"Cross Action Against Crime" Is Subject For Address By Judge Bills

"Cross Action Against Crime" was the subject of an address of District Judge E. A. Bills before the Muleshoe Rotary Club Tuesday noon. Wording of his subject was suggested by a term in law, but it meant to him a counter offensive in this country against crime, which he said is increasing.

The judge said that in various counties of this, the 64th Judicial District, he last year tried 198 criminal cases.

He reviewed the efforts at rehabilitation, the work of educators and other movements to combat crime. It actually has increased while such measures were being tried, he said.

He decried the modern attitude toward sex education and said that he believed schools and parents should go back to the old concept towards handling this subject. Above all, he thinks that parents must exercise a closer supervision over their children.

Blocher Testimony Is Finished

Capt. Clyde A. Bray, Jr., Killed In Car Accident; Rites Held Monday

Phillips Builds Service Station At Cross Roads

Nearing completion in Muleshoe is a service station building for Phillips Petroleum Co., to be operated by Evans Bros. Oil Co. The building is located at the cross-roads, where highways 70 and 84 join and where highway 214 intersects, one of the busiest intersections in this section.

The building is 28x47 feet in dimensions and is built of cement blocks with lots of plate glass in the front. It will be under the management of the Evans boys, Eit and Elmo, who will move their wholesale office there and conduct their entire business from the service station, which will be known as Evans Bros. Service.

E. C. Johnson, of Bartlesville, Okla., has been the engineer in charge and a contract was let to Doc Wilhite for the construction. The building has cost in the neighborhood of \$20,000, not counting cost of lot and equipment. It is the property of the Phillips company, which has owned the 65x100 ft. lot about ten years.

Mr. Johnson said he believed that the station would be the brightest place in this section, for nothing has been spared in lighting the building, using new type mercury vapor lamps. The building will not be turned over to Evans Bros. until this lighting system is in operation, Mr. Johnson said, and delay in receiving material for the system has delayed the announcement of a formal opening date. Most of the concrete work is completed and four new pumps are installed.

Capt. Clyde A. Bray, Jr., died in a Dumas, Texas, hospital at 8:30 o'clock last Saturday morning, December 1, as a result of injuries he received in a car accident two hours before. His car crashed into the rear of a truck near the town of Kerrick, 10 miles north of Stratford, on US highway 287.

Captain Bray was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde A. Bray, Sr., long time residents of Muleshoe. He had been stationed at Great Falls, Mont., and was on his way to his home in Pampa for a visit with his family.

After graduating from Muleshoe high school he attended West Texas State College at Canyon and the University of Texas. He served as a pilot in World War II, in the European Theater of Operations.

He moved to Pampa after the war and was with the loan department of Citizens State Bank when he was recalled to duty Feb. 1, 1951. He was active in the Pampa Junior Chamber of Commerce and sang in the First Methodist Church Choir.

Since his recall, he had been flying four motor planes. He recently returned from a flight to Tripoli.

Military funeral rites for Capt. Bray were conducted at 2:30 o'clock Monday afternoon in the First Methodist Church of Pampa with Dr. Orion W. Carter, pastor, officiating. Interment was in Fairview cemetery in Pampa.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Thelma Osborne Bray, Jr., twin sons, Rodney and Ronald, 4 1/2 years old; Parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde A. Bray, Sr., Muleshoe, two brothers, Dan Bray, Lubbock, and Keith Bray of Muleshoe; and a sister, Mrs. Anna Lucy McAdams of Muleshoe.

Judge Prepares Charge To Jury Arguments May Begin Late Today

Taking of testimony in the case of the State of Texas vs. L. D. Stevens, charged with murder in the death of Josh Blocher ended at noon today in Bailey County district court in Muleshoe and District Judge E. A. Bills was to begin preparation of his charge to the jury. Only ten minutes were required for defense testimony. Arguments of attorneys will be heard probably Friday morning.

The State had brought 21 witnesses to the stand up to Wednesday night and continued this morning to present its case with 14 more witnesses to be heard. The State will demand the death penalty against Lester Douglass Stevens, who is charged with the murder of the aged Bailey County citizen.

The district court room has been filled with spectators since taking of testimony began Wednesday morning. Monday and Tuesday were consumed in selection of a jury from a special venire of 180 Bailey County men.

