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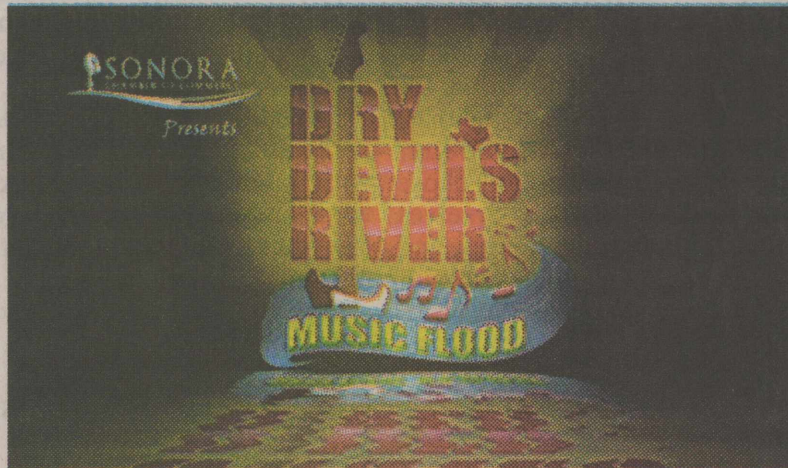

The Green Future

Environmental activists regularly scare Americans about our domestic energy resources -- and urge us to abandon development of them. Witness the various efforts to stop hydraulic fracturing, offshore and onshore drilling, and the like.

What life would look like in this new green world, though, rarely gets coverage. Considering environmental activists aren't very secretive about their agenda, it's worth looking at the dramatically different lifestyle they envision for all of us.

When you wake up in your new sustainable home, the first thing you notice is the cramped quarters. Today, the average home size in the United States is around 2700 square feet. That's about five times more than environmentalists think you need.

The founder of treehugger.com, for instance, just moved into a sustainable home many consider a model for the future. At 420 square feet, the home comes with movable walls to create separate spaces when you need them.

The upside is you won't need much space for appliances. Environmentalist guru Bill McKibben, founder of 350.org, notes that a 60 percent reduction in fossil fuel usage would result in a dramatic reduction of carbon emission per person. Says

McKibben, "If you carpooled [six miles per day], you'd have about three pounds of CO2 left in your daily ration-enough to run a highly efficient refrigerator. Forget your computer, your TV, your stereo, your stove, your dishwasher, your water heater, your microwave, your water pump, your clock. Forget your light bulbs, compact fluorescent or not."

But surely your electric vehicle will get you around greenly? Unfortunately, no.

A recent study by the Low Carbon Vehicle Partnership suggests electric powertrains actually have a bigger carbon footprint than internal combustion engines once you take manufacturing the battery and producing the electricity into account. Electric cars don't even out with their gas counterparts for about 80,000 miles.

You'll be biking everywhere. But not to the shopping mall. As McKibben has said: "[S]lash your stock of clothes to a comfortable (or even uncomfortable) minimum... If we reached that point-the point where great closets full of clothes seemed slightly absurd, unnatural-then we might have begun to climb down from the tottering perch where we currently cling."

It's a long way down. The Internet, for example, collectively generates emissions equivalent to half the fossil fuels burned in the United King-

dom. That's a lot of CO2. No more web-surfing for you.

But surely we can move heavily into renewables and stave off these extreme lifestyle modifications, right? Again, no.

The Worldwatch Institute notes the problem with that approach, "[I]n order to produce enough energy over the next 25 years to replace most of what is supplied by fossil fuels, the world would need to build 200 square meters of solar photovoltaic panels every second plus 100 square meters of solar thermal every second plus 24 3-megawatt wind turbines every hour nonstop for the next 25 years. All of this would take tremendous energy and materials-ironically frontloading carbon emissions just when they most need to be reduced."

It turns out that building solar panels and wind turbines takes a lot of power and emits a lot of carbon - to say nothing of the effects of the extraction of the rare earths, metals, and other materials required to produce them.

But don't worry, the same environmental groups opposing oil and gas production are also opposed to rare earth extraction. So environmentalists themselves have made sure these alternative energy sources will remain out of reach for some time.

