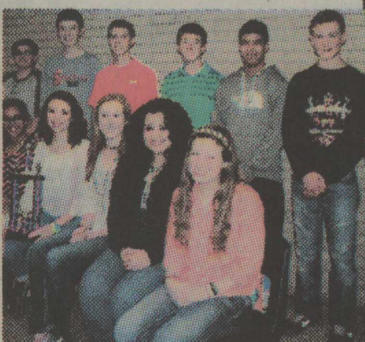

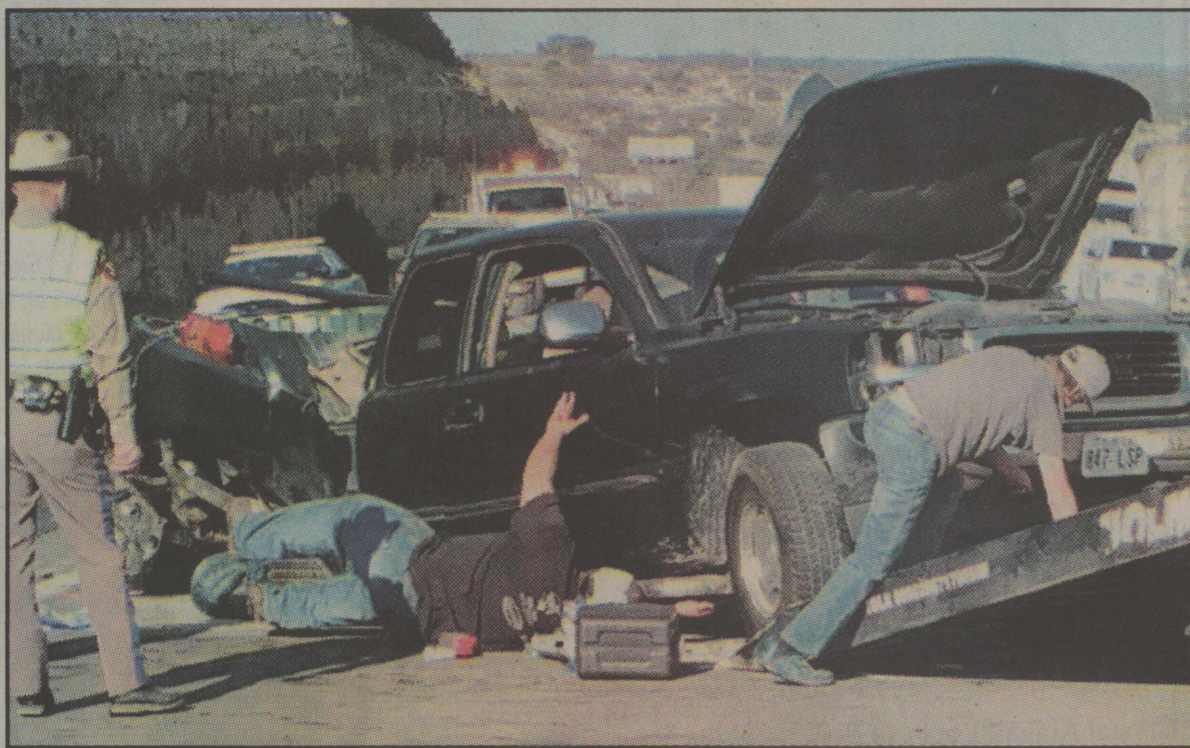

## Fatal Accident on I-10



At 8:15 a.m. on Thursday, March 12th, a traffic accident resulted in the death of a man 1 mile east of Sonora. The accident occurred when 77 year old retiree Karle J. Maxwell from Utah was driving east (at a slow speed) when a 2004 Freight-liner Tow-Truck ran into the back of his vehicle.

Maxwell was pronounced dead by Justice of the Peace J. Wilson and then transported to Kerbow Funeral Home.

The driver of the Tow Truck was Chad Voyer from Buckeye Arizona. Voyer suffered non incapacitating injuries and was admitted into the Hudspeth Hospital in Sonora.



## Bronco Baseball Recap

**Game #3- (championship game) Broncos lose extra-inning Heartbreaker to Kerrville JV, 5-4.**

Broncos lost 5-4 in 11 innings to Kerrville JV on Saturday at Bronco baseball field.

**Game #2-Third-Inning Rally Sparks Win for Broncos, 8-0**

A five-run explosion in the third inning spurred Broncos to an 8-0 win in six innings over Brownwood JV at Bronco Baseball field on Thursday.

Broncos scored in the third on an RBI single by Michael Munigia, a two-run double by Hunter Hughes, an RBI single by Andres Acevedo, and an RBI single by Isaiah Lira. Hughes racked up three RBIs on three hits for Broncos.

