## Sonora's John Duke Hudson Receives All American Scholar Honors

Sonora Academy of Arts Late Registration Wednesday, August 8 from 6:30PM - 7:30PM @ Dance Studio on Main St.



NORMAN, Okla. - College of Charleston rising senior John Duke Hudson (Sonora, Texas) was honored today by the Golf Coaches Association of America as they announced the Cleveland Golf/Srixon All-America Scholars.

Hudson, a Pre-Business Administration major at CofC, was one of 146 players in NCAA Division I to earn this honor.

"This is a great accomplishment for John Duke," CofC head coach Mark McEntire said. "It shows how well he

is able to balance school and golf. I hope he can continue to excel in both areas and have an outstanding senior year."

Hudson had a stroke average of 74.91 with a low round of 70 and a season-best finish of third-place at the Kauai Collegiate Invitational in the fall. In the spring Hudson finished 25th at the Southern Conference Championship at the Daniel Island Club.

To be eligible for Cleveland Golf/Srixon All-America Scholar status an individual must be a junior or senior aca-

demically, compete in at least three full years at the collegiate level, participate in 70-percent of his team's competitive rounds or compete in the NCAA Championships, have a stroke-average under 76.0 in Division I, 78.0 in Division II, 77.0 in NAIA and 79.0 in Division III, and maintain a minimum cumulative grade-point average of 3.2. A recipient must also be of high moral character and be in good standing at his college or university.

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## Conservation Agency Seeks Local Input at Annual Meeting

SONORA, TEXAS, July 25, 2012- The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Edwards Plateau Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) and the Local Working Group invite the public to their annual Conservation Stakeholder's Meeting at 3:00 pm August 8, 2012 at the USDA-NRCS office located at 301 SE Crockett.

Each year, the Local Working Group hosts a public meeting to determine the re-

source concerns and needs of the area and how to best address those needs. The NRCS and their local conservation partner, the Edwards Plateau SWCD, provide agriculture producers with professional consultation and financial assistance through Farm Bill conservation programs to apply conservation practices on their land that address soil erosion and health, water quality and quantity issues, as well as wildlife habitat. The Lo-

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## Plunge In CO2 Output Due To Natural Gas Fracking

The most underreported recent environmental story has been the dramatic decline in energy-related carbon emissions -- nearly back to mid-1990s levels, and falling.

Maybe it's because that story just doesn't fit the left's mantra that traditional energy sources are destroying the environment.

The U.S. Energy Information Administration's (EIA) June energy report says that energy-related carbon dioxide fell to 5,473 million metric tons (MMT) in 2011.

That's down from a high of 6,020 MMT in 2007, and only

a little above 1995's level of 5,314 MMT.

Better yet, emissions in the first quarter of 2012 fell at an even faster rate -- down 7.5% from the first quarter of 2011 and 8.5% from the same time in 2010. If the rest of 2012 follows its first-quarter trend, we may see total energy-related carbon dioxide emissions drop to early-1990s levels.

That's a very positive environmental story, and yet you probably haven't heard a word about it. Especially from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), which couldn't keep tyrannizing the states if

the truth got out -- and now that tyranny has the blessing of a federal appeals court.

A three-judge panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit recently rejected arguments by several states and industry groups that the EPA was overstepping its authority and using strong-arm tactics to regulate greenhouse gasses.

As we learned from former White House Chief of Staff Rahm Emanuel's comment about a crisis being a terrible thing to waste, the heavy hand of government regulation can get a lot heavier if it can

claim it's addressing a crisis. And highlighting a huge decline in energy-related carbon dioxide emissions doesn't fit the crisis scenario.

So why the decline? It would be hard to credit either political party. As EIA figures show, energy-related carbon dioxide emissions had been rising steadily for decades -- through both Republican and Democratic administrations and Congresses. They were rising in the 1990s when Bill Clinton was president, and continued to rise when George W. Bush was in of-

However, emissions began to fall after 2007, when Barack Obama was only a second-year senator -- so he doesn't get the credit.

The most likely explanation for the decline is the shale gas revolution, made possible by hydraulic fracturing, or fracking.

