As soon as the place and time for the game was firmed up, the weather forecast for the Area Championship Game became the hottest topic for Bronco fans. For nearly two days, Bronco fans had a good time recalling the coldest and most miserable playoff games in Bronco history. The other hot topic was how the weather was going to affect the game and whether the weather would favor either the Broncos or the Antelopes. This discussion reminded me of one of Coach Hopkins' famous quotes. "The weather always affects the loser the most."

At kickoff time last Friday night, the temperature was 30 degrees, wind speed about 10 mph, and with a slight amount of freezing mist. The Broncos won the toss and deferred to the second half. Both teams lined up and waited and waited and waited for the officials to place the ball in play. Each team started jumping in place trying to stay warm. It turned out that there were no chain gang personnel. Finally they found some volunteers and the Broncos kicked off. Cambry Gilbert fielded the kickoff and weaved his way through the Broncos for an 80-yard return for a touchdown giving the Post Antelopes an easy and quick 7 to 0 lead.

After each team had three and outs, the Broncos started their third possession. Chance Campbell took the pitch sweep for a first down. Then he got the ball on the "second man through" and raced 45 yards toward the goal. A shoestring tackle had Campbell crashing to the turf at Post's five-yard line. The Broncos caught a break as an offside call on Post negated a Post fumble recovery. From the 2.5 yard line, Michael Rollert tried the quarterback sneak. He came down inches short of the touchdown. The next

quarterback sneak gained nothing and lost nothing. Third time's a charm. On the third sneak, Rollert dove toward the end zone and fumbled the ball. Campbell recovered the ball under the pile in the end zone for the touchdown. Ricky Martinez kicked the PAT, and the score was tied with 8:05 left in the first quarter.

Post scored their next touchdown after a tipped Bronco pass was intercepted deep in Bronco territory. DJ Brown, Post's speedy running back, slipped through the Bronco line and was tackled at the one-yard line. Taking a lesson from Coach Phillips, Post ran Bryan Smith three times on the fullback smash, and he scored on the third try. Their kick was good, and they regained the lead at 14 to 7 with 10:55 left in the second quarter.

The Broncos answered quickly. On the sixth play, Campbell broke several tackles within five yards of the line of scrimmage, broke into the secondary, and raced 76 yards to tie the score at 14 to 14.

Post mounted their best offensive drive of the game. When one has a very speedy back and he is fed the ball often, he will break a long one. After six plays of just moving the chains, Brown took the option pitch from quarterback Pake Jones and sped down the far sideline. Campbell smashed him out of bounds at the Broncos' 22-yard line. Jones surprised the Broncos with a 22 yard pass to Campbell Kirkpatrick for the go ahead touchdown. The Antelopes led 21 to 14 at the end of the half.

To start the second half, the Broncos captured the game's momentum. On the first play from scrimmage, Elijah Cross took the inside hand off and rambled 55 yards to the Post 20 yard line. Campbell took the handoff and was surrounded by Post defenders at the line

of scrimmage. Campbell was not even visible to the fans as he carried the Post tacklers to five-yard line. Three plays later, Cross moved the pile and ended up in the end zone. Martinez kicked the PAT, and the game was tied at 21 with 8:05 left in the third.

Post responded with a long drive using the same smash mouth running plays that Sonora depends on. The drive ended when Andres Acevedo RIPPED the ball out of a Post runner's arms. Ethan Patlan recovered the fumble at the Broncos' 18-yard line.

The next drive was a smash mouth thing of beauty. Cross continued carrying Post defenders for several yards after the initial contact. Rollert called his own number and gained 22 yards to the Post 23 yard line. Post stiffened and Sonora was facing a fourth and nine. Rollert took the snap and tossed it to Acevedo who was running to his right. Rollert slipped into the left flat and caught the halfback pass from Acevedo. Rollert managed to gain nine yards and two inches for the first down. Rollert would not have made an inch without the blocks by Hunter Hughes and Jose Longoria. Campbell took the pitch sweep and gained eleven yards to the two. After Cross was stopped at the one, Rollert kept the ball and scored from one yard out. Martinez made the kick and Sonora led 28 to 21 with 10:41 left until trophy time.