Brownwood JV couldn't get anything going as long as Acevedo was on the mound. Brownwood JV managed just one hit off of

Acevedo, who allowed no earned runs, walked none and struck out three during his six innings of work.

Brownwood couldn't get it done on the bump for Brownwood JV, taking a loss. He lasted just 2 1/3 innings, walked two, struck out two, and allowed five runs.

Broncos increased its lead with two runs in the fourth. The inning got off to a hot start when Elijah Cross doubled, scoring Netza Estrada.

**Game #1-Broncos tops TLCA in back-and-forth affair, 7-6**

Broncos and TLCA traded the lead five times on Thursday, but Broncos ended up on top with a 7-6 win in five innings over TLCA.

Broncos finally managed to grab the lead after a strong fourth inning. Broncos went up for good on an RBI single by Elijah Cross off Weidner, scoring Noah San Miguel.

San Miguel racked up two RBIs on two hits for Broncos. He singled in the first

inning and doubled in the fourth inning.

Louie Castro recorded the win for Broncos even though he allowed six runs over five innings. Castro struck out eight, walked three and gave up three hits. T. Weidner was the game's losing pitcher. He allowed seven runs in four innings, walked two and struck out four.

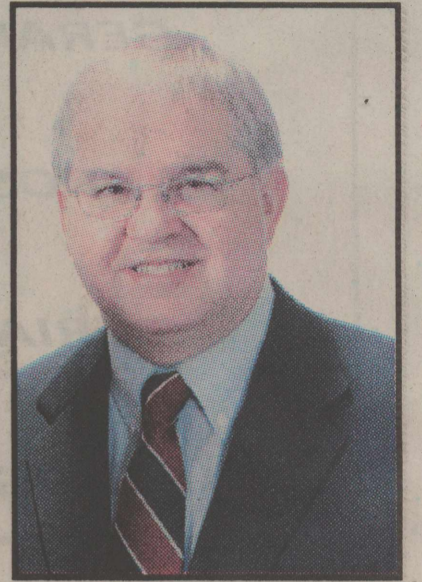

## Sonora's Doctors Are A True Asset

As reported from several sources, the nation's shortage of doctors will rise to between 46,000 and 90,000 by 2025 as the U.S. population grows.

A new study announced by the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC), a lobby for medical schools and teaching hospitals, said "the doctor shortage is real" with total physician demand projected to grow by up to 17 percent as a population of baby boomers ages and the Affordable Care Act is implemented.

"It's particularly serious for the kind of medical care that our aging population is going to need," said Dr. Darrell Kirsh, AAMC's president in a statement accompanying the analysis by research firm IHS.

Specifically primary care doctors are in short supply. The report estimates that between 12,500 and 31,000 primary care doctors will be needed even as retail clinics, outpatient centers and other models use more nurse practitioners, physician assistants and other allied health professionals.

"The physician shortage will grow over the next 10 years under every likely scenario," Kirsh said. "Because training a doctor takes between five and 10 years, we must act now, in 2015, if we are going to avoid serious physician shortages in 2025. The solution requires a multi-pronged approach: continuing to innovate and be more efficient in the way care is delivered, as well as increased federal support for graduate medical education to train at least 3,000 more doctors a year to meet the health care needs of our nation's growing and aging population.

Given the results from that study, it would seem that Sonora is extremely fortunate in having the number of physicians in our community. That is something I think that a lot of us "long timers" here in Sonora take for advantage, which is something we plan on fixing in the upcoming weeks.

In upcoming editions we will highlight each of our local doctors so that all of us can get to know them a little better. They are literally on the front line for all of our health care needs (and if the reports are correct, they might be the last line as well). So if you see any of these men and women in our community take the time to thank them for choosing Sonora, because they could have chosen just about any other place to be.

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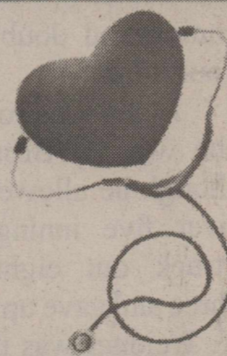

