## Bronco Express Rolls On

Again last week, the Broncos dominated a weaker opponent with class as they defeated Harper by a score of 49 to 14. It is hard (possibly impossible) to find a weakness in this year's Broncos. Except for a rare turnover, the Broncos' starters scored on every opportunity with six Broncos scoring points. The average length of the scoring drives was two minutes and three seconds. The average scoring drive lasted four plays, the longest drive was nine plays, and two drives were of the one play variety.

The Bronco defense was just as impressive as the offense. Harper managed two first downs in the first half with one rushing yard and 32 yards of passing! In the first half, Reagan Randle, Harper's fine quarterback, was held to one yard rushing on nine carries. Harper's leading rusher for the game managed 22 yards on six carries.

On the third play of the game, Clayton Parks completed a 65 yard pass to Word Hudson who was forced out of bounds at the Longhorn seven yard line. Zach Badeaux stepped in motion from his flanker position, took the handoff from Parks, and ran to his left. Edward Garza took out the defensive back allowing Badeaux to score. Kade Wimberley kicked the PAT and the

Broncos led 7 to 0 with 10:33 left in the first quarter.

As usual, the Bronco defense, led by Kyle Patlan, Damon Evans, and Sam Powers forced a three and out. Imoni Cross fielded the punt and started up the left sideline. He was stripped of the ball, but it bounced right to Jorge Villanueva who continued the return to the Longhorn 17 yard line. Dallas Payne accepted the handoff from Parks running to his right. When he was hemmed in, he cut back to his left and scored. The kick just barely missed to the right, and the score was 13 to 0 with 8:31 left in quarter one.

The Longhorns managed one first down on a completed pass. The drive ended when Davis Jimenez intercepted at midfield. Cross caught a 12 yard pass on fourth down to keep the drive alive. Cadesman Pope caught a short pass and turned it into a 33 gain to Harper's four yard line. After three plays, the Broncos had been backed up to 12 yard line. Parks lofted a pass to Hudson who made his patented, leaping catch for the touchdown. Parks then rolled to his right and threw to Hudson for the two point PAT. With 3:08 left in the first quarter, the Broncos led 21 to 0.

Harper's next drive lasted four plays and ended when

Powers recovered a fumble at Harper's 39 yard line. Garza scored on the first play on a run through the Harper defenders. Harper managed to block the PAT, and the scoreboard read Harper 0 - Visitor 27 with 1:56 on the scoreboard clock.

After another three and out, Cross fielded the punt at the 50 yard line and raced for an apparent touchdown. However, it was called back for a block in the back. This drive ended when Randle intercepted a Parks' pass and returned it 30 yards to the Bronco 40 yard line. Four plays later, Payne intercepted Randle.

Hudson hauled in a 35 yard pass to the Longhorn 29 yard line. Pope's catch and run set up a first and goal. Parks hit Badeaux over the middle for a nine yard touchdown. Wimberley boomed the PAT through the uprights for the 34th point with 8:54 left in the second quarter.

The last Bronco scoring drive of the first half lasted eight plays, covered 59 yards and ended with another touchdown pass from Parks to Badeaux. The PAT snap was high and Payne leaped to catch it. The ball bounced off his hands, and Wimberley caught it. He threw a pass that was tipped by Nathan Villa and finally caught by Jesse Vaquera. At first, the officials threw a flag. After they talked about it, the play was allowed to stand as Villa must have been an eligible receiver. The score at the half was 42 to 0.

Harper received the opening kickoff. Will Dutton hustled down the field and tackled the returner at Harper's eight yard line. Four plays later, Harper was punting from their own end zone. Erik Santana carried three times on the Broncos' last scoring drive, making the last Bronco touchdown on a 31 yard run. Mr. W ended the scoring with his kick. With the score at 49 to 0, the majority of the starters retired to the sideline.

With a running clock, the Bronco reserves gained some valuable experience. The Harper players and fans enjoyed watching their Longhorns score two touchdowns

## State Legislature Examines the Permanent School Fund

The Texas Legislature is currently looking at re-evaluating the Permanent School Fund by trying to pass Amendment Six to the State Constitution. Early voting has already started, and the general election will be on Tuesday, November, 8 2011. The Permanent School Fund (PSF) is an endowment trust established to benefit Texas public education. Proceeds from the PSF are transferred to the Available School Fund (ASF), which then distributes the funding to school districts throughout the state.

