

The school counselors compile the names of those who

need to receive assistance.

In the past we have been able to coordinate with ALCO for the clothing vouchers, but we are making a great effort to also purchase the school supplies for this project from them as well. It is our hope that ALCO is able to work with our committee to get the best pricing so that we are able to help the children.



Now Is The Time To Spray Brush

By Pascual Hernandez, Sutton County Agricultural **Extension Agent**



We are in the window of opportunity for herbicide applica-

Frequent brush spraying recommendations include "spray foliage when soil temperatures are above 75 degrees" or "wait until the new foliage has changed from a light pea green color to a uniform dark green color." But, have you ever stopped to

consider why this is so?

It has to do with the time of year and what the plant is doing. Once budbreak occurs, further plant development is regulated by daylength. When brush such as mesquite puts on new leaves, the sap (carbohydrates) begins to move up to provide energy for the developing leaves. Yet, when the leaves have fully developed, they actively produce carbohydrates and will transport them BACK to the roots for storage. If spraying is done when leaves are a pale green and not yet fully developed, the trees are not translocating to the roots; therefore, root-kill is low and only top-kill is achieved. You'll kill the top, but the plant will re-sprout the next year. This happens early in the season or after a rainy period.

We also have to be careful if the summer gets too dry. Drought-stressed plants are often less responsive to herbicides, or require higher herbicide rates for effectiveness. A common plant response to drought is the formation of a thicker cuticle to reduce transpiration; this, however, makes foliar uptake of

herbicides more difficult.

Keeping Kids Safe From Hidden Household Dangers

(StatePoint) Curious children will put anything in their mouths. But many household items can be deadly when swallowed.

One of the most dangerous hidden hazards for children is powerful magnets. Unlike those typically found on refrigerators, magnets in children's toys and even in desk toys marketed for adults can be extremely powerful. "It's critical to educate children, adolescents, and their parents about keeping small, powerful magnets out of young children's hands and mouths," said Robert W. Block, MD, FAAP, 2011-2012 president of the American Academy of Pediatrics

While the Consumer Product Safety Commission has worked with the toy industry to pass standards to prevent magnets from detaching from toys, parents should always check toys for magnets to ensure that if present, they are secure. Discard any toys that cannot be fixed and never let children under 6 play unsupervised with magnetic toys. Products labeled for users age 14 and up do not have to comply with the toy safety standard, so parents must be especially vigilant about keeping them well out of children's reach. Teach your children never to put magnets in their mouths.

According to the AAP, common abdominal symptoms, such as pain, nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea could be a sign magnets were swallowed. Be sure to seek medical attention imme-

diately if these symptoms occur.

Magnets aren't the only items children are putting in their mouths. In 2010, more than 3,400 children swallowed lithium button batteries, according to the National Capital Poison Center. Tears in the esophagus and internal bleeding are some of the common injuries associated with swallowing batteries. Keep loose and spare batteries locked away and store any product that uses button batteries out of reach.

In addition, child-proof your medicine cabinet. It's easy to mistake a dangerous pill for a delicious piece of candy. Lock away your medicine and throw out any old and unnecessary pills. 
