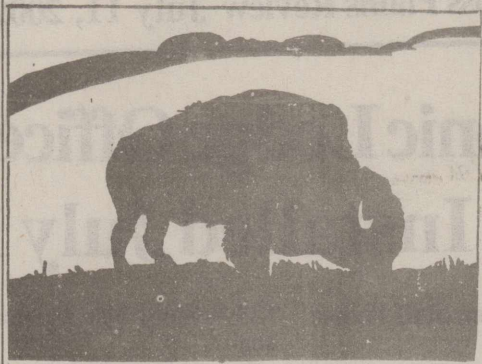

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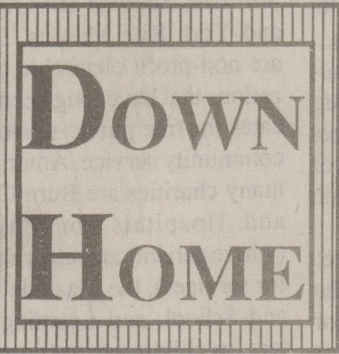

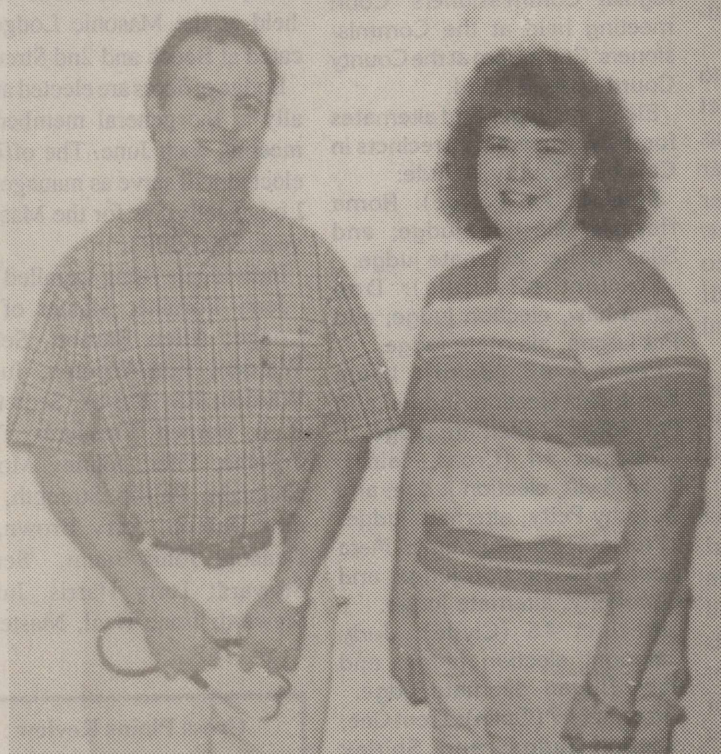

July 4th holiday weekend was very different this year. Thursday was a relatively cool day and then the rain started on Friday. Intermittent showers continued throughout the day causing the ground to absorb all the moisture. By Friday night and Saturday morning high water and flooding occurred due to approximately 14 inches that fell in Cross Plains.

Turkey Creek got out of bounds and filled Treadway Park. The picnic tables were under water but didn't run over the bridge.

A couple of houses, one near the baseball park and another near the water treatment facility, were flooded inside the city limit of Cross Plains.

Lakeway Grocery had approximately two feet of water rushing through it.

ing regular business hours.

