A Conversation With God... Finding Balance

As a result we frequently stumble on things we cannot see. To focus only on our own salvation is no different. We can become so obsessed with all that "I" do for the church that we start to judge others that don't appear to do as much. It is the focus on our own salvation that unbalances us from being able to see that how our bodies "walk in Christ" is just as important as how our mouths "talk about living in Christ".

When we keep our eyes on the earth we can't see that there is even a heaven above us (we don't know how to get to our destination). As a result we can't see why we stumble. To focus only on our own ability is no different. We can become so absorbed with everything that "I" can do in this world that we soon start to see failure not as a lesson, but as a shortcoming. The thoughts enter our minds that maybe, "I am not good enough" or that, "that person cheated his/her way into success" is when we start finding reasons to explain why we didn't succeed. In those times where our gaze is directed to the earth we tend to start looking for reasons not to succeed rather than finding ways we can succeed. That is how our lives will be reflected on others.

Choose your Own Reflection.

When most of us come across people that live a life contrary to our values

we tend to avoid them. It may be someone that is homeless, addicted to drugs or live their lives under a different sense of morality but we all tend to write these people off as "lost". In doing that we are forgetting why God put that person in our path in the first place. We become just as lost as the person we were so quick to avoid. Just like forgetting why we went to the grocery store, we forget why God chose to give us life.

We forget that we were created in His image, which literally means that we are a reflection of Him. Just as the sun will reflect light off of the lake when it is calm we too can reflect the light of His message. Sunny Day Spawns Cloudburst Of Big Bass

ATHENS—The sun came out, and the Toyota ShareLunkers came in.

On the first sunny Saturday most people in Texas can remember, nearly every bass boat in Texas was on the water, and the result was three Toyota ShareLunker entries and one almost.

The almost actually was a ShareLunker last year, when it was caught by Athens resident Frank Kirk from Lake Athens. At that time—January 25—the fish weighed 13.67 pounds. When reeled in by Robert Adams of Mineral Wells on Saturday the fish weighed 12.94 pounds—just short of the magic number of 13 needed to qualify for entry. The fish was identified by a tag inserted when it was caught last year.

Toyota ShareLunker 560 came from Lake Ray Roberts and was caught by Shannon Lee Elvington of Pilot Point. Elvington, who has fished the lake all his life, was fishing with guide Dannie Golden when he hooked the 15.18-pound bass. The fish was 26.25 inches long and 21.5 inches in girth.

Elvington was fishing on the east side of the lake in 14 feet of 45-degree water when the fish took a jerkbait at 10:40 a.m. Elvington has submitted the fish for recognition as the new lake record. The previous biggest largemouth reported from the lake weighed 14.59 pounds and was caught in 2000.

The fish also puts Elvington in the lead for Toyota ShareLunker Angler of the Year honors as the biggest fish of the season. The Angler of the Year receives a prize package from G. Loomis and, if the angler is a Texas resident, a lifetime fishing license.

At 15.18 pounds, the fish was just over 3 ounces shy of making the list of 50 biggest largemouth bass ever caught in Texas.

Second out of the gate was Wayman Triana of Nacogdoches, who caught Toyota ShareLunker 561 from Sam Rayburn Reservoir during a Bass Champs tournament. The 13.05-pound fish was 25.5 inches long and 21 inches in girth. Triana caught it in 15 feet of water on a crankbait at 1:30 p.m.

Next up was Darrell Tompkins of Huffman, also fishing on Sam Rayburn, who caught Toyota ShareLunker 562 at 6:00 p.m. Tompkins was throwing a spinnerbait in shallow water when the 14.32-pound bass took it. The fish was 26.25 inches long and 22.25 inches in girth. It was held for pickup at Jackson Hill Marina, an official Toyota ShareLunker weigh and holding station.


The two ShareLunkers from Sam Rayburn vaulted that lake into a tie for second place among lakes producing the most ShareLunkers. Lake Fork leads the pack with 257, while Sam Rayburn, Alan Henry, and O.H. Ivie have all produced 25.

ShareLunker catches can be reported 24 hours a day, seven days a week during the season, by calling (903) 681-0550. If poor cellphone service prevents use of the voice number, anglers can leave a phone number (including area code) at (888) 784-0600. That number is also monitored 24/7 during the season.

For complete information and rules of the ShareLunker program, tips on caring for big bass and a recap of last year's season, see www.tpwd.texas.gov/sharelunker. The site also includes a searchable database of all fish entered into the program along with pictures where available, and a list of official Toyota ShareLunker weigh and holding stations equipped with certified scales.

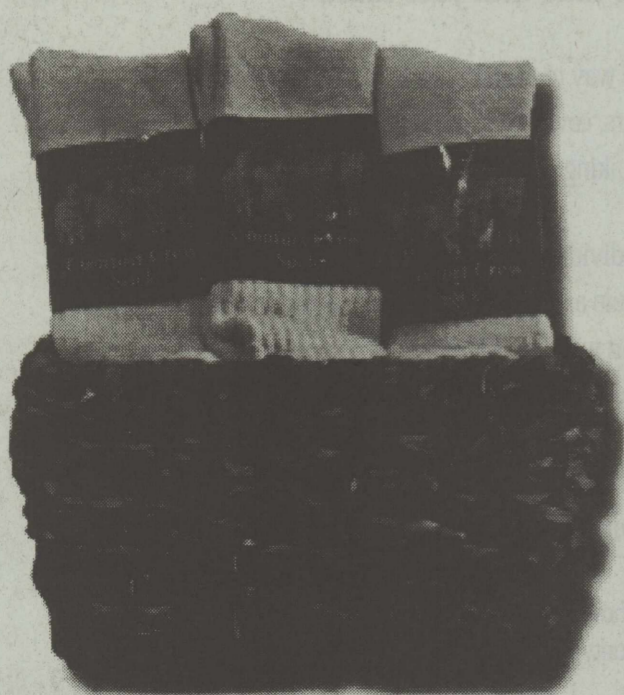

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Game Warden Field Notes

The following items are compiled from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement reports.

