## BRIEF ILLNESS IS FATAL TO ROBERT WALKER

Robert Walker, whose serious illness was mentioned in The Star last week, died at the Griggs hospital Friday night at 11:45 o'clock, following an illness of a week with peritonitis, following a ruptured appendix. He was taken suddenly ill on Thursday night a week before while helping to get out the weekly edition of The Star. Dr. Griggs was called at once and he carried Mr. Walker to the home of Mrs. Will McCoy. Everything possible was done for him that medical skill and tender care could do and for a few days we were hopeful that he would recover, but complication set up and hope began to fade. Thursday morning he was taken to the hospital, but his condition gradually grew worse and his family and friends were brought face to face with the realization that death was near. His wife and mother were at his bedside from the first of his illness and his father arrived from Dallas at noon Friday and they with friends were at his bedside when, in the still hours of the night, the death angel came and bore his spirit away to that realm from which no traveler returns.

Mrs. J. R. Padgett, Mr. Walker's grandmother, Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Watta, parents of Mrs. Walker's, Mrs. Hi Wilmeth, sister of Mrs. Walker and Mr. Wilmeth, all of McKinney, who had been notified of his serious condition, arrived here a short time after his death.

The body was removed to the W. O. Wylie's undertaking establishment where it remained until the hour for the funeral which was at 1:30 o'clock at Presbyterian Church, of which the deceased was a member, having been converted and joined the church during a meeting held by Rev. R. H. Walker, the pastor soon after he came to Baird. Funeral rites were conducted by Rev. Walker, who was a close friend of the deceased, assisted by Rev. Joe R. Mayes, pastor of the First Baptist Church. At the request of the family two special songs: "In The Garden Of Tomorrow," by Judson Atechison, and "Abide With Me," by Delma Compton, of Merkel.

Pall Bearers were: R. F. Mayfield, C. B. Snyder, Jr., James E. Ross, Haynie Gilliland, Hugh Ross, Jr., and Bill Melton.

At the conclusion of the service the body was placed aboard the 3:45 train for Dallas and carried to the Larnar & Smith Chapel there to await the hour for the concluding service Monday morning at 10 o'clock which were conducted by the Rev. Clifford Weaver and the Rev. W. C. Jones and interment made in Grove Hill cemetery.

W. O. Wylie was in charge of the funeral here.

Robert Sanders Walker, only child of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Walker, of 725 S. Jefferson St., Dallas, was born at Mesquite, Texas, September 2, 1906 being 26 years, 5 months and 15 days of age at the time of his death. He spent his boyhood days in Mesquite, moving with his parents to Dallas some twelve years ago. After completing his high school course he entered the Dallas Vocational Training School, specializing in linotype work and printing, which course he finished. Robert was a splendid operator and printer, always taking pride in doing his work well. He was married to Miss Lucy Watts, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Watts, of McKinney, on May 28, 1927, who with his father, mother and grandmother survive him. He is also survived by an aunt and cousin Mrs. Ina Bear and son, Walter Leo Bear, who make their home with Mr. Walker's parents in Dallas.

Robert Walker came to Baird in August 1930 to take a position as linotype operator on The Star, which position he held until June 1, 1932, when due to business conditions we had to let him go, much to our regret. Mrs. Walker who teaches expression here closed her studio at the close of the school term and they went to Dallas spending the summer there and at McKinney. Mrs. Walker returning to Baird in September to resume her classes here and Mr. Walker came out several times to spend a few days

## \$100.00 In Cash Prizes

Plans for state-wide essay and poster contests to be conducted through the high schools of the State have been completed by the Texas Centennial Committee. County and district school superintendents, principals and teachers are requested to cooperate with the County Centennial Committees in the holding of these contests.

"Some Benefits Expected from Texas Centennial is the title to be used in the essay contest, which is open to all high school students of the State. The essays must be limited to 500 words. The county school superintendent of each county will appoint a committee of three who will select the first, second, and third best essays from schools. These winning essays must be printed in a local paper of the county and clippings, accompanied by the name and address of the writer of each and the name of the paper in which they appeared, sent to the Texas Centennial Committee, Box 718, Austin, Texas, on or before April 11, 1933.

Cash prizes of \$25 for the best essay in the State, \$15 for the second best, and \$10 for the third, will be awarded by a committee appointed by the Centennial Committee. Certificates of merit will also be given for the three best essays from the State and for the best essay from each county.

