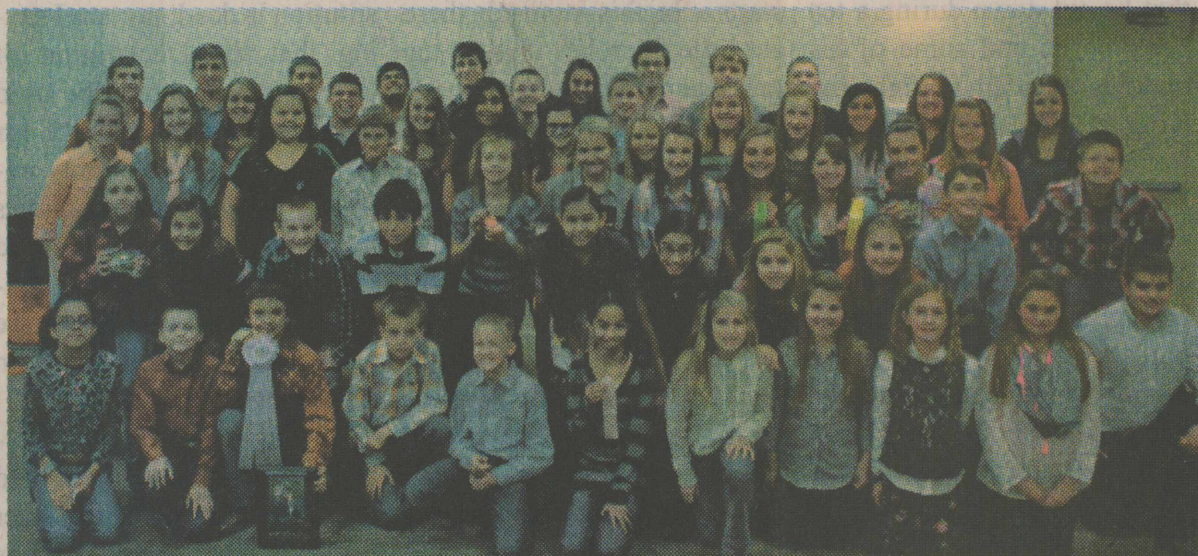

Sonora came out Friday night with extra energy and shut down Tornillo. The halftime score was 41-0 which led to the final score of 79-14. The Lady Broncos are now 24-2 overall and 3-0 in district. The defensive domination was evident with some of Sonora's team stats... Sonora pressured Tornillo into 43 turnovers and contested every shot which held them to 14% shooting. On Sonora's side, the Lady Broncos shot a season high 60% and dished out 22 assists in their brand of unselfish basketball. It's a Question of Why, Not How

Historians for years have waxed poetic about how the United States was birthed from a dream and nursed on the milk of freedom. That is a beautiful (yet creepy) description of the beginnings of our country. Now let me recount the entire American revolution from the viewpoint of 90% of the American public. George Washington couldn't tell a lie about a cherry tree that he cut down during a tea party so he and some of his buddies decided to fight the King of England while Paul Revere road around singing Yankee Doodle Dandy.

I have spent my entire life (including 10 years of college and graduate school) learning about how America was founded. Elementary school taught me about the cherry tree, in Junior high I learned about the Tea Party, and in High School I discovered that George Washington hated political parties. In college I learned all about the personal shortcomings of Jefferson and the intent of the framers of the constitution. It wasn't until my formal education ended that I discovered that I didn't know anything about why it was founded.

So please, if you have a college degree in history, political science, or underwater basket weaving STOP telling everyone what the "founders intended". First of all 90% of people don't care (while the remaining 10% repeat what you say at dinner parties to seem smart). Second, you know more about the chicken's intent as it crossed the road than you know about Jefferson, Hancock, Franklin...and...well...all those other guys. You weren't there. What makes you think you can understand the intent of those long dead men when you can't figure out why your neighbor insists on mowing his yard at night.

Let me boil down the entire American Revolution into one simple sentence. A group of men did not like being told what to do so they convinced a larger group of people to change it. Yes, yes, a lot of stuff happened in-between 1776 and whenever the whole thing ended but how much does that matter in understanding why it happened.

If you focus on how things happened, rather than why they did you will be filled with a lot of pretty words and nothing else. Don't get me wrong, the HOW is important...but not as important when you compare it to WHY.

Allow me to explain to you HOW grass is converted into meat. Grass has some stuff in it called chlorophyll that converts light into chemical energy (sugars and other kinds of organic compounds).

