Broncos 52 – Crane Golden Cranes 20

This past Friday, the Broncos traveled to Crane for the last regular season game of the 2012 season. The winner of this game would be the district runner-up with Alpine as the district champion. The game was played on the artificial turf with a strong wind out of the south. The Broncos dominated the game with eight players scoring touchdowns. Offensive linemen, Lino Villanueva, Michael Sanchez, Blake Esparza, Ethan Patlan, and Chris Ren-ning played their best game of the season. They opened the game with a 360 degree spin to break into the clear. As he started for the Broncos, the Crane defender was able to jump on Evans' back and ride him to the ground at their five-yard line. If Lopez had been able to stop that last Golden Michael Rollert, and Darien Crane, Evans would have been the Bronco record book with the Broncos 477 yards of rushing offense. Evans and Castillo just missed setting Bronco records.

Crane won toss and deferred to the second half. The Cranes stopped the Broncos on their first series, and Andres Acevedo had to punt into the howling wind. The wind blew the ball into the Cranes' stands, and they took over on the Broncos' 30-yard line.

Charles Tapia, Crane's quarterback, tried a flea flicker on their first play. Will Dutton made a leaping interception, and the Broncos were back on offense. The drive started with Darien Lopez losing two yards. Cross rambed through the line for 15 yards and a first down. Rollert then moved the chains down on both knees (I have on the quarterback keeper, indisputable proof in the form Cross broke through the line of one of Nancy's photos) to at the Bronco 44-yard line and catch the ball. Somehow, the was finally hauled down at refs missed it and he got the Crane's five-yard line. Evans kick off. got the touchdown as Rollert rolled to his right and threw and turned the ball over on to Evans. Kade Wimberley kicked the PAT, and the Broncos were on the board first with Joison Cavazos scored on a 8:43 left in the first quarter. Crane took over on their 36-yard line. After two failed running plays, Crane tried to set up a screen pass. The well-coached Broncos were ready for this play, and Tapia had to bell

run for 10 yards. After two incompletions, Rollert threw a "throw-back" screen to Wimberley for a 26-yard gain. Wimberley broke several tackles after making the catch. Lopez ran wide right and easily scored, but the play was called back for a holding penalty. Campbell made up the penalty yardage and more as he ran for a Bronco first down. Dutton was interfered with as he tried to catch a pass from Rollert. The penalty moved the ball to Crane's 15-yard line. After a rushing loss of two yards, the pitch to Lopez gained 13 yards to the four-yard line. Campbell scored from there. The Broncos tried to run for the extra point, but the Cranes were able to stop Rollert just short of the goal line. With 8:37 left, the scoreboard read 19 to 7 in favor of the visiting Broncos.

Wimberley boomed the kickoff out of the end zone and Crane started a drive at the 25-yard line. After three plays, they had to punt against the wind. The punt netted only one yard. The Broncos scored quickly. The best play of this drive was a pass to Hagen Kennedy. After catching the ball, Kennedy used a spin move to break free for yardage after the catch. Lopez ran from the 15-yard line to Crane's five yard line. Rollert executed a great fake, kept the ball, rolled to his right, and threw a five-yard touchdown pass to Wimberley. Wimberley also kicked the PAT, and the Broncos were comfortably ahead 26 to 7 with 5:37 left in the first half.

The second half opened on a good note for the Cranes. Crane's Steve Heredia slipped through the left side of the Broncos' line and scored on a 64 yard run. Their kick was good. 26 to 14 with 11:07 left in the third quarter.

The Broncos didn't take long to answer. The drive started with Lopez gaining 25 yards for a first down. Evans moved the chains with two

2012 Bi-District Playoff Game: Sonora vs. Ballinger

The Sonora Broncos with a record of 7-3 overall and 3-2 in district begins football post season play this Friday in Angelo against the Ballinger Bearcats at 7:30 PM. The Bearcats (7-3, 2-3) started out with five straight wins in non-district play. Things didn't go as well once district started. They lost to Colorado City by a score of 20 to 13. The Bearcats eked out a win over Hawley with a three-point win at 20 to 17. Coleman beat them by 11 points at 14 to 3. Hamilton lost to Ballinger by a touchdown in a 21 to 14 game. Cisco, who made it to the state finals in 2011, won in a blowout 40 to 7.