Two drives later, Post forced Sonora to punt. Acevedo blasted a 60-yard punt that pinned the Antelopes deep in their territory as his punt rolled dead at their four yard line. The Bronco defense held and

This run is designed to raise money for the Arthritis Foundation and will be held in San Antonio on December 7, 2013. Patton (or "P" as her family calls her) was diagnosed with Juvenile Arthritis when she was just in kindergarten. Little P's bravery throughout this whole process has been an amazing sight to behold, from X-rays and MRI's, bone scan, steroid injections into her joints, and blood work every three months, Patton has faced each new treatment with an inspiring level of strength. "We are so proud of Patton", commented her grandparents, "She has always been a bright light in our lives, and it makes us so very proud that we get to share that light with so many people." As is her nature Patton is not about to let her condition effect the way she lives her life. She is no

longer able to do gymnastics, but that doesn't bother her as she stated in her biography for the Jingle Bell Run, "we drive 45 miles one way, 3 times a week for my swimming. I LOVE SWIMMING! I hope that I can swim in the Olympics like Missy Franklin". Patton is much so more than a typical 3rd grader, she is a 3rd grader with purpose.

Recently during a television interview Patton took over the conversation to inform everyone what they can do on top of donating to the Jingle Bell Run to raise money for the Arthritis Foundation. Apparently Patton is not one to do things in half measures.

One of her other major interests is helping other kids like her by going to, and raising money for an arthritis camp she recently went too, "This summer I got to do something my parents never thought I would be able to do because of arthritis. 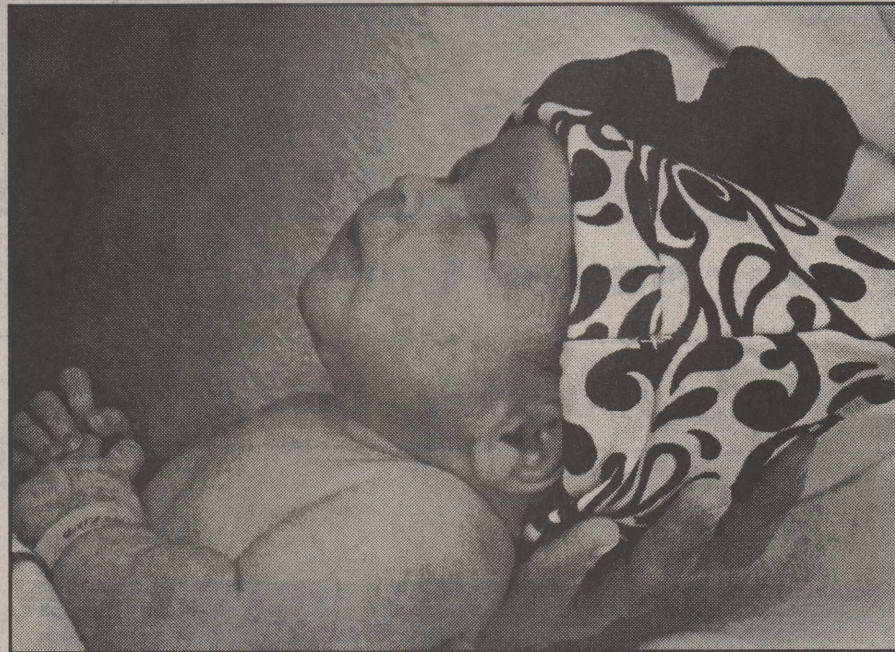

Texas Cities Lead The Way For Business

Texas cities continue to catch the attention of national business and economic publications for their economic strength and job creation, taking top marks in recent rankings by Forbes and The Business Journals.

"When it comes to the critical areas of economic success and job creation, it's no secret why Texas continues to set a national example," Gov. Perry said. "It's simple: we keep taxes low, maintain fair and predictable regulations, and protect our citizens from frivolous lawsuits. These free market principles

have created an environment that allows hard-working Texans to prosper, unburdened by an intrusive government that taxes success and limits our freedom."

