Tradition runs deep in the Land of the Broncos. Real Deep. The trophy cases are bursting with evidence of our successes for many years in various sports. However, we are ready to add to our collection. On this Friday, the road leading to the UIL football playoffs begins.

The Broncos start things off with a BANG by hosting the 4-1 Alpine Bucks. Alpine defeated Pecos 28-19, Wink 49-7, Fabens 28-27 and Anthony 69-0. In the last game of non-district play, the Muleshoe Mules defeated the Bucs 55-14. Historically, Sonora and Alpine have played 24 times. Sonora leads 18-6.

Junior Evan Moore, the Bucks' quarterback, has thrown for 782 yards and ten TDs. His favorite target is senior Oscar Trevino who has 21 receptions for 306 yards and five TD's.

That night in Sonora, Alpine's senior quarterback, Dominic Scott, threw for 444 yards and three TDs. Trevino played in this game also as a Freshman returning kickoffs and had a TD reception.

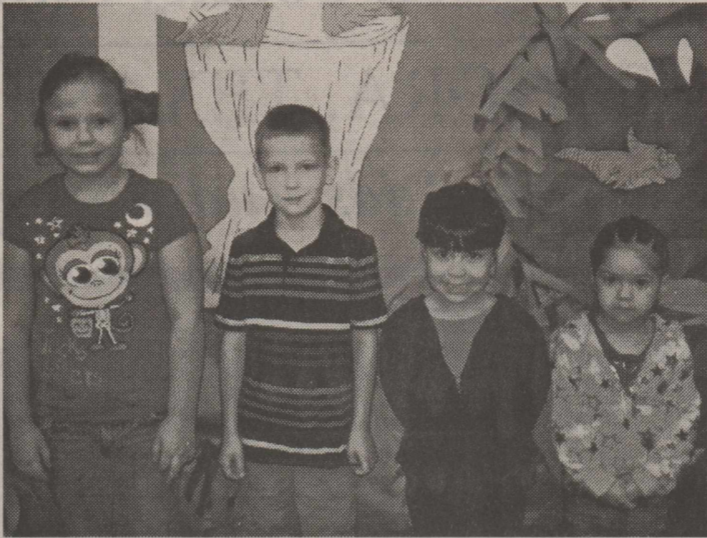

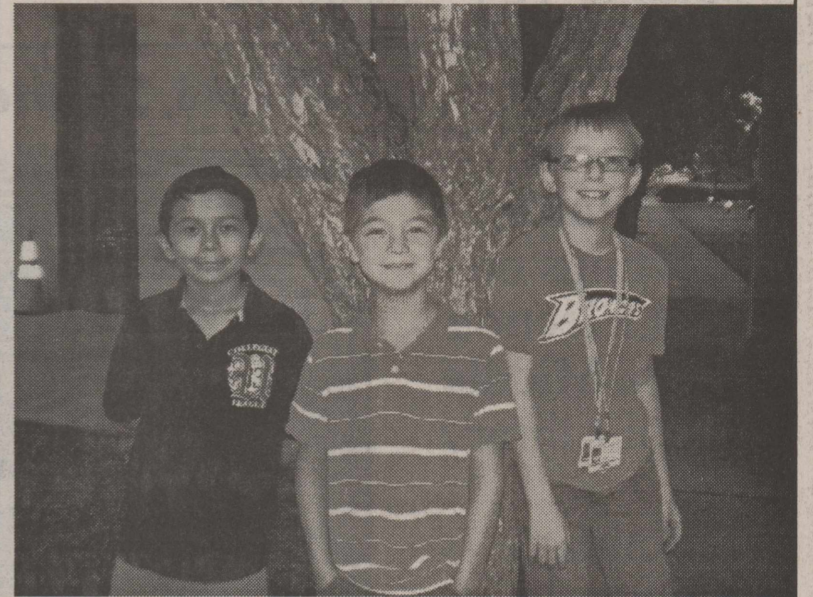

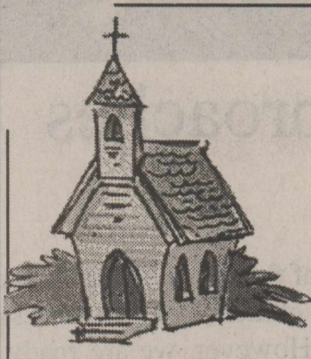

Program:

