BABSON DISCUSSES BUSINESS OUTLOOK

Babson Park, Mass., Apr. 18. As my readers know, I have thus far been pretty blue about the prospects for business up to election time next November. But, as I told you in my release on unemployment last week, President Truman's decision to pull out of the race has changed my outlook. I feel more optimistic now!

Feelings Control Statistics
When I was a boy in Gloucester, Massachusetts, my father ran a store. He often said to me: "Roger it isn't how much money people have in the bank that makes them buy my merchandise—no sir, it's HOW THEY FEEL!" That was good advice in 1900, and it is still good.

Just take a look at what's happened in the last year. You will remember that the bureaucrats and the brain trusters in Washington were warning the nation that a new wave of inflation was just ahead—that there soon would be big shortages again. That was only twelve short months ago. Did these shortages show up? They did not. Why? Because the people who do the buying decided to save more and buy less. The government statisticians could measure inventories but they couldn't figure out people's feelings!

Everybody Feeling Better
In my opinion, business and the public have both been holding back from making decisions and

buying until after the elections. Now, however, with the President making his historic "shall not run" decision, his possible successors would be more kindly disposed to business. A feeling of relief has spread through the country from one end to the other.

Now, this feeling is not something you can measure in black and white. You can't put it into a graph. But, it is the kind of thing that will make a man go out and spend a little more money than he would have before. Just a month ago he may have told his wife that "there'll be no new car this year." Today, however, he may feel that things aren't so bad after all and say: "There is enough in the bank for a rainy day so, with election prospects looking brighter, why not now enjoy the new car?" This should cause currently high inventories to be pared down.

Swing To Right
There is another important possibility that should not be overlooked. With President Truman out of the running, every effort will be made to pick a candidate behind whom the whole Democratic Party can unite. Uow, the big bulk of Southern Democrats happen to be very conservative. If they are to be appeased and "kept in line," it is highly necessary that the Convention nominate a team that will be

You can bet that their "smoke-filled rooms" are already busy mapping the strategy for keeping things humming right up to polling time. They may have lost their leader, but they haven't lost their sense of direction.

Already we have seen the government granting permission to the military to award contracts to "job distress" areas. It isn't a far step from this to finding other reasons why defense spending should be stepped up in the months immediately ahead. Certainly, if the people get an impression that a new wave of inflation is on the way, which recent strikes indicate, they may do a little more buying themselves.