A cow walks by and eats the grass. After chewing up that grass the cow swallows it into the first of 4 stomachs (the rumen). The cow occasionally harks up a grass lugie (pulls the chewed up grass back into its mouth) and chews on it some more until it is a nice slimy green glob where it moves back into the rumen. It is the largest of the stomachs and is where the "real magic" starts. In this stomach there are little microbes that eat the grass and release the "food" where it passes into the third stomach (reticulum). As a side note it's important to note that these little microbes also fart methane which in turn collects into a really massive cow fart and causes global warming. Not much really happens in the reticulum (other than filtering out large objects and facilitating additional fermentation) so the food goes into the third stomach (omasum) where water and other nutrients are absorbed. The fourth stomach (abomasum) where the good stuff is digested and turned into meat through yet another highly complicated process.

Here is WHY grass is converted into meat. Because humans can't eat grass.

That is the answer that most people with real jobs care about. And here is why.

You ask, "How did our national debt get too high?"

A committee of experts will tell you about "deficit spending in a time of crisis", "the Kesyian philosophy of economics", and "the necessity of an industry wide bailout".

I ask, "How did I get into debt?"

My banker answers, "It doesn't matter, your three months behind."

The government has the luxury of explaining itself in the form of how things happened. The majority of us have the luxury of understanding things by how they happen to us.

So what do you do? Ask "How do we do it" or "Why do we do it"?

I think that it isn't which question you should ask before making a decision I personally believe that you should ask both. It's the order in which you ask that matters. For far too long our government has asked "how do we make this happen" instead of "why should we even do it in the first place".

The founders of our nation got it. They didn't write the Declaration of Independence explaining how we were going to become a free nation. They wrote the thing telling us WHY we should do it. The constitution (which came later) laid out how our nation would be formed-and all of us have been arguing back and forth for years over that par-

ticular document.

Every argument that we have is based off of the constitution. Not once has the Declaration of Independence been argued on either truth or merit. Yes I realize that the Declaration of Independence is the soul of America rather than its body, but isn't that the point? The soul is immortal, while he body eventually dies.

I'm not saying that the constitution is dead, nor am I saying that the Declaration of Independence should be used to manage the business of our government. I am simply implying that either our nation's moral center is either focused too much on the wrong document, or that our leaders are asking the right questions in the wrong order.

If you walk into your living room to find your cat bald and your child standing over it with a pair of hair clippers you don't ask "how did you do that?" you ask "why did you do that?"

For far too long our government has found itself on the back end of a mistake that could have been prevented by asking "why do we need to do this" rather than asking "how did this happen". For the record, asking "why" first rather than "how" afterwards works

on a personal level as well.

If we ask why things happen it allows room for faith. To me faith is not some talking point designed to increase your appeal nor is it some elusive concept that I use to get through hard times. Faith is a concrete and real reason to keep going. Faith is an investment. It is an investment into a promise that someone or something will take care of me.

Why is grass converted into meat?

Because God provides for His children.

Why is America here?

Because a group of men didn't want the government to tell them how to live their lives.

Why do I have faith in the United States of America?

Because it all started with this:

"We hold these truths to be self evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among those are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness"

That is where we need to begin all over again.

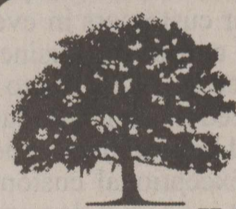
Lions Roar

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Sonora Lady Bronco CHAMPIONS at the 82nd Annual Mary Tatum Basketball Tournament

