myself there and then that I would never again allow my religious belief, or political convictions to be assailed and not at least make an effort to defend myself.

"So I am here tonight, in a strange land, and before a strange public and am forced to make this address and many others that I shall make in the near future in keeping that promise.

The ministers of Texas have been assailed as no other class of respectable men was ever assailed.

MULLINS CASE IS POSTPONED

SICKNESS MAIN DEFENSE WITNESS HALTS HEARING RAPS CASE

The case of the State of Texas vs. Russ Mullins, charged by indictment with statutory rape upon a fifteen-year-old girl, on Friday night, July 28th, was set down for trial in the 72nd Judicial court Thursday but was continued until the next term of court because of the absence of principal defense witness, Rod Mitchell, who was reported to be dangerously ill at St. Joseph's hospital at Fort Worth with pneumonia poisoning.

The continuance of the case followed the regular court proceedings one hundred special veniremen were summoned to appear in court in regular order and the court machinery would have been well under way by noon but for the receipt of a telegram from Fort Worth relating the illness of the principal witness.

The assault is alleged to have been made upon the girl after she and the defendant, accompanied by another couple, had been car riding. The other couple was said to have been at a local theatre when the alleged attack was made upon the girl in a lonely pasture two miles northwest of the city.

SAYS WILL LEAD TO DETRIMENT OF INDUSTRY

ALSO WARNS AGAINST BREAKING DOWN OF COURT SYSTEM

BY RAYMOND CLAPPER PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 25.—Public ownership of railroads and electric utilities would soon lead to nationalization of all industry, President Coolidge declared in a speech here Thursday night in connection with the observance of the 150th anniversary of the meeting of the first continental congress.

The president again warned against breaking down the power of the courts, urging that the judicial safeguards evolved in this historic spot be preserved from all despotism "whether it emanate from a monarch, from a parliament, or from a mob."

"If the people lose control of the arteries of trade and the natural sources of our mechanical power, the nationalization of all industry could soon be expected," the president said.

"Through the breaking down of the power of the courts, the president of the property and the destruction of the liberty of the individual. "With railroads and electric utilities under political control, the domination of a group would be so firmly entrenched in the whole direction of our government that the privilege of citizenship for the rest of the people would consist largely in the payment of taxes."

As in his recent Baltimore speech attacking proposals to curb the power of the courts, the president failed to mention LaFollette. Nor did he refer indirectly to the progressives, but his speech at the academy of music here was construed by his audience to be the administration answer to the progressive demand for government ownership of the railroads.

FLOUR MARKET IN EUROPE MAY BE CLOSED TO U.S.

PASSAGE OF AGRARIAN TARIFF THREATENED BY REICHSTAG

BERLIN, Sept. 25—The American farmer with his visions of revived European market may soon be confronted by a narrow margin rather than an extension of the European outlet for his wheat and other grains, for American flour millers are threatened with exclusion from German and other European markets.

This measure arises from the prospective passage of agrarian protective tariffs by the reichstag, the next session of which is tentatively set for October 15. After the war America developed an important export business in flour to European countries. In 1923, approximately \$10,000,000 worth of flour was shipped to Europe. America then conquered the European markets chiefly from Germany, which before the war, was the greatest flour exporter in European markets.

In 1922, the latest period for which complete figures are available, Germany, while importing 1,312,000 metric tons of wheat, exported in total only 17,013 metric tons of flour. Fourteen thousand tons of this total were exported to the Saar district (in the 1912 statistics figuring as "Belgium") so that the actual amount exported to former foreign markets was reduced to little over 3,000 metric tons. Switzerland, formerly Germany's best customer, had Great Britain, also among the best, but entirely been erased from this list. The domination of the European market by Germany was due to her protective tariffs on grain, wheat and flour that were repealed in August 4, 1914, through imperial order, pending eventual reconsideration. Now the German government urged by Count Kaunitz, the food controller, intends to revive the tariffs again. The tariff provides for 5.50 gold mark per 100 kilos for wheat, while the duty on flour would amount to 16.70 gold marks for the same quantity. The differential is absolutely prohibitive for American millers and exporters. For the milling of 100 kilos of flour roughly 125 kilos of wheat are required. There fore the differential between the price for wheat and flour, forming the

FIGHTING EXPECTED TO BE RESUMED AT SHANGHAI

SHANGHAI, Sept. 25—Peace negotiations between the contending armies on the Shanghai front have broken down and an immediate pitched battle for the city is expected.

