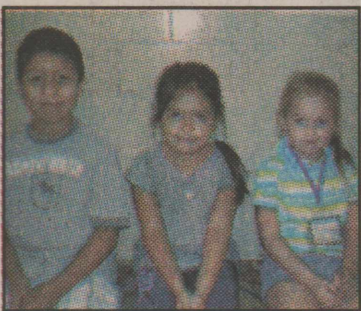

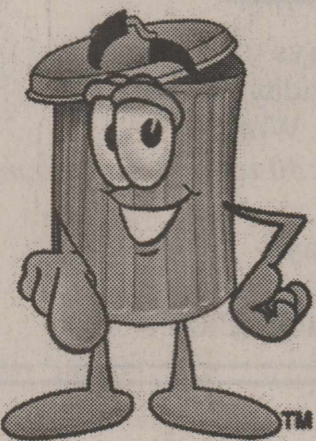

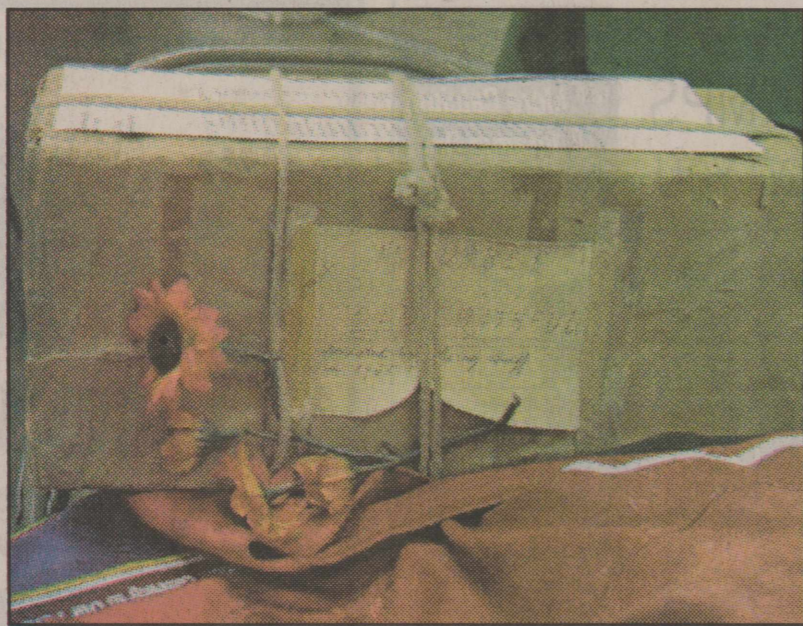

Monarchs! Everywhere! This year's monarch butterfly migration exploded into Sutton County last Friday evening. Watching over a water tank, I counted 200 butterflies in under five minutes. Most were headed to a large live oak where they began covering the branches. An "overnight roost" as it's known and one of the most spectacular sights offered up by a world filled with astounding sights. To walk beneath the tree limbs and amidst the fluttering monarchs is akin to entering fairyland - surreal and mysterious.

The numbers were so great at the cemetery on Saturday that we could hear the wing beats! Whether this past weekend will prove to be the "peak" of migration remains to be seen, however the experience had the definite and exhilarating feel of a mountaintop.

Report your sighting of monarch and hummingbird migrations online by googling "Journey North", and share your experiences with Eaton Hill Nature Center. Yes, hummingbirds are still in the area as of October 4th, so keep your feeders fresh, it's slim pickins out there!

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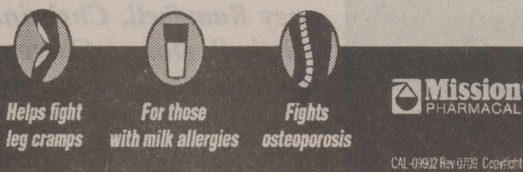

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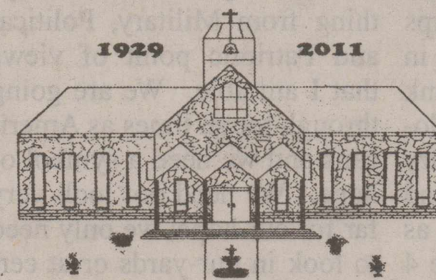

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## Are We Alone? Small Fish May Hold The Answers

COLLEGE STATION – Could there be life on other planets less hospitable than ours? Many have speculated the possibility, but a team of Texas A&M University and Oklahoma State University scientists studying a tiny Mexican fish think it's plausible.

