"It's a matter of life or death!" So reported the King County Humane Society of Seattle, Washington, in looking for people to play with caged puppies. The idea was to prevent what they called an emotional break. "We've all seen the break," they said. "We'll take a loving, beautifully well adjusted puppy that has even passed its health exam, that has known love and children, and has romped on green grass – and then put it in a cage, and it breaks. Emotionally, it breaks! It will get in the back of the kennel and cringe, or perhaps run back and forth in sort of a seesaw game."

The reasons the humane society gives for this "emotion break" is that the animal feels rejected. That's sad, but as sad as it is for a little puppy to feel rejected, how many more times sadder, how tragic, for a human being to be rejected - or even just feel rejected! How sad for one of God's creations, with a soul, created in His own image, to feel "all down inside," like nothing really matters anymore and no one really cares...

What is needed in our lives is someone who does care and is concerned – someone who values and affirms us, who considers us of great worth- not because of where we live or who we know, but because we are a human being. This Person who does care so much for us is revealed in a document over 2000 years old, the New Testament. It says nothing can separate us from the love of God, which is in Him, Jesus Christ, the Lord. (Romans 8: 37-39) What is needed by each of us is the kind of Someone who really cares-either Him or His representative(s) - actually and hope-



ATOMIC VETERANS—DVA has recently announced the addition of five new cancers to the list of diseases presumed to be connected to the exposure of Veterans to radiation during military service. Beginning March 26, Veterans diagnosed with bone, brain, colon, lung or ovarian cancers will have an easier time establishing entitlement to compensation for their illnesses. The new rules apply to Veterans who participated in "Radiation-risk activities" while on active duty or during training exercises.

The definition of radiationrisk activities also has been expanded to include radiation exposure at Amchitka Island, Alaska, prior to 1974, and service at certain gaseous diffusion plants in Kentucky, Ohio and Tennessee.

VA's changes ensure equity between Veterans and federal civilians who may be entitled to compensation for these cancers caused by radiation under comparable federal laws such as the Radiation Exposure Compensation Act of 1990, amended in 2000. RECORD YOUR MEMO-

ING-Under a new law, the Department of Veterans Affairs will increase reimbursement for

funeral expenses and cemetery plots for service-connected disabled Veterans and provide government markers for Veterans' graves even if families already have installed private

The Veterans Education and Benefits Expansion Act of 2001 increases the burial and funeral expense allowance for Veterans who die as a result of a service-connected disability from \$1,500 to \$2,000 and the cemetery plot allowance, for certain other disabled Veterans, from \$150 to \$300. The funeral expense allowance for the latter named Veterans remains at \$300 for a new total of \$600. The deceased Veteran must have been receiving VA compensation or pension in order to qualify for the benefit.

December 1, 2001 is the effective date of the increase for both types of payments.

In the past, people who submitted VA applications to receive a government marker had to certify that the Veterans grave was unmarked. Under the new law, the applicant must certify that the marker will be placed only in a cemetery. VA will send the marker only to a designated cemetery. The new provision for markers applies to Veterans' death on or after December 27, 2001.



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Former C.P.H.S. Graduate **Starting Post on Winning HSU Basketball Team**

ABILENE — Winning is getting to be a very pleasant habit for Laura Ricci.

Not only is the Cross Plains graduate a starting post player on the nationally ranked Hardin-Simmons University women's basketball team but the junior athletic training major also served as a student trainer for the Hardin-Simmons football team last fall.

Between the two sports, Ricci has experienced losses only three times this year. The Cowboys' football team lost its season opener and then won nine in a row before losing in the first round of the NCAA Division III playoffs.

The Cowgirls' basketball team (now 26-1) reeled off 21 straight wins before a regular-season loss at Howard Payne. But HSU bounced back to win the American Conference tournament and on Saturday defeated Guilford College (N.C.), 72-71, in a thrilling come-from behind victory in the second round of the national tournament to earn its fourth straight trip to the

NCAA Division III Sweet 16. "It's definitely been a good year," said Ricci, who has played a key role in the Cowgirls' last three treks to the Sweet 16.

Ricci, the daughter of Ron and Connie Ricci of Cross Plains, was a key reserve as a freshman and has been starter for the past two seasons. This year, the 5-11 junior is averaging 9.1 points and 5.2 rebounds per game. She scored 10 points in Saturday's win over Guilford.

Last week, Ricci was named honorable mention on the ASC all-West Division team.

This year, Ricci and the Cowgirls want to take the next step - to the NCAA Division III Final Four.

"Our plan is to make it to Terre Haute, Ind. (site of this year's Final Four), Ricci said. "We have our hearts set on it. We want to do our best and improve every game. But we would be disappointed to lose."

The Cowgirls, ranked fourth in the nation in NCAA Division III, will face Depauw (Ind.) Friday in Wilmington, Ohio in the sectional tournament semifinals. This weekend's sectional winner will advance to the Final Four.

Ricci is typical of the members of the Cowgirls' team, which is comprised almost entirely of

Big Country. The HSU roster includes players from such places as Colorado City, Eula, Ira, Stephenville, Comanche and Brady, as well as Ricci from Cross Plains.

"We have a lot of Class A stories, with people who graduated with 10 in their class," Ricci said, laughing as she spoke of her teammates. 'Growing up the same as we did, there are similar stories and lots of crazy ideas."

"I remember when I recruited her," Hardin-Simmons coach Julie Goodenough said. "She was the weak-side rebounder on her high school team. They would overload the other side of the floor. She was their leading scorer, but she never got in the offense. She'd just grab the offensive rebound and put it back in.'

Ricci is still filling a similar role for Hardin-Simmons.

"She's been a fun player for us," Goodenough said. "She has such a soft touch around the basket, even when the other team is getting physical. She's the best perimeter shooter of our posts.'

Ricci admits she has taken more of a leadership role this

"My role is to be energetic on the floor and be a motivational leader," she said.

Ricci said her favorite games are the ones against crosstown rival McMurry University.

"I like to win against McMurry," said Ricci, who had a seasonhigh 19 points in the first meeting with the Lady Indians this season. "One of my former teammates in high school (Whitney Giles) plays for McMurry. It's fun to battle against her. We don't take it easy on each other.'

While basketball occupies most of her time these days, it's her stint as a student trainer with the HSU football team last fall that is providing a glimpse of her

"I get to see athletes in all sports," said Ricci, who is on schedule to graduate in May 2003. "But I was assigned to football. I tape ankles and give treatments, evaluations and rehab. I'd like to be an athlete trainer in high school or a clinical setting, whichever gives me a job."

Either way, someone will be hiring a trainer who is familiar with winning, Ricci just hopes she can wear a national championship ring to one of those job interviews.