General Lu Yung Hsiang has left Shanghai for the front with his staff, to take personal command of his depleted forces, which are holding a line of defense only a short distance outside Shanghai. No firing has been heard here as yet.

It is known, however, that Chi's troops have been preparing for a heavy thrust toward the city. Troops are ready to march, while strong reinforcements have been placed at strategic points on the attacking line. Lu, in his retreat, in the last few days, destroyed bridges and roads behind his fleeing army. The forces under Chi outnumber Lu's forces five to one, and Lu's sole hope is that machine gun units will be able to inflict heavy enough casualties to hold up the invaders advance.

The foreign colony, after a week of constant alarms, is again preparing to defend itself in the event of the capture of the city. The foreign warships here are able and prepared to act if hostilities endanger the lives of those in the settlement.

CEDAR RAPIDS, Iowa, Sept. 25—Not in years has Iowa witnessed such a genuine "ret" class party quarrel as that precipitated by the unheralded entry of Luther A. Brewer, as an "independent republican candidate for the United States senate, in opposition to the present incumbent, Smith W. Brookhart.

Petitions containing the required number of signatures necessary to place Brewer's name on the ticket were sent to Des Moines Wednesday night. The time for filing ended at midnight Thursday. Brewer's sudden announcement of his desire to wear the senatorial toga now worn by Brookhart will result in dividing the republican party into two factions, political observers here said. His entry into the race means that at least three candidates able to put up a hot fight will try to win a senate seat. Daniel Steck, former state com-

## CYCLOPS HEARD BY MANY LOCAL KLANSMEN HERE

The ministers of Texas have issued: Yes, who has?

**Raps Jim Ferguson**  
"Jim Ferguson and his whole crowd have preached it all over this state that ninety per cent of the preachers of Texas belong to the Klan. How they found that out I do not know, but they know it just the same, and with that knowledge they went to Austin and adopted a resolution there in that convention, in which they denounced the Klan as being 'undemocratic, un-American, un-Christian. If that is not un-Christianizing ninety per cent of the Protestant ministers of Texas what would you call it? Now, I am a minister first, and a Klansman next, and I am honored in being a Klansman second to no title that could be conferred upon me except that of a minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ."

Then the question comes to us, "Why would a bunch of intelligent men want to do such a thing? Because it is in keeping with their convictions, and if that is their conviction are they the kind of men that we need at the head of the government of this state?"

"Men whose ideals are such as would prompt them to destroy the principles that have been bought with the blood of the men that have given their lives to build this great Empire of state."

"The whole of the men that have been nominated to fill the executive offices at Austin, and especially the Ferguson, are opposed to the Protestant church and the Ku Klux Klan."

Do you want to know how I know this? I have here in my possession a letter written by the pastor of the Catholic church of his own home town. Let me read it to you.

The speaker here read the following letter:

Temple, Texas, May 29, 1924.  
St. Mary's Church,  
Rev. P. A. Heckman, pastor.  
Dear Father:

True friendship induces me to write you a word in favor of Hon. Jas. E. Ferguson, candidate for governor. I have known him for years. He is a man of the highest honor and integrity, and none more fit for governor of this great state. He is not only a true friend of mine, but a true friend of our church, and for years has been one of its most gen-

eration to save and perpetuate His people.

"Then long years after when God's people had gone into Egyptian bondage, and He proposed to bring them out. He raised up Moses and had him trained and educated in the palace of the very king that He intended to use him to destroy, and through him He destroyed a great king and saved his people. When the Roman power had dominated the world and humanity was suffering under the tyranny of the dark ages God raised up Martin Luther and inspired him to lead the great reform and the world was brought back to God. When the laws of England and all Europe became such that God's people could no longer live there and worship Him as He would have them do, He led the pilgrims to brave the storms of an unknown sea and blessed them in this country and established here His sacred habitation.