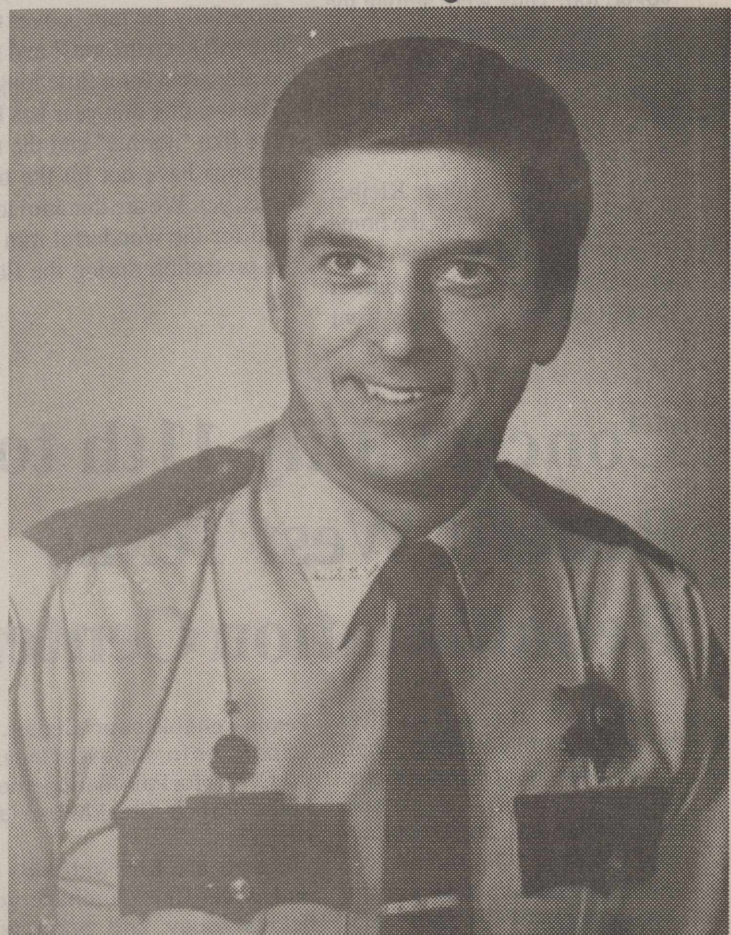

Richard I. Mack is the author of From My Cold Dead Fingers: The Proper Role of Law Enforcement: What Every Citizen Should Know, What Every Cop Should Believe; and Government, God and Freedom: A Fundamental Trinity. A popular speaker on Constitutional issues relating to gun control, law enforcement, states' rights, and the oath of office, Mr. Mack has made television appearances on The Donahue Show, Good Morning America, Crossfire, Nightline and CNBC, among others, and has been interviewed on over 200 radio talk shows, including G. Gordon Liddy, Michael Reagan, and Pat Buchanan. The Friends of the Cross Plains Library invite you to meet Mr. Mack on Tuesday, July 16, 7:00 PM, at the Community Center.

As sheriff of a rural county in Arizona, in 1994 Richard Mack filed suit in Federal court charging that the Brady Bill (7-day waiting period for handgun purchases) was un-constitutional because it required local law enforcement personnel to do the work of enforcing a Federal law. Sheriff Mack carried his lawsuit all the way to the Supreme Court, where the Brady Bill was ruled un-Constitutional, reasserting the supremacy of states' right under the (nearly forgotten) Tenth Amendment- and helping to hold the line on further infringement of Second Amendment rights.

A graduate of the FBI National Academy, Mr. Mack spent nearly 20 years in law enforcement, serving as a patrol officer, undercover narcotics officer, hostage negotiator, school resource officer, Search and Rescue supervisor, detective, sheriff and DARE instructor. Currently he is Public

Affairs Director for Gun Owners of America.

In The Proper Role of Law Enforcement, Mr. Mack recounts how he changed from being just another beat cop whose job was "to write tickets and arrest people" to a Constitution-conscious defender of citizens' safety and freedom. Like all law enforcement officials, Mr. Mack had taken an oath to "protect and defend the Constitution," but unlike far too many such officials- he had never read that document, an omission he quickly corrected. In From My Cold Dead Fingers, Mr. Mack defends the Second Amendment right "to keep and

bear arms" simply and lucidly, with clear references to the words of our Founding Fathers discussing why (and from whom) that right needs to be protected.

The water at the Burkett Bridge was dangerously close to running over the bridge. The Department of Public Safety personnel were watching it should it need to be closed.

Water ran over Highway 36 west of town near the Fred Davis place. It was reported on television that water crossed Highway 36 in several places and the road was closed for a while.

Hopefully the rain is over now. This will keep the grass and trees looking great for a little longer.

The weather this year has been more like "normal" and the temperatures have not hit the triple digits, yet. We are thankful to the Lord for the wonderful rain and His protection during the flooding.

Callahan County Commissioners Appoint Election and Alternate Judges at Recent Meeting in Baird

Callahan County Commissioners voted to appoint election judges, alternate judges and polling places for the election cycle from August 2002 until July 2003.

The Commissioners took the action Monday, July 8 during a regular Commissioners' Court meeting held at the Commissioners' Courtroom at the County Courthouse in Baird.

Election Judges and alternates for the seven voting precincts in Callahan County include:

Precinct #1 (Clyde): Roma Howard, election judge; and Silas Tucker, alternate judge.

Precinct #2 (Eula): Don Greenhaw, election judge; and Pat Logan, alternate judge.

Precinct #3 (Baird): Linda Kendrick, election judge; and Pat Holland, alternate judge.

Precinct #4 (Cross Plains): John Swift, election judge; and Dorothy Petty, alternate judge.

Precinct #5 (Putnam): Meta Isenhower, election judge; and Beth Petty, alternate judge.

Precinct #6 (Clyde): Judy Calhoun, election judge; and Patsy Hogan, alternate judge.

Precinct #7 (Oplin): Trent Gee, election judge; and Shirley Landers, alternate judge.

Early Voting election judge is Dorothy Watson.

