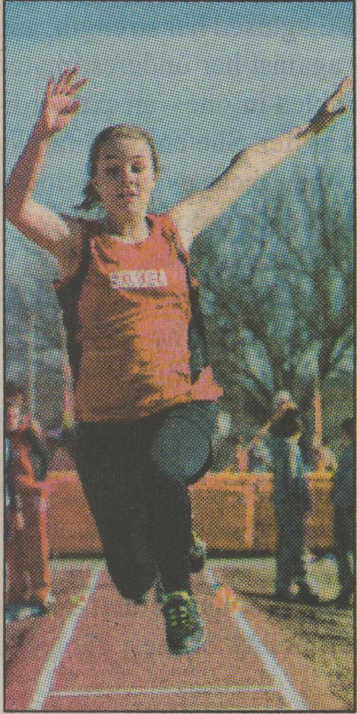

2012 Texas Top Ten Most Stolen Vehicles



Some are stolen and stripped for parts. Others are stolen and resold by thieves to unsuspecting buyers. Many vehicles are stolen for joyriding, for use in committing other crimes, to perpetrate insurance fraud, to burglarize personal items and documentation, or for any number of other illegitimate purposes. And vehicle theft directly costs Texans more than any other single crime - over \$621 million in 2011.

Personnel from the Texas Auto Burglary and Theft Prevention Authority (ABTPA) and the agency's associated vehicle crime task forces remind Texas drivers that vehicle thieves are always looking for opportunities to steal. Vehicle owners should be aware that thieves can be lurking anywhere, and drivers should practice prevention techniques such as hiding contents that may be desirable to a thief, locking vehicle doors, and taking keys.

The Texas ABTPA, an office of the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles, has funded law enforcement programs specializing in vehicle crime investigation, recovery, prevention and prosecution since 1991. Since then, Texas has seen a 61 percent reduction in the vehicle theft total. Currently, ABTPA funds 29 task force grant programs statewide, allowing over 150 law enforcement officers throughout Texas to focus exclusively on the resolution of vehicle crime cases.

(Dallas, TX) Pickups are not only popular among Texas drivers, they are also top targets for Texas vehicle thieves! The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) has released its final MVT19 report on the top vehicles reported stolen in Texas during 2012. The MVT19 report is compiled monthly by DPS and represents vehicle theft data entered into the Texas Crime Information Center (TCIC) by all Texas law enforcement agencies. An error margin of plus or minus five percent is assumed for incorrect entries by agencies. Based on the reports, as has been the case for many years, pickup trucks top the list of thieves' most common targets for the year. Coming in at No. 1 was the Ford Pickup followed closely by the Chevrolet Pickup at No. 2. In the No. 3 position,

the Dodge Pickup also remains a popular target for Texas thieves. The Honda Civic and the Chevrolet Tahoe round out the top five stolen vehicles.

Marge Amerine passed from this life on Mar. 4, 2013, after a long illness. She was born on Sept. 11, 1929, in San Angelo, TX. Her father, Will Renfro, was a skilled carpenter who built many notable churches and commercial buildings in the region. Her mother Pearl was a homemaker known for her cooking and quilting. The Renfro family included Marge's older brother, Wallace, an excellent horseman and rancher who settled in Sonora.

Marge met her future husband, Ernest "Bud" Amerine, while he was in flight training in San Angelo. They married on Sept. 30, 1949, and eventually had four children: Deb, Bill, Lori and Jeff. Military assignments took the Amerine family to bases in Texas, Kansas, Nebraska, Massachusetts, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Japan, Hawaii and the Philippines. When Bud retired from the Air Force in 1975, he and Marge settled in Harrison, Arkansas, where they lived for 36 years.

Marge was a strong competitor, an expert card player and near-scratch golfer. Her petite size disguised her strength, and many golfers who played with or against her underestimated her expert abilities. She made four holes-in-one – an extraordinary accomplishment for any avid golfer. She enjoyed family holidays and reunions, especially when these events included cut-throat games of Scrabble, Uno and Liverpool Rummy.

In 2011, Marge and Bud moved to Papillion, Nebraska. Despite her failing health, Marge continued to enjoy gatherings with her family. She is survived by her husband of 64 years, Bud; her daughter Deb Bayne and her husband, Ron, of Omaha; her son Bill and his wife, Robin, of Kerrville; her daughter Lori and her husband, Carl, of Green Bay, WI; and her son Jeff and his wife, Phyllis, of Fayetteville, AR. Texas Employers Increase the Number of Employed

AUSTIN — Texas employers continued to expand their payrolls in January with the addition of 10,400 total nonfarm jobs for a total of 310,900 jobs added over the year. In January 2013, Texas reported more than 11 million total nonfarm jobs.

After declining for six consecutive months, the unemployment rate in Texas rose slightly in January to 6.3 percent, and was down nine-tenths of a percentage point over the year. It remained well below the nation's January unemployment rate of 7.9 percent.

"The Texas economy continues to add jobs and create opportunity, with growth in all 11 major industries over the

last year," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Andres Alcantar. "I encourage job seekers and employers to visit WorkInTexas.com, or a local Workforce Solutions office, to take advantage of the quality services available to them."