Public Invited to Provide Input for Upcoming TxDOT Project

The main arterial through Sonora is about to receive an upgrade thanks to a \$5.5 million dollar project the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) plans to put out for bid this fall. A new road surface on US 277 will be laid from the Dry Devils River Bridge on the north end of Sonora to the East Fork of the Dry Devils River Bridge on the south end of town, approximately 1.76 miles.

TxDOT invites the public to learn more about this project, review the plans, and talk to the project engineers.

Conditions Ripe for Dove Season

AUSTIN — A bumper crop of native sunflower and other seed producing weedy plants this year have created ideal habitat conditions leading into September's dove hunter opener. Better habitat is good for the birds, but might make hunting tougher during the early migratory game bird seasons, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists.

"Abundant seed production, predominately sunflower and croton will help recently fledged birds to rapidly put on weight," said Corey Mason with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. "But, quality range conditions could also cause doves to disperse as food sources become readily available and make managed fields less attractive early in the season."

Texas dove season in the North and Central Dove Zones will run from Saturday, Sept. 1 through Wednesday, Oct. 24 and reopen Saturday, Dec. 22 through Sunday, Jan. 6, with a 15-bird daily bag and not more than two white-tipped doves.

"I'm seeing lots of growth of sunflowers, crotons, and other early-succession stage 'weeds' that should provide abundant food sources and hunting opportunities when they ripen in the fall," said Mike Krueger, TPWD district biologist in Ker-ville.

For hunters looking for hunting opportunities on public lands, check out TPWD's Public Hunting Program, TPWD offers affordable access to quality hunting experiences with the purchase of a \$48 Annual Public Hunting (APH) Permit.

Permit holders have access to more than 100 hunting units leased from private landowners specifically for dove and small game. An online map feature allows for "virtual scouting" of these areas. By clicking on the locator points, you can follow links to detailed aerial maps with highlighted boundaries and links to information pages from the APH information map booklet. A downloadable Google Earth file (.kml) is also available that contains all the boundary information along with links to the corresponding APH map booklet pages.

Hunters are reminded that in addition to a valid Texas hunting license, a state Migratory Game Bird Stamp, and certification in the Harvest Information Program (HIP) is required. HIP certification is offered when you buy your license and involves responding to a few simple questions about your migratory game bird harvest during the previous season. Hunting licenses expire annually on Aug. 31.

Great Bake-Free Desserts Ideas For Summer

Or create a parfait of frozen yogurt, fresh strawberries and a variety of nuts.

For a bit of inspiration, try out this perfect no-bake summer treat from Landis:

Invisible Cookie Dough Ice Pops

Makes: 4 pops
 Active time: 5 minutes
 Total time: 3 hours

Ingredients:

- 1 1/4 cups milk (skim, 2 percent, or whole)
- 1/3 cup light brown sugar, packed
- Pinch salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 tablespoons mini semisweet chocolate chips

Directions:

In a microwave-safe container or glass measuring cup, microwave milk 30 seconds or until warm to the touch. Add brown sugar and salt and stir until dissolved. Add vanilla.

Place 1/2 tablespoon chocolate chips in the bottom of each of four 1/3-cup ice-pop molds or small paper cups. Top each with milk mixture. Insert sticks and place molds in freezer. Freeze until solid, at least 3 hours.

To release pops, run molds under warm water 20 to 30 seconds; they should slide right out. If using paper cups, simply peel cups away and discard.

If your ice-pop mold does not include built-in sticks or a lid to hold them in place, you may find yourself with sticks pointing every which way but up. To prevent this, stretch a layer of plastic wrap over the top of the mold and secure it with a rubber band. Cut a small slit in the plastic, centered over each pop, and insert a stick through each opening. Alternatively, you can adjust sticks as necessary after about 45 minutes of freezing, when the pops aren't yet frozen solid.

