Last Friday night in Ozona, the Broncos easily disproved the amateur pickers and the semi-professional prognosticators who picked Ozona to win the game. The game between the longtime rivals was over at the end of the first quarter after the Broncos scored 13 unanswered points.

The weatherman had been forecasting rain, and he had finally got it right as the teams met at midfield for the coin toss in a steady rain. At least, it was warm. The Lions won the toss and elected to defer to the second half.

On the Broncos third play,

Michael Rollert rolled to his right and threw to tight end Kade Wimberley who rambled for 55 yards giving the Broncos a first and goal from the eight. The Lions defense held for the only time of the night, and the ball went over on downs.

The Lions tried to run to the right on their first play only to have a gang of Broncos stop the Lion for no gain. On second down, they tried a short pass and Jason Alaman tackled the receiver for a loss and almost a safety. A sweep to right resulted in Elijah Cross and Sam Powers planting a Lion for no gain.

Darien Lopez fielded the Lion punt and returned it 31 yards to the Lion 13-yard line. On the second play, Cross took the pitch sweep through the Ozona defenders for a ten-yard touchdown. Wimberley kicked the PAT, and the Broncos led 7 to 0 with 6:21 left in the first quarter.

The Lion kickoff returner got outside of the Broncos' kickoff containment and was finally pushed out of bounds near mid-field. With the aid of the first of ten Lion fumbles, the Lions went three and out and punted into the endzone for a touchback.

Two runs by Damon Evans and three by Chance Campbell moved the ball from the Bronco 20-yard line to the Lion 37-yard line. Lopez broke through the line and sprinted for the second touchdown. Wimberley's kick was wide left, and the Broncos led 13 to 0 with 53 seconds left in the first quarter.

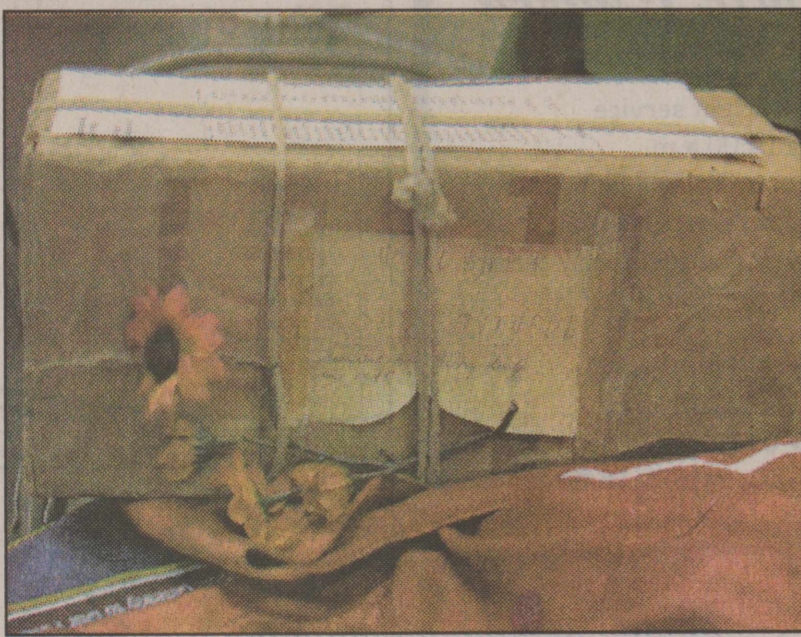
When Wimberley's kickoff was fielded at the five-yard line, it looked like the Lions were going to start deep in their territory. However, the Lion returner broke free and was finally hauled down by Cody Barber at the Lion 40 yard line.

The Lions attempted a sweep to their right and Ricky Martinez logged a solo tackle for no gain. Their drive ended with a lost fumble that Cross recovered.

Three plays later from the Lion 15-yard line, Lopez sped around the right end for his second touchdown of the night. Brett Castillo scored the two-point conversion on a run to the right. With 11:30 left in the second quarter, the Broncos had a three touchdown lead at 21 to 0.

