Bailey County's cotton acreage Saturday was estimated by K. N. Klapp, Lubbock cotton man, at 180,000. Mr. Klapp said there are cotton and about 150,000 acres of dry land cotton.

He figured the condition of the irrigation crop was good, while The rain of Friday night ma-

WHAT WE CELEBRATE

Declaration Of Independence An Expression Of Basic Principles Our Declaration of Inde-

pendence, signed 17 years ago, is considered by lawyers as expressing a basic principle of our American way of life-our belief in a government of laws rather than a government of men, and in certain individual rights that must not be denied by governing bodies.

The indictments set out in the document against King George III of Great Britain charge him with numerous violations of that tenet. Among the complaints enumerated are the following:

"He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people."

"He has obstructed the administration of justice, by refusing his assent for laws for establishing judiciary powers." "He has made judges dependent upon his will alone,

for the tenure of their offices.

and the amount and payment of their salaries.' "He has refused his assent to laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good." "He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation: . . For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury; For transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offences; . . . For taking away

our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our governments; . . . For

suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever."

Our forefathers who subscribed to the principles of the Declaration of Independence were willing to fight for their beliefs. The Revolutionary War followed, dragging through weary years of suffering and suspense. Each of us takes pride in their eventual triumph over gigantic obstacles. In 1787, when the farmers of

our Constitution met at Independence Hall in Philadelphia, where the Declaration of Independence had been signed 17. years previosuly, they set to work to create a system of checks and balances in government which was to perpetuate the fundamental theory mentioned in the preamble of the earlier document:

"We hold these truths to be self-evident: That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty,

and the pursuit of happiness. "That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, depriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; .

Some 5 years later, the first ten amendments to our Constitution were adopted at one time, specifically detailing various basic civil rights stemming from the underlyin theory of the Declaration

Independence.
Our courts day by day guard these rights for us.

STATISTICS ON ACCIDENTS It is estimated that there were about 40,000 persons killed by automobiles last year, and many, many times this number injured. Over one-third of these deaths were due to collisions; and about one-third from non-collision accidents, such as running off the road. About 10,000 needless deaths were the result of hitting careless pedestrians.

These new super-highways and improvements on existing roads should reduce the collision and non-collision accidents, as well as save time, gasoline and maintenance. When the Texas housewife goes to the grocery store, she has every right to assume she will get an accurate measure of foodstuffs weighed on the grocery scales. In most cases she does, and her chance of getting the full amount of commodities from scales in good working order are increasing every year.

Protection of the public from inaccurate scale devices is just one of the functions of a branch of the State Department of Agriculture which is little known by the average person, the Weights & Measures Division. This division is not only concerned with grocery store scales, its insepctors also guarantee you a fair measurement from pharmaceutical scales, hopper scales, livewholesale devices.

Filling station gasoline pumps well as milk and cream testing units. And high on the list of important duties is the administration of the Texas Net Container Law which assures the purchaser of full value in all goods sold by weight, measure or numerical count. Hardly any field of commerce is exempt from the scrutiny of this division.

In order to maintain a high level of equality in all commercial weight and measure transactions, the Department of Agriculture is constantly making spot checks and blanket inspections of devices throughout the state. Full time inspectors are stationed at Houston, Encinal, Austin, Nacagoches, Brownwood, Want-Ads.

Wylie and Stephenville. These men are assigned a territory and alo participates in inspections in other areas when needed. If a report of suspicious scales reaches the department officials in Austin, an inspector is dispatched to the scene immediately.

Because the department's scope of activity is necessarily limited by the size of the state and overwhalming number of scale devices, several cities have their own weights and measures division. These include Austin, Cleburne, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Houston San Antonio, and Tyler. The city bureaus work in close cooperation with the state and make monthly reports to the de part-ment.

Until recently, these seals were oval shaped and dark green in color. A new rectangular white seal bordered in green is now being used which bears the date of the last inspection.



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Texas Teachers Rank Sixth In U. S.

AUSTIN, July 2 - Despite the fact that Texas teachers have not had an increase in their base salaries since 1949, they have continued to improve their professional training. They now rank among the five top states in the nation in teaching preparation, according to Charles H. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers Associ-

Tennyson said that figures available from the Texas Education Agency show that more than 95 per cent of the state's 58,513 public school teachers now hold degrees from accredited institutions of higher learning.

During the school term just closed, only 2,299 or 4.5 per cent of the white teachers in the state did not have degrees. Only 146 or 1.84 per cent of the Negro teachers in Texas do not have de-

The school year 1951-52 also marked progress in another direction, Tennyson added. It was the first year in history of the state that the schools did not have some people teaching who had less than a high school edu cation. The previous year 34 such people were employed as teach

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
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