Doctor Reports Autopsy

Dr. L. T. Green of Muleshoe, who performed the autopsy on the body of the 85 year old founder of the town of Progress, was a witness Wednesday. He described three lacerations on Blocher's head and said they were the primary cause of death. Exposure, hunger and thirst were contributory causes of death, the doctors said. He described a deep laceration on the top of Blocher's head and said two smaller lacerations near the back of the head were caused by a blunt instrument, which "could have been a gun barrel."

He said Blocher probably had been beaten about 9 o'clock Saturday night and that death probably occurred sometime Sunday afternoon, August 12. The body was found in a cotton field on the C. C. Mardis farm August 15.

King Testifies

Another highlight of Wednesday's testimony was that of L. L. King of Amarillo, who gave the tip which led to the arrest of Stevens and Thomas C. Livesay, also charged in the Blocher slaying and who will be tried separately. Livesay recently underwent an appendicitis operation in the Green Hospital & Clinic here.

Two days were needed to select the jury. Four men were accepted by both defense and prosecution Monday afternoon, four more by noon Tuesday, and the 12th man, Alex Reid, No. 137 on the special venire list, was selected at 5:30 p. m. Tuesday.

Only two men on the jury, J. L. Taylor, barber, and Fred Beene, a grocer, are not farmers. H. M. Gable, large scale farmer residing northeast of Muleshoe, was the first man accepted for the jury.

The jury is composed of the following men: H. M. Gable, H. E. Kirby, Merwin Wilterding, E. M. Sowders, J. L. Taylor, Lester Howard, L. M. Dupler, R. E. Sowders, J. W. Witherspoon, Fred Beene, Buck Ragsdale, and Alex Reid.

11-Count Indictment

Dist. Attorney Joe Sharp read an 11-count indictment against Stevens. The carefully worded indictment used calculated repetition to detail the prosecution's version of how Blocher met his death.

Beginning with the first count charging that Stevens and a companion, Thomas C. Livesay, "struck Josh Blocher with a gun," the other accounts went on to list other weapons, a bottle and "an instrument unknown," and to describe how Blocher died in the cotton field where his body was found August 15.

Plea Is Not Guilty

At the conclusion of the reading of the indictment, Judge Bills asked for a pleading. Stevens rose and said: "No, sir, not guilty."

45 Witnesses Called

About 45 witnesses had been summoned for the defense and the state. Taking of testimony began Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock.

Judge Bills Addresses Lions

Judge E. A. Bills, presiding over the 64th District Court now in session in Muleshoe, was guest speaker at the regular monthly meeting of the Muleshoe Junior Chamber of Commerce Monday night when Mr. and Mrs. Sherman Inman were honored as the farm family of the month.

Marlin and Jerry Inman were also recognized with the Inman family for their fine work in raising Poland China hogs. These boys have won numerous prizes in 4-H Club work and FFA work including top honors at the State Fair of Texas.

Basis for their selection by the Jaycees for the farm family of the month was their well balanced farming operations. Their crops are diversified and they raise alfalfa, feed, cotton, and have a small irrigated pasture. They are also following good soil improvement practices such as rotation and cover crops.

They are also improving their farm. Since moving to their present location, they have moved several old buildings, built very practical livestock sheds, cleaned up the premises in general, and have a nice livestock program. At the present time they are milking several cows, have six registered Poland China sows and have a nice flock of White Leghorn hens.

He outlined the political career of Thomas Jefferson and said that he was probably the father of American democracy. He also read a letter to Harry S. Randell, who was writing a book on Jefferson, in 1857, from T. M. McCaulay, in England, at that time a member of the British parliament.

He outlined the workings of a socialistic government and why they were hampered by lack of production and why our free enterprise system resulted in more work and production and higher standards of living for all concerned.

He gave several illustrations of how our government was turning toward socialism and communism and gave one remedy that would help alter the situation.

Another guest for the meeting was Joe Jones, of Jones Farm Store. He was the guest of Irvin St. Clair.

Nearly four sections of grass burned near Muleshoe Saturday afternoon. The flames were swept along by a brisk wind and covered lots of ground before they could be brought under control by men of the community.

Jno. S. McMurtry, proprietor of the McMurtry ranch just east of town, said he lost about two sections of grass and estimated that the Muleshoe ranch lost more than a section.

It was his best grass, Mr. McMurtry said, and the loss is particularly important since he will now have to go into the market and buy hay for his cattle, and hay is selling at a stiff price at this time.

Local Group Visits Itinerant Labor Camps At Hereford, Dimmitt

A group of Muleshoe men last Friday visited labor camps at Hereford and Dimmitt to learn at first hand how these camps were formed, how they are maintained, how used, and other pertinent information. The information will be available to the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce which is studying the possibility of establishing such a camp here for itinerant laborers.

