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## Does Sonora Love... Loves.

**City Council Holds Open Meeting  
To Discuss Truck Stop Establishment**

Normally any new business that establishes itself within the city limits of Sonora doesn't require any meetings by the City Council but as all of us know, anytime love is involved things tend to get complicated. This is also the case with the proposed development of property located along I-10 exit 404 as Love's is interested in building a truck stop on 15 acres adjacent to that exit.

Love's has over 140 stores across the United States. They build two kinds of stores. The 'Country Stores' are fueling stations with a convenience store attached and the larger Love's Travel Stops (what is proposed to be built in Sonora) are located on interstate highways and offer additional amenities such as food from restaurant chains such as Subway, Arby's and Carl's Jr., trucking supplies, showers and RV dump stations.

In the course over the past several months the Sonora Economic Development Cooperation (hereafter EDC) has been involved in negotiating an agreement which would facilitate an investment by Love's for a 10 million dollar travel stop. On March 2, 2014

the Sonora City Council held a special meeting to openly discuss some of the communities' concerns regarding the potential development.

In the deal proposed by the EDC 15 acres of land located adjacent to I-10 exit 404 would be annexed by the City of Sonora. This would result in the city being able to receive both sales and property taxes at the location, but would also require that the city provide access to the city sewage treatment system. This would require the City of Sonora to extend sewage lines approximately 5 miles beyond its existing city limits as well as drilling a water well to provide water to the truck stop.

Robin Street (EDC representative) indicated that the total cost for extending sewer service and drilling a water well would cost around 1.4 million dollars. While the sticker shock of that amount would cause most taxpayers to cringe, Street indicated that the EDC's negotiations limited the burden of this expansion on taxpayers. "Love's has agreed to contribute \$500,000, the EDC is putting in 225,000. We are seeking a grant that would pay an ad-

ditional \$750,000 which only leaves about 25,000 that the city will have to pay."

Street then discussed some details about that grant. "We will be applying for a grant through the Texas Community Development Block Grant, but even within that there are several funds available to us. Specifically, we will be applying for the Texas capital fund under the infrastructure grant,



a portion of the funds will be used in order to get a water well out there [truck stop]". She indicated that this is not an unusual path for Sonora to take as, "the city has used development funds in the past. This program is based on funds available to benefit low to moderate income persons. The full amount of the funds are available which can be up to 750,000. So it will pay for about half of what this project is going to cost."

When an audience member asked her about how many jobs this project will create and what the chances are that Sonora will get such a grant she commented that, "we are looking at adding 31 jobs with this project (a conservative figure) as it stands right now. The grants are awarded monthly. We apply for them by the 20th of each month. There are a lot of factors determining if we get the grant, but the biggest one is how many other people have applied for it. For example, in January there wasn't a single application for the grant so had we applied for it we would have gotten it. The chances are very good because we do meet the minimum requirements".

Street then addressed

several concerns she received this week regarding this proposed project. The major topics asked are indicated by bold along with a response.

**The community didn't get enough advance notice to fully consider the pros and cons of this investment.**

-Street-I understand that some people are upset that I have entered into executive session in discussions with the City Council in the last few months, and that the SEDC has had executive sessions. If everyone doesn't already know, the SEDC and any taxing entity (entities that receive tax income) is under the open meetings act. We are bound by state law so that any Economic Development negotiations are one of the topics we are required to discuss in executive sessions. As soon as we could, we have opened this up for public input and we are happy and delighted to reach this point.

**Is the City of Sonora going to annex any additional property?**

-Street-We are in the process of obtaining annexation for the 15 acres that this property is on. In order to do that we have to join

the city limits. So we are trying to figure out a "strip annexation" out to the 15 acres. Right now (as far as I know) there are no other plans to annex any other property. As additional commercial property develops we are hoping that they request annexation so that we can extend our services to them and in turn benefit from taxes that come into the city from that."

