Chuck wagon churns out food

For a growing number of people, Super 2nd Saturday in Haskell is becoming to mean eating a personally prepared hamburger, or perhaps a hot dog, on a bench on the courthouse lawn.

That's when the Assembly of God pulls its chuck wagon to the southeast corner of the courthouse lawn and operates its portable restaurant.

And it's not just on Saturday. It's also open on Friday, and on some weekends more people eat there on Friday than on Saturday.

Hamburgers, cheeseburgers, grilled cheese sandwiches, hot dogs, corn dogs and chili dogs are prepared to individual specifications. Also offered are Frito pies, french fries, cake, cookies and soft drinks.

The Rev. J. C. Amburn, Assembly of God pastor, is the ramrod of the chuck wagon and does much of the cooking. James and Carol McFadden also are deeply involved and numerous other church members assist in the effort.

When they first started, the church members opened the kitchen about 10:30 a.m. on Friday and Saturday. Lately, though, they've been opening at 7 on Saturday morning so they can serve breakfast.

Except for the hamburger patties and the buns, all ingredients for the menu are donated by church members. The soft drinks also are donated, as are the cookies and cakes.

On a typical weekend, the chuck wagon will dispense between 100 and 200 hamburgers, along with an assortment of other items.

The Saturday morning breakfast

idea came by accident. A group of church members would gather at the chuck wagon on Saturday morning and cook for themselves. They bought their own food to prepare. But when the public started showing up, they started selling food to them. They now prepare bacon, sausage, eggs and hashbrowns to a growing clientele.

Proceeds from the food sales are going into a fund to renovate the church parsonage, a project which is now underway.

Although the chuck wagon has been a once-a-month fixture in downtown Haskell only since the Super 2nd Saturday activities were organized a year ago, it has quite a history as a fund-raising vehicle for the Assembly of God.

It is set up each fall at the Haskell County Fair and can be seen at other functions where people gather. It's been taken as far away as Weinert--for homecoming.

The Assembly of God got into the food business in September 1973 when a women's club asked the church to operate its food booth at the fair.

The next year, the church bought a portable food booth from the Foursquare Church of Knox City and set it up at the local fair. It's been there each year since.

The present chuck wagon is an offspring of the old portable booth bought from the Knox City church. Most of the original kitchen equipment is still being used, but the wagon itself bears little resemblance to the original booth. The housing is mounted on a running gear of an old cotton trailer, donated to the church by Amburn's father.

Activities will begin at 6:30 p.m. in the Lions club building with a barbecue, followed by the traditional muster. Muster is open to all former students and their families, parents of students and friends of Texas A&M.

Aggie muster dates back to 1883 and has been held annually ever since. More than 400 musters will be held around the world this year "wherever Texas A&M former students live or work."

During wars, Aggies have mustered in foxholes, on the battlefields, aboard ships, in airplanes and in medical hospitals. In World War II, a muster was held on Corregidor Island shortly before the Japanese captured it in 1942.

Every muster ceremony is the same. Texas Aggies pay their last respects to all those who are absent because of death since the last muster. When the names of the honored dead are called from the Muster Roll, a friend of the deceased answers "Here."

Waller Overton, this year's muster chairman, encourages all friends of Texas A&M to attend this year's muster.

Seymour firm wins bid for street project

30 blocks to receive seal coating

Coltharp Construction Co. was lowest of five bidders for the city's seal-coating project.

The firm bid .7097 per square yard, which will equal about \$30,000 for the 30 blocks to be coated.

The City Council accepted the Seymour firm's bid during its regular meeting last Thursday.

Included in the seal coating projects are streets in the northwest section of town, Addison Avenue and South 2nd Street from US 277 to Avenue A (by the Civic Center).

Work is expected to begin about June 15.

Money for seal coating city streets comes from the regular budget of the city, just as it has in recent years.

In other action during last week's council session, the City:

•Approved a new personnel policy for employees, incorporating a section on a drug prevention policy which is now required by the state.

•Authorized the construction of a gazebo in the park to be used as a stage.

