
Each flower as it stands there in its place; struggles through the turmoil to remain alive and upright, petals shining in the sunlight. Buffeted by the winds of

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

The unemployment rate in point from January's rate of 6.3 Callahan County for the month jobless figures released Monday, April 22 by the Texas Workforce Commission.

Of the 6,483 civilian labor force in Callahan County, 6,253 were employed during March 2002, and 230 were unemployed, giving the county an unemployment rate of 3.5%. The county's unemployment 2001 was 3.7%.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 3.8% in February 2001. Of the 6,490 civilian labor force in the county during February, 6,243 had jobs while 247 or 3.8% were unemployed.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 3.3% in December 2001, 3.6% in November, 3.6% in October, 3.8% in September, 3.9% in August, 4.1% in July, 4.8% in June, 3.8% in May, and 3.5% in April, according to the unemployment figures.

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and those counties' unemployment rates for March 2002 include: Brown, 4.6%; Coleman, 8.8%; Eastland, 3.6%; Jones, 2.8%; Runnels, 3.2%; Shackelford, 3.0%; Stephens, 5.2%; and Taylor County, 3.7%.

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



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

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For a 3-hour tour...

Geology again. An independent tour of the Callahan Divide and Steamboat Mountain was on the class syllabus for April. I took two friends with me. One is an ace photographer, the other a lover of strata.

Like Gilligan on the "Minnow" we set out for a 3-hour tour. The weather was cool and overcast, perfect for comfort and clear pictures.

The guide sheet instructed students to photograph or sketch the Permian and Cretaceous findings at seven different stations, and there were questions to answer about each stop.

It sounded simple, but I miscalculated the passion of a strata lover for a pile of rocks. And I learned how to photograph a road cut from 101 angles. As we pulled away from Stop One, the photographer looked at her watch and told us we had been at this first station for exactly one hour. From our cell phones we canceled all afternoon plans.

The tour led us past Permian red and Cretaceous pink. We found limestone shelves capping the bluffs, with crumbly soft rock eroding from beneath. Speeding up the slow course of nature, we envisioned the further erosion and collapse during the differences in land use as the topography changed.

Road cuts were our downfall. I began to think I should have brought a tent and a camp coffee pot. Hours passed quickly in the company of limestone. It took three attempts to finally break away from one road cut rich in fossil hash.

We fancied ourselves the discoverers of an ancient stream buried in the historic folds of time. Its story was revealed in cross-section, with bands of slow

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(and silty) or fast (and graveled) flow. One of the layers toward the top held the evidence of turbulent flooding that shoved large rocks in its swift season.

At the Rest Area stop was a bluff with double layers of cap rock. Stream flow changes direction here, and from this point all water flows south.

We drove across the valley, talking of fossils and finds of mammoth bone, and the missing layers of geologic time, somehow washed away without

At one point, someone reported the strange behavior of three women. The Sheriff hunted us down, letting us go only because he figured truth is stranger than fiction.

The sun crept westward as our tour continued. Before we made it home, the photographer detoured to Fort Chadbourne. It was only 12 miles out of our way, but she wanted to see the historical site just opening to the public after 125 years seclusion on private ranch property.

Leaving there, the strata lover spotted a Badlands erosional landscape, and the photographer spun a donut in the middle of the highway to explore a road cut of exceptional beauty and

Nine and a half hours later our some later epoch. We duly noted 3-hour tour was finished. A few documenting pictures were snapped from a moving car, or we'd be there yet.

These are different rocks now that they have names and personalities. I walk on them with a great deal more respect.

Who knows what I will remember of this day as time passes, but one thing is clear: I need to find a bumper sticker that says, "I brake for road cuts."


