The decisions in the four cases of the State of Texas vs. Tom Ross and Milt Goode, charged jointly with murder in connection with the fatal shooting of W. D. Allison and H. L. 



FIRE PREVENTION RATHER THAN FIRE **EXTINGUISHING**

We believe that the campaign for fire prevention which is being nationally carried on this week is one of the most important movements that has ever been inaugurated, and it will no doubt be the means of preventing many fires. Education against fires is the most important step. The number of fires and the extent of the fire losses depends largely upon the people. They can by using precautions against fires prevent many of them and merous fires due to forcing the heating apparatus. we feel the importance to such an extent that we Keep this in mind next winter. Watch your heatare devoting this space to the education of the er. people along this line, and the following suggestions

More lives are lost by fire in dwellings, apartment houses, tenements, and hotels in the course of a year than in all the factory, school, theater, and similar holocausts in the average decade. About 60 per cent of all lives lost by fire are children. It would be difficult to design a more combustible type of structure than the average dwelling. The wooden shingle roof has been responsible for the great conflagrations; and its use should be avoided, and prohibited by law in congested districts.

extinguish.

Practically every dwelling house fire is due to carelessness or neglect. Especial care should be taken in the home to prevent fires from starting. because when they do start there is seldom a man about to extinguish them. Where women and defenseless children are housed, every human consideration demands the utmost vigilance on the part of those responsible for their welfare.

The attic, cellar, basement, and all closets and outbuildings should be cleaned at least once every year, and all useless material and rubbish removed therefrom and burned. These unnecessary accumushould be placed in every home. lations of oily rags, mops, dust cloths, in burlap, and in hay and straw. Store all remaining material neatly so that a clear passage may be or around boxes, cases, barrels, etc.

Metal waste, baskets, only, should be used.

In storing clothing, first remove all matches or other materal from the pockets and then carefully fold and neatly place away. Do not hang the safest method for keeping gasoline. The gasoclothes where they will be near hot chimneys.

Do not go into closets with lighted matches or candles. Care should be exercised in burning leaves,

Use only safety matches, and make it impossible for children to get them. Always place burned matches in metal receptacles; never throw them on the floor or into waste baskets.

To smoke in garages, in bed, or around stables containing hay is deliberately to invite disaster. Never lay down a lighted cigar or cigarette, or throw away a lighted stub.

Illuminating oils should be kept in closed metal cans in a safe place, and lamps should never burn all night, select one that contains much more preferable. Care must be taken not to place them Every minute is significant. near inflammable material, under shelves, nor to set or leave lamps or lanters in stables or other station on a special card at your telephone. places where animals may upset them. Never allow little children to carry lamps, and never set lamps on table covers. Children may pull them over,

ous or liable to cause fire. Electricity is a hidden hazard and extends throughout the wire system in a building. Be sure it is safely installed, and have the system carefully inspected and approved by a recognized electrical inspector. Many fires are due to defective electric wiring. Do not destroy the insulation on light, fan, heater or other electric wires by hanging them on hooks or nails. Immediately repair or replace any defective switches, sockets, etc. A fuse is the "safety valve" of an electric system, and should never be replaced by one of larger size, bridged with pennies, or any other material.







Not content with an exhibition which only lasted a fortnight, April 19 to May 3, the University has caused to be winted "A Descriptive Catalogue" of the exhibits; and this has been compiled with exhaustive care and knowledge by Professors R. R. Griffith and H. M. Jones, who both lectured on the subject of Byron durng the period of the exhibition. A mere hurried glance through the cutwill show that it is one of great value for permanent reference What is, in a sense, still more remarkable, is that the exhibition was almost exclusively made up from Texas itself.