The Lions got a first down when a fumbled snap to the Lion quarterback turned into an unplanned quarterback draw. They got one more first down on a defensive pass interference. Their drive ended when Powers, using his rodeo skills, sacked the quarterback

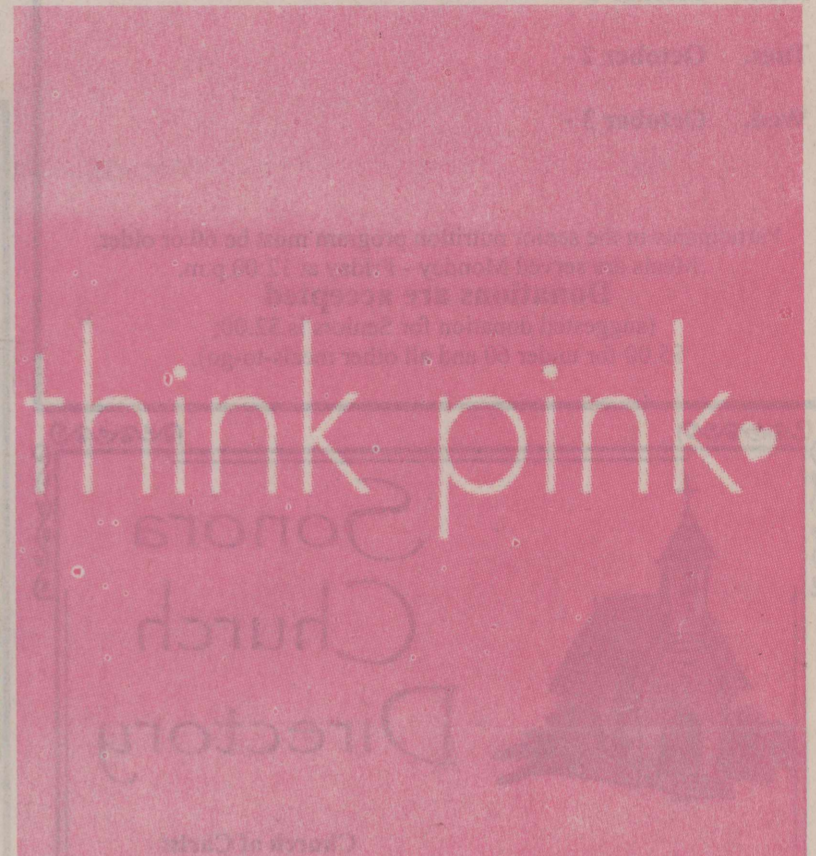
## 75th Sonora Downtown Lions Club Auction

## Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital Of Sonora Is Observing Breast Cancer Awareness Month With Several Special Activities During The Month Of October.

Beginning Monday, October 1st, with a group of women from Kimble County, the staff at Hudspeth Memorial began its month-long awareness and information campaign by hosting the first of five special "Mammo Party" events, focusing each week on a different community in the area. Scheduled for after-work hours from 5 to 7 p.m., participants are eligible for door prizes and can enjoy refreshments while receiving critical information on breast cancer detection and prevention from Kristy Edwards, MD and the Hudspeth Memorial Imaging Department staff.

Additionally, information will be available during all of the events for women seeking financial assistance for mammography services. Hudspeth Memorial and the Sutton County Health Foundation, through the Golfing for Ta-Tas program, provide free screening mammograms to local and area women who meet indigency qualifications. Through funding from the Laura W. Bush institute for Women's Health program, the hospital can now provide free mammograms to working women who have no health insurance, high deductibles or high co-payments. A three-year grant from the Cancer Prevention Research Institute (CPRIT), funds this program and provides funding for treatment for women who have been diagnosed with breast cancer.

Also, during the month of October, Hudspeth Memorial is offering screening mammograms, including the radiology reading, for a cash price of \$120; a savings of more than 50%.

Crockett County women will be guests of honor on Monday, October 8th, while the Sutton County women's Mammo Party is scheduled for October 15th. Ladies from Camp Wood and Rocksprings are carpooling to Sonora for their party on Thursday, October 18th, and our neighbors from Eldorado will be participating in the final Mammo Party on Monday, October 22nd.