According to the Forbes study released last month, the top four U.S. metro areas for middle class job creation since 2007 are in Texas. Austin-Round Rock-San Marcos ranked first, adding 17,000 middle class jobs, followed by Houston-Sugarland-Baytown, San Antonio-New Braunfels and Dallas-Fort Worth-

Arlington. In addition, The Business Journals' October 2013 ranking of U.S. cities by economic strength named three Texas cities in the top five. Austin topped the list, with Dallas-Fort Worth and Houston taking the second and fourth spots.

This week, Gov. Perry joined world-renowned economist Dr. Arthur Laffer to highlight Texas' conservative fiscal principles and contrast the economic policies of red states vs. blue states. Laffer unveiled a new study cit-

ing Texas' low-tax, business friendly environment as the driving force behind its economic success story.

Texas' economy continues to see growth across several industries. Last month, San Antonio-based Toyota announced truck sales were up 23 percent from one year ago, while Seguin-based Caterpillar Inc. assembled their 150,000th engine earlier this month. Dakin Industries Inc. this month also announced plans to create 250 new manufacturing jobs.

The JV Lady Broncos continue to stay undefeated with their second overtime win of the season. This time Cip Tobias drained a 'three-ball' with under 5 seconds for the one point Sonora victory. The Lady Broncos continue their road warriors ways in OZONA Tuesday (11/26) night with games at 6 (JV) and 7:15 (Varsity).

Broncos Win Another Bi-District

When a district champion meets a fourth place team in the playoffs, the fans probably have an idea of how the fourth place team will play. The first of the game went according to script as the Broncos jumped out to a 20 to 0 lead. Toward the end of the first quarter and through most of the second quarter, the Ballinger Bearcats played well and gave their fans some fun football to remember. At halftime, the Monday Morning Defensive Experts wondered the stands offering their wisdom on how to stop the Bearcats. All of their great ideas weren't needed as the Broncos and Bearcats got back on script. The Broncos won by a score of 67 to 28 with the final points being scored by mostly JV players. As far as I could find, the 67 points was second only to 74 points scored by the 1954 Broncos against Eden.

On the third play of the game, Andres Acevedo ripped the ball out of a Bearcat's hands. Michael Rollert rolled to his left and threw a touchdown pass to Ricky Martinez. After Martinez kicked the PAT, the Broncos led 7 to 0 with less two minutes of game time expired.

The Bronco onslaught continued after a Bearcat punt. Most of the yardage for the drive came from great blocking and tough running by Chance Campbell. Campbell got the touchdown on a three yard run around the right side of the line. The Bearcats blocked the PAT making the score 13 to 0.

After a three and out, the Broncos scored quickly. Acevedo took the handoff, broke several tackles, and gained 21 yards. Elijah Cross, Rollert, and Campbell took turns running the ball. Campbell found the endzone from seven yards out. After Martinez kicked the PAT, the score was 20 to 0 with 3:18 left in the first quarter.

From 3:18 left in the first until 10:38 left in the second, the Bearcats scored 14 points on passing touchdowns and trailed Sonora by six points with the score being 20 to 14.

The Broncos responded quickly. Rollert ran into the middle of the line. Somehow, he came out of the pile and raced down the right sideline for an 83 yard touchdown, With 9:01 left in the half, the Broncos led 27 to 14.

Ballinger put together another multi-play drive using mostly short passes. They reached the redzone where the Broncos held until they scored on a fourth and goal pass play. With 3:17 left in the half, the Broncos led by 27 to 20.

The Broncos answered with a long drive running the ball. Success running the ball causes the defense to inch closer and closer to the line of scrimmage. With 1:01 left in the half, Rollert faked the run and threw a 25 yard touchdown pass to Acevedo. When the PAT run failed, the score was 33 to 21.

Ballinger tried to answer, but Martinez intercepted stopping the last of Ballinger's magic.

To start the second half, Campbell carried twice on the opening drive. The first run gained 24 yards and the second one was a 46 yard rushing touchdown. After the kick missed, the score was 39 to 21 with only 39 second expired.