•Granted a 35-cents-per-customer rate increase to Lone Star Gas Co. (The gas rate is analyzed each year and is automatically adjusted, up or down, based on the consumer price

index.)

•Granted an easement to the Paint Creek Water Authority for a water line in the airport area.

•Heard a report from administrator Bob Baker on the 911 emergency system of the West Texas Central Council of Governments.

Going strong at 100

She lives alone, does her own shopping and cooking, goes to church every Sunday and travels three times a week for a noon meal at the Experienced Citizens Center.

Not a bad schedule for Birdie Culberth. She'll be 100 years old next Thursday (April 25).

She's used to doing things and a little old hundred years hasn't slowed her down much.

She came to Haskell County as a young bride in 1915, just married to Robert (Bob) Culberth in her native Vernon. They settled in the Rochester area where he was a farmer and a rancher. They raised three kids in the Foster community. After the boys, Ray, now of Fort Worth, and Elton, now of Haskell, were grown, they and their teenage daughter, Maxine (now Maxine Ivey of Munday) moved to Haskell. Her husband died in 1962.

Two years ago, her family moved her into an apartment, reasoning that smaller quarters and fewer responsibilities would make her life a little easier.

Until then, she worked in her flower garden, sewed and did all the other things a normal homemaker is required to do.

But she hasn't given up her interest, or her know-how. Mrs. Ivey tells of a time recently when her mother asked her to bring her a hoe so she could chop some weeds around the apartment. And after she chopped the weeds, she requested a rake.

Three times a week, Mrs. Culberth boards the Experienced Citizens Center van for a trip to the center for her noon meal. And on Sunday, she rides the Church of Christ bus to church.

Maxine, who works in Haskell at Farmers Co-op Gin, comes by to help her mother dress before she goes out. She also takes her to the grocery store to do her shopping, and occasionally to other places. It's not uncommon for Maxine and Elton to take her to dinner in Stamford or shopping at Wal Mart.

Mrs. Culberth did a lot of sewing until she was 97 years old, but failing eyesight has forced her to give up this hobby.

A housekeeper comes two afternoons a week to clean her apartment and do her laundry. Otherwise, she runs her own household.

Mrs. Culberth attributes her long life to "hard work." As the third child and oldest daughter in a family of 14 children, she learned early how to raise children and take care of things around home.

Five of the siblings still live. In addition to Mrs. Culberth, there are two brothers, Velmer and Vernor Bruce, both of Madisonville, and two sisters, Mrs. Delma Williams of Rule and Mrs. Rollo Harrell of Hale Center. As she approaches her 100th birthday, she doesn't anticipate any change in schedule or way of life. Although her eyesight and hearing are beginning to show signs of a century of wear and tear, her health remains good and her mind is keen.

AFA to sponsor public meeting

The American Family Association of the Rolling Plains will sponsor a meeting next Thursday (April 25) to inform the public on directive abstinence sex education in the public schools.

The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. in the Haskell National Bank community room.

Mrs. D'Ann Pierce of Spur will be the speaker. She is the teacher-coordinator for the Teen Pregnancy Program, sex education teacher and counselor in the Spur ISD.

Four years ago, Mrs. Pierce received a grant through the Texas Education Agency to help teen parents. There were 11 single parents in the program. The following year, the abstinence sex education program titled Teen-Aid was implemented for the fifth through 12th grades. During the past two years, Mrs. Pierce has used the curriculum in the fifth, sixth and seventh grades. After using the Teen-Aid program for

three years, there was a drop from nine pregnancies to one in her single parent program. Mrs. Pierce says the Teen-Aid program is a major factor in this success.

Abstinence sex education is a directive approach to the teen sexuality problem. It teaches decision-making skills and healthy standards of living. Consequences of sexual activity are also taught, such as the failure of birth control, likelihood of contacting a sexually transmitted disease and the emotional, mental, social and spiritual pain involved with being sexually active.

"Everyone interested in learning about an approach that is being effective in solving this national problem is encouraged to attend next week's meeting," said Karen Lehrman, president of the American Family Association of the Rolling Plains.