"The fish we study are extremophiles, meaning they are adapted to life at the edge of biological tolerance," said Katherine Roach, a graduate student at Texas A&M University in the wildlife and fisheries sciences department.

Roach, together with Regent's Professor Dr. Kirk Winemiller and collaborator Michael Tobler, recently authored a paper on the fish accepted for future publication in the journal Ecology. The small fish their study focuses on is Poecilia mexicana found in the Cueva del Azufre or the "cave of sulfur" located in Tabasco state, Mexico.

The small (about 2.5 inches at maturity), almost blind fish live in total darkness swimming in oxygen-starved water with hydrogen sulfide concentrations so toxic they would kill most other life forms, according to Roach.

"Our research shows that organic carbon produced by sulfur bacteria oxidizing dissolved hydrogen sulfide, a process called chemoautotrophy, is the main food source for the fish," Roach said. "Though it is known that simpler life forms flourish by feeding through this process, ours is the first study to actually document a fish, a true vertebrate, directly receiving its sustenance through bacteria performing chemoautotrophy."

"Their ecosystem in the cave is basically self-sustaining without much input from plants at the surface. As a result, our research has implications for discovering life outside the earth. If these complex vertebrates can thrive on sulfur bacteria, why couldn't similar, more evolutionary derived organisms be supported by chemoautotrophic bacteria on other moons or planets such as Europa, one of Jupiter's moons? It may not be altogether impossible."

Roach explained that most of the earth's ecosystems have food chains supported by organic carbon produced from the fixation of atmospheric carbon dioxide by plants using sunlight. These, in turn, release breathable oxygen into the atmosphere.

"What makes our study so exciting is that we're the first to actually document a fish, a relatively large and complex vertebrate, that is able to thrive by being solely supported by chemoautotrophic-processed hydrogen sulfide bacteria," Roach said.

The Statement of Intent filing made by WTG seeks to increase rates to offset increased operating expenses. The proposed increase will take effect on or after November 5, 2011.

The proposed changes to WTG's tariffs will affect all of the approximately 14,811 domestic and 2,108 non-domestic customers. The proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues by approximately \$2,489,741, which represents an increase (including gas costs) of approximately 22.9% (or 50.49% excluding gas costs). This is a major rate increase as defined by Texas law, in that it would increase WTG's aggregate revenues by more than 2.5%. To achieve these increased revenues, the Company proposes to phase in the proposed rates over a two year period. The Company proposes to increase the monthly do-

mestic customer charge from \$9.00 to \$11.27 in Year 1, and to \$13.54 in Year 2. The monthly domestic volumetric charge would increase from \$2.42 per Mcf to \$3.03 per Mcf in Year 1, and to \$3.64 per Mcf in Year 2. For non-domestic customers, the Company proposes to increase the monthly customer charge from \$12.00 to \$15.03 in Year 1, and to \$18.06 in Year 2. The monthly non-domestic volumetric charge would increase from \$2.27 per Mcf to \$2.84 per Mcf in Year 1, and to \$3.42 per Mcf in Year 2.

In addition, the Company proposes to eliminate the Farwell Gas Cost Zone and substitute the West Gas Cost Zone in its place.

In addition, the Company seeks to recover all rate case expenses through a surcharge as allowed by law. The exact amount of rate case expenses and the surcharge will not be known until the case is completed. This notice is

# Fall Means Fishing, Camping in Texas State Parks

ATHENS—With cooler weather just around the corner and cabin fever taking its toll on those of the outdoor persuasion, people are ready to start enjoying the outdoors again. In North Texas, Meridian and Cleburne State Parks offer fishing opportunities close to home with excellent hiking and camping opportunities as well.

