School Board Looks At Cost Saving Measures:

Evaluates Options for Slimming Down 2010-2011 Budget

The Board of Trustees of the Sonora Independent School District met for their regular meeting scheduled at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, September 14, 2010. Among the items to be discussed was an update regarding the field house project.

Board member Van Winkle commented on construction delays after Representatives from DSA (Jim Barnes, Joe Carlock, and Barry Foil) presented the board with the costs of the project.

Van Winkle commented that he did not know who was to blame; however, he stated that he had visited the site on numerous occasions and on these occasions had seen only two people working. Mr. Van Winkle stated that with a project the size of the Field House, that was not acceptable, even when taking into account bad weather and other issues.

Joe Carlock stated that often there was a trade off between quality and time and that pushing contractors sometimes resulted in mediocre work. He then assured the Board that DSA would be available not only for the current one year warranty but also even ten years down the line if there were any construction issues.

Member Jesse Bustamante asked how many more days it would be before the project was finished since he had received numerous inquiries from the public. Mr. Foil stated that the boys' side could be

moved into immediately and the girls' side would be ready by the end of the following week.

The board went on to discuss cost saving measures for the 2010-2011 school year. President Cahill stated that some areas to consider were evaluating the Pre-K Program as it relates to charging tuition and also looking at cafeteria losses.

Business Manager Diane Jacoby said she had reviewed the losses and that most of it centered around the High School, where, due to the low turnout of students eating in the cafeteria, not enough money was generated to offset the cost of salaries, food, and equipment. Board members discussed a number of options, including an increase in meal prices, busing students to other campuses and closing the High School Cafeteria, and pre-ordering meals.

Cahill commented that the district would need to look at staffing issues as they relate to scheduling and to adjust this scheduling due to attrition. In order to better determine a more accurate level of staff turnover (due to retirement) Gibson presented the board with data showing that 24 staff members have over 24 years experience (12 of whom are at retirement age). Gibson then stated that it was possible that some of those people would retire, at which point their positions could be absorbed. President Cahill con-

cluded the discussion by expressing her appreciation to administrators for the budget trimming they had already completed and stated that this discussion would be contin-

ued over the next few months before any decisions would be made. She also asked the administrators for their input in upcoming meetings.

After a discussion over the

district's pet policy for school district housing the board adjourned the meeting at 7:05 p.m. without the need to consider any items in closed session.

Sonora's Ethan Morriss says he patterns his game after the Titans' Vince Young. Not a bad role model. One of Texas' top dual-threat QBs, Ethan was at his best in a come-from-behind 37-34 win over Ballinger last week. The clock was down to 2:27 when the 6-0, 195-pound Morriss scored on a five-yard

After last week's nail-biter, the only suspense this week was provided by Mother Nature as she teased the crowd with strong winds, brief rain, and some lightning. The Broncos scored on all but two possessions, and the Tigers made ONLY one first down the entire game. The game was called with 11:00 left in the fourth quarter as lightning was going to force a second 30-minute game delay and the Broncos held a 46 to 0 lead.

The Tigers won the toss and elected to defer to the second half. After Imoni Cross re-

turned the opening kickoff to the Bronco 48-yard line, the Broncos used only eight plays to score the first touchdown. Ethan Morriss completed two passes to Edward Garza and Zach Badeaux. Morriss gained 20 yards on three carries. After Dallas Payne's first carry of the season moved the Broncos to the Tiger's four-yard line, Badeaux scored on a run up the middle for a touchdown. Lino Villanueva and Jesse Vaquera doubled teamed the nose tackle and Colyer Dermody pulled to take out the Tiger left defensive tackle

so that Badeaux would not have to get his uniform dirty. For the first time this year, Cross missed the PAT as he was kicking into the 25 to 30 MPH wind. With 8:42 left in the first quarter, the Broncos had the lead at 6 to 0.