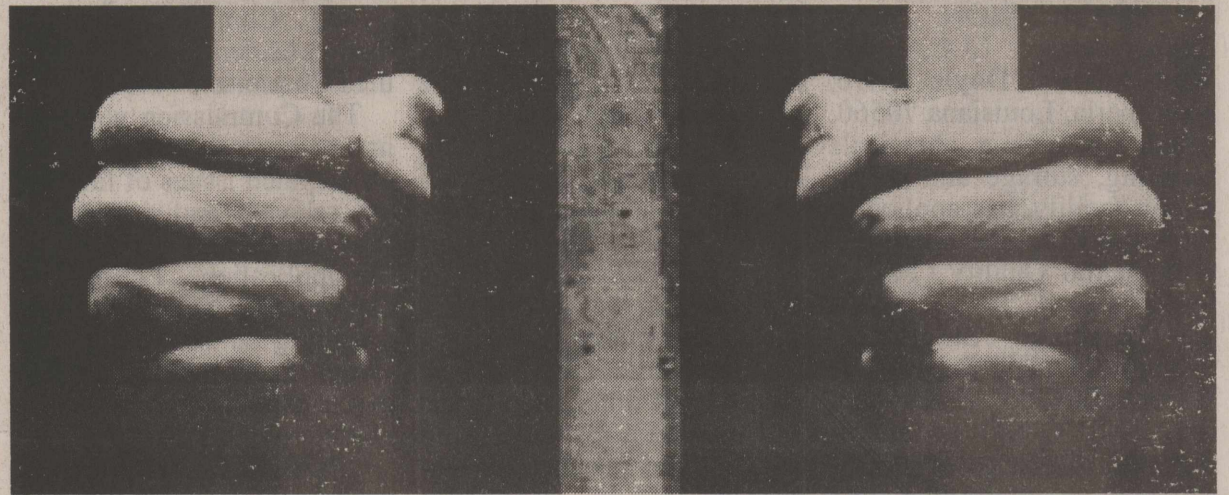
In the past two seasons the Lady Broncos have made it to the finals of six straight tournaments. Sonora has won the Harper Tourney twice and now are the (Reagan Co.) Mary Tatum Champions. The Lady Broncos are peaking at the right time. District starts January 4th in Alpine. The Lady Broncos went 4-0 in the tourney and now have a season record of 20-2. The first game pitted the Broncos against Coahoma with the Sonora team winning 67-37. Four Lady Broncos were in double digits scoring - Kylie Love (12), Gracie Dozier (12), Avery Nolen (13) and Jaye Sanchez (17). Jaye and Gracie paced the offense with 5 assists each and Kylie (7 rebounds), Abby Creek (5) controlled the boards. The Lady Broncos shot 48% from the field and 72% from the FT line. In the second game of the day, Sonora was matched with the very confident Mc-

Camey team winning 63-39. Gracie Dozier shot 7 for 9 on the way to 17 points. Avery Nolen turned in a other solid performance with 13 points, 4 assists and 4 steals. Jaye Sanchez recorded 10 assists and Kylie Love controlled the paint with 11 boards. Tyler Hampton, Zella Powers and Katie Hartman were spark plugs off the bench. The Lady Broncos shot 50% for the game. Day two Sonora found Stanton and Sonora had a dominating defensive performance with a 55-28 victory. Sonora forced 36 turnovers and limited Stanton to 23% shooting. On offense, the entire team was in the scoring column: Kylie (10 points & 11 boards), Zella Powers (5 points & 6 boards), Katie Hartman (1 point & 2 steals), Gracie Dozier (10 points & 7 assists), Avery Nolen (12 points & 3 steals), Jaye Sanchez (9 points & 3 steals), Tyler Hampton (2 points & 3 rebounds), JoJo Guterrez (1

point & 2 steals), Naomi Dozier (2 points & 2 rebounds) and Abby Creek (4 points and 8 boards). In the finals against longtime rivals - BALLINGER - the Lady Broncos won 59-48. The Sonora team outscored the Ballinger team 24-13 in the all important 4th quarter to run away with the win. The pressure defense and 'run and fun' offense were keys to the victory. Kylie Love had 19 points and 5 blocks to earn MVP honors. Gracie Dozier (14 points and 7 assists), Avery Nolen (9 points, 5 assists and 5 steals) and Jaye Sanchez AKA Logan Smith (8 points, 5 assists and 10 REBOUNDS) were also named to the all-tournament team. Abby Creek (4 points, 8 rebounds and 3 steals) had another inspired performance and logged extra minutes with the very productive subs in the 3rd quarter to set up the fourth quarter run. It was another team victory for the Lady Broncos.

