No rabies tests performed in Callahan Co. during December

The Texas Department of Health reported no animals were diagnosed for rabies in Callahan County during the month of December 2001

The Texas Department of Health's Zoonosis Control Division releases the monthly rabies diagnosis and said no Callahan County tests results were made in December.

Total animals tested for rabies by the 11 public health regions totalled 641 for December 2001 and 63 were tested positive for rabies and 578 tested negative for the disease. Of the positive tests, 53 were skunks, there were two fox, four bats, 1 dog, 1 cat, and 2 bovine. There was one cat report in Cooke County and one dog reported for rabies in Johnson County.

Heritage travelers, those who visit historic sites and communities, make a particularly strong contribution to the travel industry in Texas, spending an average of \$29 more per day than nonheritage travelers and \$1.43 billion annually. Heritage travelers create more than 32,000 jobs for Texans every year. For every \$ 1 million spent by Texas heritage travelers, 22 jobs are created and the Gross State Product increases by \$825,000.

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

Precious was on the phone. Mostly she was trying to pacify a toddler badgering for her attention, but every once in awhile a sentence was directed at me.

"Mom, l've thinking...you're not going to believe this...but...'

I cut in. "You want to bake bread, don't you.

"That's incredible!" she said. "How did you guess?"

It swept me back to her teen years. I was in a bread baking, cheese making phase of my life. I kept a large garden, canned and preserved the harvest, baked pies, tended goats, rabbits, and chickens. Precious wanted no part of anything involving that much work.

I wanted so much to teach her the magic of home-made bread. She liked the whiff from the oven that wound its way through the house, loved the crunchy crust and the mouthwatering taste with jam and butter (home-made jam, of course -butter I made only once).

French bread was my favorite recipe, because of the crust and because it only has to rise once. Hooked, I went on to try sourdough starter. Two or three gallon jugs sat on the shelf percolating various recipes. I'd take one down, use half and feed the other half for the next batch, continuing the self-perpetuating process.

Every once in awhile a jug gave up its creative strength and rotted. I'd picture myself on a wagon train plodding west, rushing to my neighbor three wagons ahead to borrow a fresh bit of starter. It was something akin to losing the last coals in the primitive days before matches. I'd imagine wrapping up in an extra hide before running to a neighboring cave for

hot coals to warm the hearth. Every once in awhile I recall my first halting attempts. Reading the instructions over and over, I struggled to get the hang

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of kneading, and peeked under the towel often to see if the dough was rising. Then I remember the day I so casually intermixed the making of bread and cheese all in one day. So that's how those clever pioneer women did it, I thought to my very pleased self.

Performing the ancient arts sets you on the ancient path -"lets you swim in the river of time" as my mother used to put it. It puts you in mind of all who before you have baked bread, made cheese and yoghurt, spun wool, poured candles. All of this I wanted to pass on to my own

"No way," she said. "I don't want to make bread. I don't even want to know how to make

"But what if someday you need to know?" I persisted. Proverbs about the unexpected curves life can throw us held no sway in this conversation at all.

"Nope. I will not want to make bread. Ever. At any time. I will never even get myself into a situation where I'd ever have to make bread!"

Precious swears she never said "never" because "nevers" have a way of turning on you. It might have been the set of her jaw, but MyKeeper and I both remember the sound of "never."

Anyway, it came as no surprise to me that a decade later, my little one wants to bake

This is new millennium bread, though, she informs me. "Now don't get crazy, Mom. What I want is a bread-making machine. I want the bread without the hours of kneading and rising and shaping and all. I don't want to hear that sugar makes the yeast work and that water too hot will kill the yeast beasties. All I want is fresh homemade bread on working Mom time." I said I understood.