"And when those laws became tyrannical here he raised up George Washington and inspired him to fight for the freedom of his people, and George Washington became the Father of the greatest nation on earth. And last, when God saw that this nation was going back into the hands of that same Roman power He raised up Joseph Simmons and inspired him to organize the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan that He might have an organization through which He could preserve this land that He loves. I know Mr. Simmons did not do the things that we wanted him to do and was banished from the organization, but what of that, God used Joseph to bring Niveah to him after he had backslidden, and this was done before Mr. Simmons ever backslided," the speaker said.

**Klan No Worse Than Others**  
"Again you say, 'The Klan is a secret empire.' Not any more than the other secret organizations of this country. And not as such as the Knights of Columbus, or they sworn to vote for a Catholic in preference to a Protestant.

"The Farm Labor Union of this country have been endorsing their candidates and nothing was said about it.

"The Federated Union of America have endorsed their respective candidates for years which they had a right to do and nothing has ever been said about it.

"The Labor Union of Texas endorsed Lynch Davidson for governor and not one word was said about it."

In referring to the attacks that have been made upon the hooded order, the speaker declared:

"The main reason that they give for their opposition to the Klan is its secrecy. Why do they object to the Klan meeting in secret? That is easy to answer: If they could force the Klan into the open, and then let themselves meet and do their dirty work in secret it would be an easy matter for them to thwart every purpose of the organization.

"There has never been any great opposition to other orders meeting in secret. We seldom hear of any one criticizing the Masonic fraternity, or the Odd Fellow order, or the various Woodcrafts for meeting in secret. Why is that so? Because these organizations are not opposing the Knights of Columbus or the Jewish fraternities that meet in secret and plan and organize into bands to destroy this government. If these other Protestant fraternities that I have mentioned had began to try to save this country ten years ago there

other sect or creed known among us there.

"Here is the only organization for Protestant Christian men and women in all this country that is dedicated to each other and not to our own selfish ambitions and desires, and that is the doctrine that we need to preach over this country today.

"The Holy Light of Christy has lost its former glory and is sadly dimmed by the choking dust of selfish sordid gain and we have reached the crisis in the history of this country when it must be proclaimed far and near that we are not living for self or selfish gain, but are living for each other.

"Men speak of love and live in hate; Men talk of faith and trust to fate; Oh, that men might live the lives they preach, Or, that men might do the things they teach, Then the throne of avarice would fall. And the clangor of grim selfishness over the earth would cease. Love would tread out the hateful fire of anger. And in its ashes plant the lily of peace. God speed the day when this will be so in the lives of our men and women."

in the electoral college, according to a statement from chairman Wm. M. Butler, issued by the republican headquarters here.

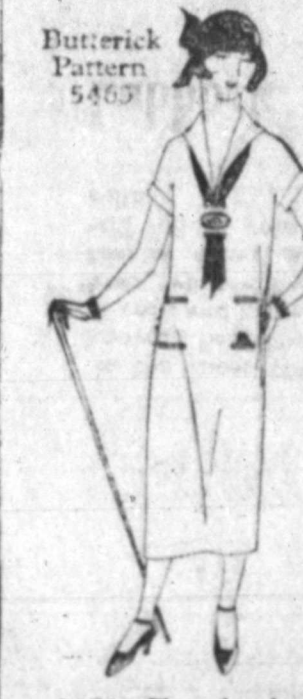

"The socialist head the third party," Butler said "pretending to stand for a clean ballot. This is to secure the electoral vote of North Dakota through fraud and trickery."

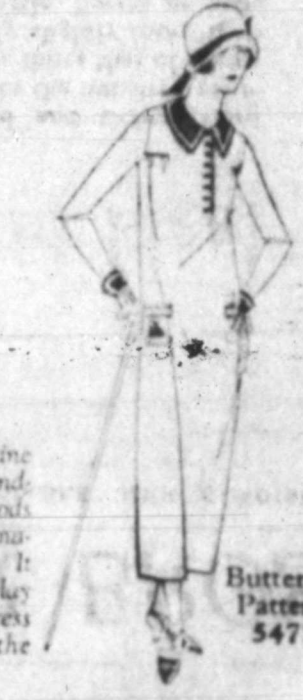
The question will come before the state supreme court on Sept. 29.
