Bailey Wildcat Test Underway

Derrick lights were burning Monday night on a wildcat oil rig about 14 miles southwest of Muleshoe in Bailey County, the test to go down on former VVN Ranch lands now the property of John Birdwell.

It is the Lion Oil Co. No. 1 Birdwell, 660 feet from the north and east lines of section 78, Block A, Melvin Blum & Blum Survey, 13.5 miles southwest of Muleshoe, in the official description.

It is believed that drilling already is underway on the well, projected to 9,500 feet.

BABSON DISCUSSES — PRESENT TROUBLES

Babson Park, Fla., Feb. 15. Since leaving Massachusetts for my usual winter in Florida, I have had a chance to observe and ponder. Perhaps readers will be interested in my conclusions.
OUTLOOK IN ASIA MAINLAND
I find very little interest in the Korean War, except to get the boys home! Most people can't tell you where Korea, Indo-China or Iran are located. There is no "will-to-fight." I have been through World Wars I and II; but never experienced the present indifference.

The United Nations—under our leadership—did right in attempting to defend South Korea. Since, however, the North Koreans got the backing of China and Russia, the situation does not look good. If we attempt to defend Indo-China, Iran, the Suez Canal and Persia, we may get licked or busted. We must, however, hold Japan and Formosa.

GRAFT IN GOVERNMENT
President Truman is probably doing his best to eliminate the graft. But it has started a "chain reaction," which is spreading over the entire country. It is "smart" to beat tax collector today, the same as it was smart to beat the prohibition officer 35 years ago.

The exposures have made the racketeers more careful; but the public is turning to more gambling, liquor drinking, and sex carousal than ever. Only a religious awakening can save us.
COMMANDER WILSON PRAISED
Church attendance is falling off, especially among the youth. Sunday schools are folding up.

Sunday observance and Family Prayers have almost entered "horse and buggy" history. But the American Legion has started what may cause a great religious revival, backed by Com. Wilson.

Newspapers give too much space to Sports. High schools and colleges foolishly give too much emphasis to football, baseball and basket ball. Chambers of Commerce had better work to have their communities lead in spelling, arithmetic and decent English!

ARE WAGES TOO HIGH
Another mistake is the Minimum Wage Law, giving youth so much wild money to spend. A Minimum Wage Law should apply only to those who have worked a required number of years. Present Wage Laws are unfair to experienced workers and are harming millions of young people.

Salaries, wages, and even profits, should be dependent upon production. For wages to be increased with the cost of living will hasten the next depression. It is like trying to put out a fire with kerosene.

TRUTH ABOUT INFLATION
I am tired of hearing politicians talk about inflation, without explaining that it is a result of our troubles, rather than a cause. When labor asks for more wages "because of inflation", its leaders are "putting the cart before the horse". Their arguments are false.

Inflation starts from three causes: (1) Higher wages, (2) Higher taxes and (3) Reduced production compared with demand for goods. When wages, taxes and demand increase, then farmers, manufacturers, merchants, doctors, lawyers and everyone else raise their prices to cover this increase in wages, taxes, etc. This is the real truth about inflation.

SAND HILLS PHILOSOPHER

Maps Out Plan For Eliminating Tax Collecting, Tax Collectors

Editor's note: The Sand Hills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm won't get anywhere with his proposal this week, but it may have its attractive side.

Dear editor:
I was out here yesterday sweating over my income tax records. It's a good thing they don't hold elections at this time of the year, wouldn't any body get elected, when a friend came up and suggested we go fishin and I let my pencil drop from where it was in mid-air and went with him.

While we were fishin he got to talkin about how high his income tax was and what a lot of trouble mak in out a government report is and I told him about a suggestion one of my readers made recently and one thing led to another and we worked out a system of eliminatin all this annual figurin and self demoralizin which I am surprisid somebody in Washington hasn't thought of before now.

As I understand it, under the present system there is considerable complaint over withholdin taxes, social security taxes, income taxes, payroll taxes, etc., not only over the fact it takes money to pay em but because it's such a nuisance to keep books on the whole shebang. Time a man keeps all the forms and records necessary to satisfy the government he ain't got enough time left for any original thinkin in his business or ain't in the mood.

Now under this new system, I'm workin on all the bookkeepin and form fillin out would be eliminated. All tax frauds would end. Instead of a business man withholdin part of an employee's pay, makin out a form for the government and one for the employee and one for himself, then sendin the withheld money to the government and the government and the employee balancin their books at the end of the year, with generally considerable argument and dissatisfaction and growlerin over which one owes the other one, there wouldn't be any records at all. He'd just withhold

A WARNING
Doubtless pensions, subsidies and old age benefits are temporarily good for business, but someday this bubble will burst. Automobiles, movies and radio, plus T. V., have their usefulness, but these inventions are also responsible for wasting billions of dollars. In a way, the same reckless spending is proportionately going on in England, France, Germany and South America. The motto there is: "Eat, drink and be merry for tomorrow Russia may strike."

