The alarm was sounded when Sheriff Alfred Petterson and Deputy H. F. Parker, identified three men who had lunch in the T. & P. Cafe on Saturday, and a finetooth comb search of this sector for the aliens was started.

T. F. Horton, a fireman for the T. & P. railroad, and B. F. Everett, of the T. & P. Cafe, also identified the men from their pictures appearing in the Abilene Reporter-News that day.

When word got around that Nazi agents were thought to be in his vicinity, Baird residents went about their ways quietly, but to say the least, this tranquil little city's heart was in its mouth, and everyone was on the alert through the three-day search.

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