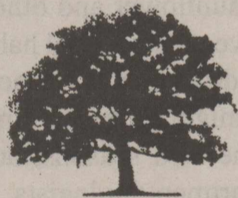

TWC Warns Texans about Gift Card Email Scam:

Agency encourages Texas residents to educate themselves about online security

AUSTIN – The Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) warned today that emails claiming to offer free gift cards “on behalf of Texas Workforce Commission” are not to be trusted. Such offers are not attributable to TWC, and anyone who receives such an email should delete it immediately. Responding to the email, or clicking on the included web link, may result in harmful malware being downloaded to the recipient’s computer, TWC warned. TWC has received reports of scam emails claiming to be sent on behalf of TWC stating the recipient has won a \$1,000 gift card. The email instructed the recipient to visit a website called “rewards2012” to claim the gift card. However, if a recipient follows the link to the website, malware attempts to

download to their computer. This is a known “phishing” scam, and TWC reminds Texans never to click on links in an email from an unknown source. Phishers and scammers often will direct people to websites that look very similar to legitimate websites in order to obtain login credentials or personally identifiable information, such as social security numbers, dates of birth or mother’s maiden names. Following these links may result in monetary or identity theft. Texas residents also are reminded that TWC staff will never call or email to obtain personally identifiable information, perform home visits, or use text messages to contact them. Unemployment benefit recipients should only give personal information

when filing for benefits online at ui.texasworkforce.org or when speaking to an unemployment benefit customer service representative on the Tele-Center phone filing system at 800-939-6631. TWC encourages individuals to check their bank or other online account settings for unusual activity if they suspect they are victims of identity theft. To avoid becoming a victim of online scams, visit the Office of the Attorney General online at www.oag.state.tx.us/consumer/scams.shtml or www.onguardonline.gov, managed by the Federal Trade Commission, for more information. To report suspicious emails posing as official TWC messages, please call TWC’s Fraud and Program Abuse Hotline at 800-252-3642.

Keep An Eye on Feed and Hay Prices

For the most part, our rangelands are in better shape than this time last year. Timely spring rains helped us out quite a bit, but the middle of summer tends to be hot and dry for us. So it's no surprise that things are getting "pretty crunchy" out there. That gets many folks to thinking about the cost of feed and anxiously anticipating September rains.

Part of the anxiety is due to the increasing cost of feeding livestock. That's because the U.S. is experiencing the worst drought since the 1950s, with more than half of the nation suffering from dry and hot conditions. This epic drought is baking crops, scorching pastures and dwindling feed supplies for many throughout the U.S.

Hay may also be affected. Many in the mid-west have already started to feed hay this summer, and there is increased worry about having enough feed resources available to get through the winter. If none are available, the next worry is how much will it cost to purchase hay?

Something to keep an eye on. All that could spell higher prices for us this winter. The price of feed has already gone up this summer.

On a related note, the "Ranch Herd Management Workshop" on August 15th will present thoughts on market expectations as well procuring feed sources. Part of the session will address historical rainfall and recovery patterns for our area. We'll also get tools for assessing forage supplies and, thoughts on forage recovery as well as the outlook for the fall and winter (provided it rains soon).

Other topics include: "Beef Outlook"; "Sheep & Goat Market Report"; and "Does Feeding Make Economic Sense During Drought". The workshop takes place from 8:00 a.m. to noon at the Sutton County civic center.

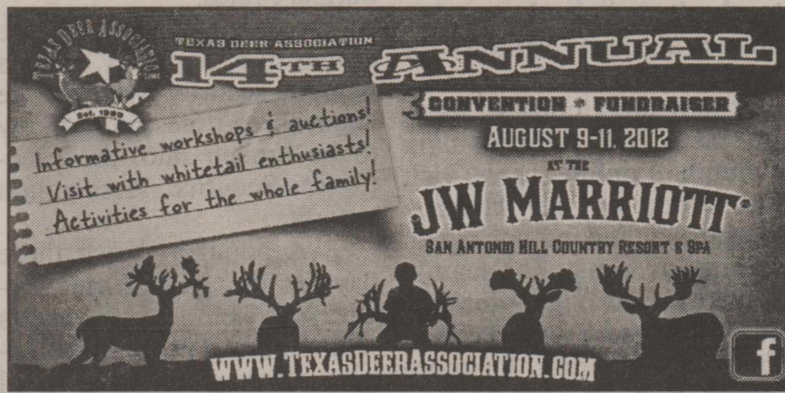

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DSHS Urges Precautions to Reduce West Nile Exposure

The Texas Department of State Health Services is urging people to take precautions to reduce the risk of contracting West Nile virus, a mosquito borne illness. People should use insect repellent when outdoors and avoid going outside at dusk and dawn.

