

# "Make Sure it's to Your Advantage!"

Back in November of 2006, the "new" Medicare Advantage program rolled out. Most of us rural healthcare providers; especially those of us at "Critical Access Hospitals," like Hudspeth Memorial, were a bit more than concerned about the potential impact. Well, here we are some seven years later and not much has changed with the program, at least not from the provider's perspective. Since the Physicians and staff of Hudspeth Memorial Hospital and the Sonora Medical Clinic know how important access to quality health care is to everyone; especially those on Medicare, we want to keep our community informed about our participation with the Medicare Program. As of this point in time Hudspeth Memorial Hospital and the providers at the Sonora Medical Clinic continue to participate in the traditional Medicare Program only.

Beginning later this Fall the commercial insurance companies who offer "Medicare Advantage" plans as an alternative to the traditional Medicare coverage will begin enrollment for 2014. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital and the Sonora Medical Clinic have decided not to participate as a provider in any "Medicare Advantage" plans. Our decision is primarily based upon the fact that to this point in time no insurance companies have offered us an agreement that would not undermine our Critical Access Hospital status, which is so critically important in keeping our hospital viable. While some Advantage plans offer an "out-of-network" option, Hudspeth Memorial may not be a provider for these plans. The fact is, if you choose a "Mediçare Advantage" plan you may not be able to select Hudspeth Memorial for your health care needs.

Furthermore, if you choose a "Medicare Advantage" plan you may be stuck with that plan and not be able to go back to traditional Medicare for a year. We strongly recommend that when considering such a plan; and we understand they can be very enticing, that you become fully informed about where you will be able to access healthcare services. Will you still be able to visit the local drugstore for your prescriptions, can you still have your tests run here in Sonora or will you have to drive several hours roundtrip? And; probably most important, will you still be able to see your favorite local physician or provider here in Sonora. Traditional coverage under the Medicare Program has provided access to quality health care for millions of older Americans. It's a program we can rely on with dependable rules and procedures that people over age 65

I hope we can continue to count on the broad-based community support we've enjoyed for so many years as we address this dilemma, while we endeavor to continue to be your provider of choice in a rapidly changing market.

Board of Directors - September 16, 2013 Budget Hearing & Regular Meeting Report September 22, 2013

The Board of Directors held two meetings the evening of Monday September 16th; the FY 2014 Budget Hearing, folly meeting

Chair Preston Faris convened the Budget Hearing promptly at 6:00 pm, and after a short invocation, inquired of those present if there was any public comment regarding the proposed budget for FY 2014. Upon hearing none, Mr. Faris called on CEO Bob Pascasio to present the proposed budget for FY 2014. Pascasio proceeded to share that he had followed the budget model used at SCHD in the past, for the sake of familiarity and simplicity, advising that next year he'd move to a different model. He continued that "we involved the organization's department directors in this year's budget development, and they were all highly cooperative and supportive." He then laid out the from Mickey Schaefer; CFO, proposed budget, hitting the high points; most notably that he is forecasting a slight drop year. Several questions were asked by the Board members, including regarding the proposed increases in expenses, to which Pascasio responded that most were based on minimal increases in compensation for the organization's staff. discussion, Mr. Faris called

for a vote, and the proposed FY 2014 Operating and Capital Budgets were adopted.

At the conclusion of the Budget Hearing the Board moved immediately into its regular monthly meeting.

The regular meeting began with a discussion with Bobby Zesch of Zesch & Pickett Inlowed by their regular month- surance regarding the organization's employee health insurance plan. Mr. Zesch discussed the various options available to the organization, including the rising cost, and that some insurance companies wouldn't provide quotes. He also covered the coming impact of the Affordable Care Act on small businesses like Sutton County Hospital District, and the activities his firm would engage in to insure SCHD was operating within the provisions of the law. Upon the conclusion of his presentation the Board elected to continue the existing plan, absorbing the approximate

6% increase in costs. After Mr. Zesch's presentation, and as it was a full agenda, Chair Faris attended to the "consent items," with reports on the minutes of the previous meeting and financials, and then moved the meeting into in utilization for the coming executive session to receive the Medical Staff report from Dr. Mark Edwards. Upon returning to open session, Chair Faris called for and received approval of the Medical Staff and Nursing Services Committee reports.