Both these lakes have ample shoreline access for those who prefer to relax on dry ground while waiting for a bite. If you have a boat to float, both parks have boat ramps. (With drought conditions being what they are, call ahead to make sure the boat ramp is useable.) These lakes are "no-wake lakes," so boats with outboard motors may only idle while moving from spot to spot. This rule, however, makes these lakes ideal for paddle-powered crafts, so bring your canoe or kayak.

Meridian State Park's 505 acres are located about three miles southwest of the city of Meridian off State Highway 22. The park is scenic and heavily wooded with many campsites. On weekends with good weather, the park can be a popular place, so call (512) 389-8900 to make reservations if you plan on camping.

You can also just access the park for the day and take advantage of a surprisingly diverse fishery. The 50-acre lake is surrounded by campsites on the lower end. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) has placed large piles of brush within casting distance of some of the more accessible shoreline areas in order to improve angling opportunity and provide valuable fish habitat within the lake. Bass, crappie, catfish and sunfish can be targeted and anglers will be pleasantly surprised by the quality of bluegill, redear, longear and redbreast sunfish. Nightcrawlers (earthworms) or crickets under a bobber on light tackle can set your kids up for some fast-paced fishing.

Cleburne State Park is a 528-acre park located 10 miles southwest of the city of Cleburne on Park Road 21. The park offers a 107-acre lake in which one can pursue bass, catfish, crappie and sunfish. TPWD has placed multiple brush piles in this lake as well. Many of these are within easy casting distance from the shoreline. Bring your bikes and challenge yourself on the 5.5-mile mountain bike trail if you're not worn out from catching fish.

You can fish without a license in lakes totally enclosed with a state park. However, it is important to remember that length, bag limits and other regulations still apply. Park entrance fees must be paid in order to gain access to the lakes. Both Meridian and Cleburne State Parks charge \$5 per day per person 13 and older; children 12 and under are free.

"Even if you had a flu shot during the last flu season, it's time to get vaccinated again," said Dr. David Lakey, DSHS commissioner. "The protection provided by the vaccine decreases over time, so everyone needs to be immunized each year."

DSHS has already seen an increase in flu-like illness in Texas over the last few weeks. Vaccination is encouraged now because it takes about two weeks for the vaccine to become effective.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends everyone at least 6 months old be vaccinated against seasonal flu. The CDC also says that children ages 6 months to 8 years who did not get at least one dose of the 2010-2011 flu vaccine should get two doses of the vaccine this season.

A nasal spray vaccine is an option for healthy people ages 2 to 49 who are not pregnant. There is also a high-dose vaccine designed for people 65 and over and a new intradermal shot with a much shorter needle available for some adults.

The flu is caused by various influenza viruses. Symptoms include fever, coughing, sore throat, aches, chills and fatigue. Most healthy people recover without problems, but people 65 and over, pregnant women, young children and people with chronic health conditions are at higher risk for serious complications and even death. It is especially important for people in those high-risk groups to be vaccinated.

Flu vaccine is reformulated each year to match the influenza viruses expected to circulate. Experts anticipate continuing to see the same types of flu as last year, so the vaccine will again protect against the strains A/California/7/2009 (H1N1), A/Perth/16/2009 (H3N2) and B/Brisbane/60/2008.

Getting an annual flu vaccine is the best way to prevent flu from spreading. Also, cover all coughs and sneezes, wash hands frequently with soap and water or hand sanitizer and stay home if sick.