In the group were Al Hall, Chamber of Commerce manager; Carl Case, of Muleshoe Canning Co.; John McFarland of King Bros.; and J. M. Forbes, Journal editor.

At Hereford they were met by Tom McFarland, Chamber of Commerce manager; by three representatives of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and by Glenn Weir, Hereford realtor who helped to establish the camp and was one of the first directors. WTCC representatives were Joe Evans, Hereford, county director; Alden Cathey, WTCC membership representative; and Jimmy Lovell, Jr., district Plains representative, Plainview.

Mr. Weir conferred with the Muleshoe men about two hours and answered many questions about the Hereford camp.

The Hereford camp is housed in barracks that formerly were used by the Hereford POW camp. After the war a group of Hereford men contributed to a fund to purchase the barracks and 86 buildings were bought. The group sold about half of these buildings for enough to pay for moving the balance of the buildings and to pay for a tract of 25 acres on which to place them. The camp is very near the city limits.

Later the enterprise was incorporated and stockholders were limited to 16. Many of the original group preferred to remain as stockholders, since the enterprise actually has paid dividends, from rentals.

The barracks have been divided into four or five apartments of two or three or even one room.

**BABSON DISCUSSES—
Causes Of Unemployment**

Babson Park, Mass., Nov. 30.—Every manufacturer, retailer, and consumer is affected by market movements. This especially applies to a consumer whose family depends upon the employment of its father or other members. Therefore, whether you own a business or a share of stock, or are dependent on a job, you should be much interested in the business cycle, and what causes business to improve or to decline.

THE INFLUENCE OF DEBT
The changing indebtedness of families, business concerns and governments-at-war is the apparent factor causing the long-term "ups and downs". When people are freely making installment purchases, business improves and more jobs at higher wages follow. When, however, people reduce their installment purchases retail trade declines. Then inventories pile up so that retailers are unable to meet their bank loans. Hence, they reduce their purchase of new goods.

This causes manufacturers to lay off help, which further reduces consumers' purchasing power. As a result, the country heads for a depression. During depressions every reader of this column suffers. As voluntary increases in indebtedness stimulate business, so forced reduction of debt hastens a decline. It would be unwise to say that we are now heading for a depression; but it is generally believed that business is now on a plateau and the next move will be downward with much unemployment.

IMPORTANCE OF ENTERTAINMENT

Although the superficial factor of the business cycle is debt, yet I ask: What causes the public's changed psychic attitude as to debt? Why do people some years do a lot of buying before any change in wages or prices occurs, while in other years follow a reverse policy without apparent reason? There is some basic spiritual, unseen cause for this changed attitude. Here is where the psychologists claim that they have the answer; namely, in the moods or desires of people. But again we ask: What changes these moods and desires? It certainly seems that such changes must be due to what people read, hear or see.

My feeling is that the newspapers, magazines, radio, movie, theaters, and television (and perhaps churches) are the factors which change people's psychic or spiritual moods and determine their actions. Yet, we find there are times when, even if all these factors unite to influence public opinion, the people refuse to believe them. Hence, the material published or broadcast or shown on the screen and stage is of little use unless the people are ready to believe what they read, hear and see. It is fairly easy to get publishers, broadcasters, film makers, and theater operators to agree on a propaganda policy; but if the public thinks this is only propaganda, then it is of no use. Only when these material forces arouse the spiritual forces of the people are they effective.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR MANY
Real opportunities exist for those who will make impartial studies of this problem for their respective communities or industries. This will require months of research in public libraries, studying the advertisements and articles of newspapers and magazines, the movies and theatrical reviews, including comments on radio and television broadcasts. (The latter, of course, have been only recently a factor.) This material should be studied in conjunction with past business cycles to learn the correlation between the spiritual and the material. These public libraries have the answer, and the librarians will be very glad to aid Chambers of Commerce and Trade Associations in such research. One of these librarians suggests that the style of women's clothing should also be considered!

Such a study could be of great value to everyone. It might solve the employment problem and enable us to make better forecasts of what is ahead. Such studies could certainly help these "vendors" of public entertainments to at least steady

But judgin from my sittin experience in court, I am convinced the truce talks have been handled by lawyers. There ain't no other type of mind with the patience and durability to stand up under so much delay, arguments, proposals, counter proposals, declarations, counter declarations, compromises, bluffin, backin out, backin in, stompin out, smilin in, drawin up resolutions, amendin em, throwin em out, drawin up new ones, in fact, I could go on for several more paragraphs but I'm soundin like a lawyer like it is.