The second annual Golfing for Ta-Tas benefit golf scramble gets underway on Saturday, October 13th with a shotgun start at 9:00 a.m. Ten teams of four players have already signed up for the event and sponsorship packages are still available for local businesses. Individuals who would like to make a donation, volunteer or become a sponsor should call Joe Marshall or Tamatha Humphrey at (325)387-2521. A signup sheet is available at the Sonora Golf Club clubhouse for players who would like to participate in the scramble. Cost is \$300 per team.

The "Shorties" team from Nabors Well Services and team "Clint Eastwood" from Eldorado won bragging rights and the \$500 per flight prize money last year. Hole in one prizes on par 3's (and a larger hole in one prize on hole #9 with an estimated value of \$9,000) are expected to provide spirited competition for area golfers.

Money raised through the golf scramble, with matching dollars from the Sutton County Health Foundation, will allow Hudspeth Memorial to continue to provide this vital diagnostic testing to women who would not otherwise be able to afford these services.

## West Nile Warning



Due to recent outbreak of mosquito-borne West Nile Virus in Texas, the City of Sonora is reminding property owners, businesses and the public to check their property for any standing water that could become a breeding ground for mosquitoes. Properly dispose of old tires, drums and buckets. Change the water in birdbaths and pet's water bowls weekly. Empty your kiddie pool weekly. Properly maintain in ground swimming pools year around and make sure your backyard pool is properly maintained while on vacation. Cover trash containers to keep out rainwater.

Check water fountains and ponds for mosquito larva. Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water with sand or concrete.

To protect yourself from West Nile Virus avoid being outdoors at dusk and dawn. Wear long sleeve and pants as well as insect repellent if outdoors.

Licensed Mosquito personnel with the City of Sonora routinely collect and send in adult mosquitoes for Virus Surveillance to the Texas Department of Health Lab. All mosquito specimens collected and sent in have tested

negative for West Nile Virus. The city will be increasing its West Nile Virus Surveillance by collecting more adult mosquitoes and having them tested for West Nile Virus. If the city receives any positive mosquito collections then the public will be informed.

The City of Sonora uses Larvacide's, Bacillus thuringiensis (B.T.I.) to control mosquitoes. This is done thru-out town in drain cans, draws and catch basins.

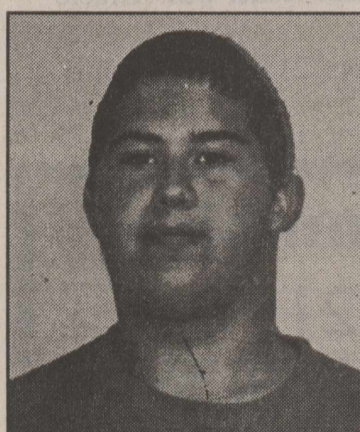

## TPWD Gearing Up For CWD Response During Deer Season

AUSTIN – Wildlife officials are asking mule deer hunters and landowners in far West Texas to familiarize themselves with new protocols developed as part of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's (TPWD) Chronic Wasting Disease response plan. The plan includes mandatory check stations for harvested mule deer taken inside the CWD Containment Zone, which covers portions of Hudspeth and El Paso counties. See map of CWD zones at <http://www.tpwd.state.tx.us/cwd>.

The response plan is being implemented after tissue samples from two mule deer in far West Texas this past summer tested positive for CWD. These are the first cases of CWD detected in Texas deer.

CWD workshops will be held in conjunction with upcoming public hearings to inform landowners, hunters, and outfitters about CWD, care of meat, appropriate management actions, and check station requirements. TPWD will present proposed amendments to deer movement rules, answer questions and take public comment during the public hearing segment of the meetings.

Meetings are set for Oct. 2 in Fort Stockton at the Pecos County Civic Center; Oct. 3 in Alpine at the Alpine Independent School District Auditorium; and Oct. 4 in Van Horn at the Van Horn Convention Center. The workshops will start at 6 p.m. and the public hearing will begin at 7:30 p.m.