The program was Superintendent James Hartman. He discussed the coming Bond Election for the Sonora ISD. He reported that the bond listed the specific actions which would be covered in the one million, four hundred and twenty-five thousand bond to be voted on. He reported that of the 43 school districts in Region XV that Sonora's is the lowest. He also reported that with the retirement of the bond this year and if the proposed bond passed there still would be a decrease in taxes. Also such a bond would help with the debt recapture relative to the Robin Hood law. This would enable us to keep funds in our system rather than sending them to Austin for redistribution.

The bond will cover some building improvements but the largest share will be for state mandated science labs in the high, middle and elementary schools. Costs will also be met through the bond for transportation and technology needs. With these needs spelled out in the bond there is no way that money can be diverted to other projects.

NOTICE OF A BOND ELECTION
SONORA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

- 1. TAKE NOTICE that an election (the "Election") shall be held in the Sonora Independent School District (the "District") between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on November 6, 2012.
2. The voters residing in the Sutton County Voting Precincts shown in Exhibit A shall vote at the polling place shown in Exhibit A.
3. The Election shall be conducted by the election officials appointed in accordance with the Election Contract.
4. The Early Voting Clerk for the election shall be Rachel Chavez Duran, and the Deputy Early Voting Clerks shall be the Election Administrator's permanent employees, in accordance with the Election Contract.
5. All qualified electors of and residing in the District, shall be entitled to vote at the election.
6. At the Election the following PROPOSITION shall be submitted in accordance with law:

PROPOSITION

Shall the Board of Trustees of the Sonora Independent School District be authorized to issue the bonds of the District, in one or more series, in the aggregate principal amount of \$1,425,000 for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, renovating and equipping school facilities and acquiring school buses, to-wit: for renovating, repairing and equipping high school science labs and lecture rooms; repairing, replacing, and weather-proofing high school windows and doors; renovating existing space and equipping classrooms for high school health science, consumer science and art programs; renovating, expanding and equipping middle school science labs; correcting the drainage at the middle school courtyard; sealing, painting and weather-proofing windows in Rock Building; renovating, repairing and equipping the elementary school science lab; upgrading instructional technology equipment and infrastructure district-wide; and acquiring new buses and transportation upgrades; with the bonds to mature, bear interest, and be issued and sold in accordance with law at the time of issuance; and shall the Board of Trustees be authorized to levy and pledge, and cause to be assessed and collected, annual ad valorem taxes, on all taxable property in the District, sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the cost of any credit agreements executed in connection with the bonds?

- 7. The official ballots for the Election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid PROPOSITION with the ballots to contain such provisions, markings and language as required by law, and with such PROPOSITION to be expressed substantially as follows:

PROPOSITION

THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,425,000 OF BONDS BY THE SONORA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT FOR RENOVATING, REPAIRING AND EQUIPPING HIGH SCHOOL SCIENCE LABS AND LECTURE ROOMS; REPAIRING, REPLACING, AND WEATHER-PROOFING HIGH SCHOOL WINDOWS AND DOORS; RENOVATING EXISTING SPACE AND EQUIPPING CLASSROOMS FOR HIGH SCHOOL HEALTH SCIENCE,

FOR

AGAINST

CONSUMER SCIENCE AND ART PROGRAMS; RENOVATING, EXPANDING AND EQUIPPING MIDDLE SCHOOL SCIENCE LABS; CORRECTING THE DRAINAGE AT THE MIDDLE SCHOOL COURTYARD; SEALING, PAINTING AND WEATHER-PROOFING WINDOWS IN ROCK BUILDING; RENOVATING, REPAIRING AND EQUIPPING THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL SCIENCE LAB; UPGRADING INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY EQUIPMENT AND INFRASTRUCTURE DISTRICT-WIDE; AND ACQUIRING NEW BUSES AND TRANSPORTATION UPGRADES, AND LEVYING THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF.

- 8. In all respects, the Election shall be conducted in accordance with the Code. Pursuant to the federal Help America Vote Act ("HAVA") and the Code, at each polling place there shall be at least one voting system that is equipped for disabled individuals, and each such voting system shall be a system that has been certified by the Texas Secretary of State as compliant with HAVA and the Code.