I have never been able to understand nations. You take me, if I get into a squabble with somebody, the thing can't be settled too fast to suit me, but nations take three or four months just to decide on where they're gonna meet to see if they can lay the ground work for decidin what to do if they decide to call off the fight. It seems to me in the future when two countries get into a war, they ought

business conditions, employment and prices. Change from employment to unemployment are what causes heartbreaks of manufacturers, retailers, wageworkers and investors.

to get together right at the start and get their truce teams goin, let them parley right along with the fightin, so there'd be some chance of the armistice comin out even with the end of the war. Like it is now, we're already one war behind in signin a peace treaty, and the thing leads to all sorts of complications. Right now, we have the job of joinin up with Russia in signin a peace treaty over Germany from World War II, but at the same time have abeen fightin in Russia in Korea. Peace treaties ought to be signed fast enough so countries would have a clear hand to fight each other in the next war.

I don't know whether it would work any better, but the next time they have a truce talk comin up, why couldn't they substitute say editors for lawyers, just to see what would happen? Believe I'd rather see something happen than nothin.

**Dr. Cox Says
Protect Your Eyes**

AUSTIN, Dec. 3.—One of your most valued assets is good eyes. Many people thoughtlessly abuse the eyes and think little about it until trouble comes, declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

What can you do to protect your eyes? Avoid unnecessary strain by reading in good position and with sufficient light. If your eyes bother you, have them examined by a physician trained especially in diseases of the eye.

Eye strain begins when you need to use too much effort to focus clearly. If you have normal eyes, you do not need to use the focusing muscles to see clearly at a distance; and when you look at something close, like reading matter, you need to focus only a little. If you are far-sighted, your eyes have to focus even when you look far away; and when you read, you have to focus a lot more than a person with normal eyes.

Children have strong focusing muscles, and their eyes do not tire easily or usually need glasses unless they have a large amount of far-sightedness. Then they need glasses to do the focusing and give their eyes a rest. Older people have weaker focusing

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Two New Types Gov't Insurance For Vets Who Served Since Korea

Two new types of low-cost Government life insurance are available to eligible veterans of the U. S. Armed Forces who served anywhere in the world since the Korean Campaign started on Jan. 27, 1950.

The first of these two types is a non-convertible five year level premium term policy that may be renewed every five years at the premium rate for the then-attained age.

The second type is a special form of National Service Life Insurance, on either term or permanent plans, that may be issued to disabled veterans whose disabilities have been found to be service-connected.

In this article, we will discuss only the five-year level premium term plan. The special NSLI provided for disabled veterans will be discussed in the next article.

To qualify for the five-year level premium policy (under Section 621 of the NSLI Act), veterans must have been ordered to

active duty 31 days or more; they must have served since June 27, 1950, and they must have been released from active service.

These veterans are eligible, without physical examination, for a five-year level premium term policy in amounts ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000, less any other Government life insurance in force at the time of application.

Must Apply In Writing
They must apply in writing to Veterans Administration, Washington 25, D. C., within 120 days after their release or separation from active service, and pay the required first premium.

The premium for most ages under this policy are the lowest of any Government life insurance yet authorized by the Congress.

While this policy may be renewed every five years at the premium rate for the then-attained age, it is not convertible to any other plan of Government life insurance, nor will it earn dividends.

Because it is a term policy running for only five years, it does not have any loan value,

cash surrender value, or extended insurance value. It merely provides life insurance coverage while premiums are being paid for the five-year period.

Sgt. Simmons left a younger brother, Pfc. Jimmie Simmons, in Korea. He also serves with the 1st Marines.

The Simmons have another son in the Marines. The third son is Pfc. Roy Simmons, now stationed at the Pendleton, Calif., Marine base. The latter and his wife expect to visit the Simmons at Christmas.

