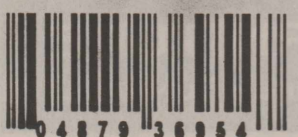

Wall Double Homicide Murder Victims Identified

Just after 6:20 p.m. Sunday evening, July 28, 2013 Tom Green County Sheriff's Deputies were dispatched to the 7000 block of FM 1223, for a report of a shooting call. Upon arrival deputies located three shooting victims. Two victims at the scene were deceased and a third transported via Aired1 to Shannon Hospital where the shooting victim was listed as critical. The suspect identified as Brian Jones Berry 40 yrs., left the scene with his two children, 7 year old daughter Kelsey Berry and 9 year old son Bryson Berry. An Amber alert was issued for the suspect and the two children. At around 11:00 p.m. Sunday evening the Amber alert was canceled when authorities from the Andrews Police Department and Texas Rangers located and apprehended the suspect. The two children were found to be unharmed. The identity of the deceased has been release, Keri Berry, 36 of Wall, TX and Brandon Block, 31 of San Angelo, TX. The third victim who was airlifted has been identified as Susan Block, 26 also of San Angelo, TX. Susan's condition is still listed as critical. Local, State and Federal agencies helped assist in the search of the suspect and children, with the San Angelo Police Department being instrumental in helping locate the suspect's vehicle. Brian Jones Berry, 40 has been charged with Murder and is currently being held in the Andrews County Jail on a \$500,000.00 bond.

All of the agencies work together when any kind of alerts are issued especially Amber Alerts. Everyone was on alert from Tom Green County to Sonora. Some of our local officers attended a Drug Endangered Child training class this last week in San Angelo, all local officers that were on standby or participated in the preliminary investigation. The class was hosted by San Police Officers Association. Both Officers received 8 hrs training credit from TCLEOSE. Multiple agencies attended the training for dealing with children found in conjunction with drug environments. The training also stressed the importance of dealing with the children in a multi agency approach to getting the drug endangered child out of the hazardous environment. Great job to all agencies involved in this case.

Local Law Enforcement to Hold a Shooter Preparation Course

Sonora Police Department/ Sutton County Sheriff's Department In partnership with Texas State Alerrt Will Be Hosting A Basic Active Shooter Level 1 course on August 5-6, 2013 8:00 AM - 5:00 PM.. The training course will be held at the Sonora High School located at 1717 Tayloe Avenue. This dynamic course of instruction is designed to prepare the first responder to isolate, distract, and neutralize and active shooter. The course will cover shooting and moving, threshold evaluation, concepts and principals of team movement (including solo officer strategies), setting up for room entry and room entry techniques, approach and breaching the crisis site, follow-on responder tactics, improvised explosives and post-engagement priorities of work. The course will culminate with dynamic "force-on-force" scenarios. These officers will be taking such courses to ensure the safety of our students should anything of this should ever take place. There will be vehicles in town from all other agencies and counties. This is only one of the many trainings that our police and sheriff's office take in order to help ensure the safety of others

Sutton County UWCD Aquifer Tracer Dye Test

On July 18, 2013 the Sutton County UWCD (District) initiated its first dye tracer study of the Edwards-Trinity (Plateau) Aquifer. This is also the first test of its kind in our aquifer. The information gathered from this study will answer many questions about the characteristics of our part of the aquifer. In addition, to the scientific data that will come from this it will aid in making other decisions about this area. For example, if a chemical spill were to occur, let's say north of the City the data we collect now will tell us how fast that chemical would get into the aquifer and how far it would go in time. This test is very important for all these reasons.

A lot of planning and careful considerations went into this study before any dye was injected into the aquifer. Likewise, careful steps are being taken when collecting the information so that we have an accurate time and date when the samples are picked up.

We want to recognize the landowners who have so graciously allowed us to place our sample packets at their water wells to collect this precious data; our hats are off to you. Without their support this project could not have happened. To the staff at the District and the Board of Directors, thank you for your support. The staff at the City of Sonora has supported this project in many ways, and is allowing us to set up an automatic water sampler at their well site. The NRCS staff is assisting us by collecting the samples as the study progresses. We are also receiving support from the staff at the Texas Agrilife Sonora Experiment Station. The staff at the Sonora Golf Course is very helpful in supporting us with this study too. The expert advice and guidance from Dr. Ron Green and Geary Schindel is invaluable, without them this study would be a difficult undertaking. In the months ahead we will continue to collect these samples and at various periods of time take what we collected and analyze it.

After we collect this data it will be input to a computer and the results will inform us about the characteristics of the aquifer. This will not be the end of the story, only the beginning, more tests and analyses will be planned to add to our understanding of our aquifer. This is the first step with many more to follow. As stated earlier, this will answer questions, but will bring up more questions. We will keep pursuing new and interesting data about this aquifer and report to you our findings.