Hunter Education Course To Be Offered October 20th

Deer season is just around the corner. Thousands of hunters will be out in pursuit of a trophy deer. But, before going to deer camp, there are two things to keep in mind- safety and the law.

Every hunter (including out-of-state hunters) born on or after Sept. 2, 1971, must successfully complete a Hunter Education Training Course. Minimum age of certification is 9 years and the cost is \$15. Hunter education not only teaches hunting safety, skills and responsibility, but is also the first step in a lifelong commitment to conservation and sportsmanship.

To that effect, the Texas AgriLife Extension Service and Texas Parks & Wildlife will offer a Hunter Education course. We traditionally offer a two-day course, but this year will have a different format. Those interested will take the online hunter education plus a one-day field course.

Visit <http://www.tpwd.state.tx.us/>, click on "Hunting"

tab and then "Hunter Education". From there, select the "online hunter education plus a one-day field course" option. Scroll down on that page and select the free course option.

Participants should then take the quizzes at the end of the first eight sections and print out the results. Section 9, "Outdoor Skills," has three quizzes, so you will have a total of 11 quizzes to print. Please bring the printed results of your quizzes with you to the Sonora 4-H Barn (located behind the Civic Center) on October 20th. The course runs from 8:00 a.m. to noon. The one-day field course will include a review, skills trail, and firearm handling. The final step is to pass the test and submit \$15 for certification.

Interested persons should call the Sutton County Extension Office at 387-3101 to register.

Dove Caught Your Tongue?

A Waller County game warden and a Harris County game warden were patrolling Waller County when, just before sunset, the wardens heard multiple shots coming from a wooded area. They made their way through the trees and observed three dove hunters having a great hunt, but not retrieving the doves that fell into the woods. If they had, they would have found the two game wardens. After the wardens hid in the brush for about 30 minutes, one of the hunters announced to his friends, "I am done. I have 23." The wardens looked at one another to make sure they both heard the same thing when the hunter yelled again, "I am done. I have 23 doves." The wardens took his word for it and announced their presence, separated the hunters, and discovered one with 20 doves, not 23. The other two hunters were within the daily bag limit. One of the wardens walked the hunter who was over his limit back to

the hunter's truck to retrieve his license. At the truck, the warden observed dove feathers that appeared to be from earlier in the day. The warden made a statement to the hunter, "This morning's hunt was good, wasn't it?" The hunter promptly agreed that it was really good and then realized what he had done, and said, "Oh, no." He admitted that he had also shot a limit in the morning. Citations were issued for exceeding daily bag limit and failure to retrieve game.

A Picture Says One Thousand Words

A Washington County game warden received information about a possible hunting violation from a local cyber crimes unit. The warden interviewed an individual that had posted a photo on his Facebook page of six cattle egrets that had been killed during a dove hunt on Labor Day. On the subject's Facebook page, it was noted that only three doves had been killed because the egrets got in the way. The subject gave a statement stating he and three other individuals had shot the egrets. The warden obtained information on the other three hunters and the location of the violation, which occurred in Austin County. With assistance from an Austin County game warden, statements were obtained from the other three hunters. Citations and restitution pending on all four subjects.

Illegal Attraction

Armed only with a tip about a website from an informant claiming an outfitter might be baiting a dove field,

Hopkins and Titus County wardens pieced together an investigation that led to several citations. After locating the hunting operator online, the wardens called to book a hunt. Imagine the outfitter's surprise when his new customers showed up in game warden gear. The operator admitted to spreading three yards of wheat seed down the middle of a 300-acre pasture with a tractor and front-end loader. Citations were issued for baiting and placing bait to attract.

Smile, You're on Candid Camera

Two Van Zandt County game

wardens were contacted by a local ranch owner concerning a unique picture that was taken on his game camera. The photo showed a woman, with a very distinct tattoo, holding a baby white-tailed deer fawn. The time stamp on the photo said that this woman was on the ranch property in May on the same date and time the ranch was burglarized and several firearms, hunting equipment and a Polaris Ranger were stolen. The wardens then conducted a press conference seeking help from the public in naming the woman in the photograph.