In the Bearcats' loss to defending 2A Div II Runner-up last Friday night in Ballinger, their only points came on a 79-yard kickoff return by Anthony Rodriguez. Cisco held the Bearcats to 180 total yards of offense (138 rushing, 42 passing). The Lobos' defense held Ballinger's leading running back, senior Zach Perez, to 101 yards on 19 carries. Perez had a season ending injury in their game with us last year.

The Broncos have played 92 different teams during our football history. Of the present day 2A teams in our past, only six teams have a winning record over Sonora. Ballinger is one of those six teams. The two teams have played each other 29 times since 1923. The series stands 16-20-1 in the Bearcats' favor.

Sonora has defeated the Bearcats each of the last three years. This includes the 2010 37-34 nail biter where the Broncos rallied from a three touchdown deficit and it ended with their kicker missing a chip shot field goal to send the game into overtime. Last year the Broncos defeated Ballinger 54-0. With a Bi-District victory, the Broncos would go on to face the Post Antelopes, the District 2 Champion. Take the drive north on Hwy 277 to cheer on YOUR Sonora Broncos on Friday night.

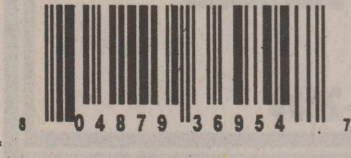

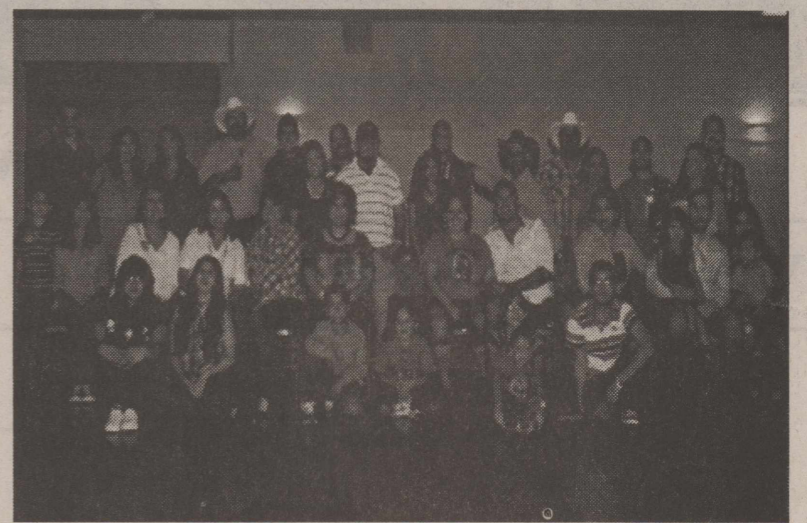

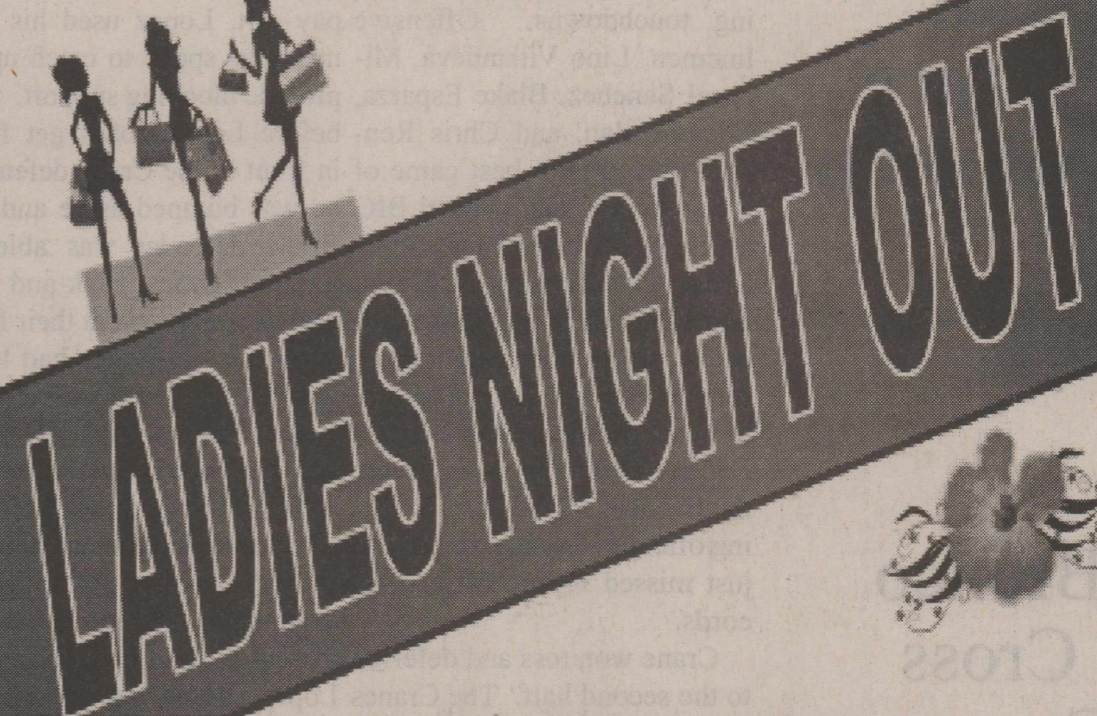

Gov. Perry Presents the Purple Heart to Ricardo Palacios III

In every generation, the United States has been blessed with individuals ready to step forward and place themselves on the line between the American people, and those who would cause us harm.

Over the years, these brave warriors consistently fought for liberty and freedom, and brought hope to untold millions the world over.

There was the generation of my father, the Greatest Generation, who turned back the forces of evil in Europe, and conquered unchecked aggression in the South Pacific.

We have another member of that generation with us today, Ricardo Palacios Jr., a Purple Heart recipient and POW survivor, and father of the man we're honoring this afternoon.

At the time of my youth, another generation of warriors was sent to fight overseas, and faced an unjust reception upon their return home.

These heroes fought and bled for our country and our ideals...just like the generations before them,

even if, at the time, our nation was far from unified in its regard for those who served.

Thankfully, we've come to realize the error of our ways, and today appropriately celebrate the members of our military for what they do on our behalf.

Today we recognize that there is no higher form of public service than wearing the uniform of one's country