Eight out of 11 major industries saw positive growth over the month, with Leisure and Hospitality leading the way in hiring for January with 8,900 jobs added. This industry has added 62,500 jobs over the last year for a 5.9 percent annual growth rate.

"It's good to see so many different opportunities continuing to arise here in Texas," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. "For example the Trade, Transportation, and Utilities industry alone has grown by nearly 64,000 jobs over the past year. That's more than any other industry in Texas."

The Mining and Logging industry, which includes oil and gas-related jobs, added 19,700 jobs from January 2012 to January 2013 for a 7.6 percent annual growth rate. The Construction industry grew by 28,500 jobs over the last year for a 5.0 percent annual growth rate.

Private industries in Texas added 15,400 jobs in January, for a total of 304,700 private sector jobs added over the past year. Over the last year the private sector has grown at a rate of 3.4 percent.

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) had the lowest January unemployment rate in the state at 3.4 percent. The Odessa MSA came in second at 4.1 percent and the Amarillo MSA third at 4.9 percent (not seasonally adjusted).

Extension Office To Offer Pesticide Applicator Training Course

With Spring not far away, some of us begin thinking about ways to control unwanted vegetation. However, you should know that some chemicals are designated general-use pesticides and can be purchased "over-the-counter" while others are restricted-use pesticides and require a pesticide applicator license. So, if you've considered acquiring an applicator license, here are some things you should know.

Private applicator license are required in order to use or supervise the use of restricted or state-limited pesticides or regulated herbicides in the production of agricultural commodities. Applicators must obtain 15 continuing education units (C.E.U.s) every five years, including a minimum of two C.E.U.s in laws and regulations and two in integrated pest management (IPM).

Commercial licenses are required to use or supervise the use of restricted or state-limited pesticides or regulated herbicides, for hire or compensation, on the land of another person. An individual that is not a licensed commercial pesticide applicator, certified private applicator, or structural

pest control applicator, but intends to apply restricted use pesticides in the performance of his or her job duties (e.g. government entities such as state, county, or city) must be licensed as a noncommercial pesticide applicator. Both commercial and noncommercial licensees must obtain five C.E.U.s annually, including at least one C.E.U. each in two of these three topics: laws and regulations, integrated pest management, and drift minimization.

With that in mind, if you are interested in acquiring a license, please contact your local County Extension Office at 387-3101. We will be offering a training course on March 25th at the Sutton County Civic Center. We will also provide take-home study material and have a "refresher" session on April 8th. Texas Department of Agriculture personnel will be on hand to administer testing that afternoon. Register by March 19th so that study manuals can be ordered for you. Cost is \$50 and includes manuals and training. Contact us at 387-3101 if you have need for additional details.

Annual Ram Performance Test Field Day and Sale set for March 15 in San Angelo

SAN ANGELO – The annual Ram Performance Test Field Day and Sale conducted by Texas A&M AgriLife Research and the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service is set March 15 at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center in San Angelo.

The center is located on U.S. Highway 87 north of San Angelo.

This is the first year the test has been conducted at San Angelo. Since its inception in 1947, the test has been conducted at the AgriLife Research Station at Sonora, said Dr. Dan Waldron, AgriLife Research geneticist at San Angelo and test coordinator. He added that the rams appear to have taken the move in stride.

"The move to San Angelo from Sonora has worked out well for the Texas A&M ram test," Waldron said. "The rams have gained better than average this year. The average final weight of the rams completing the test was 262 pounds prior to shearing, with an average daily gain of almost a pound a day over the course of the 140-day test. Many of the breeders that have tested rams at Sonora are also participating now at San Angelo."

"The rams on test this year represent the accumulation of genetic improvement these breeders have made over several sheep generations."

The day's events start with an informal morning inspection of the Rambouillet rams and their performance test data from 10 a.m.-10:30 a.m. An educational program is set for 10:30 a.m., followed by lunch at 11:30 a.m. and the auction of eligible rams at 12:30 a.m.

Program topics will include wool industry issues for 2013, Ronald Pope, manager, Producers' Marketing Cooperative, Incorporated, Mertz; Recent Changes and Future Prospects for the American Rambouillet Sheep Breeders Association, Robbie Eckhoff, executive secretary, Hawley, and comments on the 2012/2013 ram test by Waldron, and Faron Pfeiffer, AgriLife Research, San Angelo.

The afternoon program will be directed by Dr. Frank Craddock, AgriLife Extension state sheep and goat specialist at San Angelo.

Eckhoff will award the certified ram certificates to the owners of the qualifying rams.

All rams must have a test index of 100 or above to be eligible for the sale, Waldron said. The animals must also meet all minimum and maximum criteria and pass a breed standards committee's evaluation.

The floor price for animals consigned to this year's sale is \$500 per head.

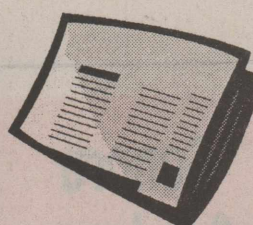

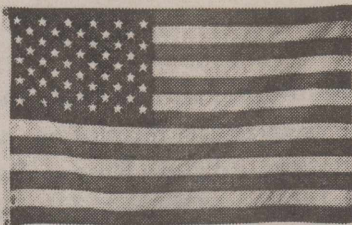