Martinez kicked off short and high. Jonathon Gutierrez tipped the football into the air and then recovered it at the Bearcats' 20 yard line. Rollert rolled to his left looking for a receiver, but all he saw was an unexpected Bearcat defender in his face. Rollert juke and then scrambled 14 yards to the one yard line. Rollert followed his great line into the end zone on a sneak. After Martinez kicked the point after, the Broncos led 46 to 21 with 9:23 left in the third.

On the next Bronco possession, Bryan Garcia took Campbell's place as the deep back.

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Sonora To Host Range & Pasture Management Workshop

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service will conduct a multi-county Range and Forage Management Workshop Dec. 10 at the Sutton County Civic Center in Sonora. Registration starts at 8:30 a.m. and the program begins at 9 a.m. Individual preregistration is \$20 by Dec. 3 and \$25 thereafter. The fee includes lunch. Five Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units (CEUs), one laws and regulations, two integrated pest management and two general, will be available.

The workshop is a joint effort among the AgriLife Extension offices in Sutton, Schleicher and Crockett counties. This fall has been good enough in terms of moisture, that we may actually have some management options to consider. This workshop is intended to highlight those options. For example, we'll discuss management considerations for cool-season forages intended for grazing. So we'll discuss items such as variety selection, planting, disease and pests, fertility needs, and other management of wheat and oat fields intended for grazing.

For rangeland managers, we'll look at chemical, mechanical, and prescribed burns as options. We'll address not just strategies associated with prescribed burns, but also the importance of managing liability risks. The full workshop should offer something for any land manager, regardless of how much acreage they have. The speakers are top-notch, so whether you are an old pro when it comes to range management, or just starting out, I think you will come away from this program with something you can use.

Speakers and their topics will include:

- Managing Winter Forages, Dr. David Drake, AgriLife Extension agronomist, San Angelo.
- Pesticide Laws and Regulations, Corey Pence, Texas Department of Agriculture, San Angelo.
- Prescribed Fire Liability Risks and Management Strategies, Dr. Charles "Butch" Taylor, superintendent of the Texas A&M AgriLife Research Station at Sonora.
- Range Plant Identification, Steve Nelle, wildlife consultant and riparian specialist and a retired U.S. Department of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Service range conservationist and wildlife biologist, San Angelo.
- Brush Management By Season, Ralph Porter, Dow AgriSciences range & pasture specialist, Abilene.

As far as the weather and Coach Hopkins' observation, I don't believe the weather had any real effect on either team.

Rollert completed one of six passes for five yards. Acevedo completed one of one for ten yards. His pass was caught by Rollert. Campbell led all rushers with 197 yards on 17 carries and one touchdown. Cross rushed 11 times and gained 104 yards scoring a touchdown. Rollert carried ten times for 40 yards and two touchdowns.

Campbell and Patlan led all tacklers with 19 tackles apiece. Cross, Cody Barber, Dub Latham, Sid Anderson, and Lionel DeLeon made 15, 14, 13, 11 and 10 tackles respectively. Cross had three tackles for a loss and Anderson had two. Latham, Martinez, DeLeon, and Campbell each had tackles for a loss. Martinez and Patlan recovered Post fumbles. Anderson and Acevedo each caused fumbles.

So here we are, facing Canadian in the Region 1 Semi-Final again. The Wildcats are 11-1, having lost the first game of the year to the 1A Stratford Elks 22-21. We'll see most of the same cast of characters from last year's Canadian team. Quarterback Ben Arbuckle has thrown for 2946 yards to Boston Hudson, Braden Galla, and Brock Hedgecoke. This year we will meet in Frenship, the home of the Wolforth-Frenship Tigers. Don't be late. Kickoff is at 2 PM on Friday.

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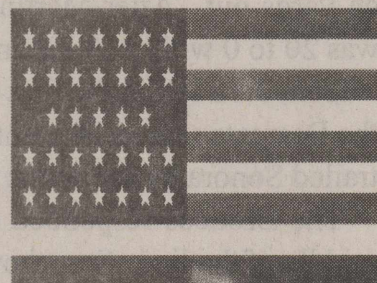
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Over 300 Hundred Years of Combined Service