CWD is a member of the group of diseases called transmissible spongiform encephalopathies (TSEs). Other diseases in this group include scrapie in sheep, bovine spongiform encephalopathy (BSE or mad cow disease) in cattle, and Cruetzfeldt-Jakob disease in hu-

mans. CWD among cervids is a progressive, fatal disease that commonly results in altered behavior as a result of microscopic changes made to the brain of affected animals. An animal may carry the disease for years without outward indication, but in the latter stages, signs may include listlessness, lowering of the head, weight loss, repetitive walking in set patterns, and a lack of responsiveness. CWD is not known to affect humans.

There is no vaccine or cure for CWD, but steps have been taken to minimize the risk of the disease spreading from beyond the area where it currently exists. For example, within the CWD Containment Zone, human-induced movements of wild or captive deer, elk, or other susceptible species will be restricted and mandatory hunter check stations will be established.

Hunters taking mule deer inside the Containment Zone during the general season, Nov. 23 – Dec. 9, are required to submit their harvest (unfrozen head) for CWD sampling at mandatory check stations within 24 hours of harvest.

"We recommend hunters in the Containment Zone and High Risk Zone quarter deer in the field and leave all but the quarters, backstraps and head at the site of harvest if it is not possible to bury the inedible carcass parts at least 6 feet deep on the ranch or take them to a landfill," said Shawn Gray, mule deer program leader for TPWD.

Hunters that harvest deer in the Containment Zone during the archery-only season or outside the general season under the authority of MLDP (Managed Lands Deer Permits) will need to call TPWD at (512) 221-8491 the day the deer is harvested to make arrangements to have the deer sampled for CWD.

Mandatory check stations will be open from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Nov. 23 – Dec. 10. Stations will be located in Cornudas at May's Café (on US 62-180) and in Van Horn at Van Horn Convention Center (1801 West Broadway).

In addition to protocols within the Containment Zone, TPWD has created a High Risk Zone for voluntary CWD sampling during the hunting season. Biologists have been collecting voluntary mule deer harvest data in the region since 1980 and this year CWD sampling will be offered in addition to age and weight measurements.

Voluntary check stations will be set up at the following locations during the first three weekends of the general season, Saturday through Monday (Nov. 24–26, Dec. 1–3 and Dec. 8–10), from 9 a.m. – 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday and 9 a.m. – 1 p.m. Monday:

Midland at Naturally Fresh (Deer Processor) (1501 Elwyn)

Bakersfield at Chevron Station (south of I10; Exit 294)  
Sanderson at Slim's Auto Repair (823 West Oak; Intersection of US 90 and 285)

Alpine at Hip-O Taxidermy (east side of town on US 90, across from Dairy Queen)

"All deer brought to the check stations this season will be aged as part of our CWD surveillance," said Gray. "We also intend to collect other biological information such as antler measurements and field dressed weights as time allows."

Although wildlife officials cannot say how long the disease has been present in Texas or if it occurs in other areas of the state, they have had an active CWD surveillance program for more than

a decade. "We have tested more than 26,500 wild deer in Texas since 2002, and the captive-deer industry has submitted more than 7,400 CWD test results as well," said Mitch Lockwood, Big Game Program Director with TPWD. "But that part of West Texas is the toughest place to conduct an adequate CWD surveillance program because so few deer are harvested out there each hunting

season. Thanks to the cooperation and active participation of several landowners, we were able to begin getting an idea of the prevalence and geographic distribution of the disease without needing to remove many deer."

