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Time Runs Out On The 2014 Football Season

With the Broncos leading by a score of 21 to 19 over the Waskom Wildcats late in the fourth quarter, Santi Garza intercepted. It appeared that this would seal the victory for the Broncos. If Andres Acevedo and the smash mouth Broncos could get some first downs, the game would be over.

In the first half, Acevedo and Brett Castillo had been able to run the football very effectively. The opening drive had been a thing of beauty. The Bronco offensive line moved the Wildcats out of the way. Acevedo had a 40-yard run for a first down and Castillo moved the chains with a 15 yard run. Acevedo got the first touchdown of the game on a four-yard run. The drive only lasted six plays.

In the second quarter, the Broncos drove for another

touchdown. Castillo scored on a ten-yard run.

The Wildcats got on the board when Kevin Johnson got outside and scored on a 33-yard touchdown run. They missed the PAT.

Sonora answered with another long drive where Acevedo and Castillo took advantage of the left side of the Wildcats' defensive line. Acevedo got the touchdown on a five yard run with only 45 seconds left in the first half.

As the teams left the field for the locker room, Sonora had pretty much dominated the Wildcats on offense and defense.

The Broncos kicked off to a much different Wildcat team to start the second half. The Bronco defense made Waskom struggle for every yard. However, they were able to

convert several fourth and longs. Waskom cut the lead to 21 to 13 when Junebug Johnson completed a long half back pass to the Broncos seven-yard line. Kevin Johnson got the touchdown at the 8:28 mark. Four minutes later, Trace Carter scored on a one yard run. Their two point attempt failed and the Broncos' lead was down to 21 to 19.

Defensively, the Wildcats solved the Broncos' wide(outside) option plays. Each Bronco possession managed to take time off the clock. The inside running plays made some first downs, but Sonora could not sustain another long scoring drive. Then Garza gave the Broncos the big stop.

After the pick, the Broncos tried to seal the victory. Unable to make a first down, and,

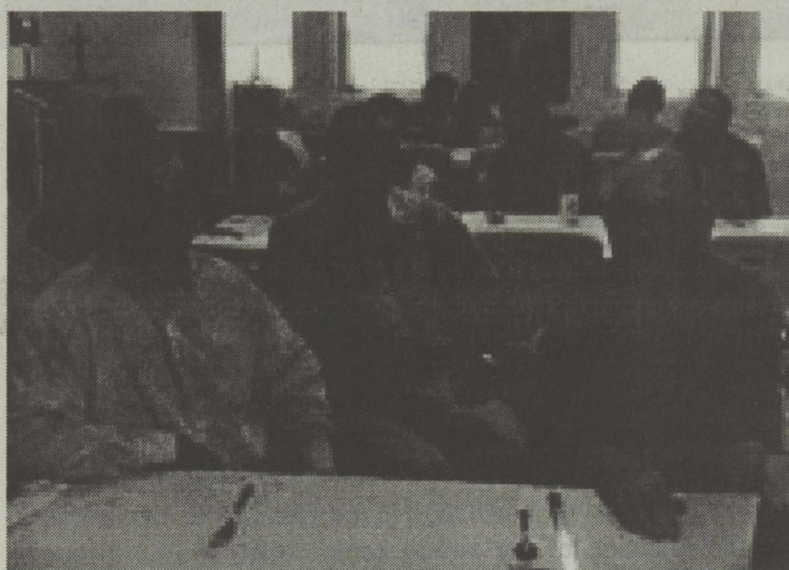

Kickapoo Cavern State Park Hosts First Day Hikes

Kickapoo Cavern State Park, located 35 miles south of Rock-springs on FM 674, will host an America's First Day Hikes event. The event will consist of two hikes, easy and moderate. Both begin at 9 A.M. on New Year's Day.

America's First Day Hikes is an annual event started by the state parks directors of all fifty states.

Park staff recommend that hikers bring water, snacks, hiking sticks, and sturdy shoes.

The easy hike follows the Sargeant Memorial Trail. It is .8 miles long and includes a stop at the Sargeant Overlook. Topics covered by the hike guide include plants and area history.

The moderate hike follows the Barbado Ridge Trail up from the valley floor to some of the highest areas of the park. Flora, fauna, karst formations, and history will be topics covered by the guides. This is a 3 mile hike lasting about two hours. For more information contact Kickapoo Cavern State Park at 830-563-2342. The program itself is free, but there is a three dollar park entry fee for adults.

The park can also be accessed from Brackettville, Texas.

Watch For Cough In Show Animals

This time of year, 4-H and FFA youth are preparing their lambs, goats, swine or other animals for the county livestock show. Following sudden weather changes, we sometimes notice animals coughing. Always check with your veterinarian, but here are a couple of conditions to be aware of.

In sheep and goats, we worry that coughing may lead to pneumonia. A virus known as the PI3 virus is commonly responsible for initiating the disease. Coughing is usually noticed along with rapid, noisy, labored breathing. Affected lambs or goats also usually quit eating.

Pneumonia in goats is most often caused by a small organism known as mycoplasma. With mycoplasma infection, other body systems such as the eyes, may be involved. Frequently in goats, if they show signs of pink eye, pneumonia and /or arthritis, you can be fairly sure it is caused by a mycoplasma.