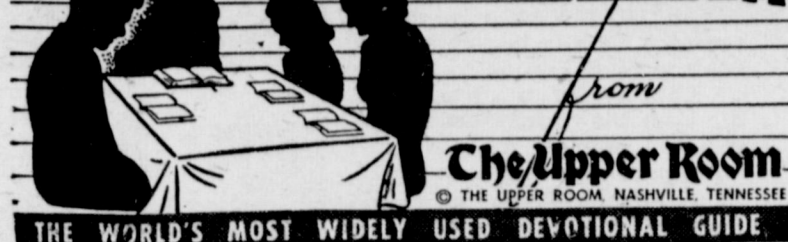

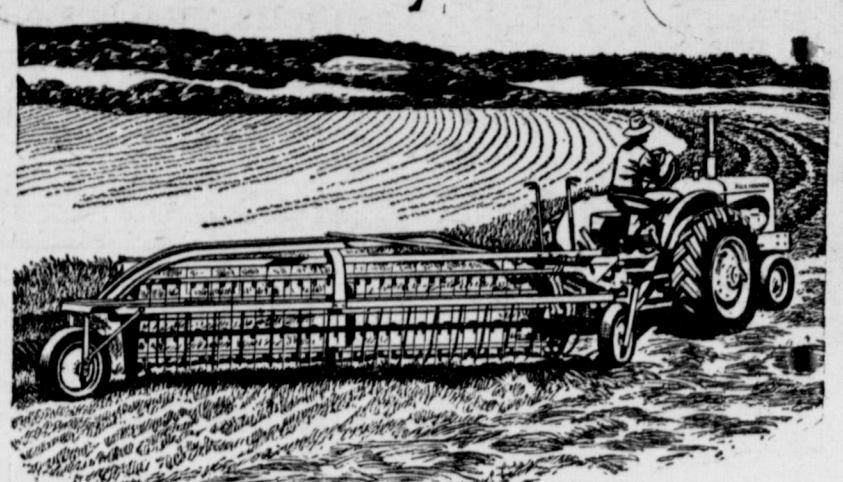

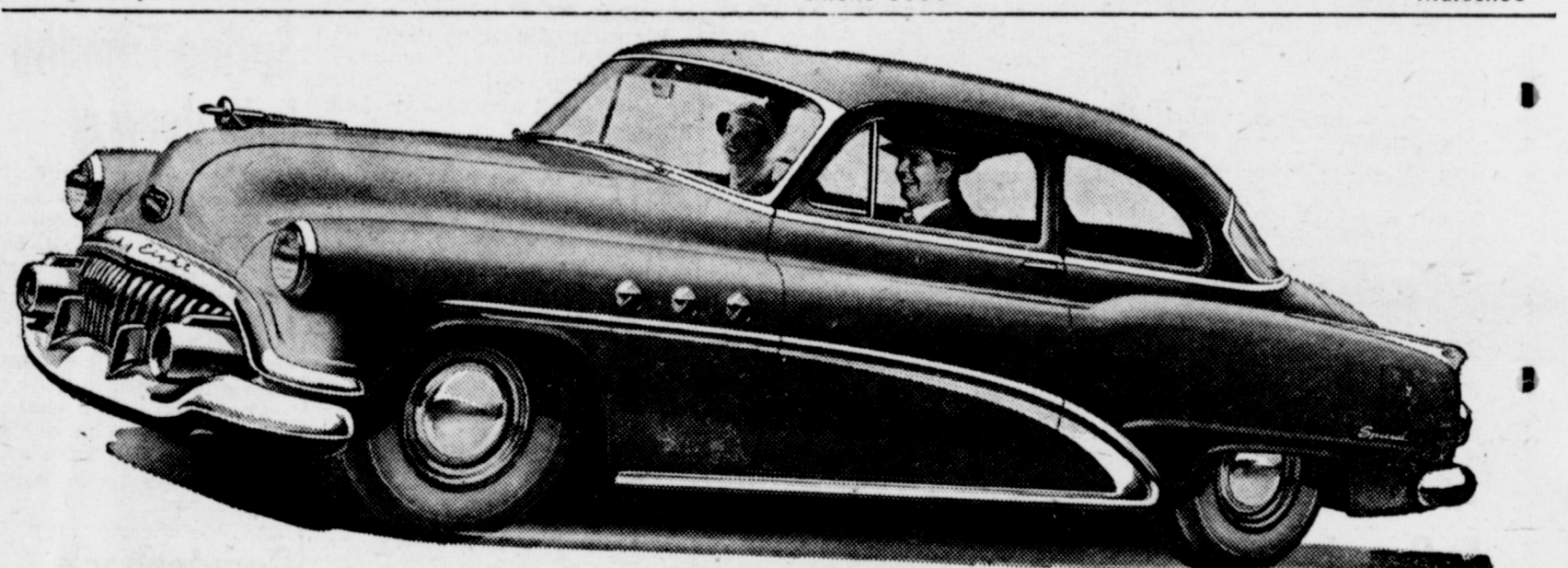

Johnson-Nix Showing Farmall Super M Tractor

The Johnson-Nix, International Harvester dealers here, has just received the first McCormick Farmall Super M, the new model which is described as the "world's most powerful all-purpose tractor." The tractor is now on display at the Johnson-Nix show-rooms.

The new Farmall Super M has 21 percent more power and faster field speeds than the famous Farmall M which is replaced," says Fred Johnson. "It will handle a regular four-bottom moldboard plow easily in practically all conditions and plow more than 20 acres in a 10-hour day."

To illustrate its large work capacity, Mr. Johnson mentioned that the Super M will do on several other field jobs. The Farmall Super M, he says, will cover up to 50 acres a day with a 10-foot tandem disk harrow and have plenty of power to handle a peg-tooth harrow or ground roller at the same time.

Castor Bean Seeds Are Here

Farmers who plan to seed some acreage to castor beans are advised that the seed have arrived. Travis Winter, administrative officer of the PMA of Bailey County has the following to say in his monthly bulletin to farmers:

"Opportunity knocks but once" Bailey county is being given an opportunity to get in on the ground floor of the new money crop, Castor Beans. This may be the crop we have been looking for. From information we have and from talking to persons who have grown castor beans before they seem to be comparable to cotton as a money crop.

Since Castor Beans are a strategic material needed by our Government in the war effort, the Commodity Credit Corporation is supporting the price of the beans at 10 cents per pound. We should have no trouble producing 100 pounds upward per acre.

Cultural and fertilizer applications for castor beans are very similar to those for cotton and grain sorghums. They are not as hard on the land as any of the other crops now produced in Bailey County. They require a growing season about like cotton.

The Commodity Credit Corporation will establish a storage center in Muleshoe for receiving the crop and will enter into contract with the producer wherein they will guarantee to pay the farmer 10 cents per pound or the market

The Star-Telegram thinks the recent New Jersey primary was a fair test of strength between General Eisenhower and Senator Taft on the Republican side; and that the victory there for the general was only another indication that Ike is far and away the most popular GOP candidate. Perhaps this is so and from this distance it appears almost a certainty, then, that the general will be nominated.