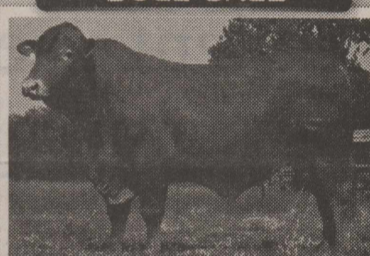

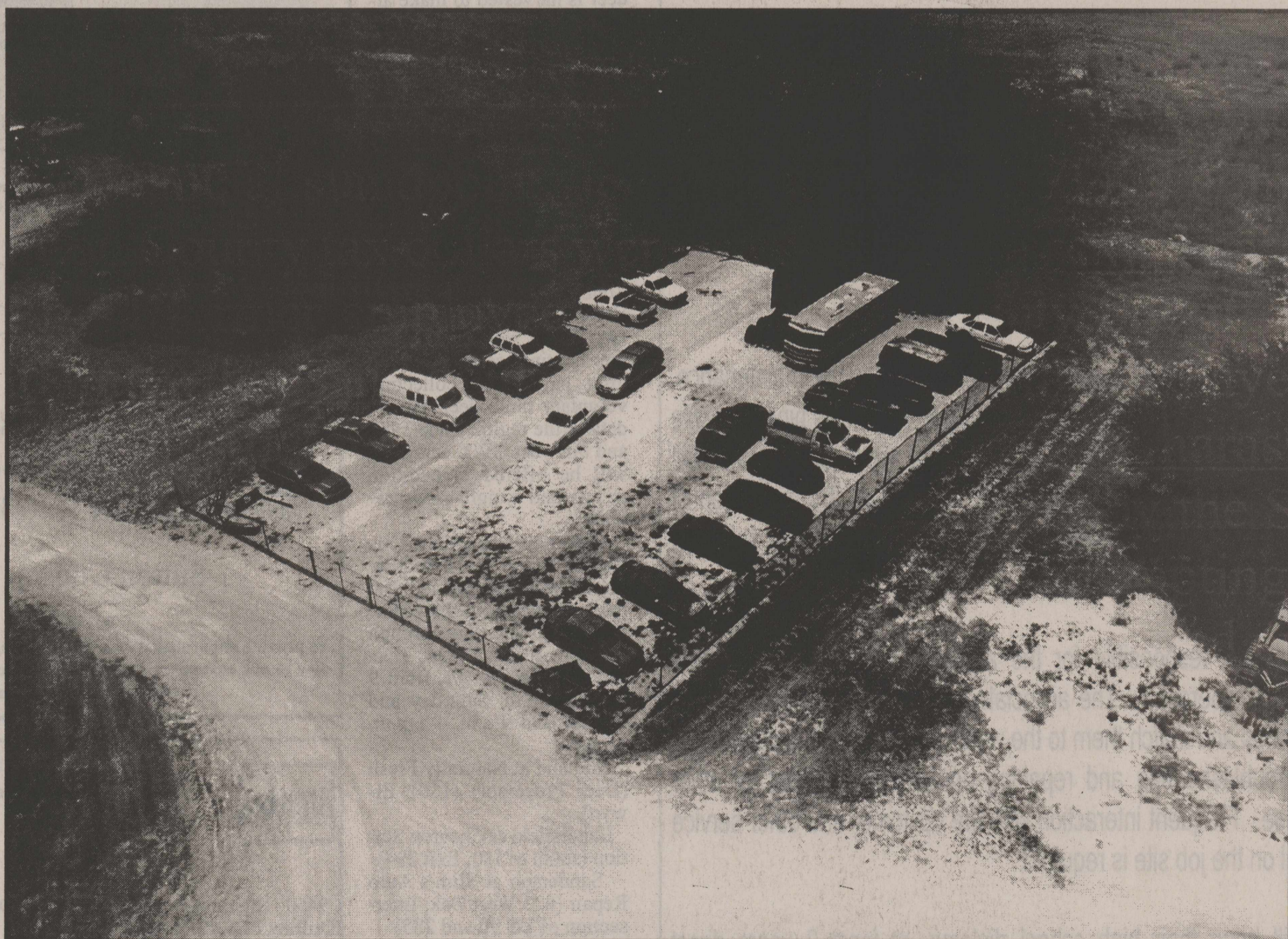

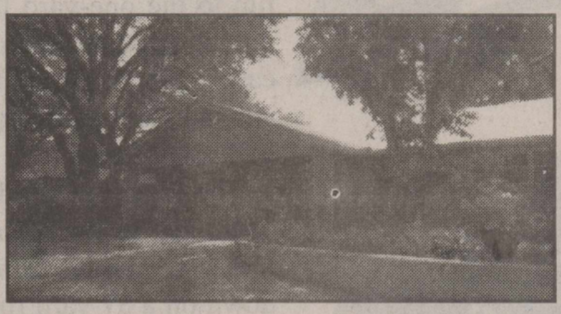

("WTG" or "Company") filed Statements of Intent to Increase Gas Distribution Rates for WTG's Texas gas distribution customers in the incorporated cities of Balmorhea, Cactus, Canadian, Canyon, Claude, Dalhart, Darrouzett, Devine, Eden, Farwell, Follett, Groom, Higgins, Junction, Kermit, Menard, Miami, Mobettie, Natalia, Paint Rock, Shamrock, Somerset, Sonora, Stratford, Texhoma, Texline and Wheeler, Texas. The proposed effective date for the change in rates is November 6, 2012.

If approved, the proposed changes to WTG's rates will affect all of the approximately 10,435 Domestic and 1,728 Non-Domestic customers in the twenty-seven (27) cities listed above. On a statewide basis, the proposed rates for all affected customers will increase the Company's annual revenues by approximately \$3,753,931, which represents an increase of approximately 74.81%, excluding gas cost, or 39.53% including gas costs. This is a "major change" in rates as defined by Texas law because it would increase WTG's aggregate revenues by more than 2.5%. The average monthly bill for a Domestic customer using 6 Mcf and a NonDomestic customer using 30 Mcf will increase by the amount and percentage shown in the table below.