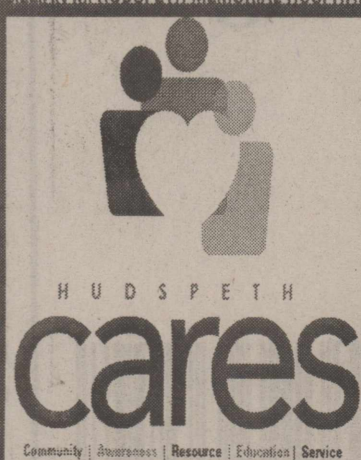

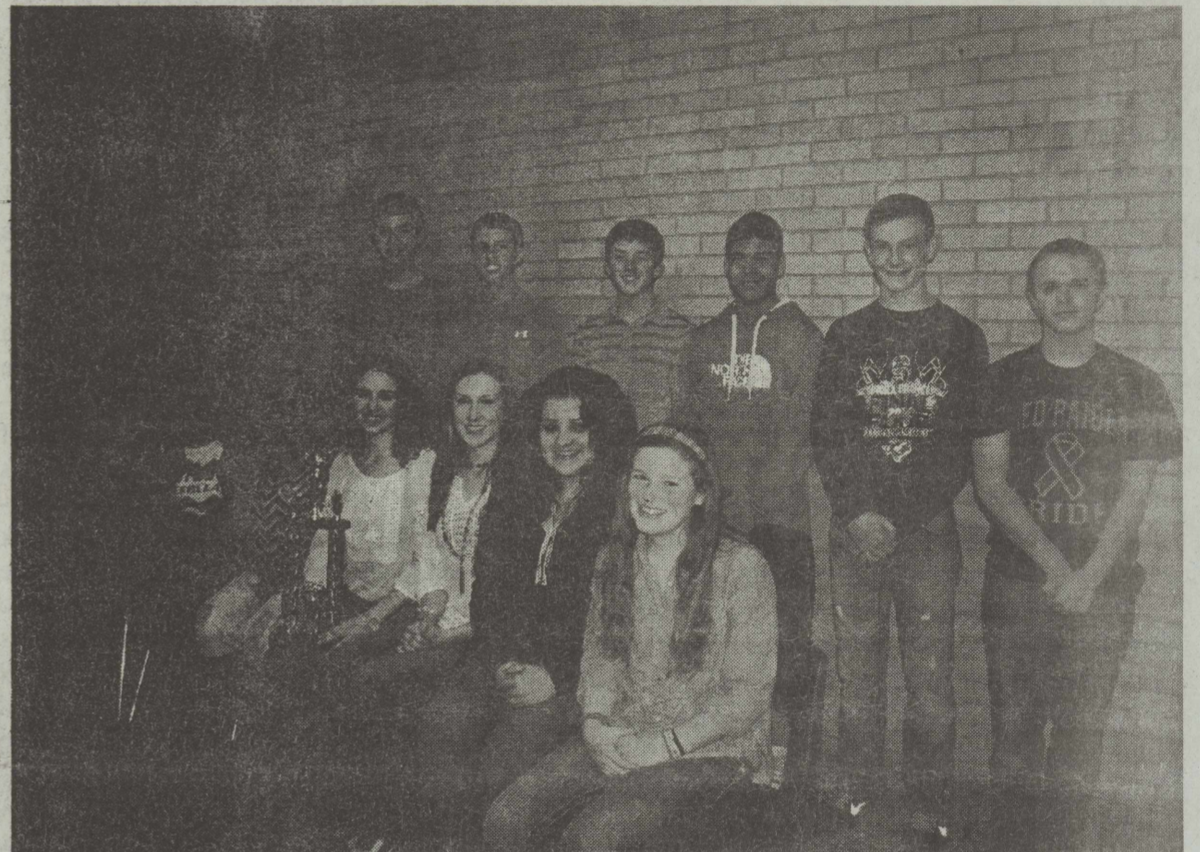

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## Making Fruits and Vegetables the Easy Choice!

In Texas, three out of four deaths are attributed to a chronic disease. However, studies show an intake of at least two and half cups of vegetables and fruits per day as part of a healthy eating pattern can reduce the risk of certain chronic diseases. March is National Nutrition Month, and an opportunity to discuss the benefits of eating fruits and vegetables. We know a healthy eating pattern including fruits and vegetables can help to lower risks of developing chronic diseases such as obesity, diabetes, heart disease, and some cancers. Lifestyles are hectic; however, increasing fruit and vegetables can be easy. Here are a few tips for making fruits and vegetables the easy choice! Choose to make half your plate fruits and vegetables. The rest of your plate should be one-quarter grains and one-quarter protein foods with low-fat dairy on the side. MyPlate is a guide to making a healthy meal yet not every meal will look like MyPlate. For example a sandwich may not fit in each portion of the plate; however, making a sandwich with whole grain bread, lean protein, a slice of low-fat cheese, and adding lots of vegetables with a side of fruit make a healthy plate. Choose a variety of colors. The colors in fruit and vegetables are not just to make them look pretty. Fruit and vegetable colors are complex and those colors pack a healthy punch in reducing the risk of developing various chronic diseases. Be sure to vary the colors on your plate. Choose whole fruits and vegetables over juice. Children and adults eat most of their fruits and vegetables in the form of fruit juice, which can contain added sugars and make it higher in calories. Choosing whole fruits and vegetables provides fiber, less added sugar, vitamins, and minerals. Eating patterns high in these nutrients have shown to reduce the risk of developing certain cancers. Choose to prep your snacks ahead of time. Busy schedules can sometimes mean reaching for unhealthy snacks. During the weekend, package small snack bags of bell peppers, carrots, strawberries, or your favorite fruit or vegetable for the week.