Mrs. Pierce also will speak to school personnel at 10 a.m. on the same day at the same place.

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Indians, Maidens qualify in nine events

Indian and Maiden tracksters qualified for nine events in the regional meet by virtue of their performances in last weekend's district 7-2A meet in Anson.

The regional will be held Friday and Saturday, April 26-27, at Abilene Christian University. The Haskell teams will enter a regional qualifiers' meet this weekend, but coaches were undecided as to where as of Tuesday morning.

Johnie Billington paced the Indian team by winning first places in both the 100- and 200-meter dashes. He ran the 100 in 10.46 and the 200 in 21.85.

Also qualifying for regional with second-place finishes were Mitch Mayfield in the 110-meter hurdles (15.90) and Chad Gibson in the discus (131-6).

As a team, the Indians finished a disappointing fourth in the eight-team field. They had 78 team points, finishing behind Winters (114), Hamlin (113) and Albany (81) and ahead of Stamford (68), Anson (42) and Hawley (42).

Four other Indian performers barely missed qualifying for regional with third-place efforts.

Sherwin Everton took third in the 3200-meter run (11:36.34), Jonathan Dever was third in the 400-meter dash (51.16), Cody Josselet was third in the discus (129-2) and Rusty Stocks tied for third in the high jump (6-0).

Mayfield took fourth place in the 300-meter hurdles (42.74) and the 1600-meter relay team of Dever, Adam Coleman, Isaac Swann and Jeremy Fuentes was fourth with a time of 3:33.08.

Fifth places went to Eddie

Gonzales in the high jump (5-8) and Gibson in the shot put (42-7).

Coleman was sixth in the 400 (52.14) and Dever was sixth in the triple jump (41-3 3/4).

For the Maidens, Regina Dever qualified for two events with a first-place finish in the 400-meter dash (60.61) and a second place in the long jump (17-1). She also was a member of the 1600-meter relay team which qualified with a second place finish (4:17.40).

Another first place was won by Trecci Burson with a time of 5:53.26 in the 1600-meter run.

Shelia Unger qualified in the 800-meter run with a second-place time of 2:30.01.

Joining Dever on the second-place 1600 relay team were Teresa Diaz, Holly Hobgood and Unger.

As a team, the Maidens came in second with 96 team points. Albany won the team championship with 166 points. Behind Haskell came Stamford (71), Winters (67), Anson (65) and Hamlin (56).

The Maidens took four third places: Unger in the 300 hurdles (48.56), Dever in the triple jump (35-1 3/4), Unger in the high jump (5-0) and the 800-meter relay team of Denise Collins, Heather Stewart,

Hobgood and Cassie Jones (1:52.02).

Cathryne Seelke won fourth in the 400-meter dash with a time of 1:04.74.

Burson was fifth in the 800-meter run (2:42.03) and Daniela Guadaluca was fifth in the shot put (32-3).

Four other Maidens took sixth places: Claudia Payne in the 3200 (15:25.25), Hobgood in the 200 dash (28.60), Shelly Stewart in the 300 hurdles (52.29) and Guadaluca in the discus (95-9).

For the second year in a row, Chris Tanner and David Foreman are headed for the tennis regionals.

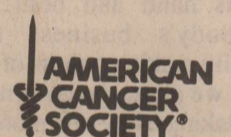

New gallstone treatment tested at the University of Utah introduces a tiny rotor through a needle puncture to grind up the stones, which are then sucked out by a tube. Procedure works faster and more thoroughly than lithotripsy, which uses ultrasonic shock waves to smash the stones.

When impotence is caused by physical problems, a new non-invasive vacuum device may be helpful, researchers at Case Western Reserve School of Medicine found.

The burning foot pain of diet neuropathy can be relieved with hot pepper! Non-prescription cream containing capsaicin, used four times a day, offered great improvement in a study at Scripps Clinic and Research Foundation in La Jolla, California.

Whether children with diarrhea are fed clear liquids or their regular diet doesn't seem to make much difference, researchers found at the Universities of North Carolina and Rochester, New York. What was important: giving oral electrolyte solutions, available in pharmacies.