The Permanent School Fund is comprised of two sources of funding: (1) returns from investments on the fund's principal (2) proceeds from state land and mineral investments. This amendment makes accounting changes to how the second source of funding (land and mineral proceeds) are distributed to the PSF. The Permanent School Fund's endowment is comprised of significant amounts of public land. Money is earned from these lands through a number of ways such as oil and gas revenues, sales, leases, etc.

The State Land Board (SLB) decides how much of the proceeds from PSF land gets transferred to the PSF. Currently there are no minimum parameters or regulations stipulating how the State Land Board distributes those proceeds to the PSF. The SLB determines how much is distributed to the PSF for public education purposes and how much is reinvested.

Currently, assets managed by the School Land Board are not included in assessing the Permanent School Fund's market value. Proposition 6 would change that. It would amend the constitution to include certain SLB real estate and cash assets in calculating the PSF's market value. The PSF's market value influences how much money is available to transfer to the Available School Fund for public schools each year.[4]

Proposition 6 would also amend the constitution as to allow the SLB to transfer funds directly to the ASF (capped at \$300 million annually), instead of sending them first to the PSF to be passed on to the PSF.

## City of Sonora Activity Report

This is a follow-up on the City of Sonora's activity report so kindly provided in last week's DRN.

If you have been driving over open paving for (I won't ask how long) awhile, our water improvement contractor Housley Communication's, Inc. and our pavement repair contractor, Charles Howard Construction, Inc. will be starting repairs within the next two weeks.

It is important that the City notify each resident in the area to be worked on the day before we begin work. The main reason being that there should be no vehicles parked in front of your house on the day we will be working there. The reason for this is that we do not want anyone's vehicles to be in the way of the equipment making the repairs.

You will receive a message delivered to your door on the day before repairs begin.

When the repairs are made, the City will run their street sweeping machine to clean up the left over dirt and gravel. This will probably create some dust for a short time. But then it should be over and your neighbor hood will have the best water distribution system available anywhere.

The City of Sonora and the City Council continue their plans to make the required improvements in the coming months.

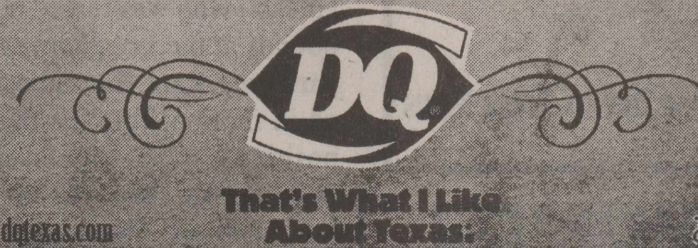

## Hill Country Chapter - American Red Cross 2011 Heater Program

KERRVILLE, TX – October 31, 2011 — The Hill Country has already experienced its first cold front of the season! With temperatures in the low 30's, the American Red Cross Winter Heater Program begins November 1st, supplying local residents with space heaters to stay warm during the upcoming months. Last year, the chapter distributed one hundred seven (107) heaters to local families. The Chapter Executive, Kristy Vandenberg estimates that the need will be even greater this year.

The heater program assists the elderly, disabled, chronically ill and families with young children during the winter months. Potential clients can either call the Red Cross themselves, or be referred by an agency, concerned friend, or family member. The heaters are provided to those who do not have heat within their homes, trailers and apartments. Specifically, this program serves:

- A. Elderly Citizens 62 years of age and older on a limited fixed income: Social Security, S.S.I, or pension.
- B. Disabled citizens whose only financial support is from disability income.
- C. Families with children under 6 years of age who have limited financial resources.
- D. Specified others who are chronically ill and suffering from the extreme heat, with no financial means of purchasing a fan. (A social worker must call Red Cross on client's behalf.)

For the past several years, area residents have been very supportive of this program with donations to the local chapter. Those wishing to support this service to the community may do so by bringing donations or a new or unused heater to the American Red Cross Chapter Mon-Fri from 8am-5pm.

