"Meet Me In the Stairwell"

By Robert (Bobby) Lee

You say you will never forget where you were when you heard the news on September 11, 2001. Neither will I.

I was on the 110th floor in a smoked-filled room with a man who called his wife to say, "Good-bye." I held his fingers steady as he dialed. I gave him the peace to say, "Honey, I am not going to make it, but it is O.K...I am ready to go."

I was with his wife, when he called, as she fed breakfast to their children. I held her up as she tried to understand his words and as she realized he wasn't coming home that night.

I was in the stairwell of the 23rd floor when a woman cried out to Me for help. "I have been knocking on the door to your heart for 50 years!" I said, "of course I will show you the way home---only believe in Me now."

I was at the base of the buildings with the priest administering to the injured and devastated souls. I took him home to tend to his flock in heaven. He heard by voice and answered.

I was on all four of those planes, in every seat, with ever prayer. I was with the crew as they were overtaken. I was in the very hearts of the believers there, comforting and assuring them that their faith had saved them.

I was in Texas, Kansas and London. I was standing next to you when you heard the terrible news. Did you sense Me????

I want you to know that I saw every face. I knew every name--though not all know Me. Some met Me the first time on the 86th floor.

Some sought Me with their last breathe.

Some couldn't hear Me calling them through the smoke and flames, "Come to Me....this way...take My hand."





Let us not wait to learn what we really need to know. What we don't know may very well hurt us!