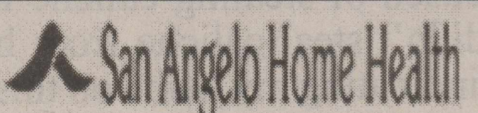

Including Farwell as part of the North Gas Cost Zone will have a *de minimis* affect on the cost of gas within the zone and little known affect on Farwell customers.

## Sonora Cross Country Runs Over North Texas

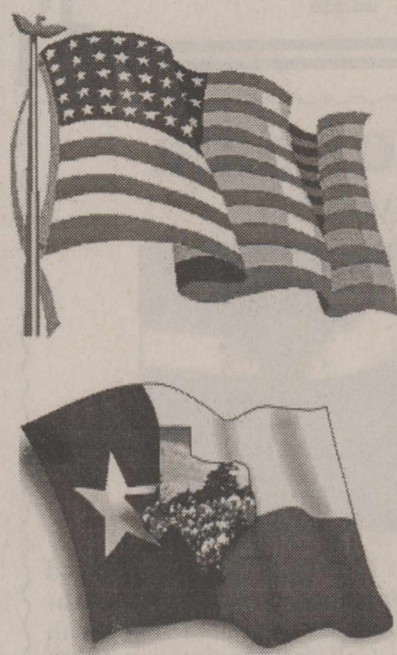

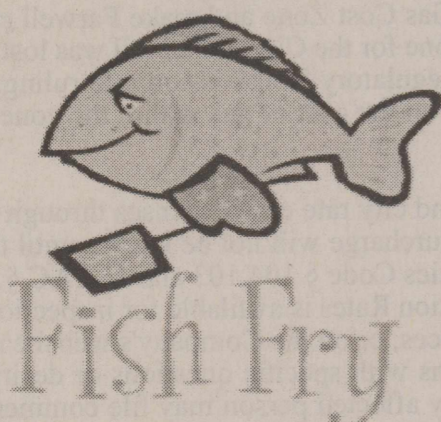

In 2004, a formal work performance citation was issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety to (then) State Trooper **Earlie Williams IV** for CHEATING while taking the Advanced Accident Investigation test. He continued, "I have been accused of stealing caliche from a local rancher. I can say that i didn't steal caliche from him or anyone else. I look forward to vindicating my name on this issue and other issues."

That was on December 4, 2008. On January 23, 2009, barely a month later, **Earlie Williams IV** signed a JUDGMENT OF CONVICTION pleading GUILTY to the charge of theft of caliche, as alleged.

Look at these FACTS and please ask yourself, do I want a man like **Earlie Williams IV**, who is a bully and a confessed liar, cheater and thief to be in charge of law enforcement in Sutton County?