The polling places for the November 5, 2002 General Election in Callahan County include:

Precinct #1 Clyde Lions Club; Precinct #2 Eula Lions Club; Precinct #3 Baird Housing Authority; Precinct #4 Cross Plains Community Center; Precinct #5 Putnam Community Center; Precinct #6 Clyde Southside Baptist Church; and Precinct #7 Oplin Community Center.

The Early Voting polling location will be at the County Courthouse Room #107 in Baird, with branch early voting taking place at the Clyde Justice of the Peace Office and the Cross Plains Justice of the Peace Office.

Other agenda items brought before Commissioners included:

—Commissioners reviewed and signed the minutes of the previous Commissioners' Court meeting and received no public comment during time set aside for comments.

—Commissioners took no action on a report from Sheriff Eddie Curtis and Commissioner Charlie Grider about the construction of a communications tower in Cross Plains. County Judge Roger Corn said the Commissioners took no action because the owner who was to donate land for the communications tower requested a paved road be laid to the tower.

—Commissioners voted to obtain some estimates to repair a portion of the County Courthouse roof in Baird damaged by water in March. Judge Corn said an insurance settlement around \$9,200 will be used to repair the Courthouse roof.

—Commissioners voted to accept a road into the County Road system located in Commissioner Bryan Farmer's Precinct #2. The road, which is located 1/4 mile south of the Eula School on the east side of FM 603, has been brought up to specifications. The County Road, which will be named County Road 271, is located off FM 603 across from Carrigan's Cafe in Eula.

—Commissioners voted to pay all approved bills and voted to adjourn the Commissioners' Court meeting.

I have read that the first hint Newton had of optics, which led him to his important optical discoveries, was from a child's soap bubble. And the telescope was the outcome of a boy's amusement with two glasses in his father's shop.

For some reason our age in enticing us into believing that "BIG is always BETTER." Whether it is in the area of government, religion, education or whatever, the word coming down is "the bigger, the better!"

But there's a need to pay some attention to little things, too. Concerning the mustard seed, Jesus said, "Though it is the smallest of all your seeds, yet when it grows, it is the largest of garden plants and becomes a tree." I remember the warning from an older and wiser man: "Watch the pennies and the dollars will take care of themselves." There are some other small things we must pay attention to -- little courtesies in life, little matters of personal appearance, little minutes of wasted time, little luxuries and extravagances, little details in our work. 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Disaster loans available for Callahan County farm businesses

FORT WORTH, TX — Businesses in some Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma counties have until July 26, 2002 to file applications for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). The SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loans are available for businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers sustaining crop losses due to drought that occurred on various dates from January 1, 2001, and continuing. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for these SBA loans. However, nurseries that are victims of drought disasters can apply. Businesses in the following Texas counties are eligible to apply: Andrews, Archer, Baylor, Borden, Brooks, Brown, Callahan, Coke, Coleman, Comanche, Concho, Dawson, Dimmit, Duval, Eastland, Fisher, Foard, Frio, Gaines, Garza, Hardeman, Howard, Irion, Jim Hogg, Jim Wells, La Salle, Live Oak, Lynn, Martin, Maverick, McCulloch, McMullen, Menard, Mills, Mitchell, Nolan, Reagan, Runnels, San Saba, Schleicher, Scurry, Sterling, Taylor, Terry, Tom Green, Webb, Wichita, Wilbarger, Yoakum, and Zavala.

Applications and further information can be obtained by calling the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired.

These loans are intended to assist businesses in offsetting working capital losses which they suffered as a result of the severe weather reducing the crop income of the area farmers and ranchers. Small businesses claiming to have been physically injured by the disaster are not eligible.

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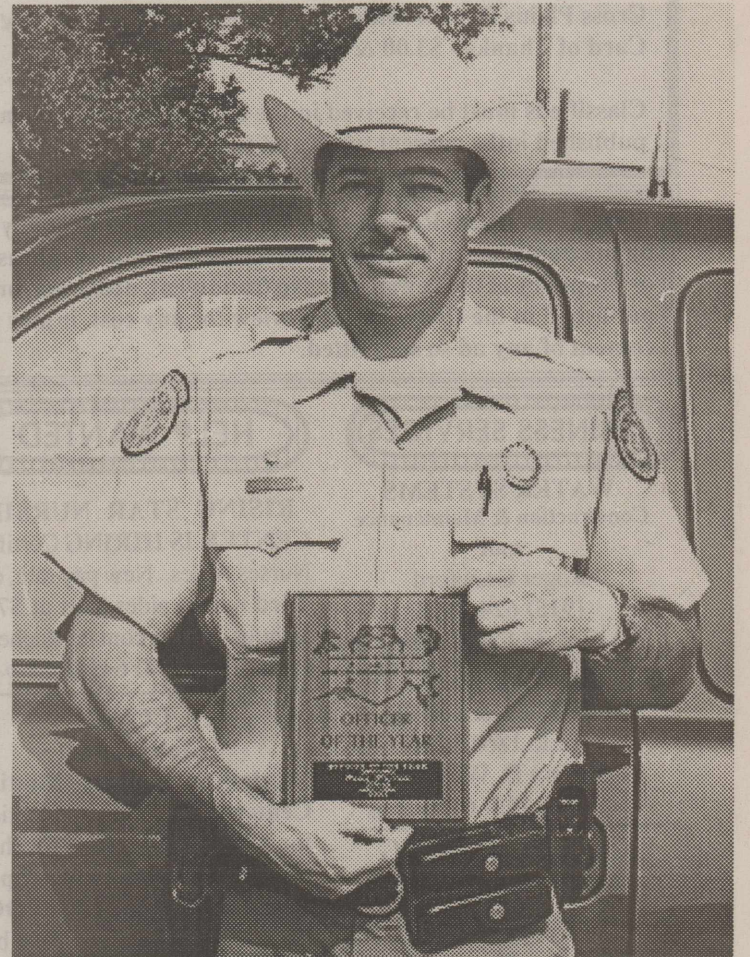