## 8th Grade Colts Get A Victory!!



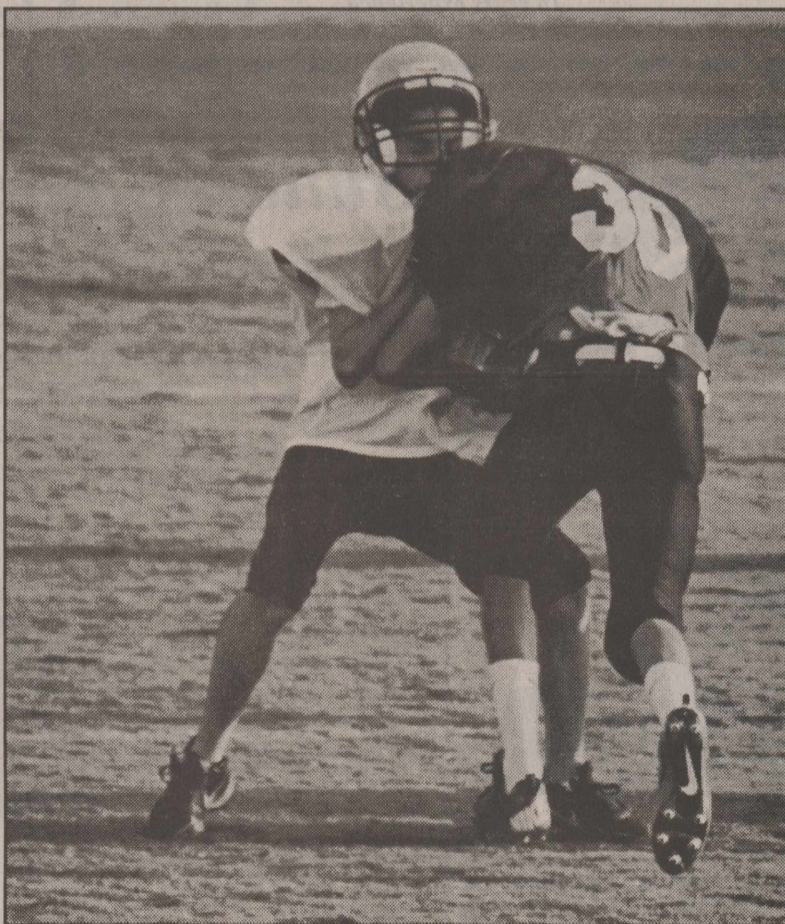
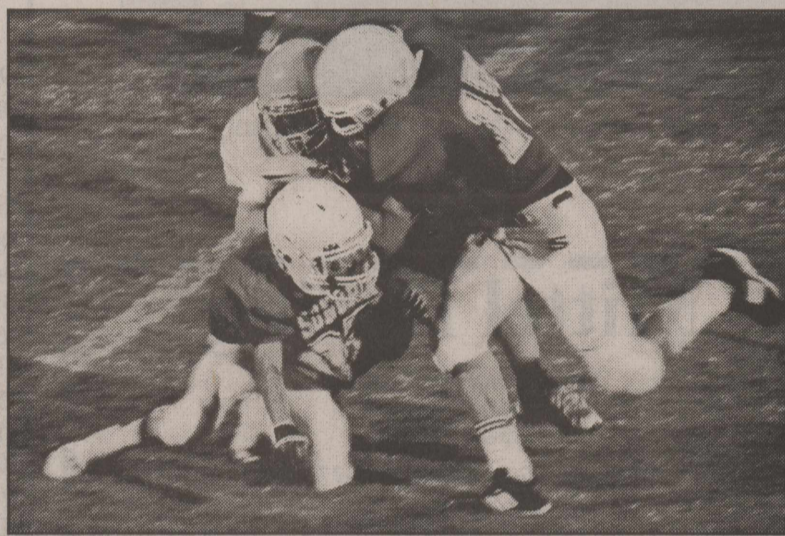

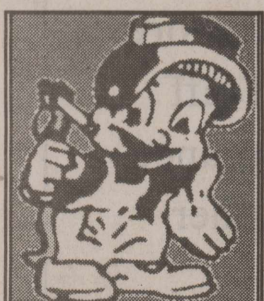

### Section 38-34:

- (2) Accumulation of rubbish, trash, refuse, junk and other abandoned materials, metals, lumber or other thing.
  - (3) Any condition that provides harborage of rats, mice, snakes and other vermin.

