Notice of Tax Revenue Increase

The City of Sonora conducted public hearings on September 9, 2013 and September 16, 2013 on a proposal to increase the total tax revenues of the City of Sonora from properties on the tax roll in the preceding year by 12.043056 percent.

The total tax revenue raised last year at last year's tax rate of 0.541535 for each \$100 of taxable value was \$616,936.29.

The total tax revenue proposed to be raised this year at the proposed tax rate of 0.570000 for each \$100 of taxable value, excluding tax revenue to be raised from new property added to the tax roll this year, is \$691,233.11.

The total tax revenue proposed to be raised this year at the proposed tax rate of 0.570000 for each \$100 of taxable value, including tax revenue to be raised from new property added to the tax roll this year, is \$695,789.52.



Needle Size Is Important When Vaccinating Livestock

This week, we put the spotlight on animal health. Both livestock producers and 4-H exhibitors will give injections to animals they raise. So, let's take a minute to regard basic injection considerations.

The correct needle size and length is important to ensure that the entire dose of the drug gets into the animal properly, with the least amount of tissue damage. Remember that as the gauge of a needle increases, the diameter of the needle decreases. For example, going from a 16-gauge to an 18-gauge needle produces a smaller needle diameter. Proper needle size will vary depending on product viscosity, size of animal and route of administration.

For cattle, a 16-18 gauge 3/4 to1-inch needle works well for subcutaneous (SQ) injections. A 16-18 gauge 1-1 ½ -inch needle works well for intramuscular (IM) injections. A 14-gauge needle is NOT recommended. It is twice the diameter of a 16-gauge needle, increasing the risk of tissue damage and leakage from the injection site.

For sheep or goats, a 20-gauge needle works for many applications. The length of the needle is also relevant to the type of injection and route of administration. For in- Dr. Gibbens has been in veterinary medicine in Sonora since jections under the skin, a ³/₄-inch needle is appropriate, especially for thin animals. For IM injections or heavier beginning in 1964. Dr. Johnny Fields later required ownership animals, 1-inch needles work well.

A one-inch needle, inserted at a downward angle places the medication in the layer beneath the hide and above the muscle. The downward injection helps prevent vaccine from running back out, before the hole seals. If you're injecting just 2 cc of medicine, it doesn't take much leakage to reduce the efficacy. Also, remember that keeping needles sharp also reduces problems. If you're pressing hard, and then feel it pop in, your needle is too dull. Change 2. Spay or neuter.. This service is done on Tuesday. needles frequently.

Always restrain animals properly and choose the best location for the injection. It is the site where the product will be most beneficial without damaging expensive cuts of meat. Keep all injections in front of the shoulder. Never inject into the top butt or top of the rump. For both vaccines and antibiotics, the triangular mass of neck muscle is the only acceptable site for both IM and SQ injections. Be sure to inject straight in, not from the side.

Finally, these are suggested practices. Always visit with your veterinarian regarding individual species of animals and the treatment being administered.

Game Warden Field Notes

Your Lie Just Croaked

Two Tarrant County game and a moving dove decoy set wardens were checking a field on opening day when they found two men sitting around a stock tank with shotguns

out. The father-son duo was contacted by the wardens and it was discovered that the father, who was from out-ofstate, did not have a hunting license. The father told the wardens that he was not hunting dove, and that the shotgun and empty hulls by his seat were from shooting at bullfrogs. The wardens informed the man that he needed a license to hunt bullfrogs, as well.

•Trouble in the Field

A Shackelford County game warden was checking local fields for early hunters when he found a field with a high concentration of dove. After investigating the sunflower field further, the warden found wheat seed. Later that night, the warden came back to the field to confirm it was baited and found that wheat seed had been spread all the way around the field and in each mowed strip. The next morning, the shooting started and the warden made contact with a group who said they were surprised to see the bait. One subject was even more surprised that the nighthawk he shot was not a dove.

Prickly Situation

A game warden was contacted by U.S. Border Patrol about some peyote cactus they had found on a ranch. The federal agents were tracking illegal immigrants when they found three burlap sacks full of peyote, and the warden was contacted to help them dispose of it. The total weight of the peyote was 297 pounds with a value of almost \$24,000.