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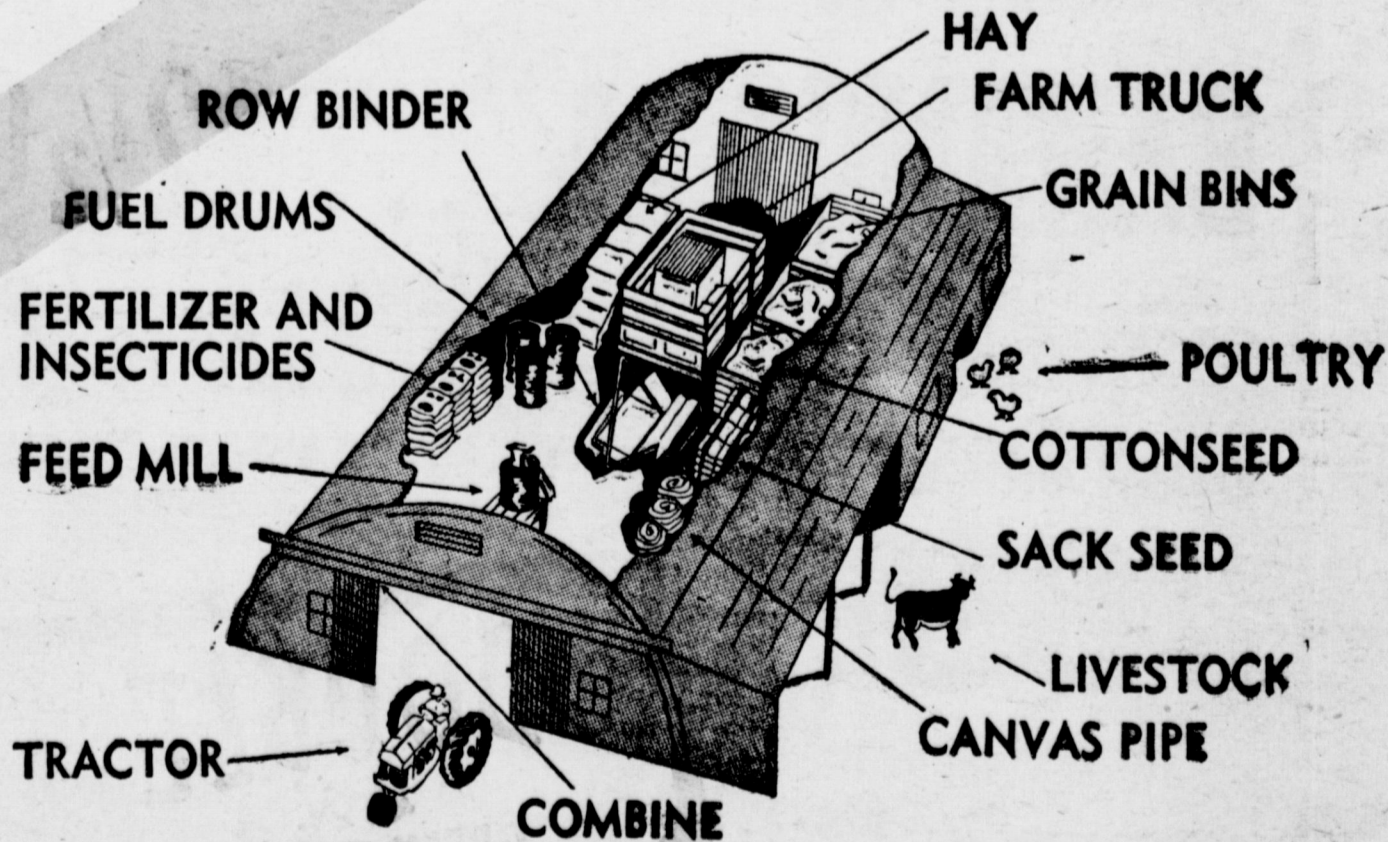

K. N. Clapp, Anderson, Clayton, and company representative in Lubbock, believes the South Plains will harvest no more than 1,310,000 bales of cotton. On November 1, Clapp estimated production would total 1,370,000 bales. Principal damage occurred in Dawson, Lubbock, and Terry counties, Clapp said.

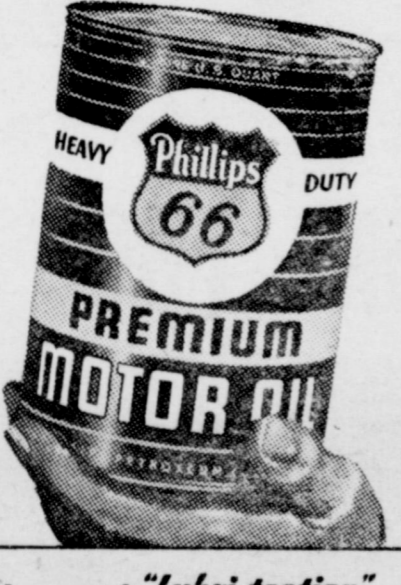
