# **Public Comments Get Out of Hand at Hospital Board Meeting**

## Law Enforcement Officers Summoned but Order Restored Before They Arrive

Sutton County Hospital Trustees and Hospital CEO John Graves came under fire when a group of citizens spoke out during the regular meeting of the Sutton County Hospital District board on Monday, October 10th.

At one point, the discussion became so animated that a 9-1-1 call was made to the Sutton County Sheriff's Department in order to quiet things down.

Frank Wamble, Pete Bradley and Robbie Jones spearheaded the verbal offensive against Graves and the board as a whole, saying that actions they have taken are not in the best interest of the community.

Jones asked about the lawsuit settlement with Dr. Hall asking for a report on tax dollars spent on the lawsuit.

Board president Sharon Holman reminded the group that the trustees are restricted from discussing the lawsuit under the terms of the settlement agreement.

Details of the settlement were obtained by The Devil's River News under an Open Records request and published in its August 4, 2016 edition.

Wamble repeatedly interrupted the meeting directing his comments at Graves and the board.

Pointing at Holman Wamble shouted, "You could have saved money by overriding what he (Graves) did without authority. He had no authority to fire that doctor with a contract. All you had to do as a board is just override him. Put that doctor back on his salary."

Jones added, "If you're not going to sit there and know your bylaws then you shouldn't be on the board."

Wamble agreed.
Attempting to diffuse mounting tensions, Robin Street addressed the crowd of about 17 people asking everyone to consider their own actions.

"I would hope that you

can go home tonight and in your heart you can say God I give it to you. Stop all of griping and divisiveness," Street said. "We need to come together at this time; in our town and in our community."

Following another outburst from Wamble, trustee Mary Humphrey asked Wamble to respect rules of order and allow others to speak without interruption.

President Sharon Holman asked for a motion to adjourn when Wamble responded, "This meeting is not adjourned. I'm not done here."

Standing up he again addressed the board, "I want to know how y'all represent me as a taxpayer if you don't read documentations and you don't read bylaws and read the emails that are sent to you?"

Wamble asked. "I want to know that. You don't have to answer me right now Sharon, but I promise you that you will answer me. And it's not going to be

pleasant."

Wamble and Bradley exited the meeting just before the meeting adjourned and deputies arrived.

Before the verbal theatrics, the trustees approved the minutes from the September 12th regular meeting, September 15th special meeting and October 3rd special meeting with corrections.

They also approved the financial reports and the district's expenditures as presented.

The board went behind closed doors for a brief session for the purpose of discussing a Nurse Committee report.

Following the executive session, the board approved Edggar E. Frausto MD as a one-year provisional consulting staff and termination of Mark Mandelbaum MD as recommended by medical staff.

Additionally, the board approved policy and procedure manuals for nursing,

emergency room and swing bed as well as the Endeavor Charge Review master agreement.

Visitors signing in to make comments included Jones, Wamble, Samaniego and Street.

Board President Sharon Holman presided over the meeting with trustees Leonora Pool, Adeltia Alvarez, Mary Humphrey, Edward Earwood and Don Longoria on hand. John Henry Strauch was absent.

The next regular meeting of the SCHD Board is slated for November 14th at 6 p.m. in the multi-purpose room of the wellness center at LMH Memorial Hospital.

## U.S. Supreme Court Refuses to Rehear Texas Immigration Case

AUSTIN — The U.S. Supreme Court on Oct. 3 denied the Obama administration's petition for a rehearing of United States v. Texas, a high-profile immigration case.

Heard by the eight-member high court in April, the case ended in a 4-4 deadlock in a late-June ruling. The deadlock left in place a Texas federal district court's temporary injunction freezing the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's November 2014 policies known as "Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals" and "Deferred Action for Parents of Americans and Lawful Permanent Residents." The policies are aimed at forestalling the deportation of an estimated 4 million undocumented immigrants and providing a conditional path to

citizenship.

In December 2014, Texas was joined by a coalition of other states in a lawsuit challenging the policies as an unconstitutional federal overreach. In February 2015, Brownsville U.S. District Judge Andrew S. Hanen sided with the plaintiffs and granted a petition for temporary injunction.

In November 2015, a three-member panel of the New Orleans-based U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit upheld the district court's injunction in a 2-1 split. The Obama administration then appealed the case to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton welcomed the high court's Oct. 3 decision

not to rehear the case. "The State of Texas' position has been validated by the U.S. Supreme Court today as they denied the Obama administration's petition to rehear the immigration case," Paxton said. "Rewriting national immigration law requires the full and careful consideration of Congress," he added.

Texas sends emergency aid

Gov. Greg Abbott on Oct. 6 reported that he had called Gov. Rick Scott of Florida, Gov. Nathan Deal of Georgia and Gov. Nikki Haley of South Carolina to offer assistance as their states prepared to deal with Hurricane Matthew.

Abbott announced he had deployed a

30-member Texas A&M Forest Service All-Hazards Incident Management Team to Florida. The teams, coordinated by the forest service, consist of trained personnel from local jurisdictions. Other state agencies were on standby to respond to further requests from hurricane-impacted

W By Ed Sterling areas, Abbott said. "As Hurricane Matthew prepares to impact the United States, it is crucial that

### The Clock Reader

I have a friend who reads clocks. Not reads in the typical sense of noting the time, but reads as in looking to see patterns in the numbers. There is a certain beauty in discovering order or meaningful sequences and my thoughtful friend finds

this in clocks. After she told me about her habit (slash obsession) I was intrigued. What patterns could I find? Before you could say "time out" I was in. Ever since I too have been a clock reader.