There has been a higher than usual number of human West Nile cases in Texas this year due to the warm winter and recent rains, particularly in the North Texas region. Statewide there have been 111 human West Nile virus cases and one death reported to DSHS this year. Of those, 71 were West Nile neuroinvasive disease cases, and 40 were West Nile fever cases. Approximately 80 percent of the cases reside in Dallas, Collin, Tarrant and Denton counties.

Over the past 10 years, 49 cases on average were reported to DSHS by this time each year, ranging from a low of 3 cases in 2011 to a high of 171 cases in 2006.

Humans can contract West Nile virus from a mosquito bite. Infected mosquitoes get the virus from feeding on infected birds and mammals. The virus can cause serious illness or death. West Nile neuroinvasive disease symptoms include stiff neck, visual problems, body tremors, mental confusion, memory loss and seizures. The milder form of the illness is West Nile fever. Symptoms include fever, headache, muscle and bone aches, nausea and drowsiness.

People with the milder form of illness typically recover on their own, although symptoms may last for several weeks. Up to 80 percent of people infected with West Nile virus will have no symptoms and will recover on their own.

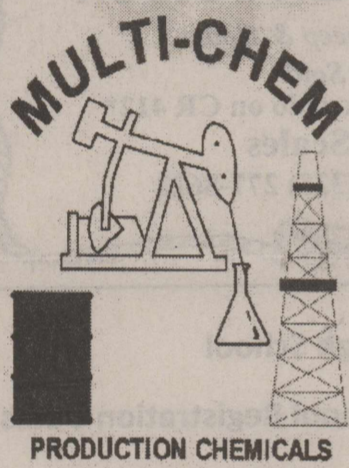
The intensity of West Nile virus activity in Texas fluctuates from year to year and depends on a variety of factors including the weather, the numbers of birds and mosquitoes that maintain and spread the virus and human behavior. The season can last up until the first hard freeze of the year.

There are no medications to treat or vaccines to prevent West Nile virus infection. People over 50 years old and those with compromised immune systems are at a higher risk of becoming seriously ill when they become infected with the virus. If people have symptoms that cause them concern, they should contact their healthcare provider.

To reduce exposure to West Nile virus:

- Use an approved insect repellent every time you go outside and follow the instructions on the label. Approved repellents are those that contain DEET, picaridin or oil of lemon eucalyptus.
- Regularly drain standing water, including water collects in empty cans, tires, buckets, clogged rain gutters and saucers under potted plants. Mosquitoes breed in stagnant water.
- Wear long sleeves and pants at dawn and dusk when mosquitoes are most active.
- Use air conditioning or make sure there are screens on all doors and windows to keep mosquitoes from entering the home.

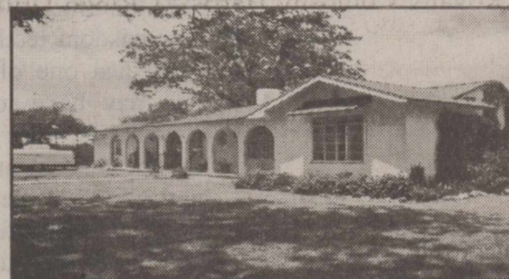

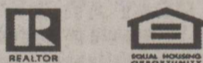

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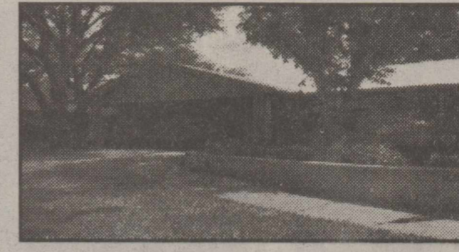