**What is the total cost of the project to the taxpayer?**

It is going to cost 1.4 million for the sewer expansion and approximately 50,000 for the water well. Loves truck stop will invest 10 million dollars for the construction and development of that property. When it's all said and done there will be 11.5 million dollars spent on this project. Love's has agreed to contribute \$500,000, the EDC is putting in 225,000. We are seeking a grant that would pay an additional \$750,000 which only leaves about 25,000 that the city (taxpayers) will have to pay on expanding the infrastructure for this specific project.

**How much money is the EDC putting into this project, and how much will they have left over**

**for helping out local businesses?**

-Street-We have approved spending for \$225,000 to be given to the city for the infrastructure. We will not be giving Loves anything, they are welcome to come to us and request assistance. That's less than half than what's than half of our money market, so we are still able to help other local projects. I encourage anyone to come by our office and we would love to work with you.

**Can our city sewer handle the extra capacity?**

-Street-There has been a lot of concern if our sewer can handle the extra load. Right now our sewer runs at around half of its capacity, so as it stands right now with this one project we have more than enough capacity to accommodate them.

**Will this truck stop increase crime?**

-Street-I really appreciate this concern and I have researched this all week long. I looked at a community in Alabama that is a little bit smaller than Sonora that has a Loves Truck stop. I contacted the police chief there and he indicated that in the six years since the construction of the truck stop there has been no instances of major crime: kidnapping, murder, rape, or burglaries.

Council member Todd Munn indicated that he had visited with the truck stop in Comfort that reported 2 instances that the police

had to be called in on (both were small altercations). The pilot truckstop in junction did not know of any issues arising that required calling the police.

**How is this going to effect existing local businesses in Sonora?**

-Street-I will say that I have been with the EDC for a good number of years and at every meeting we have a discussion about business retention. This is something that we feel is extremely important, and so we work very hard at everything we do to ensure that we keep our local business. Will Love's impact our local business? Probably to a small degree, but one of the reasons EDC is so excited about this project is because it is targeting a demographic that is not stopping in Sonora.

I have talked to many towns similar to Sonora and you don't have businesses closing down right and left, but we will continue to talk about this and the EDC will do everything we can to ensure local business stays in Sutton County.

**Will this project effect our water table?**

Jim Polonis director of Sutton County Underground Water addressed this question.

To give you an idea of scope that we are talking about in the way of water, Texas Water Code Chapter 36 defines domestic and livestock water as being 17.5 gallons per minute, or

25,000 gallons per day. In the discussions I had with Loves, the requirements at the truck stop will be at about 15,000 gallons. That is 10.4 gallons per minute, which is less than what is allowed for livestock or domestic. Being that this is a commercial well, the board of directors at the water district will consider this and rest assured that we will keep an eye on it.

**How will the Hospital District be effected by this project?**

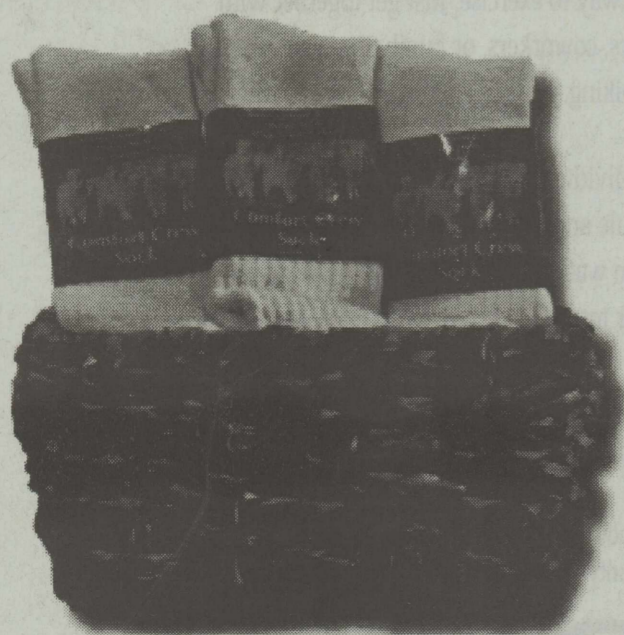
-Street-I don't really know how to answer that, but I do know that the hospital district taxes will increase. Right now it's zoned agricultural but when you put in the 10 million dollar investment then the change to commercial property you will see an increase. I just have confidence in the doctors and the hospital board to work out any issues that may effect the district.