There are countless numerical sequences a clock reader observes at specific times during the day. It's a combination of a game and an art form intertwined in a delicate dance of numbers.

What I find intriguing and enticing is that even though numbers are rigid and unchanging, there is an abundance of creativity involved with clock watching. The patterns are practically infinite, as long as you stay within the 4-digit, base-60 system that time is based upon. (The technical term for this is sexagesimal. I slipped it in because I thought it was a sexy vocabulary word we all should learn.)

While a clock reader isn't confined to any certain patterns, a few are obvious. One of the most undeniable is 11:11, which is so well known it even has its own Wiki page. Some say when you see 11:11 on the clock you should make a wish. Others say you should pray. Still others believe it is a sign of good luck. I just appreciate the pattern. As I do for 10:10 and 12:12, even though they are not as pure, in my humble opinion.

I also watch for the palindrome-ish times: 10:01, 12:21, 1:01 and so on. They read the same forward as backwards, which is almost as exciting as riding in a race car.

The same goes for orderly clock times, the main one being 12:34 and lesser so: 2:34, 3:45 and of course 4:56, but it ends there as there is no 5:67, which I suppose would technically be 6:07 if we are being sexagesimally correct. (See how I found a way to sneak in our vocabulary word?)

You can also go backward with the order. 6:54, 5:43, and so on. But I'll refrain from remarking on the obvious.

Algebra exists in time. 3:39 has a certain synchronicity when you realize 3 multiplied by 3 equals 9. Once you understand the formula, times like 4:48, 7:43 and 2:24 will never be just random numbers ever again. You can't disavow knowledge like that. It's like gaining the key to a secret world.

Then there are dates. My wedding anniversary is July 11, so I have the opportunity to see 7:11 at least twice a day. I hardly ever catch it. My husband's birthday, June 8, equates to 6:08. My kids' birthdays are, 11:18, 2:05, 7:28 and 11:28. Each day of the year has a corresponding clock time. Every 24 hours we have the opportunity to see our own birthdays not once, but twice. Finding the joy and excitement in details like that is what clock watching -

and life - is all about. Finally there are familiar number sequences found in the commercial world. 7:47 reminds me of airplanes; 4:11 is the number I call for directory assistance; 5:05 looks like a cry for help. I could go on and on, but I probably already have.

Despite my lack of actual math skills, I've always found numbers comforting. I count when faced with a stressful or difficult task - like exercising or giving birth. I find a semi-enjoyment in balancing the checkbook each month. I enjoy studying statistics - as long as they relate to fantasy football. And I'm a clock reader. Right now it is exactly 3:33. There's a certain tranquility in that. At least there is, for those of us in the club. (You know who you are.)

## Navasota Has a **Graveyard Event**

Navasota is celebrating its 150th anniversary and a number of things are happening. Planning is underway on an annual graveyard event the last weekend of October called Legends and Lanterns, where actors portray the lives of people who are buried there.

"We're up to working on our fourth

year of it," says Mavis Anderson, who writes the scripts for the project. "It has become sort of a local institution, really. This

year I'm sticking my neck out, though, because we do things around themes and since this is an election year, this year's theme is Politics As Usual. We'll mention some of our elected officials who served on local and state levels."

Mavis says she has to be careful when she's researching and writing.

"When you start doing the family history, half of the people in town are mad at you because you tell stories on their family and the other half are mad because you don't tell their family stories. We're never trying to pull skeletons out of the closet or embarrass anybody or anything. I also don't believe in making it sound like everybody who settled here was a saint and a hero. They were people. They had families, personal concerns, they had reasons for moving from wherever they came from to here and reasons for staying here or reasons why their families moved on."

Actors come from Navasota's commu-

nity theater.

"What we do is have our costumed actors at the actual gravesite where the people are buried. We put visitors in groups of about fifteen or so with one of our theater people who serves as a tour guide and takes the group around from grave to grave, so it takes about an hour to cover everybody."

The event is a fundraiser for the theater. Admission is ten dollars.

"The actors doing the portraying memorize their scripts. The guides have a script in front of them in case the actors suffer a mental lapse and need prompting."

People visit six or seven gravesites during the nighttime tour.

'It's pretty dark out there, so you have to stand close and listen carefully. The tour guides carry lanterns around and there is a lantern at each gravesite."


The earliest grave in Navasota's Oakland Cemetery dates back to when the city started in 1866. Some of the headstones are worn and difficult to read, but through investigation of the graveyard layout, organizers are able to tell where people are buried.

"Part of what we're doing is not only telling the stories of the people who are out there, but trying to connect with what was happening in the general area around Navasota as well as the state and the nation. Last year our topic was a toast to Navasota's foreign born so we named it Imported Spirits."

Officials continue to recommend that health care providers test anyone with at least three of the four most common symptoms statewide and all pregnant women who have traveled to an area with active Zika transmission, regardless of symptoms.

As of Oct. 7, Texas had 226 Zika cases reported among patients who contracted the disease while traveling elsewhere. While no cases are known to have originated in Texas, the Rio Grande Valley is considered to be at higher risk for Zika transmission, according to **DSHS** Commissioner John Hellerstedt, because of previous regional outbreaks of dengue, a similar virus spread by the same type of mosquito.