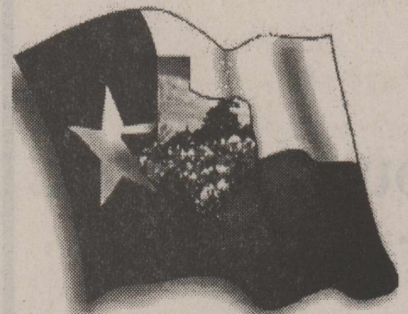

On September 27th and 28th, 2012, West Texas Gas, Inc. ("WTG" or "Company") filed Statements of Intent to Increase Gas Distribution Rates for WTG's Texas gas distribution customers in the incorporated cities of Balmorhea, Cactus, Canadian, Canyon, Claude, Dalhart, Darrouzett, Devine, Eden, Farwell, Follett, Groom, Higgins, Junction, Kermit, Menard, Miami, Mobeetie, Natalia, Paint Rock, Shamrock, Somerset, Sonora, Stratford, Texhoma, Texline and Wheeler, Texas. The proposed effective date for the change in rates is November 6, 2012.

If approved, the proposed changes to WTG's rates will affect all of the approximately 10,435 Domestic and 1,728 Non-Domestic customers in the twenty-seven (27) cities listed above. On a statewide basis, the proposed rates for all affected customers will increase the Company's annual revenues by approximately \$3,753,931, which represents an increase of approximately 74.81%, excluding gas cost, or 39.53% including gas costs. This is a "major change" in rates as defined by Texas law because it would increase WTG's aggregate revenues by more than 2.5%. The average monthly bill for a Domestic customer using 6 Mcf and a NonDomestic customer using 30 Mcf will increase by the amount and percentage shown in the table below.

The Company also proposes to eliminate the Farwell Gas Cost Zone and make Farwell customers part of the North Gas Cost Zone. The benefit of having a separate gas cost zone for the City of Farwell was lost when discounted transport rates were eliminated as part of a 2007 Federal Energy Regulatory Commission rate ruling. Including Farwell as part of the North Gas Cost Zone will have a *de minimis* affect on the cost of gas within the zone and little known affect on Farwell customers.

The Company seeks to recover its rate case expenses and city rate case expenses through a monthly surcharge as allowed by law. The amount of rate case expenses and the surcharge will not be known until the case is completed. Higher Ed Must Be Accessible For All Texans Texas Governor Rick Perry

Recently, we received the great news that the number of Texas students taking the SAT has soared over the last five years, especially among minority students. Statistics released last week show a 42 percent increase among African-American students and a 65 percent increase among Hispanic students. More than ever before, Texas students from all backgrounds are dreaming of going to college, and are taking active steps to get there.

This is quite a turnaround for Texas. In 2000, we had a smaller percentage of students going to college than any of the other 10 most populous states. To reverse this trend, the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopted a strategic plan called Closing the Gaps by 2015, which challenged our higher education institutions to increase enrollment by 500,000 in 15 years.

By 2005, this plan was

working so well that we moved the goalposts back further, increasing the target number to 630,000 by 2015.

As interest in pursuing a college degree is increasing, state officials have to do everything we can to remove the roadblocks and enable students to pursue their dreams.

That's why I'm calling for a four-year tuition freeze for incoming freshmen, so that the amount students pay when they first arrive on campus will be locked in through what should be their senior year. Not only will this help students and their families predict and plan for the cost of their college careers, it will also provide a powerful incentive to complete degrees on time.

Currently, less than 30 percent of students at Texas' four-year institutions graduate within four years. In fact, only 58 percent get their degrees in six.

Clearly, this system can -

and must - be improved.

For this reason, I'm also proposing we link a portion of each university's funding to the number of students that graduate.

Under the existing formula, state funding is based primarily upon the number of students who enroll in the university. This number is important, but it's not the complete story. Under my proposal, 10 percent of the school's funding will be tied to how many of those students are actually receiving degrees.

Simply put, if a school fails to graduate students, it'll eventually cost it some funding.

This will encourage universities to do everything they can to help their students complete their degrees and graduate in a timely fashion, saving both the student - and ultimately the university - time and money.
