Win some. Lose some. That was how it went for both the Broncos and the District 5 leading Lady Broncos. After last week's games, the Broncos dropped to third place in district and the Lady Broncos were still leading despite their first district loss. Still, they were ranked 20th by the TABC.

Coach Dozier's win streak was snapped, and the Lady Broncos suffered a district loss to the Coahoma Lady Bulldogs at home. The taller Lady Bulldogs broke Sonora's press and pulled ahead for good at 2:23 left in the game to eke out the 54-49 victory. The Lady Bulldogs outscored Sonora 35-21 in the second half.

The Broncos defeated Coahoma at home in the nightcap 62-57 despite senior Braxton Iden's 33 points for the visitors. The Broncos trailed at the half by six points after only scoring two points in the first period. After halftime, the Broncos started zeroing in on the basket and outscored the Bulldogs 43-32. Gabe Rollert and John Arredondo each had two, three-pointers in the second half, while Luke James had one. Rollert led the Broncos with 21 points. Arredondo had 8 and James had six - all in the fourth period.

Dozier led all scoring with 20 points despite a rough night on the free throw line. Junior Janelle Vasquez had 19 points despite being knocked to the floor and slammed into the wall by the tag-teaming Lady Owls. 



1. Give up sweets and desserts. 2. Take a 10-minute walk each day and spend it in prayer and gratitude.



State involvement in the case began at 12:20 a.m. today when game wardens Nichole Leonard and Brent Satsky responded to a call for assistance from the New Braunfels Police Department. When they arrived on the scene a short time later, they learned that local officers had stopped a pickup truck near Landa Street and Paradise Alley while investigating a report of gunshots in the area.

Two dead bucks and one doe were found in the bed of the truck, which was occupied by two men and two teenage boys. When officers checked the vehicle for weapons, they discovered multiple empty shell casings on the floorboards.

Property Taxpayer Remedies - This Comptroller publication explains in Homestead Tax Deferral detail how to protest a property appraisal, what issues the county appraisal review board (ARB) can consider and what to expect during a protest hearing. The publication also discusses the options of taking a taxpayer's case to district court, the State Office of Administrative Hearings or binding arbitration if the taxpayer is dissatisfied with the outcome of the ARB hearing.

> Residence Texas homeowners may post-

pone paying the currently delinquent property taxes due on the appreciating value of their homes by filing a tax deferral affidavit at their local county appraisal district. This tax relief allows homeowners to pay the property taxes on 105 percent of the preceding year's appraised value of their homestead, plus the taxes on any new improvements to the homestead. The remaining taxes are postponed, but not cancelled, with interest accruing at 8 percent per year.

Property Tax Deferral for Persons Age 65 or Older or Disabled

Homeowners - Texans who are age 65 or older or disabled, as defined by law, may postpone paying current and delinquent property taxes on their homes by signing a tax

deferral affidavit. Once the affidavit is on file, taxes are deferred, but not cancelled, as long as the owner continues to own and live in the home. Interest continues to accrue on unpaid taxes. You may obtain a deferral affidavit at the appraisal district.

Protesting Property Appraisal Values -Property owners who disagree with the appraisal district's appraisal of their property for local taxes or for any other action that adversely affects them may protest their property value to the appraisal district's ARB.
