Veterans stand and salute the Flag during the ceremony at Liberty Park.

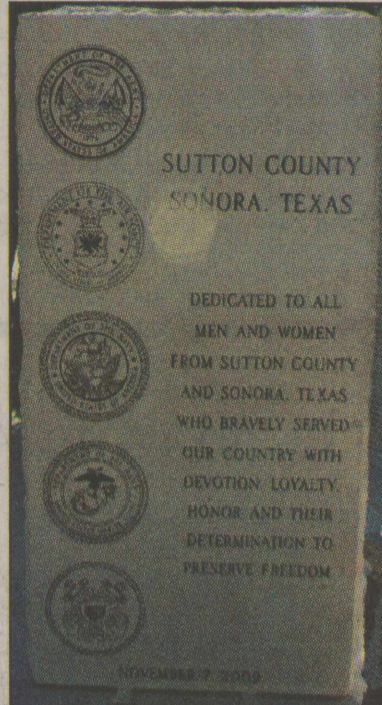

## Broncos Are in Playoffs!!

Before the kickoff in Ozona, the Broncos led by 14 points as far as making the playoffs was concerned. But the Broncos had no intentions of "backing into the playoffs." By making the playoffs, Coach Sine and the Broncos accomplished their first goal for the season, and now they must make new goals for the post season. With the 32 to 6 victory over their longtime rivals, the Broncos will travel to Sweetwater this Friday night to meet the Post Antelopes for the Bi-District Championship.

The outcome of the game against Ozona was never in doubt beginning with the opening kickoff. After Kris Aguero fielded a crazy, bouncing football, the Broncos used a mixture of runs and passes to march seventy yards using 6:56 minutes worth of game time for their first score. On the twelfth play of the drive, Ethan Morriss ran right to the wide side of field for the touchdown. After a Bronco penalty moved the PAT kick back five yards, Dustin Neff just missed to the right. The Broncos led 6 to 0 with 5:04 in left the first quarter.

The scrappy Lions responded with a drive that consumed the rest of the first quarter before giving the ball back to the Broncos on downs. The next Bronco drive was another long, time-consuming one. Morriss used his arm and his gifted receivers on this drive. Two catches by Will Anderson moved the chains. Facing fourth down near mid-field, Word Hudson caught a pass over the middle for a first down. Once inside the Red Zone, Morriss again ran the ball on consecutive plays before following his offensive line into the end zone on a quarterback sneak. The

Broncos tried a two-point conversion, but Dustin Neff was stopped just short. The Broncos led 12 to 0 with 7:31 left in the second quarter.

The Lions gamely tried to stay in the game. With the help of a face mask penalty, the Lions were getting close to the Broncos' Red Zone. Jorge Gaytan blitzed and hit the Lion ball carrier causing a fumble that the Broncos recovered stopping the Lions.

After each team had drives that ended in punts, the Broncos got the ball back with less

PAT, Morriss lofted a pass into the left corner of the end zone where only 6'5" Pope could catch it. The score stood 26 to 0 with 6:34 left in the third quarter.

The last Bronco score came on three complete passes. Gonzales caught the first and Hudson the last two. Hudson got the score as he leaped higher than the two Lion defenders and hauled in the completion. The PAT hex continued, and the Broncos had scored their last points of the regular season.

In the fourth quarter, Clayton Parks came in at quarterback. Manny Parades used his speed for several nice runs as the Broncos finished the regular season.

At the "Meet The Broncos" in August, Coach Sine said that he was going to coach the



offensive line. It is no doubt that this year's line is not composed of large, beastly behemoths, but with rather normal sized young men. Dylan Castillo, Cash Jennings, Kyle Patlan, Martin Campa, Jorge Gaytan, Cacho Mesa, Hugo Cardona, Osbauldo Castaneda, Ryan Garmon, Christian Lujan, Colyer Dermody, Josh Salazar, and RJ Torres have outplayed their opponents all year and are primarily responsible for the Broncos entering the playoffs with a 7 and 3 record.

There will be Bronco Tailgating in the Mustang Bowl parking lot starting at 5:30 PM for the entire Bronco Nation. Bronco fans are asked to bring "finger food." Come out and travel north to the Big Country to cheer the Broncos on in the football playoffs.

## Butler Honored With THA Pioneer Award



Keith Butler, CEO of Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital in Sonora, will receive the Texas Hospital Association's Pioneer Award at a luncheon tomorrow in Austin. This is THA's highest honor for a rural hospital executive.