## Poster Contest

All entries for the poster contest, the subject of which is "The Spirit of the Texas Centennial," must be in the Texas Centennial office at Austin before May 1, 1933.

The size of all posters must be 18"x24". They must be done in show card colors, water colors, pen and ink, pencil, crayon, or paper cut-outs. All are to be exhibited at the high schools in which they are made and then sent to the county seat, where a committee appointed by the county school superintendent will select the three best from the county to be sent to the Centennial Committee for the State competition, these to be packed flat and sent prepaid.

Prizes of \$25, \$15 and \$10 for the first, second and third best posters in the State will be awarded by judges selected by the Texas Centennial Committee. Certificates of merit will also be given for the three best essays from the State and for the best essay from each county.

An exhibit of the winning posters will be held in Austin during the State meeting of the Texas Fine Arts Association, May 4th to 6th.

## Pending Tax Measures Before Legislature

Austin, Texas, The Legislative News Bureau of the Texas Press Association has been established for the purpose of providing an unbiased reporting service on pending tax measures and matters pertaining to governmental costs. The reports will be free from propaganda or editorial opinion. Only facts will be given in order that the people may have definite information, leaving the people to form their own opinions and take such action as seems wise to them. The bureau will not engage in lobbying and will not support or oppose any particular programs, measure or officials.

Total receipts of the State government for the fiscal year ending Sept. 1, 1932, were \$96,894,751.25. Of this amount \$24,175,000.74 came from ad valorem taxes, \$28,213,020.59 from the gasoline tax, while the gross receipts tax yielded \$7,001,299.89.

Other receipts include Insurance companies occupation, \$2,236,960.37; cigarette, \$3,420,645.42; franchise, \$1,490,349.73; gross receipts, \$1,553,706.88; licenses, \$3,636,619.11; fees and permits, \$1,130,384.55; land sales rentals and royalties, \$2,355,893.84; interest and penalties, \$3,623,324.23; Federal, county and other aid, \$15,803,686.68.

Above are major sources of income. Principal expenditures follow: judicial, \$2,371,198.90; military and law enforcement, \$1,208,466.22; regulation of business and industry, \$1,137,021.79; development and conservation of natural resources, \$1,978,007.21; highways, \$39,458,336; eleemosynary and correctional, \$5,744,739; public schools \$28,961,501.44; higher education, \$9,525,277.33; pensions, \$3,562,641.57; Figures are from the Comptroller's office. Items of income and expenditure of less than one million dollars are not included in the above.

Forty-one percent of all State expenditures are for highways, thirty per cent for public free school and slightly less than ten per cent for colleges and universities. These three items, plus Confederate pensions, care and education of blind, deaf and other wards of the State, account for ninety-one per cent of all State expenditures. Hence, if all other costs were eliminated, including judiciary, law enforcement, legislature and executive, saving to taxpayers would be less than ten per cent.

The first bill relating to costs of government to be passed by both House and Senate provides for 25 per cent reduction in the pay of Rangers. It takes effect immediately and continues until Aug. 31, 1933. Captains are reduced from \$225 per month to \$170; sergeants from \$175 to \$130; privates from \$150 to \$112.

The House passed the judiciary bill last week providing for 25 per cent reductions in pay of judges and district attorneys, and elimination of assistant district attorneys. The bill applies to district and higher courts.

## COMMISSIONER S. S. HARVILLE GIVES REPORT ON R. F. C. FUND IN HIS PRECINCT

In planning the distribution and disbursement of the R. F. C. Money that would be allotted my Commissioner's Precinct, I decided to divide it by voting precincts; tanning into consideration the crops made in the respective precinct and the financial condition of the people in the community.

It will be noticed that Rowden has the largest allotment, because the country between Rowden and Belle Plain was almost a complete failure in crops. 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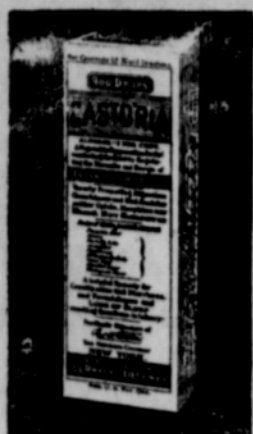
