## Lady Broncos Win District and Bi-District

Sonora's Lady Broncos won the team's third district championship in a row last Tuesday night in front of the hometown fans. The game proved to be an exciting nail biter against district runner-up, Stanton.

The Lady Broncos were facing another tall team from the Big Country. In the first meeting earlier in the season, the Lady Broncos defeated the Lady Buffs 57-49. This final district game proved to be different. At the half, the Lady Buffs led by two. The Lady Broncos tied it up after three to make it 32 all. No Lady Bronco was in foul trouble in the second half, but when Gra-

cie Dozier and Torie Guerrero broke the Lady Buffs' zone defense to make their way to the free throw line, two key Stanton playmakers found themselves with four fouls each. Foul trouble and turnovers plagued the Lady Buffs when the game came down to the last three minutes of crunch time. The Lady Broncos pulled out the three-point victory 47-44. Stanton tried two three pointers in the final seconds that failed to extend the game into overtime. The Lady Broncos celebrated by cutting down the net prior to the Broncos' game.

On Monday night, the team played the Merkel Lady Bad-

gers in San Angelo for Bi-District. After a slow start and being behind 18-16 at the half, the Lady Broncos wore down the Lady Badgers and won 60-38. Junior Cip Tobias was the KHOS Player of the Game. Cip kept the Lady Broncos in the game with 14 points including four three pointers. Senior Gracie Dozier had a game high 23 points and was 12 for 15 at the free throw line.

The Lady Broncos' next game will be against the winner of the Bi-District matchup between Breckenridge and Coleman.

## Walk Across Texas

If you were to ask me to walk across Texas my reply would be a great deal shorter than the time it would take for me to put my shoes on. For some reason that's exactly what the Agrilife Extension service is asking us to do

on February 25th. Somehow though Sutton County Agrilife Extension agent Jessica Stapper makes it seem like a good idea!

"The Walk Across Texas program began around 25 years ago and it was estab-

lished as an 8 week program to promote physical activity", commented Stapper. The program's ultimate goal is to have folks across the state spend a week walking, running, skipping a total distance of 830 miles (or the total mileage across Texas).

"Obesity rates are so high and walking is such a great form of exercise. The agrilife extension goal is to lower those rates one step at a time", Stapper commented, "we are always trying to help better yourself. That's why I love the extension program so much".

The kickoff for the event will be held at the Sutton County Health and Wellness Center on February 25th between 10:30a.m. and 12:30 p.m. Stapper informed the Devil's River News that they will be doing team registrations at that time (the first 50 people will receive free pedometers). "A team would need to walk 13 miles per person per week. If you are counting your steps each day at work then it's easy to reach that goal. Each week the team captain will need to report the results back to me."

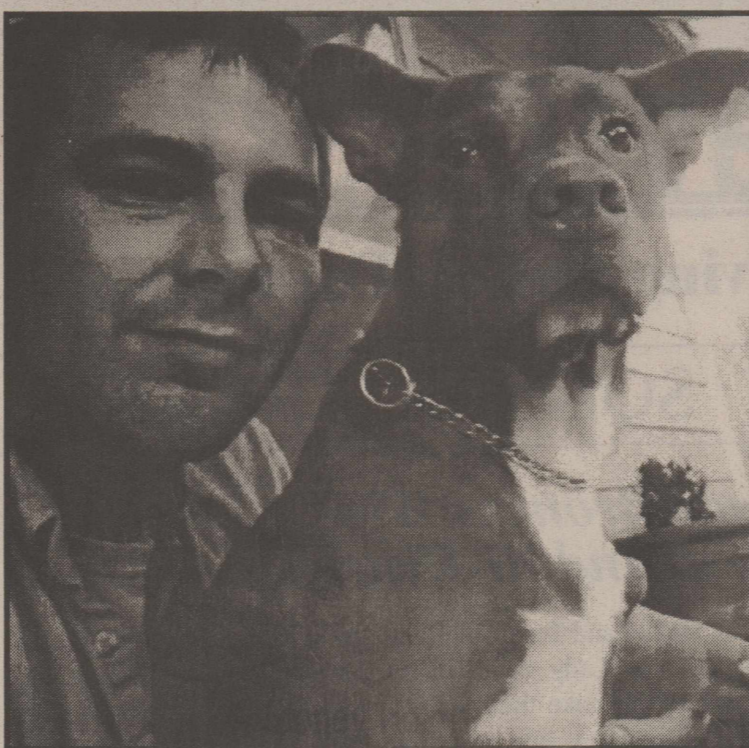

**Psalms 119:130**

**"The unfolding of your words gives light; it imparts understanding to the simple"**

Our modern world is a wonderful thing, but we have become blinded by that wonder. We are blinded not by the light of God, but by the flood of instant information. All the decisions we make are based off of the endless amount of instant information that is broadcast through our telephones, televisions, radios, and computers. It's also important to note that How many of you start your day not in prayer, but in front of a computer reading the news or checking your facebook? How many of you get frustrated when your internet connection is slow, requiring you to wait an extra 30 seconds before your email loads? That, in my opinion, is the most important aspect that blinds us from truth. We have become a society of "now", but God's word is spoken in the context of "forever".