Increasingly, power plants are turning to natural gas because it has become abundant, and therefore cheap. And though technology is improving our ability to reduce emis-

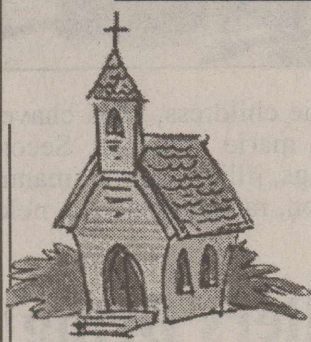

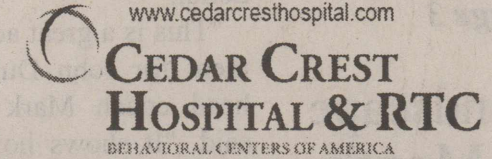

I appreciate Dr. Patjestka and my dear friend, Diana Artega RN-PAC, as well as all the staff who have had a difficult time in treating me, as well as both my elderly parents, who both have their own debilitating disease processes, in which we are all indebted to for their expertise in accommodating all of our illnesses & needs. Also, a big thanks goes out to LMH for meeting our needs on a local basis, with their updated equipment to serve the community, the financial services to meet one's needs on a fixed income, as well as their friendly staff to meet & greet everyone the same, that has medical emergencies or sick family in the hospital. I would also like to salute the Physical Therapy Department, in which now has the daring challenge of helping me to rehabilitate and moan & groan while doing such! I am also obliged to Dr. James Mull (Orthopedist) & Dr. Moore (Anesthesiologist), who took on the trying task to fix my leg, which I recommend highly to all in need of their services & expertise.

Also, I would like to pay tribute to Dr. Mull's office staff & Shannon Medical

Center, where I had surgery & inpatient stay. 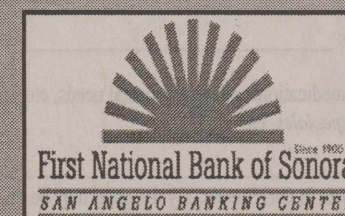

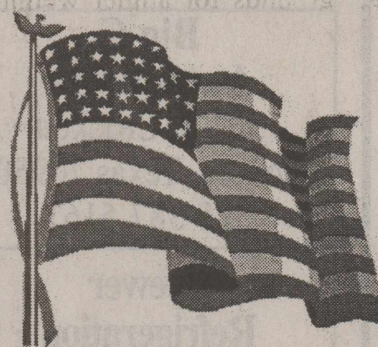

# Sonora to Host Ranch Herd Management Workshop on August 15

By Pascual Hernandez, Sutton County Agricultural Extension Agent



Nearly all our region's livestock producers had to reduce their herds in 2011 due to the extreme drought and record-breaking heat. Though conditions have moderated somewhat this year, most pastures are still in poor condition, so restocking is not an option. And while reduced livestock numbers is necessary to rangeland recovery, less livestock can also mean less revenue.

Ranchers often need a certain amount of income from the ranch to pay the bills. Less livestock and skyrocketing feed costs can make that a challenge. Thankfully, livestock prices have been excellent, so the point is for producers to maximize profits from the livestock they have by targeting peak markets and minimizing their overall overhead.

To discuss options, the Texas AgriLife Extension Service offices in Sutton and Schleicher counties will conduct the Ranch Herd Management Workshop: Making Ranching Work with Fewer Livestock. The program runs from 8 a.m. to noon on August 15 in the Sutton County Civic Center.

The day's speakers will include Dr. Rick Machen, AgriLife Extension livestock specialist, Uvalde; Benny Cox, Producers Livestock Auction, San Angelo; Dr. Charles "Butch" Taylor, superintendent, Texas AgriLife Research Station at Sonora; and Dr. Dale Rollins, AgriLife Extension wildlife specialist, San Angelo.

The program topics will include:

- Beef Outlook - Condition of the beef herd, enduring with fewer cows, market expectations and securing feed sources.
- Sheep and Goat Market Report - Auction numbers; conditions, trends and expectations for the fall market; ethnic holidays and types of animals desired; and comparing prices of similar weight hair sheep and wool sheep lambs.
- Preparing for the Feeding Season - Historical rainfall and recovery patterns; assessing forage supplies; and forage recovery/outlook for Fall-Winter 2012-13.
- In Times of Drought, Feed Deer? Feed Livestock? Feed Neither? - The challenges of feeding; does feeding make economic sense?

Three Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units will be available for those with a valid pesticide applicator license. Individual preregistration is \$10 by August 10 and \$15 thereafter. The fee covers refreshments and workshop materials.

All landowners and land managers in Sutton County are encouraged to attend and participate in this meeting. This open discussion public meeting will focus on identifying area natural resource concerns that can be addressed using conservation programs and activities.

"Effective conservation stems from a locally led process," says Tom Payton, NRCS District Conservationist for Sutton County. "The Sutton County NRCS office operates on the concept that local residents' best understand local issues and are the key to solving problems."

"Our Conservation Stakeholders Meeting gives everyone the opportunity to decide how the assistance from the NRCS and Farm Bill funds can be

most beneficial for our community," adds Payton.