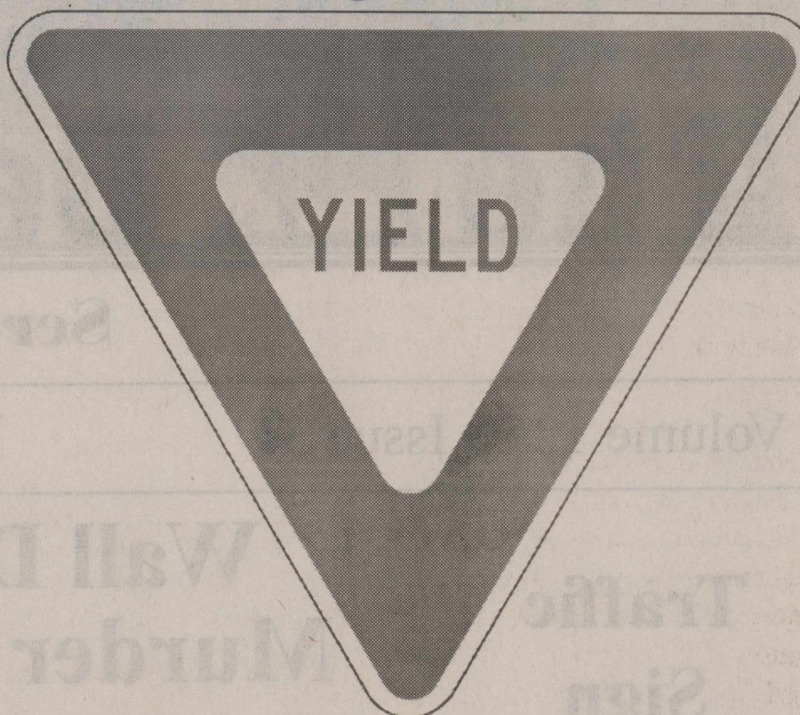

Traffic Sign Refresher



A red yield sign is a traffic sign meant to mean 'Give Way'. It shows drivers that they should prepare to slow down and stop if necessary so as to allow a driver from a different direction approach a junction or proceed. A Yield sign is placed at a point where a less-traveled road merges into a busier one. The Yield sign alerts drivers on the less-traveled road that they need to look both ways and ensure that no traffic is approaching before continuing onto the other road. This is the same purpose that is served by a Stop sign; a Yield sign is sometimes used in locations where traffic is light, visibility is good and a driver will not necessarily be required to stop if there is no other traffic. Yield signs may also be used in to alert drivers to likely pedestrian traffic. In addition to the familiar triangular Yield signs, highway departments sometimes place bollards -- often large metal or concrete posts -- along the edge of the street to warn drivers of potential pedestrian traffic.

Understanding Water Test Results

Understanding Water Test Results

If you depend on a well for your drinking water, it is recommended that you have the water tested every couple of year. Sometimes, however, we get the results and are not quite sure what they mean. Here are a few tips to help understand water testing.

Water hardness refers to water with a high mineral content. The source is naturally dissolved calcium and magnesium. The symptoms are soap deposits, scaly deposits in plumbing and appliances, and decreased cleaning action of soaps and detergents. Total Hardness Description: 0 TO 75 mg/L is Soft water; 75 TO 150 mg/L is Moderately hard water; 150 to 300 mg/L is Hard water; and Over 300 mg/L is Very hard water.

Conductivity and salinity measure the water's ability to conduct electricity, which provides a measure of what is dissolved in water. Pure, distilled water is a poor conductor of electricity. When salts and other inorganic chemicals dissolve in water, they break into tiny, electrically charged particles called ions. Ions increase the water's ability to conduct electricity. Common ions in water that conduct electrical current include sodium, chloride, calcium, and magnesium. Because dissolved salts and other inorganic chemicals conduct electrical current, conductivity increases as salinity increases. Organic compounds, such as sugars, oils, and alcohols, do not form ions that conduct electricity.

Chloride - should not exceed 250mg/L

Total Dissolved solids- >500 mg/L, fresh; 500-3000 mg/L slightly saline; 3000-10,000 mg/L, moderately saline; 10,000-35,000, very saline

pH - pH is a measure of the hydrogen ion concentration of a solution and indicates acidity or alkalinity. Drinking water standards require water utilities to maintain pH value within the range of 6.5 and 8.5. When the pH value is below 7.0, water tends to be corrosive and can damage metal pipes carrying the water.

Alkalinity -of water may be due to the presence of one or more of a number of ions. These include hydroxides, carbonates and bicarbonates. Hydroxide ions are always present in water, even if the concentration is extremely low. Bicarbonates are the most common sources of alkalinity. Up to 400mg/L as CaCO₃ is not a health problem.

In Sutton County you can get water tested at the Sutton County Underground Water Conservation District or you can send off samples to the Texas A&M Water Testing Lab. For details on collecting samples, types of testing, and cost, contact the Sutton County Extension Office.

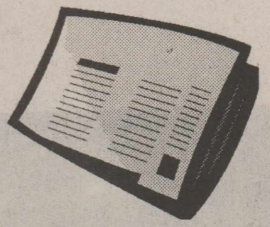

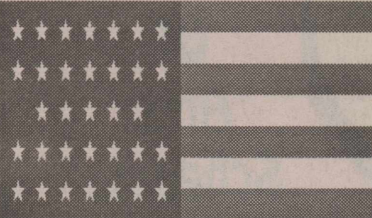

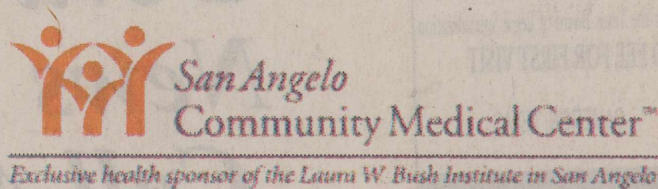