On the Tigers' first rushing attempt, Osbauldo Castaneda and Badeaux stuffed Victor Robledo after a gain of one yard. After an incomplete pass, Robledo was stopped short of the first down by Cross and Kyle Patlan. The Tigers punted. A good punt forced Cross to retreat back

to the 17-yard line. He caught the bouncing pigskin and returned it untouched 83 yards for the second Bronco touchdown. The Broncos tried for two, but an outstretched Cadesman Pope could not haul in the pass from Morriss. 12 to 0 with 6:52 left in the first quarter.

Blitzing Badeaux logged two tackles for a loss on first and second down. On third down, the Tigers tried a lateral to Robledo who was caught from behind by Jorge Gaytan and dropped short of the first down.

Just like some people have to touch an electric fence twice, the Tigers tried punting to Cross. Cross caught the ball at the 19-yard line and started up the near sideline. This time it was not as easy and he had to cut back across the field at the Tiger 40-yard line to complete the 81-yard touchdown return. This time a Tiger made a good defensive play on the pass from Morriss to Pope deflecting the ball out of Pope's reach. With 5:04 left in the first quarter, the score was 18 to 0 in favor of the Broncos.

Gaytan kicked off and Davis Jimenez tackled the Tiger returner at the Tiger 31-yard line. Jorge Villanueva and Gaytan plugged the hole as the Tigers tried to run up the middle. Tiger quarterback Brandon Allen tried to run

wide and Word Hudson cut him down. Blitzing Badeaux logged his third solo tackle and the Tigers had to punt. No return for Cross this time as they kicked away from him.

The Broncos mounted a seven-play drive that covered 83 yards with Badeaux scoring on a 33-yard shovel pass from Morriss. Morriss completed a pass to Cross for the two-point conversion and the Broncos led 26 to 0 with 10:00 left in the first half.

Jorge Villanueva, Ryan San Miguel, and Shane Patlan stopped the Tiger kick returner. This Tiger three and out was just as quick and easy as all the ones that had come before. Even with the video, I couldn't give credit to any single Bronco as "a whole herd of Broncos" made the tackles.

For the only time during the game, the Tigers forced the Broncos to punt. Clayton Parks continued his good punting with a 40-yard punt to the Tiger 30-yard line. Damon Evans logged solo tackles on the first two plays of this Tiger drive. The Tigers completed a short pass, but Shane Patlan and Castaneda combined to limit the gain to only two yards forcing another Tiger punt.

This Bronco drive last two

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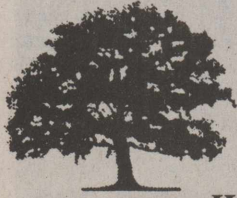