Through the Edwards Plateau SWCD, the Local Working Group will provide recommendations to the NRCS District Conservationist on local natural resource priorities and criteria for conservation activities and programs planning for the upcoming fiscal year. These issues will be especially important in decisions made for financial assistance when implementing the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP). This program is administered by the NRCS and provides incentive payments for the installation of several conservation practices on eligible participant's land. The information gathered from these meetings will be used to help carry out the EQIP and other programs

in 2013. While the NRCS brings the technical expertise and Farm Bill funding to the table, the goods and services are delivered through the local SWCD board. SWCDs are local units of government made up of five members elected by the public. Their office is usually co-located with the NRCS office. Members of SWCD Boards are actively engaged in farming and ranching.

**Bar Stool Economics: A Simple Guide to the American System of Taxation and Distribution**

Suppose that every day, ten men go out for a beer and the bill for all ten comes to \$100.

If they paid their bill the way we pay our taxes, it would go something like this:

The first four men (the poorest) would pay nothing. The fifth would pay \$1.00. The sixth would pay \$3.00. The seventh would pay \$7.00. The eighth would pay \$12.00. The ninth would pay \$18.00. The tenth man (the richest) would pay \$59.00.

So that's what they decided to do. The men drank in the bar every day and seemed quite happy with arraignment, until one day, the owner threw them a curve.

"Since you are all such good customers, he said, I'm going to reduce the cost of your daily beer by \$20.00.

"Drinks for the ten men now cost just \$80.00

The group still wanted to pay their bill the way we pay our taxes so the first four men were unaffected. They would still drink for free. But what about the other six men - the paying customers? How could they divide the \$ 20 windfall so that everyone would get there "fair share?" They realized that \$ 20.00 divided by six is \$3.33. But if they subtracted that from everybody's share, then the fifth man and the sixth man would each end up being paid to drink his beer. So, the bar owner suggested that it would be fair to reduce each man's bill by roughly the same amount, and he proceeded to work out the amounts each should pay!

And so: The fifth man like the first four, now paid nothing ( 100% savings).

The sixth now paid \$2 instead of \$3 (33% savings).

The seventh now pay \$5 instead of \$7 (28% savings).

The eighth now paid \$9 instead of 12 (25% savings).

The ninth now paid 14 instead of 18 (22% savings).

The tenth now paid \$49 instead of \$59 (16% savings).

Each of the six was better off than before! And the first four continued to drink for free. But once outside the restaurant, the men began to compare their savings.

"I only got a dollar out of the \$20" declared the sixth man. He pointed to the tenth man, "but he got \$10!"

"Yeah, that's right, shouted the seventh man. "why should he get \$10 back when I got only two? The wealthy get all the breaks!"

"Wait a minute," yelled the first four men in union. "We didn't I get anything at all. The system exploits the poor!"

The nine men surrounded the tenth and beat him up.

The next night the tenth man didn't show up for drinks, so the nine sat down and had beers without him.

But when it came time to pay the bill, they discovered something important. They didn't have enough money between all of them for even half of the bill!

And that, boys and girls, journalist and college professors, is how our tax system works. The people who pay the highest taxes get the most benefit from a tax reduction. Tax them too much, attack them for being wealthy, and they just may not show up anymore. In fact, they might start drinking overseas where the atmosphere is somewhat friendlier.

sions from coal usage, natural gas is still a much cleaner source.

Indeed, natural gas has just passed an important milestone. As noted by John Hanger, energy expert and former secretary of the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection: "As of April, gas tied coal at 32% of the electric power generation market, nearly ending coal's 100-year reign on top of electricity markets."

There are other factors, of course. For one, a slow economy tends to use less energy, especially oil. And despite President Obama's two -- or is it three -- "summers of recovery," this economy is going nowhere fast.

The economic slowdown appears to be causing a gradual decline in petroleum-related carbon dioxide emissions, which also peaked in 2007 and then began to fall, albeit at a slower pace than the total emissions decline.

Even so, all facets of the energy industry have been working to reduce carbon emissions, and those efforts are beginning to pay off.

The refining industry, for example, reports that between 1990 and 2008 it spent \$112 billion -- and \$20 billion in 2010 alone -- to get emissions in compliance with regulations. As a result, the industry has reduced sulfur levels in gasoline by 90% since 2004 and a similar reduction in diesel since 2005.

That task is made more difficult when refiners have to rely on upgrading existing plants to meet new federal regulations rather than building new ones, leading several northeast refineries to shut down recently.

The reason for the lack of new refineries is the EPA refused to grant any new building permits.

The good news, according to the Associated Press, is that the EPA has just granted "final permit approval" to three Native American tribes in North Dakota to build a new refinery -- the first permit in the lower 48 states in 41 years. It's a start, but only a start.