The Board then discussed Upon the conclusion of the proposals for engaging external advisors and consultants for a Strategic Planning project, as well as for a Marketing Agency. After discussion the Board ultimately decided to delay a decision on the strategic planning project until the October meeting, and, requested staff to arrange for the marketing agencies to make individual presentations for further consideration.

The Board then considered the Tax Rate for FY 2014. With the Budget for FY 2014 having been adopted earlier, Pascasio shared with the Board a range of rates and the total income those rates would generate for the District. Pascasio advised that "we're having one of those years; our total taxable values dropped by over \$100 million this year." The drop in values did result in the District's effective rate; the amount necessary to generate the same income for the District, increasing Pascasio shared. "So, some folks will see an increase, while others will see a decrease; it's just the way the market works," Pascasio concluded, if the District adopts the effective rate. After a short discussion, the Board voted to accept the effective rate as identified by the Sutton County Appraisal District, as the SCHD tax rate for FY 2014.

The Board then considered and adopted several organization policy statements to address operational issues, including a new Employee Travel reimbursement and a revised Employment References statement. After which, there being no further business, the Board concluded its meeting.

#### Protect Pets from Fleas

You may have tried to control fleas in your pet's areas and had a hard time of it. That's because during their life cycle fleas pass through four stages-egg, larva, pupa and adult. So it's important to know a little about each stage of development.

Adult fleas need a host and consume more blood than needed. Much of this blood is excreted as partially digested feces. Flea feces are a fine, reddish-black dust seen in pet fur and bedding. Larvae feed on adult excrement.

Fleas do not survive well outdoors in hot, sunny lawns. Relative humidity less than 50 percent or soil temperature higher than 95 degrees F kills flea larvae. Moist, shaded spots near pet resting areas are the places to find fleas. Indoors, flea larvae are usually found under furniture and in pet bedding. The pupa is the transition stage between the larva and adult

The pupa forms inside a cocoon spun by the larva. After a couple of weeks, the pupa becomes an adult. The adult may remain in the cocoon for up to 5 months until stimulated by a passing animal. That's why vacant homes can "come alive" with such fleas when new inhabitants move in.

An integrated flea control program includes good sanitation and treatment of the pet and environment. You can eliminate fleas from your home with proper treatment, but it may take time, especially if the infestation is heavy. Change pet bedding regularly and vacuum thoroughly. Vacuuming removes up to 30 percent of the larvae and up to 60 percent of flea eggs from a carpet

Insect growth regulators, or IGRs, are a safe preventative treatment for fleas. These products work by disrupting the normal development of flea eggs and larvae. When exposed to IGRs, adult fleas are unable to reproduce; eggs fail to hatch and larvae die before they complete their development. Because most IGRs kill only eggs and larvae, they do not eliminate adult fleas quickly. For this reason, they are usually mixed with a mild insecticide.

Insect growth regulators are available as sprays, spot-ons, pills or food additives. One product designed for internal use has an active ingredient called lufenuron, and can be given as a pill (for dogs), food additive (for cats), or injection (for cats). These products are available only through veterinarians. They are very effective, particularly for indoor pets.

Two other insect growth regulators for topical use are methoprene and pyriproxyfen. Methoprene is sold under several trade names and are available at pet stores as dips, pet sprays, spot-ons and flea collars. Control requires 4 to 6 weeks.

For severe flea problems, select a product that kills adult fleas, such as imidacloprid or fipronil. Both products have low toxicity to mammals. These can provide 1 to 3 month protection from fleas. For more information, visit your veterinarian or contact the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service.

> Under prior statewide regulations, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department determined the pronghorn harvest quota and issued permits directly to landowners. With the new pronghorn rules, landowners or their agents within selected pronghorn management units in the northeastand northwest Panhandle will determine the harvest quota and control buck pronghorn harvest on their property during the three-year pilot project. Hunters are reminded they must receive landowner permission to access their property.

The goal of the project is to simplify pronghorn hunting regulations and increase hunting opportunities in areas with stable populations. Wildlife officials will closely monitor pronghorn herds during the pilot project to ensure populations remain healthy.

Hunters are required to present the intact, unfrozen head of harvested pronghorn at a mandatory check station within 24 hours of harvest, so TPWD wildlife staff can collect essential biological information from the harvested animal. These data will be analyzed annually to make sure populations remain healthy.