A recent Joe Belden poll of the Texas electorate indicates an overwhelming Eisenhower popularity enough to cause that pollster to say that with Eisenhower the GOP might win Texas, but with Taft they can't. However this is something that most observers have been willing to concede for some time — they think Mr. Taft just doesn't have the appeal to swing Democratic Texas to the GOP side. And now the only thing that we have not settled is whether Texas ought to send an unstructured delegation to the national Democratic convention as is urged by our good friend Allan Shivers. There are many advantages one could name to having an unfettered delegation but one of my friends thinks the delegation should be instructed up to a point, say the fourth ballot it seems to me that an unstructured state delegation might possibly be more susceptible to manipulation by the high level party bosses in their smoke filled rooms. Does that disturb you? I fear that the will of the people will be ignored in the heat of the battle that is a national convention. Of course Allan has in mind, I think, a delegation composed of men who are indifferent toward the aims and objects of the Fair Deal, so, if a majority of Texans go along with the Governor, we suppose they will have to take whatever candidate seems the most likely to succeed as the bosses see it in the coming hammer and tongs campaign between the two parties for the control of the U. S.

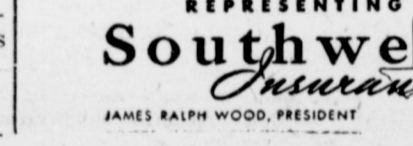

THE PINK BOLLWORM — II
There was near panic among cotton people and government agencies following the discovery of the first Pink Bollworm in Texas in 1917. "No cotton zones" were proclaimed excitedly everywhere the insect was found.

The worm had been a serious pest in many parts of the world, including Chir Egypt, Brazil, Argentina and Mexico. But still almost nothing was known about its habits and life history. And there was as much confusion

among those trying to combat it in the early days in Texas as there was hardship among the growers, who suffered from the "no cotton zone" proclamation.

Now we know that no cotton zones are futile in Texas as long as there is a plentiful supply of Pink Bollworm across the border in Mexico. We've also learned that since the worm bores its way deep into the cotton boll we can't get at it successfully with insecticides.

We are coping with it effectively, however, by following cultural practices based on the knowledge we've acquired of its life history. The cotton growers can change his procedure, the Pink Bollworm can't change its fixed habits.

We know it propagates in the growing season. So in the warm-

er areas, with a long growing season, we shorten the breeding time with planting time and plow-up deadlines.

We know that in the fall it goes into hibernation. So we destroy its place for passing the winter by stalk destruction and field cleaning.

At gins and oil mills we have fumigation, sterilization and burning of "gin trash" to prevent spread by way of seed, lint, burs, cotton products, etc.

Commercial damage from the Pink Bollworm in the past has been as high as 50%, now it is negligible. Our success is due to the almost 100% cooperation of growers, ginners and oil millers in the program for control and eradication under the Texas Pink Bollworm Law.

As long as the moth can make long distance flights, however, it can invade any part of Texas. And it is important to get at it quickly when it shows up in a new area.

Anyone finding a worm resembling the Pink Bollworm in cotton

areas thought to be free of the insect should place it in a bottle of diluted alcohol and send it to the Entomologist for Pink Bollworm Control, Texas Department of Agriculture, Austin, with full information as to date and place of collection.

Home Demonstration Week Is Set



College Station, April 23 — Governor Allan Shivers designated April 27-May 3 as Home Demonstration Week in Texas as part of the seventh National observance in the United States, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

In issuing the proclamation, Governor Shivers recognized the many contributions the more than 41,000 members of 2,023 Texas home demonstration clubs have made to the advancement of rural living. He pointed out that the state of Texas has not only benefited from the individual work of its home demonstration club members, but has gained national recognition through their achievements.

Governor Shivers said that home demonstration clubs have reflected credit on their sponsors, the United States Department of Agriculture, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the A. & M. College System and the Commissioner's Courts by building a greater Texas as they build better homes.

In 1912 the first home demonstration agent in Texas was appointed to work with girls' tomato clubs and in 1915 demonstration work began with women. The county personnel has gradually increased until today there are 255 home demonstration agents and assistants. The Texas Home Demonstration Association began as a very loosely organized group of rural women in 1926. Twenty-six years later it has grown into a formal organization with many accomplishments to its credit. The present officers of the association are: Mrs. R. M. Almanrode, president, Munday, Knox County; Mrs. B. M. Harris, vice president, Plainview, Hale County; Mrs. John Golightly, secretary, Hico, Hamilton County; Mrs. Vaughn D. 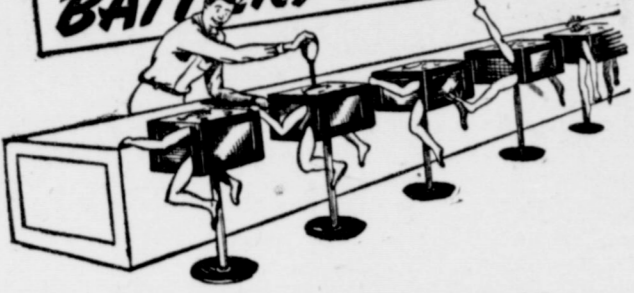