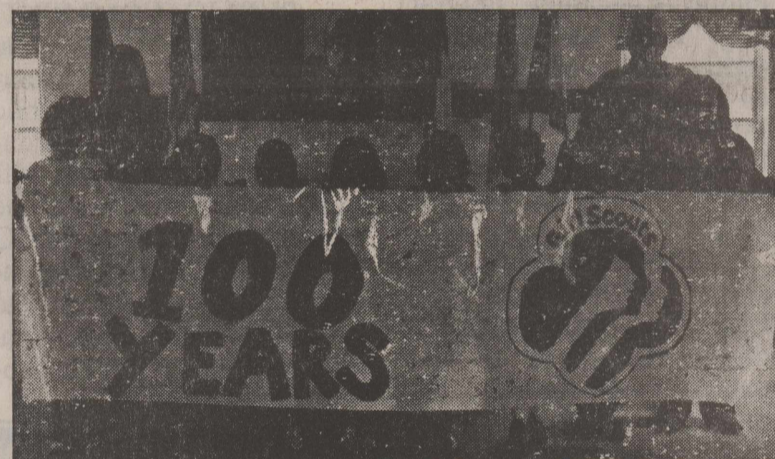
Jose Luis Trevino was re-apprehended by U.S. Marshalls in Del Rio on Wednesday, January 4th around 3:00 p.m. Sutton County Sheriff Joe Fincher was on the scene during the re-capture and later commented that, "Joe Frank Martinez (Val Verde County Sheriff and the Rangers did an excellent job of putting the operation together. They covered all the bases and made sure nobody got hurt." Trevino was free for about 48 hours before the Texas Rangers received a tip on his location. Texas Ranger Kenneth Wadsworth commented, "The vehicle Trevino was known to

be in was discovered by railroad workers next to the rails. At that point it was just a matter of time before we caught him." Trevino was apprehended in a trailer house, and with known gang ties his re-capture was approached with care. "We knew he was associated with a pretty rough gang, so safety was very important to us," commented Fincher, "again I cannot stress how good of a job everyone did in catching him". Ranger Wadsworth commented that, "In the 20 plus years I have been involved with the Texas Rangers (part

of that time spent with a fugitive apprehension team in Odessa) I have never been on an operation that went as smooth as this one did. This operation may have ended in Del Rio but it began almost immediately after Trevino's escape. I was contacted within minutes of his escape, and at that point we immediately began a coordinated operation involving local, state, and federal agencies. Joe Fincher led the operation, and he did an outstanding job handling this entire multi-agency apprehension."

NOTICE OF RECEIPT OF APPLICATION AND INTENT TO OBTAIN WATER QUALITY PERMIT

PERMIT NO. WQ0005001000
 APPLICATION. Multi-Chem Group, LLC, 3401 West Admiral Doyle Drive, New Iberia, Louisiana 70560, which operates a chemicals blending, storage and distribution facility, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for proposed Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) Permit No. WQ0005001000 (EPA I.D. No. TX0133884) to authorize: the discharge of stormwater at an intermittent and variable flow rate via Outfalls 001 and 002; and the discharge of Reverse Osmosis discharge water, via Outfall 003, at a volume not to exceed a daily average flow of 3,000 gallons per day on an intermittent basis. The facility is located at 349 Private Road 4473, Sonora, in Sutton County, Texas 76950. The discharge route, via Outfalls 001, 002 and 003, is from the site via pipe to Shurley Draw; thence to a tributary of Dry Devils River; thence to Devils River. TCEQ received this application on September 26, 2012. The permit application is available for viewing and copying at the Sutton County Annex Building, 1st Floor, 300 East Oak, Number 3, Sonora, Texas. This link to an electronic map of the site or facility's general location is provided as a public courtesy and not part of the application or notice. ADDITIONAL NOTICE. TCEQ's Executive Director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. After technical review of the application is complete, the Executive Director may prepare a draft permit and will issue a preliminary decision on the application. Notice of the Application and Preliminary Decision will be published and mailed to those who are on the county-wide mailing list and to those who are on the mailing list for this application. That notice will contain the deadline for submitting public comments.

PUBLIC COMMENT / PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments

or request a public meeting on this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or to ask questions about the application. TCEQ will hold a public meeting if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for submitting public comments, the Executive Director will consider all timely comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Unless the application is directly referred for a contested case hearing, the response to comments, and the Executive Director's decision on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments and to those persons who are on the mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision and for requesting a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court.

TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST: your name, address, phone number; applicant's name and proposed permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the proposed facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; and, the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing." If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are relevant to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission will only grant a contested case hearing on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues that were raised in timely filed comments that were not subsequently withdrawn.

MAILING LIST. If you submit public comments, a request for a contested case hearing or a reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision, you will be added to the mailing list for this specific application to receive future public notices mailed by the Office of the Chief Clerk. In addition, you may request to be placed on: (1) the permanent mailing list for a specific applicant name and permit number; and/or (2) the mailing list for a specific county.