**What kind of tax revenue are we expecting out of this?**

-Street-Based on existing locations (comparable to Sonora ), Loves projects about 10 million in taxable revenue. So that will mean 200,000 in sales tax and then we will have property tax that the city is currently not making. Since that area will be taxed as a commercial property (in addition to the City), the county, hospital, school, and water district will all benefit from an increase in tax revenue.



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## USDA Designates Sutton County in Texas as a Primary Natural Disaster Area

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25, 2015 — The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has designated Sutton County in Texas as a primary natural disaster area due to damages and losses caused by a recent drought.

"Our hearts go out to those Texas farmers and ranchers affected by recent natural disasters," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. "President Obama and I are committed to ensuring that agriculture remains a bright spot in our nation's economy by sustaining the successes of America's farmers, ranchers, and rural communities through these difficult times. We're also telling Texas producers that USDA stands with you and your communities when severe weather and natural disasters threaten to disrupt your livelihood."

Farmers and ranchers in Crockett, Edwards, Kimble, Menard, Schleicher and Val Verde counties in Texas also qualify for natural disaster assistance because their counties are contiguous.

All counties listed above were designated natural disaster areas on Feb. 25, 2015, making all qualified farm operators in the designated areas eligible for low interest emergency (EM) loans from USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), provided eligibility requirements are met. Farmers in eligible counties have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply for loans to help cover part of

their actual losses. FSA will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability. FSA has a variety of programs, in addition to the EM loan program, to help eligible farmers recover from adversity.

Additional programs available to assist farmers and ranchers include the Emergency Conservation Program, The Livestock Forage Disaster Program, the Livestock Indemnity Program, the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-Raised Fish Program, and the Tree Assistance Program. Interested farmers may contact their local USDA Service Centers for further information on eligibility requirements and application procedures for these and other programs. 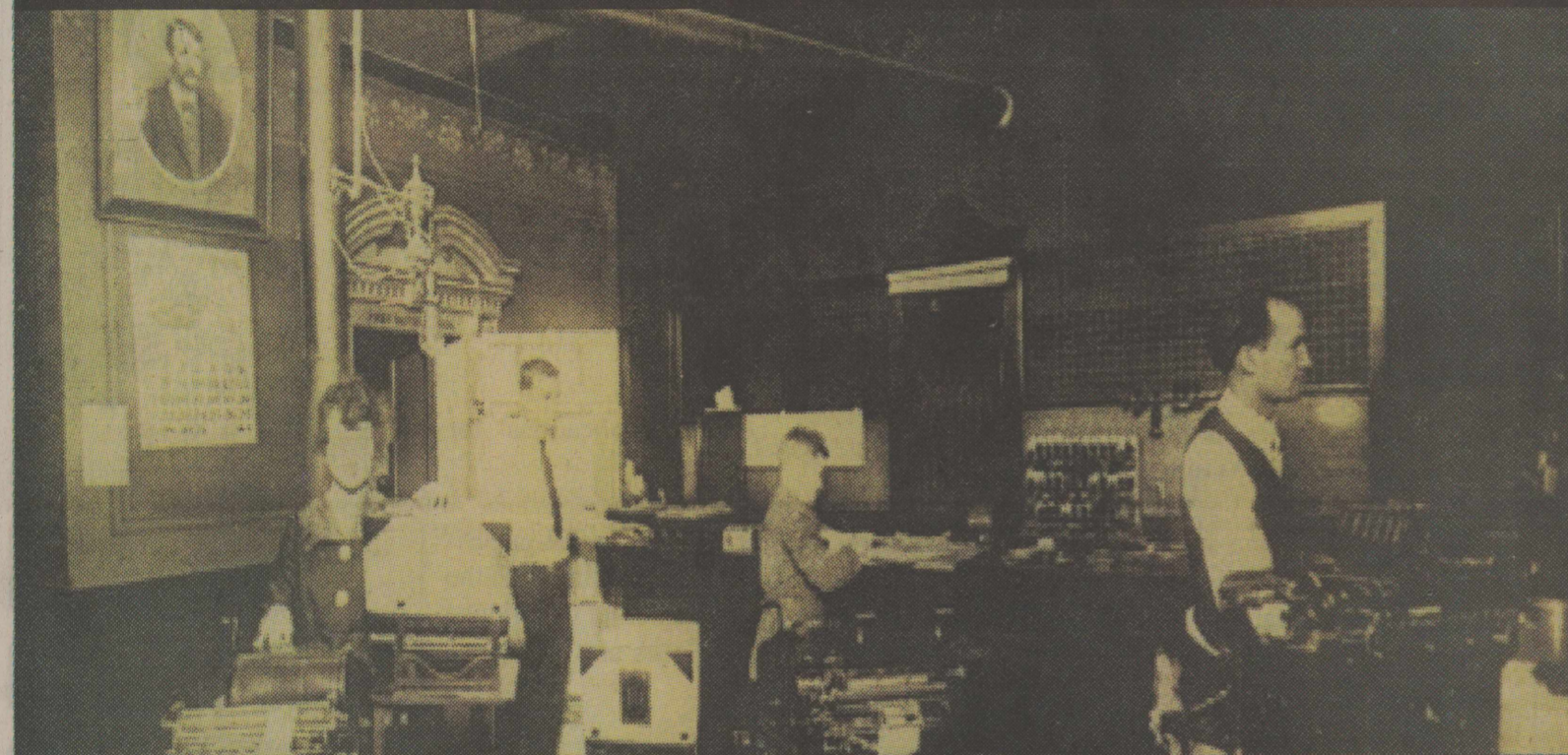