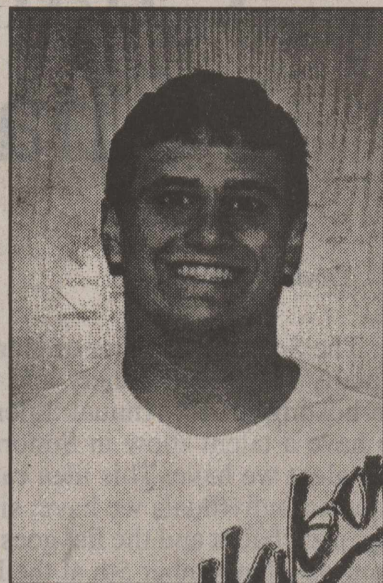
# Students of the Week

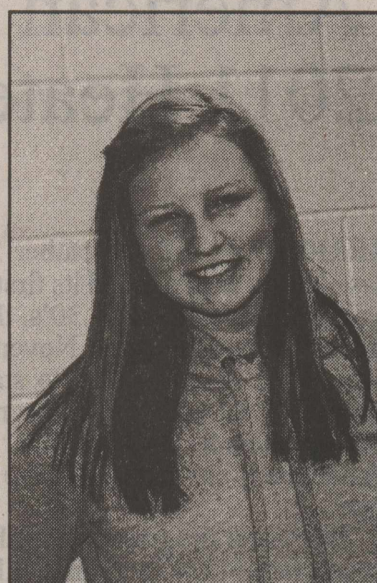

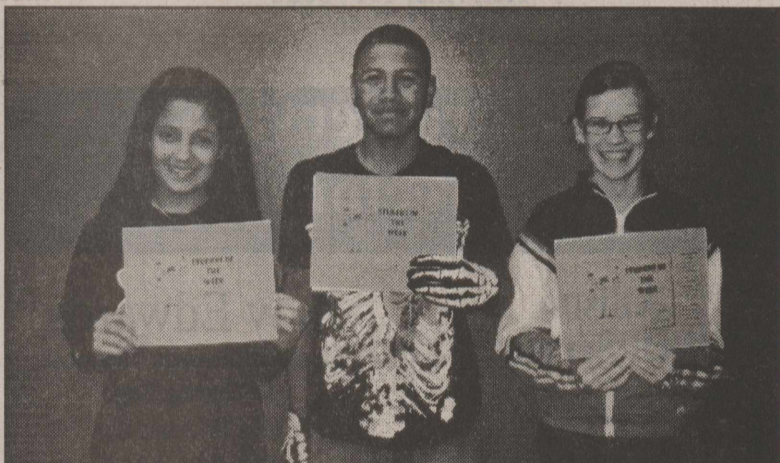

On the street he was taken and put in a car by five men. A month later his body was found and he had been tortured and killed.

Friends of Camarena began almost immediately to honor their friend and his sacrifice with the Red Ribbon. Certainly it was not just for Camarena but for his and others service and to challenge Americans for the sake of our children to remember, "It's up to me to be Drug Free!". American's buying the drugs fuel the market. The end result is destroyed lives but young and old. It's time to take up the Red Ribbon and remember the battle for our young people.

# Home Horticulture Tips For November

With the end of October and the start of November usually come our first frost or freeze for the season. That brings about a different set of chores for the gardener. Here are a few things to be thinking about.

**BE ON THE LOOKOUT.** October is a good time to reduce the insect and disease potential in next year's garden. Cleanup the garden, pulling up all annuals that have completed their life cycle. Remove the tops of all herbaceous perennials that have finished flowering or as soon as frost has killed the leaves. If twig girdlers have worked over your trees so that many twigs and branches are dropping, make sure these are collected and destroyed as the eggs are deposited in that portion of the branch that drops to the ground.

**FERTILIZER.** Reduce or stop fertilizing indoor plants now through mid-March. An exception would be plants in an atrium or well-lighted window that are actively growing.

**MISCELLANEOUS CHORES:** Start collecting leaves for the compost pile. Be sure to have extra soil. Always wet the layer of leaves thoroughly before adding the soil. Add about one pound of complete lawn or garden fertilizer to each layer of leaves to provide the necessary nitrogen for decomposition.

Evergreen plants frequently suffer from lack of moisture during those winter dry periods that occur in West Texas. Adequate soil moisture provides the best protection you can give your lawn and plants against winter cold injury. Lawns need water during the winter in order to reduce damage that can show up in the spring.

# Benefit From Properly Prepared Poultry

It's reaching that time of year again, the cooking season! Family get together, holidays, and celebrations are just around the corner. As these special events approach, and you begin planning your events, be sure to keep food safety in mind. A popular food choice for this time of year is poultry and poultry products. Poultry is a nutritious economical choice and very versatile in the ways you can cook with it. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, it is estimated that that 1 in 4 Americans will get a foodborne illness each year. You can protect your family by following certain food safety measures when handling or preparing poultry and poultry products.

It is not always easy to tell when a food product is safe to eat. Most bacteria cannot be seen, smelled or tasted. To ensure your poultry is safe to eat, consumers should be careful when handling raw products at all times. Follow these safety tips when preparing your poultry.

