BABSON DISCUSSES

Steel Seizure

Washington, D. C., Apr. 25. — Of all the dangerous and unforgivable things which President Truman has done, the seizure of the steel plants is the most horrible.

WAGES SECONDARY I am not now discussing the wage question involved. Doubtless, some raise in wages was justified; and if only a moderate increase, there need be no increase in steel prices. This would have been better for all, including labor—in the end.

Under the above conditions, labor would get less "take home" pay than they would get with the full increase; but what they would take home under the steel industry's offer would pay more. The action of the Stabilization Board and the President will set off another general price increase. Every reader of this column will suffer. It is too bad.

THE GREAT CRIME The great crime was to seize the plants without due process of law, or without awarding fair damages, or without treating all plants alike. We are used to

having the President seize our boys and send them to Korea; but this is under a fair draft law to which all boys are equally subject. We know that our property is liable to seizure for payment of taxes, but all citizens (not having mink coats to give) are treated alike.

The President can take our home by eminent domain for a public highway or other necessary needs; but only after a fair hearing, proper time to vacate, collecting full damages — all being subject to Court injunction. The reason why the railroads were seized last year without a row is because the Railroad Laws provide for such a remedy. No such provision exists for seizing steel plants, or shoe factories, or newspapers, except in case of a War declared by Congress. We are now in no such War. This means President Truman's seizure was premeditated robbery, done to pay a cheap political debt. I repeat it was a crime, especially when he would not at least try the Taft-Hart-

Study Club Tour Members To See Not Only Fine New Homes But The Oldest

Those who go along on a "Tour of New Homes" planned by the Muleshoe Study Club for May 8 will see, not only some of the newest fine homes in this locality but perhaps the oldest "fine" home in this section, the ranch house on the famed Janes Ranch five miles east of Muleshoe, whose story begins before that of the city itself. Jno. S. McMurtry operator of the ranch which bears his name and who leases the Janes lands, has granted permission for the tour members to go through the old house.

It is still a fine house, but no one lives in it. Mr. McMurtry has a smaller house nearby but he admits he keeps his "Sunday clothes" in the big house. The ranch house is a basement and two and one half story affair. It is still well furnished.

Construction was begun on this pretentious home for the John Janes family in 1913, as soon as the rails on the new Santa Fe line from Lubbock to Clovis and on to California reached a point

opposite the building site. It was before the railroad reached the site that is now Muleshoe. The house was pre-built and shipped in on a siding built for the purpose.

History of the ranch itself goes way on back to 1892 when John Janes and Jarrott Janes, brothers, "squatted" in a dugout north of Amherst. Later, they built a home north of Sudan. The Janes acres now number about 10,000; but they had their cattle spread over a much wider area in the early days.

Jarrott Janes and Mrs. John Janes died in the well remembered flu epidemic in 1918; both were buried on the same day in Amarillo.

Later in that year John Janes sold the cattle on the ranch and leased the land. The Janes family has not operated it since and Mr. McMurtry leases the 5,600 acres which lie near Muleshoe; another 5,000 Janes acres lie near Bull Lake in Lamb County. Mr. McMurtry leases 10,000 acres, owns 5,000.

Mr. and Mrs. John Janes had one child, a daughter, John Ann, who married Dr. Wallace, professor of surgery in the Sealy Hospital in Galveston at the time. Mrs. Wallace died in 1946. Their son, Jimmy spends most of his time in a Denver, Colo., military academy where he is a student.

John Janes was in the Paso Del Norte Hotel in El Paso when he was fatally stricken with a heart malady, this being some time after he had left the ranch.

Mrs. Ida Givens will act as hostess for the visit of the tour members. The ladies plan to begin their tour in the west part of Muleshoe at the new home of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Damron at 2 p.m.

The tour, after leaving the Damron home will go as follows: No. 2, Mrs. Verney Towns home west of town; 3, Mrs. Ray Edwards; 4, Mrs. Sylvan Robinson; 5, Mrs. Guy Nickels; 6, Mrs. Milton Forbes; 7, Mrs. Homer Sanders Jr.; 8, Mrs. Homer Sanders, Sr. The tour members will remain for a while at the Sanders home and everyone who desires may then join the tour for the trip to the Janes Ranch, which will be visited in a body at 5 p. m. It was felt some may wish to take that part of the trip but perhaps could not make the first part.

VAST EXPANSION IS FORESEEN
FCC Lifts 'Freeze' On New Television Station Licenses

By JACK ADAMS
 WASHINGTON, April 12. (AP)—The Federal Communications Commission today lifted a three-and-a-half-year-old freeze on new station licenses. This means that eventually more than 2,000 video stations may be licensed in the United States and its possessions, as compared to 108 in operation now.

Five TV Channels Allotted Lubbock Under New Setup

Lubbock is allocated five television channels under the order lifting the ban on new station licenses as announced Sunday—but it still is anybody's guess as to just when the city will have television stations in operation.

Very High Frequency (VHF) channels 5, 11 and 13 and Ultra High Frequency (UHF) channels 20 and 26 are assigned to Lubbock by the Federal Communications Commission, according to word received here. One of the UHF channels is for educational use only, however.

Application On File

One radio station here already has an application on file for one of the channels and another station is to apply for a second channel before July 1, it was announced. Even so, no one would hazard a guess as to how long it will be before South Plainsmen will have TV available to them.

Gordon Thompson, manager of Station KFYO, said his station has had an application on file for some time for Channel 5. The FCC plan announced today, he said, the

It is expected to take a long time to reach such a total, but today's action is a go-ahead sign for the industry that blossomed into a multi-million dollar enterprise even under wraps.

Eventually television will be available to most of the population, whereas now less than half the people live within tuning range of a station.

Today's order involves several steps:

1. Formal creation of television channels in the high frequencies (UHF) added to the 12 very high frequency (VHF) channels.
2. Adoption of a final table of local channel assignments, based on the total 82 channels.
3. A specified number of exclusive educational channels.
4. A formula for exact and wider mileage separations between TV transmitters and for lower standards "to provide best possible service without point of interference."

2,000 Stations Possible

The towns all of which were allotted UHF stations, include Brownfield, Floydada, Hereford, Lamesa, Levelland, Littlefield, Plainview and Snyder.

It was not stated whether groups in any of those towns intend to make application for assignment of one of the channels.

Some schools that such stations be permitted some part-time commercialization was rejected.

Associated Press reported that it will take "a long time" to get all of the nation's new 2,000 television stations in operation, but added that the FCC is to give "first attention" to areas such as Lubbock which are now without any TV service.