While there are many forms of giving back to your community, to me, those who face incoming fire to set other people free exist on an entirely different level.

In addition, among the most solemn and meaningful honors that can be presented to a member of our country's armed forces is the Purple Heart.

This award represents true sacrifice, and goes to our most valiant warriors who placed themselves in harm's way for the good of country and comrade.

Today, we are honoring a veteran of the Vietnam War.

Ricardo Palacios III en-

listed in the military in 1970, training to transport supplies and munitions in combat situations.

In 1971, Mr. Palacios was in an Army gun truck on a mission, when he and his fellow soldiers fell under attack by enemy forces.

A rocket-propelled grenade struck his vehicle, and in the resulting destruction, Mr. Palacios suffered major burns to both hands.

It's taken a bit of time to get from that point to today, and I'd like to congratulate both Mr. Palacios and commend Victor Polanco, a Texas Veterans Commission claims counselor who worked hard to locate and assemble the medical documentation and eyewitness statements required for the Army to reconsider and rightfully present Mr. Palacios with the Purple Heart.

And now, 41 years after he suffered his injuries, it is my privilege and my humbling honor, to present Mr. Ricardo Palacios III with the Purple Heart.

Mule Deer Hunters Reminded of CWD Testing Requirements

AUSTIN – Wildlife officials are reminding mule deer hunters and landowners in far West Texas about new protocols developed as part of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's (TPWD) Chronic Wasting Disease response plan. The plan includes mandatory check stations for harvested deer and elk taken inside the CWD Containment Zone, which covers portions of Culberson, Hudspeth and El Paso counties. See map of CWD zones at <http://www.tpwd.state.tx.us/cwd>.

The response plan is being implemented after tissue samples from two mule deer in far West Texas this past summer tested positive for CWD. These are the first cases of CWD detected in Texas deer.

Hunters taking mule deer inside the Containment Zone during the general season, Nov. 23 – Dec. 9, are required to submit their harvest (unfrozen head) for CWD sampling at mandatory check stations within 24 hours of harvest.

"We recommend hunters in the Containment Zone and High Risk Zone quarter deer in the field and leave all but the quarters, backstraps and head at the site of harvest if it is not possible to bury the inedible carcass parts at least 6 feet deep on the ranch or take them to a landfill," said Shawn Gray, Mule Deer Program Leader for TPWD.