Kody Joy Davis, San Angelo Stock Show Junior Wether Show Class 1.

the citizens there for over 8 years.

Short term, Chief Dudley wants to "get the police department back up to strength protecting the citizens of Sonora. I want to work with the community by having my door open 24/7 for any of the citizens and guests here in town".

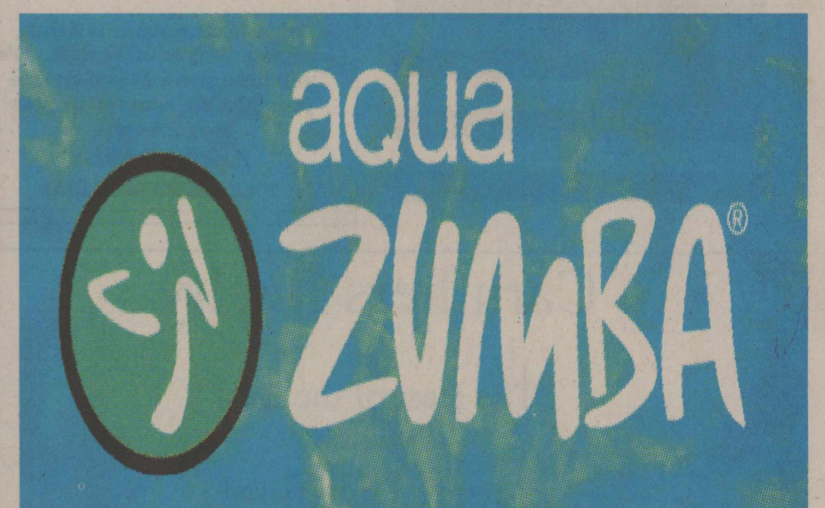
When it comes to direct interaction with the Chief we can expect to see that he, "gets along and enjoys people. I do need your [citizen's] help, so if anyone has a problem or complaint I want them to feel like they can talk to me about it."

His vision for Sonora includes getting law enforcement back to when it worked best, "m going to go old school. That doesn't mean I'm going to avoid modern technology, but I want to see it back where the police department, sheriffs office and DPS are all on the same team. I've already met with Sheriff Fincher and he's in complete compliance with that vision. The main thing is that I want a community police department."

He finished his comments by stating that, "I am not here for myself or the city council. I am here for the citizens."