There is a divide between humanity and God that can keep us from really hearing what He is trying to tell us. It exists not because we lack knowledge, it exists because we no longer value wisdom. For example, the vast majority of the great men and women of our time are praised for their accomplishments by using words like genius, brilliant, and intelligent. The Bible uses the word "wise" 247 times but the words "information", "smart", and "genius" aren't even printed once.

Our brilliance has allowed us to build a world-wide system that allows for instant communication anywhere in the planet. By any measure that accomplishment is one of the gems of modern society, but the knowledge we used to build that system lacked the wisdom required to see that instead of connecting humanity, the internet has separated us from any real contact with each other.

From text messaging to emails, we have completely removed the personal component associated with building relationships. This new kind of "communication" has made it acceptable to form relationships with people without ever having to know who they are. Other than being an annoyance to the older generations (who actually had to hold real conversations with people when they were younger), this way of communication creates a system of thought that is in conflict with how God speaks to us. Put more simply, we are conditioned to read His word in the same way we would read a text message but God is not texting us, He is speaking to us.

In Psalms 119:130 scripture tells us that the act of "unfolding" His words gives light and understanding, but most of us seem to "understand" the words printed in the Bible without doing anything more than reading them. To live in faith that way is a lot like being a child that uses big words that they really don't understand.

What would you rather your children do? To be smart enough to know what the definition of Love is, or have the wisdom to listen to the lessons that Love can teach?

Now ask yourself this question. What do you think God would rather us do? To have the intelligence to speak the words of our faith correctly, or to have the wisdom to live our lives based on what those words mean?