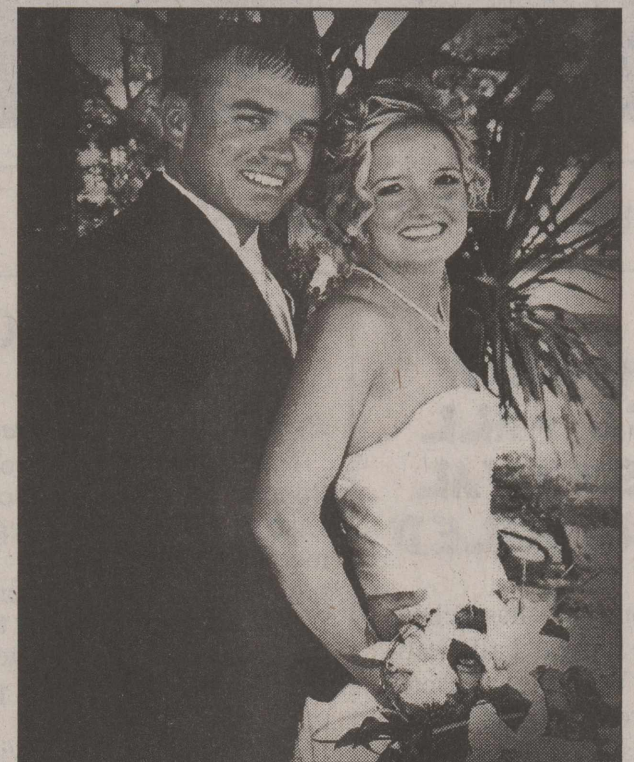

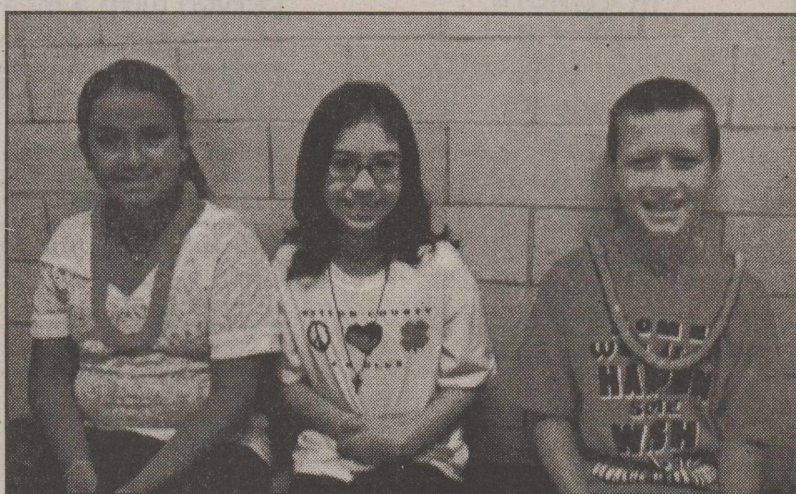
Buckle Up and Stop Texting!

(SPM Wire) The number of drivers and passengers who use seat belts has been climbing nationwide, according to statistics from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) and "Click It or Ticket" campaigns.

National seat belt use has jumped from 58 percent in 1994 to 84 percent in 2009, due in large part to high-profile campaigns and enforcement.

If only drivers nationwide would stop texting on cell phones while on the road, which greatly increases risk of accidents. Surprisingly, as of mid-2010, only about half the states in the country have banned texting while driving, according to statistics from the NHTSA.

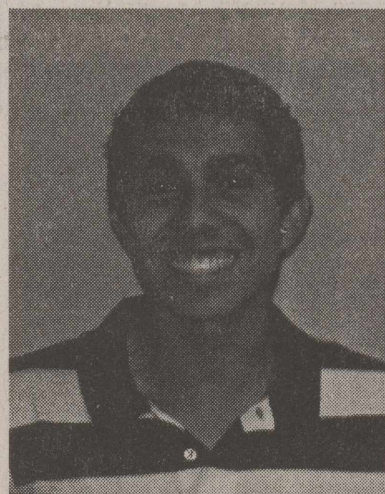

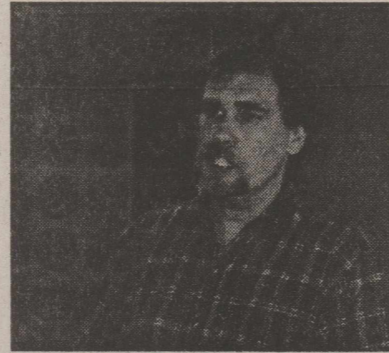

Don't forget the upcoming Auction in October, great food and good time promised for all.

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
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

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From Eaton Hill Horny Toad Ho-Down

Just a short week ago, visitors to Eaton Hill along with Jacqui Thomas racked up an incredible Texas horned toad tally...THREE horny toads in ONE DAY! Seventh grader Joseph Hudson kicked off the sighting frenzy (perhaps frenzy is a tad too strong), the sighting bonanza and was soon joined by Eaton Hill's Jacqui Thomas and two visitors from Whitney Texas. This marks the first reported sighting of a horned lizard (actually 3!) on Eaton Hill in at least five years, and comes on the heels of a notable increase in casual reports from friends and visitors who have seen horny toads in the past year. Could their numbers be on the rise?