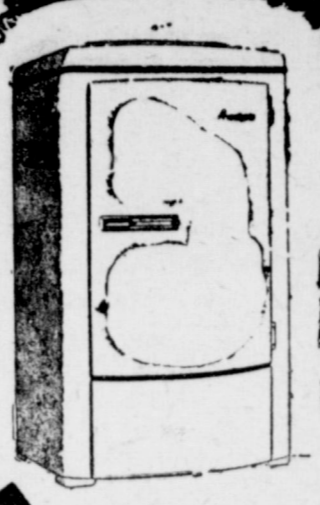

Other vocational counseling conferences will include, Engineering, Law, Business Ad-

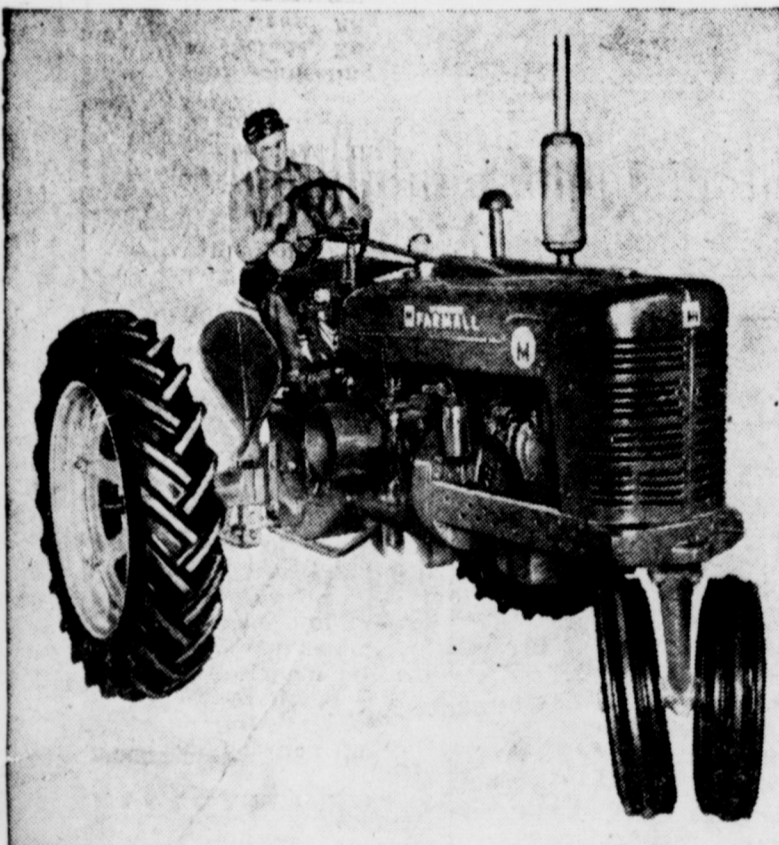

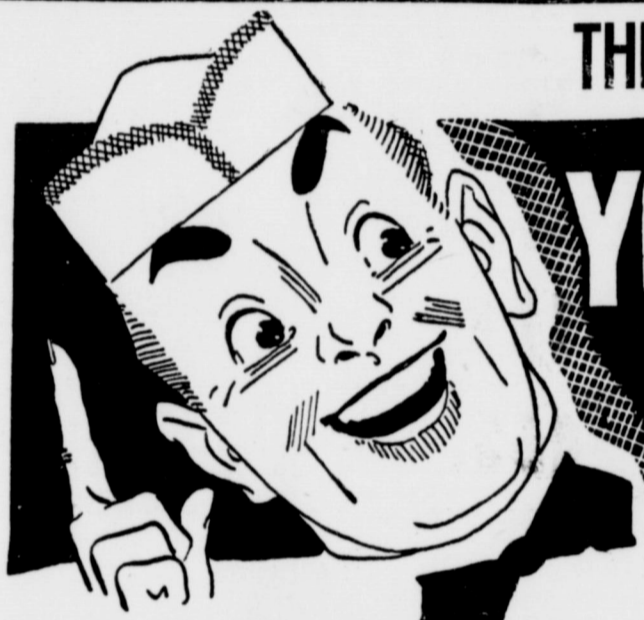