**Grocery Shopping:** Food safety begins at the store. Do not buy products that have been bruised or damaged in any way. If purchasing frozen food, make sure you have enough storage space in your freezer and the product is frozen solid. Refrigerated food should be cold to the touch. Keep raw foods separate from ready to eat foods in the cart as well as in bags.

**In the Kitchen:** One of the most effective ways to prevent bacteria from spreading is by practicing good personal hygiene. Be sure to wash your hands before preparing food and after using the bathroom, changing diapers, or handling any raw foods. Keep your kitchen clean. Be sure to wash cutting boards, utensils and counter tops with hot soapy water. A common sanitizing solution you can use is 1 teaspoon bleach to one quart of water.

**Cooking and Serving:** Whole poultry and poultry parts should be cooked to a minimum internal temperature of 165 degrees F. Place the thermometer in the thickest part of the meat away from bone. Be sure to check the temperature of the meat before serving it to make sure it reached its proper temperature of 165 degrees F. The only way to ensure your food is properly cooked is to use a calibrated food thermometer.

When serving food, be sure to use only clean utensils and dishes. Heat only what you will be serving and refrigerate everything else. Do not let food sit out more than 2 hours.

**Leftovers:** Divide all cooked foods into shallow containers and refrigerate or freeze within two hours of cooking. Throw away any food left out at room temperature for more than two hours. Use leftovers within 3-4 days then discard or freeze. When using frozen leftovers; use within 2 to 6 months for best quality. Reheat all leftovers to a minimum internal temperature of 165° F before eating.

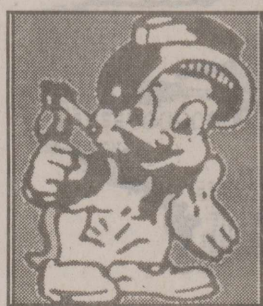
## 7th Grade Colts Defeat Harper 24-20

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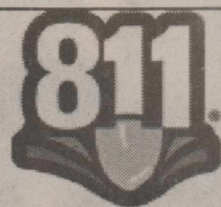

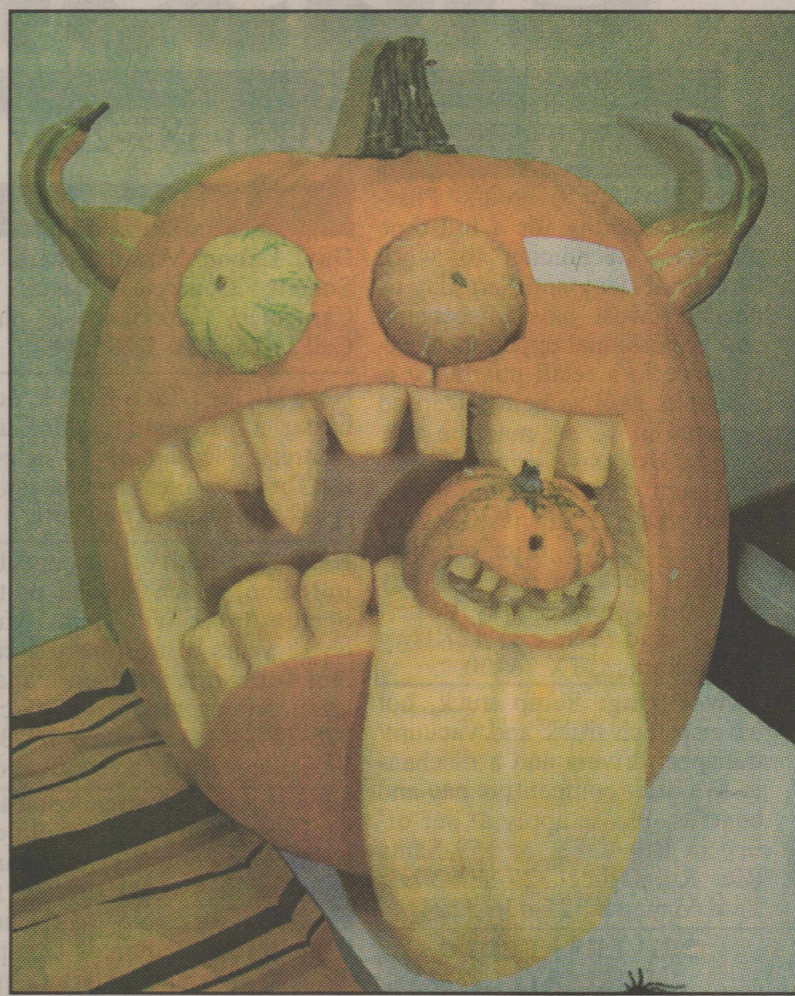
to finish the game at 49 to 14.