Stress to the animal weakens the immune system, and leads to opportunistic infection of the lungs by bacteria. It is usually a combination of stresses such as nutritional deficiencies, bad weather, etc. that weaken the sheep's immune system.

Treatment for pneumonia is to inject with antibiotics. Some antibiotics require a veterinarian's prescription.

Swine exhibitors should be aware that coughing and respiratory diseases are common in pigs in confinement. Bacteria and viruses can be transmitted in the air that is shared by pigs that are housed together.

Clinical signs include intermittent coughing that persists for days to weeks and worsens with dust. Pigs also show a decreased rate of gain despite normal feed intake and become less efficient at gaining weight.

Sometimes, however, the coughing may not be due to microbes. Some parasites can cause similar symptoms. Roundworm larva migration, for example, can mimic Mycoplasmal pneumonia and SIV (swine influenza virus).

The roundworm larva (liver-lung) migration occurs from 5-21 days after exposure to eggs that are present within a feces-contaminated environment. The clinical signs (coughing) start about a week to 10 days after exposure. A fecal examination for roundworm ova (eggs) will not diagnose this condition. The feces will be negative for eggs for at least 7-8 weeks after exposure.

Regardless of species, persistent coughing can have several causes. It is best to be vigilant and notice changes in the animal early. Again, contact your veterinarian for course of treatment.

even though the Broncos were on their side of the 50, Acevedo punted. It was an absolutely perfect punt as it was downed at their two-yard line.

With slightly more than two minutes left in the game, Dillon Benton somehow broke several tackles and got free for a 71 yard go ahead touchdown. Waskom went for two, but the Broncos stopped it. Waskom had lead at 25 to 21.

The Broncos started their final drive from their own 22-yard line and went to their NASCAR offense. Hunter Hughes moved from tight end to quarterback and Acevedo became a receiver. Facing a fourth-and-10 with 39 seconds left, Hughes completed a clutch 14-yard pass to Gabe Rollert on the right sideline. He followed with a 6-yarder

to Acevedo. A Waskom penalty moved the ball to the three with less than 20 seconds to play and no timeouts.

On second down, Hughes rolled to his right and saw a small opening in the defense. He sprinted toward the goal line, but was stopped just short. He frantically got his offensive line set and appeared to spike the ball with one second remaining on the game clock. A penalty flag was thrown on the field for what appeared to be offsides on Waskom. But, after a brief discussion, the referee waved off the flag and the game was over. The official explanation was that the game clock had run out and the last play never occurred. Waskom got the 25-21 win and will advance to the State Championship game to

face the Newton Eagles who defeated Blanco 42-28.

Giving a Bicycle for Christmas? Don't Forget the Helmet!

The following article is provided by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Passenger Safety grant in College Station, TX provided by Bev Kellner Program Manager and TXDOT. It is being published in Sonora, TX to remind parents about purchasing a bicycle helmet.

Bicycles are always a popular gift at Christmas time, and many parents are shopping now for that perfect new bicycle for their child — maybe even their first bicycle. This is an excellent opportunity to teach children about the importance of wearing a helmet

to protect their head. According to National Safe Kids, helmets can reduce the risk of severe brain injury by up to 88%, but only 45% of children wear bike helmets. Safe Kids also reports that bicycles are associated with more injuries in children than any other product except automobiles. Other studies from the organization found that nearly half of the hospitalizations related to bicycles are from traumatic injury to the brain. Helmets should be considered an important part of bike riding.

"Learning to ride a bicycle is not just child's play," said Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service agent Jessica Stapper. "In addition to promoting healthy living habits, riding bicycles can teach children about becoming independent. With this new independence, children need to learn to follow important safety rules. One of the most important rules is to always wear a helmet."

Parents can be great role models to promote bicycle safety by wearing helmets on every trip. A child who rides with companions wearing helmets or adults in general is more likely to wear a helmet himself. Even very young toddlers on tricycles should wear helmets to establish good habits.

When selecting a helmet for your child, follow these tips: Look for a helmet that has been certified to meet Consumer Product Safety Commission standards. Make sure the helmet fits properly. To do this, measure around the rider's head about an inch above his or her eyebrows, and select an appropriately sized helmet.

When wearing a helmet, make sure the rim sits level from front to back and is worn low and just above the eyebrows. Make sure the helmet fits snugly. Adjust the helmet's

size with extra foam pads, which are provided with most helmets.

Buckle the chin strap on every ride.

Replace a helmet if it has been in a crash, even if no damage is visible.

In addition to helmets, parents need to find safe places to ride, such as parks, sidewalks, or playgrounds. It is important to supervise preschoolers when they are riding, and keep children younger than 10 from riding bikes in the street. When teaching children to ride bicycles, also educate them on these tips for safe bicycle riding:

Always wear a bike helmet.

Make sure the bicycle is the right size for the rider and in good working order.

Wear the proper clothing - neon, fluorescent, or other bright colors when riding day or night.

Teach children to make eye contact with drivers.

Ride in the same direction as other traffic.

Use hand and arm signals.

There should only be one rider per saddle.

Keep at least one hand on the handlebars.

The bicycle must have a white light on the front and a red reflector or red light on the rear (for riding at night).

Use effective brakes that are capable of making the braked wheel skid.

champions, they are champions.


In that truth I was able to see that there is something special about champions that everybody seems to look over.