Mandatory check stations will be open from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Nov. 23 – Dec. 10. Stations will be located in Cornudas at May's Café (on US 62-180) and in Van Horn at Van Horn Convention Center (1801 West

Broadway).

Hunters that harvest deer in the Containment Zone outside the general season under the authority of MLDP (Managed Lands Deer Permits) will need to call TPWD at (512) 221-8491 the day the deer is harvested to make arrangements to have the deer sampled for CWD.

In addition to protocols within the Containment

Zone, TPWD has created a High Risk Zone for voluntary CWD sampling during the hunting season. Biologists have been collecting voluntary mule deer harvest data in the region since 1980 and this year CWD sampling will be offered in addition to age and weight measurements.

Extension To Offer Range and Pasture Workshop

AgriLife Extension To Offer Range and Pasture Workshop
Though we've had more rain than last year, our rangelands are a long way from recovery. But as we go into the dormant season, even the areas with timely rainfall have to prepare for the nutritional supplementation of livestock. To help sort through the various considerations that have impacted our agricultural year, the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service offices in Schleicher and Sutton counties will conduct a Range and Pasture Workshop from 8:30 a.m. - 2 p.m. Nov. 27 in the Schleicher County Civic Center.

Some parts of the state have had enough good rains to raise hay. That gives those of us looking to buy hay a little more opportunity to be selective; last year we had to take what was available. So, to address the question of hay

quality and to provide techniques for properly collecting hay samples for those needing to test for protein, nitrates, etc., we've invited Dr. David Drake, AgriLife Extension agronomist at San Angelo.

As we discussed in an earlier article, the areas of bare ground resulting from the 2011 drought, gave this year's good crop of mesquite beans an opportunity to sprout in multitude. So, Dr. Bob Lyons, AgriLife Extension range specialist at Uvalde, will offer his opinion on the survivability of the many seedlings which have sprung up. He will also cover how to manage those seedlings that do survive the approaching cold season.

Other speakers include Allison Watkins, AgriLife Extension horticulturist in Tom Green County, who will talk about pests of the home and landscape, along with con-

trol options. Cory Pence with the Texas Department of Agriculture, will speak on pesticide laws and regulations. These last two topics pertain not only to our ag audience, but also those with landscape management responsibilities.

Five Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units - two general, two integrated pest management and one laws and regulations - will be available for those with a valid private applicators license.

Individual preregistration is \$20 before Nov. 19 and \$25 thereafter. The fee includes refreshment, a catered lunch, and course materials.

Sonora Lady Broncos Basketball: Start season 2 - 0!

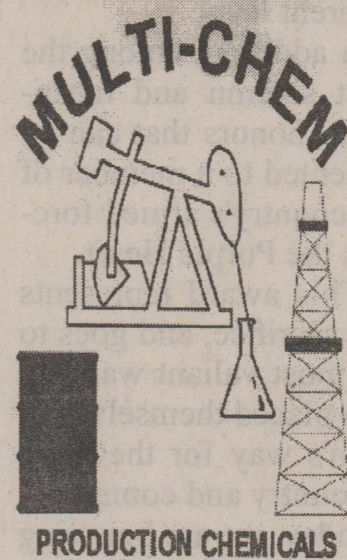
The Lady Broncos opened the 2012-2013 "Showtime" campaign with a resounding victory over Eden 96-34. Eden kept the game close in the first 4 minutes with Sonora leading 10-5 and then the pressure defense took over and the Lady Broncos went on a 45-4 run to finish the half up 55-9. Sonora shot 54% from the field (Kylie Love shooting 11/15 and Abby Creek going 3/3) and made 8 of 15 three pointers (Katie Hartman 2, Gracie Dozier 2, Avery Nolen 2, Jaye Sanchez 1 and Alexa Sykes 1). Sonora had a balanced scoring with Kylie leading with 27 points, Gracie 17, Alexa Sykes 12 and Katie Hartman finishing out the double digit scoring with 10. The defensive pressure forced 32 Eden turnovers with Avery leading in the take-a-way department with 5 and Gracie and Kylie adding 4 steals each. Kylie and Alexa both pulled down 10 rebounds.