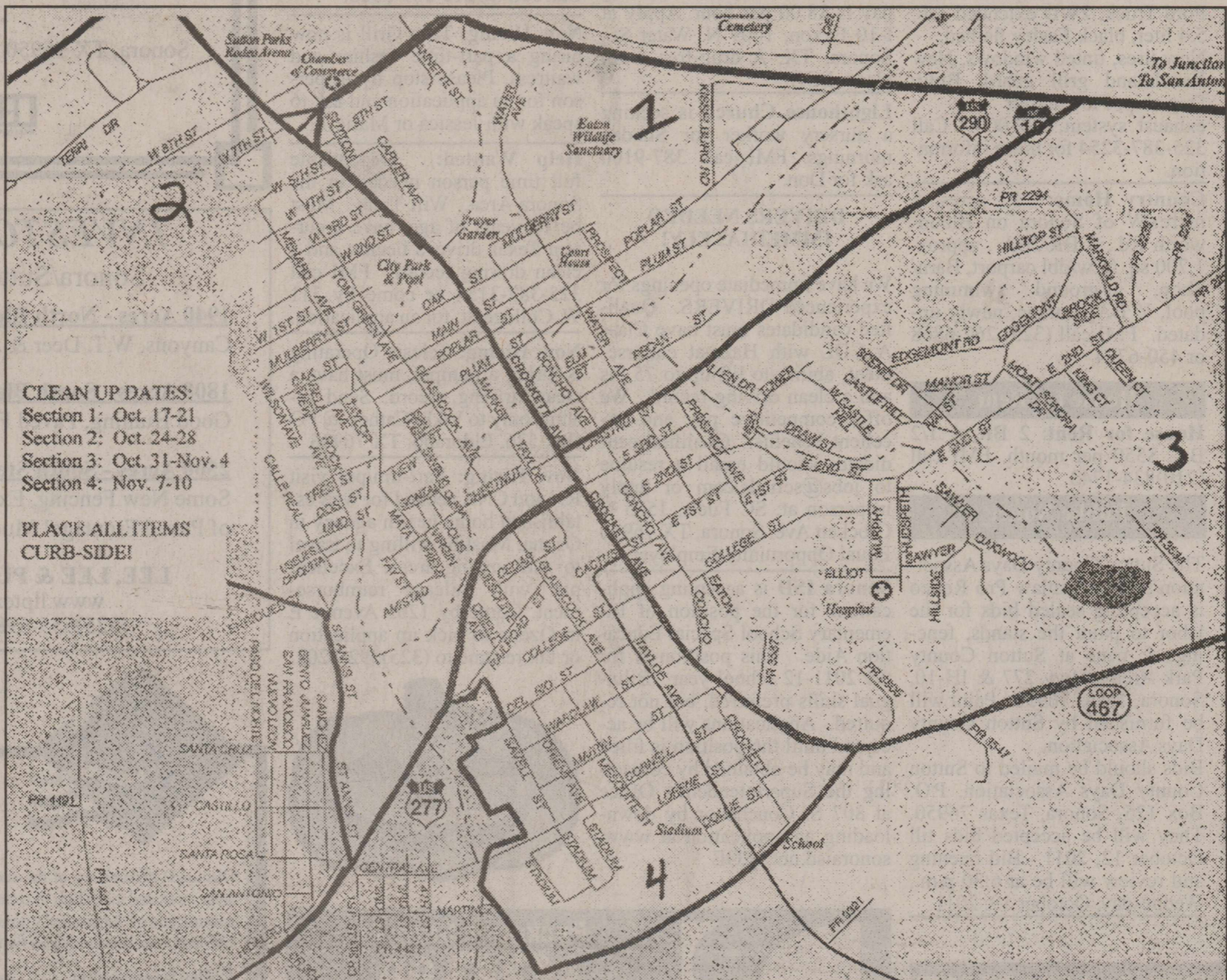

carded; or (3) Has remained inoperable for more than 45 consecutive days.

A junked vehicle that is located in a place where it is visible from a public place or public right-of-way is detrimental to the safety and welfare of the general public, tends to reduce the value of private property, invites vandalism, creates fire hazards, constitutes an attractive nuisance creating a hazard to the health and safety of minors and is detrimental to the economic welfare of the state by producing urban blight adverse to maintenance and continuing development within the city and shall be deemed a public nuisance. It shall be unlawful for any person to cause or maintain such public nuisance by wrecking, dismantling, rendering inoperable, abandoning or discarding his vehicle on the property of another or to suffer, permit or allow the same to be placed, located, maintained or exist upon his or their own real property.