Daffy Duck Hunters

An Upshur County game warden and a Wood County game warden investigated an anonymous tip about two duck hunters shooting a 10-man limit of ducks at an unknown location one morning. The only evidence the tip offered were a possible last name and a photograph of one individual posing with 60 ducks. Later that evening, the wardens identified, located and interviewed the two individuals involved, who both admitted to shooting 60 ducks over a baited pond as well as dumping 55 ring-necked ducks in the woods to waste. The ducks and bait were located and collected for evidence. Multiple cases and restitution are pending.

Possum High

A Smith County game warden was sitting on a night set watching two pastures. After a while, a car drove by, slammed on the brakes, swerved into the bar ditch and turned around quickly. The car sped up for a short distance before swerving into the bar ditch and turning around again. The warden watched the vehicle do this two more times before catching up with it and making a stop. When the warden asked the driver what he was doing, the driver replied he was trying to run over an opossum that was trying to cross the road. The warden could smell a heavy odor of marijuana coming from the driver, who admitted to possessing a small amount. The warden issued citations and the cases are pending.

Dude, Where's My Deer Head?

Two Jasper County game wardens went to a local deer processing plant and began inspections, during which the owner of the plant became very uncooperative, telling the wardens they had no right to look at his business. The wardens stepped out of the plant to discuss the several class C violations they found at the plant, and upon their return to the plant, they noticed a deer head in question with undersized antlers was missing. The wardens filed felony charges for tampering with evidence and the undersized buck was eventually found. Stolen? No. Wait, Yes.

As an Atascosa County game warden was on patrol, he came across a parked truck on the side of a county road that was "out of place." He ran the rear license plate and it did not come back stolen. However, upon further investigation, he learned that was in fact actually stolen and had been for two weeks. In addition, the truck had been used to carry undocumented immigrants from South Texas to a designated drop off point in Atascosa County. The truck was going to be reused for that same purpose until the warden happened upon it during his routine patrol. Those responsible had switched out the back license plate with a similar truck's license plate.

Peyote Nights

Several Texas game wardens helped investigate a group of trespassers on the East Wildlife Foundation property after receiving a picture of two individuals walking into the ranch from the southern boundary fence. Based on prior intelligence, the wardens believed these trespassers were the same ones that

had gotten away from them just two weeks prior. In all, five wardens and two ranch security personnel waited alongside a trail the trespassers had used previously, where they successfully apprehended to Mexican nationals with about 103 pounds of peyote. The wardens charged the trespassers with criminal trespass class B misdemeanor and possession of controlled substance first degree felony. Further investigation could lead to organized criminal activity charges.

On a Ram-page

While investigating a poaching case, two Webb County game wardens visited the local taxidermist hoping to locate a missing deer. While going through the records, the wardens found two ram skulls that raised a concern. Further investigation proved that both rams were taken illegally. Both hunters who shot the rams were cited for hunting without a hunting license and no proof of hunter education. "I Didn't Think You Would Be Home"

A Comanche County game warden had come home for lunch and parked his truck in the driveway when a knock came at the front door. His wife answered the door to find a young man asking if she knew where he could hunt hogs. She said she didn't know and sent him on his way. The warden got to the door just as the man was getting into his white truck to leave. He felt there was something off about the encounter, so he moved his patrol truck behind his house and set up where he could watch the oat field just across the highway. At dusk, he saw a white truck driving slowly on the highway and

stop at the edge of the oat field. He then saw the man get out, remove a rifle from the backseat, sneak up to the fence and fire four shots into a herd of deer. Another car was coming down the road and spooked the man, so he ran back to his truck and made a U-turn just as the warden arrived to the scene. The warden proceeded to handcuff, search and read Miranda rights to the man before asking him, "What were you thinking?" The young man said, "I didn't think you would be home." The warden then searched the field but did not find a deer or any blood. The man said he had just bought the .243 rifle and had not bothered to sight-in the scope. The man was charged with hunting from a public road and hunting in a closed area. His new rifle was seized. Shell Shock

While patrolling for duck hunters in Aransas Bay, two Aransas County game wardens came across a sea turtle stranded in the very cold and shallow water. The wardens then transported the stunned sea turtle to deeper water and helped it get going. The sea turtle successfully swam way.

The Brady Bust

A McCulloch County game warden was patrolling a county road when a truck towing another truck on a flatbed trailer approached from the opposite direction. The warden met the approaching vehicle side-by-side in the middle of the road and began a casual conversation with the driver. The driver said that he and his buddy had met up in Brady to sell a truck at the scrapyard, but the scrapyard had not taken the truck due to some missing paperwork, so the guys decided to drive around and visit for a while before parting ways. Having been called out many times before to this specific county road for suspected road hunting violations,

the warden asked if there were any guns in the truck. The driver revealed a loaded rifle tucked between the seat and the console. Further questioning and a driver's license check indicated that the driver had a suspended license and a felony conviction. A deputy was called in for assistance on

a vehicle search, which turned up .6 grams of methamphetamines, drug paraphernalia and open containers of alcohol. The driver was arrested for unlawful possession of a firearm, possession of a controlled substance and driving with a suspended license.

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