Place them in a spot you can see in the refrigerator. This may help to limit choosing less healthful and tempting snacks! Choose to make fruits and vegetables exciting. Create a fruit and veggie contest. Making fruits and vegetables part of a child's healthy eating pattern establishes positive behaviors early. Children learn from watching you. Try having a fruit and veggie contest once a week. It can be a simple game of name five blue fruits! The prize could be choosing the fruit for dessert tonight. Choose to flavor your water. Flavored drinks are in every grocery store. However, they can be full of added calories. You can make your own flavored water by freezing diced fruits or vegetables and adding them to your water. When you finish your water have the fruit or vegetable as a snack! It can be as easy as freezing slices of cucumber or whole raspberries and adding them to your water! Choose fruit and vegetables to start the day. Fruits can be an easy choice at breakfast food. However, mix in some vegetables too. Try adding spinach to your eggs, avocado to your toast, or tomatoes to a breakfast sandwich. Choosing fruits and vegetables can be an easy task, if you plan and prepare healthy options in advance. Making small creative changes can benefit your overall health. Overtime choosing more fruits and vegetables can help prevent chronic disease. ## Game Warden Field Notes

The following items are compiled from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement reports.

**Up to No(se) Good**  
A Travis County game warden and K-9 partner, Ruger, were requested by the Jonestown Police Department and the Travis County Sheriff's Office for a canine sniff search of a vehicle. The vehicle had been stopped for a traffic violation and was deemed stolen. Ruger alerted and indicated to the presence of controlled substances. While searching the vehicle, officers found about 1 gram of methamphetamines, a glass meth pipe, a scale with residue, potential stolen phones and SIM cards, birth certificates and documents with other individuals' social security numbers. Charges were filed for possession of drug paraphernalia, possession of controlled substance and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. Further investigation of the potential stolen phones, SIM cards and sensitive documents is ongoing. Cases pending. Well-Hidden

The Delta County Sheriff's Office requested assistance from their game warden after burglary suspects fled from a deputy. The deputy was unable to continue pursuit of the suspects due to the condition of the road, but the warden was able to locate the suspects' vehicle, which had become stuck in the mud. With the assistance of a Department of Public Safety helicopter and a Texas Department of Corrections K-9 team, the subjects were found clinging to the inside of an abandoned well. The well was covered by a cedar tree and appeared to be about 20 feet deep. A large amount of methamphetamines was also located a few yards from the vehicle. Poachers See, Poachers Do

A Harris County game warden responded to an Operation Game Thief tip about a man seen walking around with a rifle in the Addicks Reservoir. When the warden arrived, he spotted a vehicle and tracked footprints that led inside the reservoir. After waiting in the brush alongside a nearby path, the warden heard a shot fired in the distance. Nearly 40 minutes later, the subject came down the path and was subsequently apprehended. After the warden spent some time questioning and investigating, two of the man's friends also poaching in the reservoir, turned themselves in without incident. Cases pending. Five of a Kind

While a Starr County game warden was on patrol, he came across an open gate leading to a ranch and decided to investigate. Upon entering the ranch, the warden spotted two

hicles and five people dressed in camouflage, standing around a hunting blind. At first the individuals said they were working on the ranch, but, after some questioning, admitted they were hunting. The warden followed the hunters down to where one of the hunters had shot an eight-point buck and helped the hunter load the deer. After further inspection, however, it was found that the hunter had marked the deer with a tag that expired in 2012 and also did not have a valid hunting license. The buck was seized and the meat was donated to a local family. Cases and civil restitution pending. Poacher Scissorhands

A Webb County game warden received a call from a landowner who believed someone poached a deer on his ranch. The warden arrived at the ranch and began to investigate the area. There, he found evidence of a deer being shot, a fence being cut and a deer dragged under the fence. The warden then went to the adjacent property to see if anyone was at the deer camp and to begin looking for evidence. There was no contact made at the camp, but the warden saw evidence of a deer that was recently processed at the cleaning station. The material used to repair the cut fence was also at the camp. After investigating further and talking to landowners plus the hunters leasing the property, one of the men said he had shot the deer on the neighboring property and cut the fence to retrieve the dead deer. Multiple cases pending.

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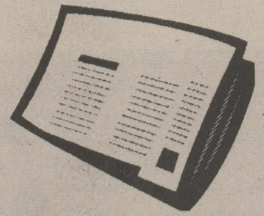
