POLIO CLINICS TO BE OPEN SUNDAY NOON TO 5 P.M.

The oral polio vaccine clinics in Baird, Clyde and Eula will be open from 12 noon until 5 p. m. Sunday, Sept. 22, for you and your family to receive polio immunization.

The oral polio vaccine is for all ages, but immediate immunization of all persons up to 21 years of age, especially infants and young children, is recommended and urged, according to State Health officials.

In Callahan County, a polio booster is recommended for those who have completed the primary oral vaccine series, and those who received a booster in 1964, the last county-wide program.

Booster doses are recommended every 4 to 5 years, and especially 5 and 6 year olds and all first grade students. The individuals who have not started or completed their series may receive their first dose at one of the clinics Sunday.

The Baird clinic will be held at the Baird School Cafeteria from 12 noon until 5 p. m. If you live in the Baird area and do not have transportation to the clinic, you may call 4-1700, Baird Chamber of Commerce, and someone will provide your transportation to the school and back to your home.

Clyde clinic will begin and end at the same hours, and will be held at the Clyde Community Center.

Eula clinic will be held at the

Eula School Cafeteria.

Putnam residents, if at all possible, are asked to come to Baird for their immunization sometime during the hours of 12 noon to 5 p. m.

You are urged to make arrangements to take this vaccine during one of the clinics Sunday.

Dyer Certified As Candidate For Judge

A. E. Dyer Jr. has been certified as the Democratic candidate for County Judge of Callahan County at the General Election on November 5th. Dyer is a rancher and a native of Callahan County.

He has served as Democratic Chairman for this county for the past six years, resigned from this position at a special meeting of the Executive Committee in the Courthouse in Baird, September 13, and was unanimously certified as the party's candidate for the place on the ballot in November.

Film Report on Gov. Connally's "The Challenge and the Chance"

Rep. Burke Musgrove will present a film report on the Governor's Committee on Public School Education Thursday, Sept. 26 at 7:30 p. m. in Baird High School Auditorium.

The 28 minute film will explain in detail the report of Gov. John Connally to make Texas a national leader in Public Education, entitled, "The Challenge and the Chance."

A 76-page report has been published and sent to various schools and news media in Texas, concerning the nearly three years of intensive research and analysis given to make Texas one of the national leaders in education. The inside cover of the book contains a quote from the Governor of Texas: "In an age when human society and man's environment are changing

The Bears held the Mountaineers for two downs. On the next series the Mountaineers went to passing and set up a first down. They passed for about 60 yards and after three plays scored for 6 points. Extra point try for two was good and the Mountaineers took the lead.

The play of the game was in the last five seconds of the first half when the Mountaineers were on the one yard line, and the Bears held the line, leaving the score at halftime 8-7.

The beginning of the third quarter brought out the new look of the '68 Bears, with three touchdowns in the last half. Donny Rowe, with the help of the other Bears, rambled 80 yards for a TD off tackle. On the same play on the other side of the line, Rowe went 70 yards for a touchdown. In the last quarter, Rowe poked off a pass and went 20 yards for the last touchdown of the game, and a score of 26-8.

Defense standouts were Sonny Collins, Roy McAdams, Jerry Barron and Roger Weeks. Standing out on offense were Rowe, Franklyn Alexander and Larry Shelmutt.

Alexander and Barron received injuries in the game. Barron will be out for a few weeks with a broken right arm. Alexander's injuries are not thought to be serious at this time.

The Bears and Coach Shipp will be looking for you at the Bears Den Friday night when they will play host to the Merkel Badgers, with kickoff at 8 p. m. You are also invited to attend the Friday afternoon pep rally at the Baird gym at 3:15.

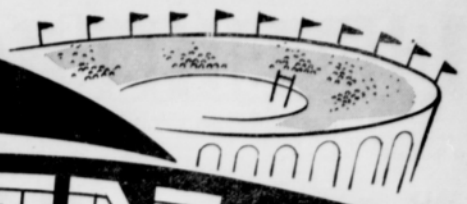