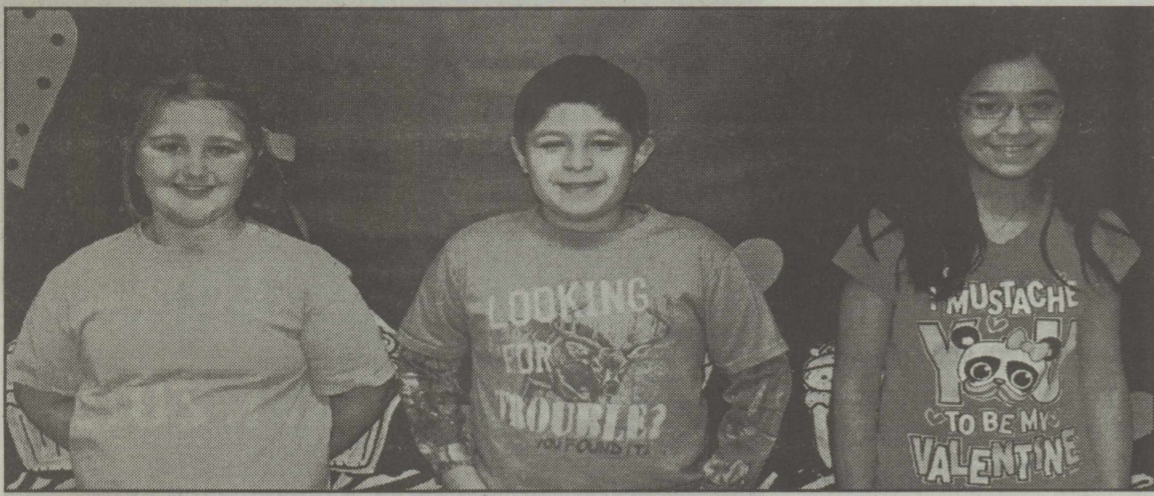

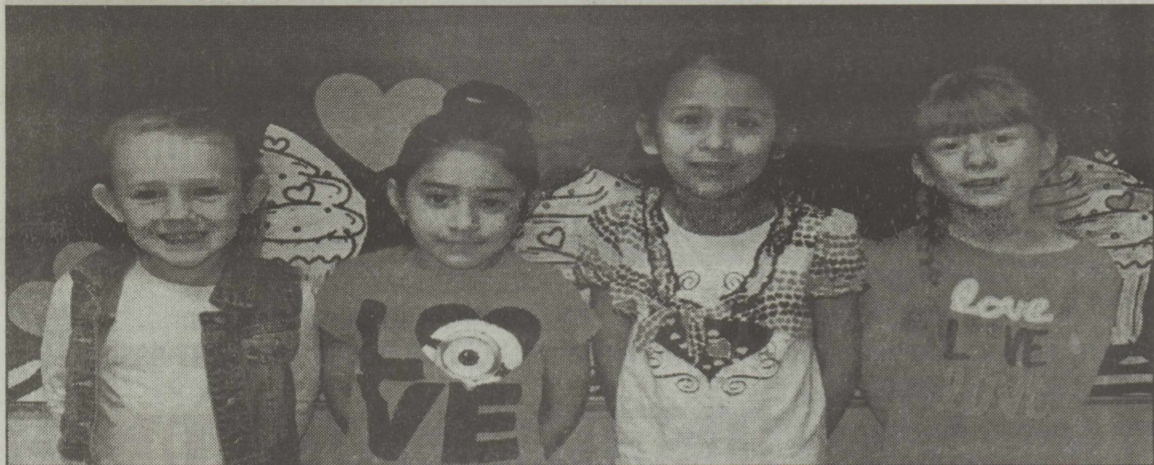

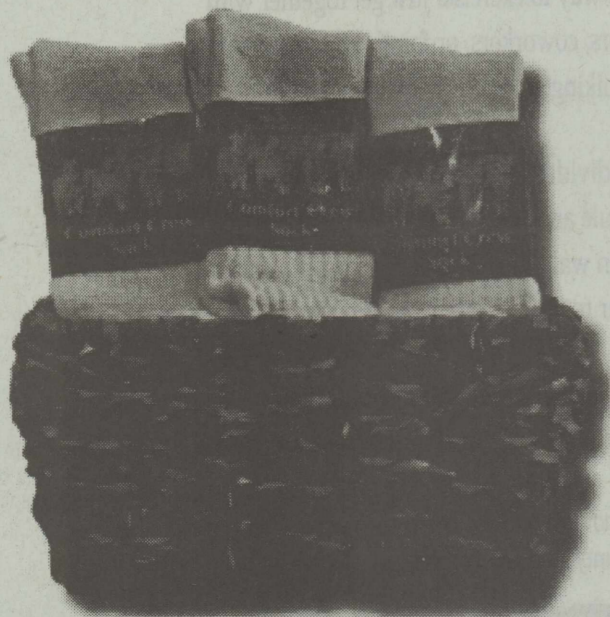

And of those countries, many do not have the same food safety standards that the United States has. He also stated that our food travels approximately 2500 miles before it is eaten. He warned us that terrorist could easily contaminate our food supply, but did not offer a solution to that danger.

## Fruit Trees Need To Chill Too

I noticed some peach trees already in bloom. Though we may still have cold weather ahead of us, some amount of cold or chill is required by our fruit trees. Why are chill hours important?

Most hardy fruit trees need a certain amount of cold weather to end their dormancy and to promote spring growth. When winters are too mild, spring growth is delayed, irregular, and slow.

During the fall season, decreasing day length and cooler temperatures induce a tree to produce growth inhibitor hormones that disrupt its growth. It is these hormones that maintain a tree in dormancy during winter. The dormant buds of many plants require cold weather to grow, flower and develop properly, but requirement vary by species.

Dormancy is interrupted when sufficient cold temperatures break down the growth inhibitors within the tree. A precise number of cumulative hours of chill (temperatures lower than 45 F), are required to break dormancy. When enough chilling accumulates, the buds are ready to grow in response to warm temperatures.

If the buds do not receive sufficient chilling temperatures during winter to completely release dormancy, trees may develop physiological symptoms such as delayed and extended bloom, delayed leafing, reduced fruit set and reduced fruit quality. Extreme cold during winter dormancy, however, may kill the fruit buds.

So what's the story for peaches?

If you're thinking about planting a peach tree, consider the chilling requirement. If you choose varieties that have a chilling requirement that is too low, there is a greater probability that they will bloom early and be more subject to frost. If the chilling requirement is too high, they may be very slow to break dormancy and abort fruit.

Our zone gets about 800 hours of chilling. Plant varieties which have the correct chilling requirement for our area. Some of these include Sentinal, Redglobe, and Fireprince, but there are others. Do some homework.