AUSTIN (Nov. 9, 2009) Keith Butler, chief executive officer of Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital in Sonora, has been honored with the Texas Hospital Association's Pioneer Award, an annual award that recognizes excellence in rural hospital management. Butler received the award at a luncheon during the Texas Rural Health Forum, Nov. 10 in Austin. The award is sponsored by THA's Rural Hospital Constituency Section.

Butler was selected for the honor by the constituency section's governing council, which is comprised of fellow rural hospital administrators from around the state.

Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital is a 12-bed public hospital operated by the Sutton County Hospital District. During Butler's eight-year tenure there, the hospital has grown from a struggling rural facility to a thriving and progressive health and wellness center for the community.

"What's amazing is that Keith has accomplished this growth through good management, with no tax increases and no bond issue, a truly amazing feat", said Sutton County Judge Carla Garner.

Construction of a replacement hospital and wellness center was completed in 2005, and a second major building program currently is underway. The hospital's services include state-of-the-art diagnostics, physical therapy, wound care, and cardiac and pulmonary rehabilitation. LMH also has embraced the use of advanced technology, including wireless telemetry for patient monitoring and a complete electronic health records



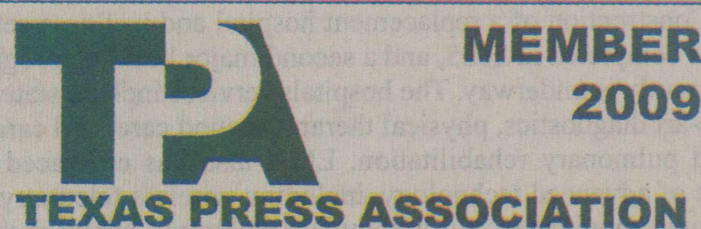
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## Obituaries

### Marcie A. Lipham

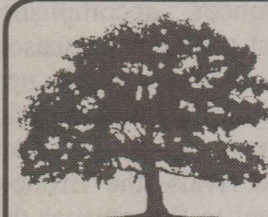

## Red Ribbon Week

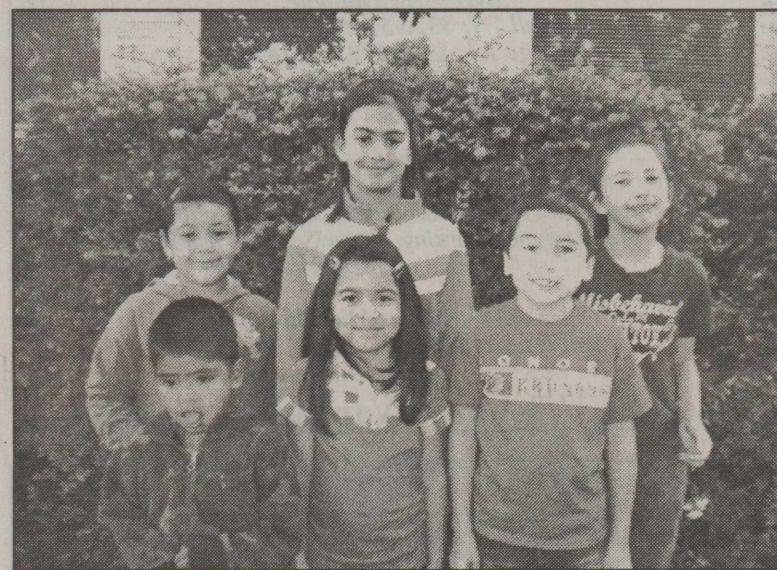

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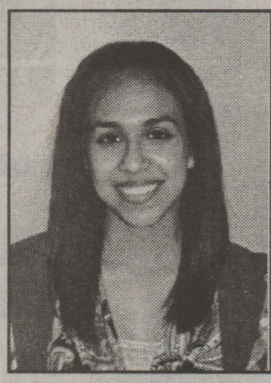

# What Makes Good Hay

Though we don't typically feed much hay in our part of the world, small-herd producers and horse owners do make use of it. It is important to select hay for quality. This can be either chemically analyzed or visual inspection. Today we'll focus on visual inspection and on those characteristics that affect its value as feed. Factors known to affect hay quality and animal performance include stage of maturity, leafiness, color, odor and condition, and the presence of foreign material in the hay.