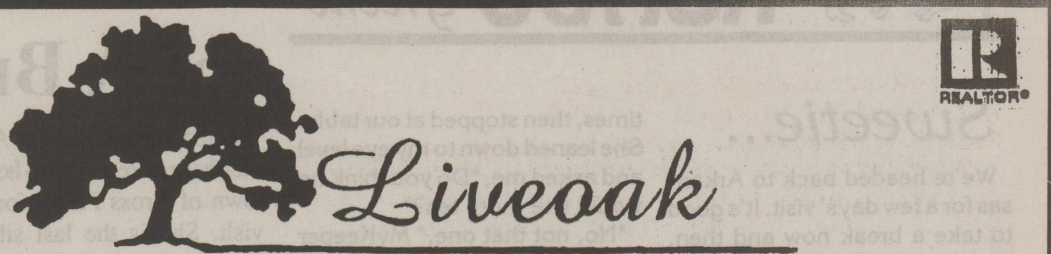

"Sounds of the Railroad"

Sounds, one of our greatest senses. You hear the birds chirping, the river running through the rocks and even the sounds of a nice summer thunderstorm. Have you ever listened to the sounds of the railroad?

Some old-timers know the way the old steam engines use to sound coming up Baird hill. It sometimes sounded like it was alive. My wife once said it sounded like an old man struggling to pull its load up the hill. Some of the old steamers had famous names and done great feats in their lives. The 8444 is the largest steam engine built in North America that is still in existence.

The Union Pacific uses it for historical trips and it always draws a big crowd. The Challenger is its sister and is still used also. Sometimes, when you get a chance, listen to the far off sounds of one of these great monsters chugging its way along the tracks and tell me it doesn't sound alive and feel the hair on the back of your neck stand up.

You know when I first started, the railroad I was a "Gandy

Dancer" or track worker. I worked on a tie gang for a while and there were 50 of us assigned to the gang. In those days there weren't a lot of equipment and you had to use manpower to move things.

Getting back to the sounds. You should hear the sound of 50 men with lining bars singing a song with a distinctive beat while tapping the rail at the same time. This was done to realign track and other tasks. Black men a long time ago started it and it still works. The only thing is the machines have taken the place of the men.

You know, I was one of those engineers who had to run the locomotive with the window open just a little. Brakemen would ask me to close the window when it was cold outside. I did this to listen to the sound of the engines. I could tell if the engines were running right, and if the train was doing everything it was supposed to. They say that old steam locomotive engineers ran their big engines the same way.

Next time you are out and about, listen to what is going on around you.

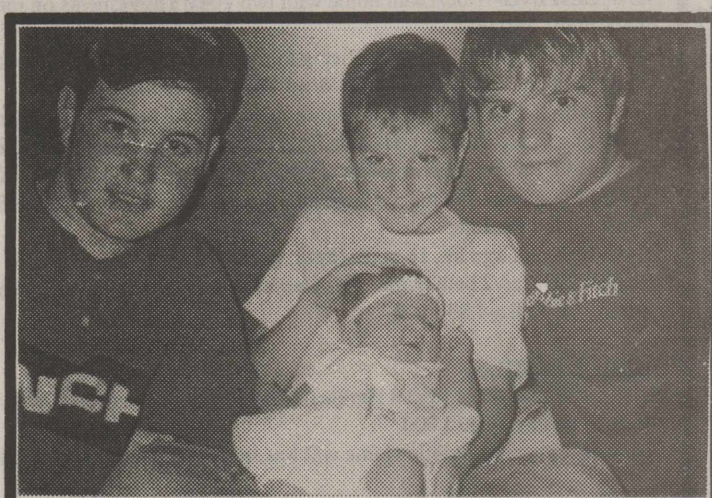