Three North American species are found in Texas: the Texas Horned Lizard, the Mountain Short-horned Lizard, and the Roundtail Horned Lizard. The Texas Horned Lizard holds the illustrious title of Texas State Reptile and is the species identified thus far on Eaton Hill. Roundtail horned lizards can also be found in this region of Texas and unlike the Texas Horned Lizard, are not on the State Threatened or Endangered List. Eaton Hill is temporarily operating a "roundtail horny toad nursery" - having come into possession of a two rescued youngsters that will

eventually be released on the hill. They can be seen at the Nature Center gobbling up harvester ants.

Lee Ann Linan, wildlife biologist with TP&WD Wildlife Diversity Program explained, "Reported numbers seem to fluctuate year to year depending on weather patterns. Good rainfall and moderate temperature may increase activity making horned lizards more visible." In 2006, Texas Parks & Wildlife concluded a ten year research project, making use of citizen-scientists to help define and monitor the actual population and distribution of our state reptile. The Texas Horned Lizard Watch, as the study was dubbed, also served to glean insight into possible causes for the regretful decline in numbers. As suspected, the presence of im-

ported red fire ants registered a negative effect on horned toad and harvester ant populations. Harvester ants are the horned lizard's primary food source and the aggressive and territorial fire ants displace or destroy them. However, a definitive cause for population decline has not been identified. Researchers suspect a combination of: 1) capture for pet trade, 2) overuse of pesticides several decades ago and other environmental contaminants, 3) spread of fire ants and, 4) changes in land use.

The Texas Horned Lizard Watch continues to function as a gathering point for observations and information on horned lizards in Texas and additional studies are ongoing. Data forms and materials are available online for the public to participate in the research as well as learn more about one of the oddest and best-loved creatures to ever skeediddle over the rocks and sand of our great state.

And what's not to love about a creature that squirts a stream of blood from its eyes to ward off predators? Three of the 18 species found in North America have this unique ability and the Texas Horned Lizard is among the three. Hopefully, the recent horned toad trend will persist giving a new generation the opportunity to experience the glee of discovering this incredible creature in the wild.

Whether it's the weather, or an actual upshoot in horny toad populations we are terribly pleased with the recent sightings on Eaton Hill and encourage everyone to share with us their own special horny toad adventures.

Hooded orioles and hummingbirds continue to visit our feeders and a few monarchs have been seen flitting around the hill. For several days we also enjoyed an enormous tiger swallowtail butterfly around the Nature Center but alas, it eluded digital capture. Hit the trails!

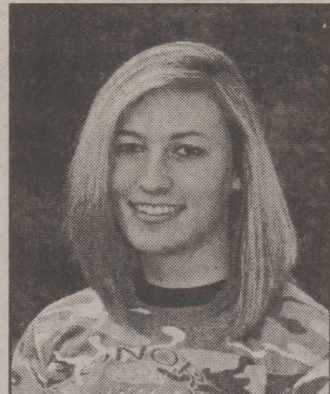

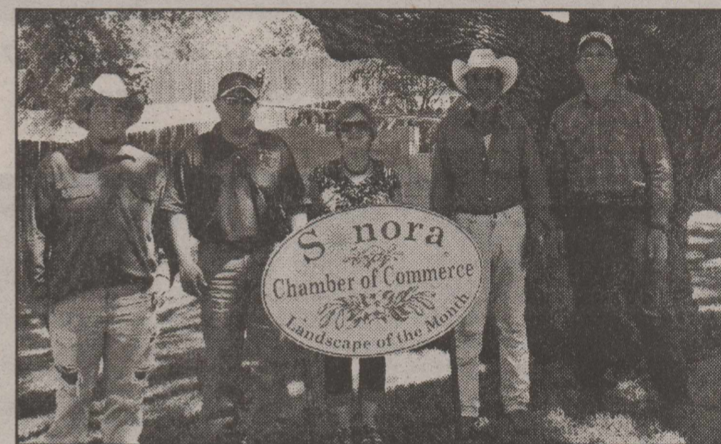
Jr. High Volleyball