Stage of maturity refers to the growth stage of a plant at the time of harvest. For alfalfa hay, stage of maturity can be determined by observing the state of reproductive parts and the texture and woodiness of the stems. Alfalfa cut in the bud stage can be recognized by the size of buds at the tips of the stems and by the absence of purple flower petals. Bud-stage alfalfa is usually very leafy, and stems are relatively fine and pliable. Early-bloom stage alfalfa has some purple flower petals and stems that are larger than bud-stage alfalfa. Alfalfa cut after the full-bloom stage is usually indicated by the large stems, by the presence of seed pods, and by a deficiency of leaves.

Leafiness is an important factor in determining hay quality, but is most critical with legumes and first-cut grass hays (two-thirds of the protein is found in the leaves). As plants mature, stems increase in diameter, lower leaves yellow and are shed, and the relative proportion of leaves decreases. The highest quality hay is that cut in the late-bud to early-bloom stage when plants have a high proportion of leaves. Leaf proportion can vary from 65 to 70 percent in very leafy alfalfa hay to only 10 or 15-percent in stemmy hay.

Color can be a definitive characteristic of hay. The ideal color is one that most closely approaches the bright green color of an immature grass or legume crop. This hay was most likely cut at an early, desirable stage of maturity and well and rapidly cured. However, even timely cut hay can lose its bright green color due to the bleaching action of the sun; rain during curing; or fermentation. Sun bleaching reduces hay palatability while rain leaches away a large portion of plant nutrients or causes molding and fermentation. Hay that has a characteristic dark brown or black discolored appearance has been exposed to rain or to heavy fog and dew. Brown-colored hay is usually indicative of hay that has either been through a heat and/or fermentation.

Foreign matter comes in two types (non-injurious and injurious). Non-injurious include non-toxic weeds, overripe grain hay, grain straw, stubble, chaff, sticks, and other objectionable matter. Weeds are the most common non-injurious foreign matter found in hay. Injurious matter is material that is poisonous or will harm the animal when eaten. These include sandburs; needlegrasses with needles attached; 3-awn grass, and poisonous plants such as pig weeds.

Off-odors, such as mildew, mustiness or rotten odors, indicate lowered quality and acceptance by livestock. These smells are caused when hay is stored at too high moisture or has been weather damaged. Hay condition is important. Hay should be free from must and mold and from insect and disease damage. It should also be free of dust.

Hay can vary in quality, so spend a little time evaluating before making your purchase.

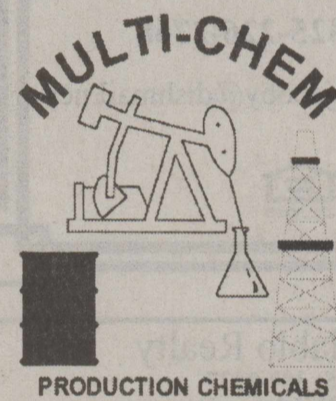
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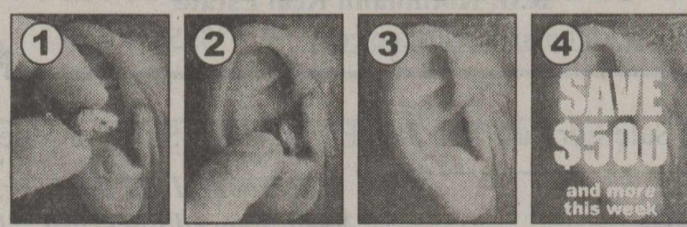

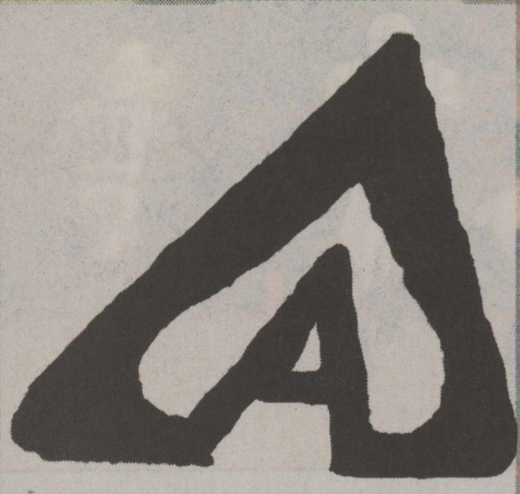
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