Without a world spiritual awakening and new sources of power, from gravity or the sun, the United States and our Allies may be beaten in our Asiatic mainland war campaigns. It so, this will be followed by economic collapse in the United States, with unemployment and lower wages and lower prices for everything. Russia hopes this will lead to Communism in this country and make the entire world Communist. This latter I do not fear. Rather, I believe that such an economic collapse could redeem our people's souls, like purifying gold with fire, and be followed by many years of great prosperity.

everything.
Under this system, whenever anybody makes any money, worker, owner, or what not, it's turned over to the government right then, all of it. No deductions, no withholdin, nothin kept back.

Everything a man bought would then be charged, and all grocery bills, drygoods bills, drug bills, etc., would be turned over to the government for settlement. Anything left over the government would hold for your old age if it couldn't think of any new dams to build.

This would virtually eliminate the need for any cash, except maybe pocket change for tippin and carfare in the cities and something to put in the cold drink machines, nobody would have to keep any records, no more overdrawn bank accounts, very few banks. It would be impossible to cheat on your income tax reports, would eliminate fraud among tax collectors and the temptation to fraud by simply eliminatin the tax collectors, and would free everybody's mind for deep thinkin on world problems.

If you think this program has any merit, what's Congress hung on?

HOW TO LESSEN THE TAX BURDEN

From The Karnes County News (Runge, Texas)

At various times, proposals have been made for placing reasonable limits on the amount of taxes that can be levied on the American people by the Federal Government. The best of these was introduced last September by Congressman

Reed of Illinois, rank-member of the House Judiciary Committee. It takes the form of a "Joint Resolution Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the United States Relative to Taxes on Incomes, Inheritances and Gifts." To become law, it must be approved by a two-thirds vote of both Houses, and then ratified by three-fourths of the States.

The heart of Mr. Reed's proposal is to fix the maximum total rate of all taxes, duties and excises on income at 25 per cent. There are but two exceptions, both of which are obviously necessary in these discordant times. First, by a three-fourths majority, Congress may raise the maximum rate to 40 per cent for periods, either successive or otherwise, not exceeding one year each. Second, in the event of a war which creates a national emergency so grave as to necessitate such action to avoid national disaster, Congress could entirely suspend the limitation on taxation, also by a three-fourths vote. All of this would apply to business as well as individuals.

Mr. Reed's amendment would also deprive Congress of the power to impose death and gift taxes, leaving this means of taxation exclusively to the States where competition would keep the rates in reasonable bounds.

The only way to cut the cost of government is to take some of the money away from the bureaucrats and department heads and all the rest of the power-hungry politicians. And that can be effectively done only when the basic law of the land makes taxation beyond a certain level impossible. Mr. Reed's carefully conceived proposal would achieve this, and at the same time take care of a real emergency. It is difficult to see how anyone who honestly favors efficient, economical government could logically oppose it.

Excessive taxation can destroy a nation from within. We are at the danger point now. The Reed Amendment is an excellent solution to our gravest domestic problem.



Self Employed SS Payments Due

Self employed persons now have one year's coverage under Federal social security, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock office of the Social Security Administration. Self employed persons were first brought under the law effective January 1, 1951. In order to receive social security credit for their 1951 self employment income, Hutton reminds owners and partners in trades or businesses that they must include a special report along with their income tax return due on or before March 15.

The social security tax report is required of all persons having a net income from self employment of \$400 or more a year. The only exception is those persons who are farm owners or operators and professional people, such as physicians, dentists, lawyers, accountants, funeral directors, and some others. The amount of tax from self employed persons on their net income will range from a minimum of \$9 to a maximum of \$81. The rate is 2 1/2 per cent on self employment earnings up to \$3600.

It is very important, Hutton stated, that the self employed person apply for a social security account number if he has never had one before or if he has lost the original card. This number will be needed when he files his income tax return and it is the only means of assuring that proper credit for his net income can be given.

The Lubbock social security office, at 1311 Texas Avenue will be glad to furnish further information. A representative of that office will be in Muleshoe on Wednesday, February 27, at 9:30 a. m. in the Post Office. Hutton suggested that all self employed people ask the representative for a copy of Do You Work For Yourself?







ment association, and instructed the staff and committee workers to expedite its organization as rapidly as possible.

Another activity of the Agriculture committee was brought to a successful completion when the acreage requirements of a new potato grower were secured, a trackside loading shed was arranged for, and various other incidental items were arranged through the cooperation of and local farmers and businessmen.

A continuing program of publicity for Muleshoe and Bailey County is a major item among chamber of commerce activities. The reams of newspaper publicity that have been carried by newspapers and radio stations in the Plains area, Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma would be hard to estimate. But the beneficial effects are constantly being brought to the attention of Muleshoe residents.

During the past six months, the local chamber has presented programs and speakers at ten different occasions in eight different cities and towns. Goodwill tours have traveled over 500 miles. C of C members have represented Muleshoe at conventions, water resources and conservation meetings, labor meetings and civic functions on numerous occasions in various centers on the South Plains.

Officials and directors of the new organization take pride in the accomplishments to date. Operating on a limited budget, the chamber is forced to restrict its activities to a great extent and often requests for assistance by various groups and organizations have to be declined for financial reasons.

"We regret this more than we can make the applicants understand," President W. M. Pool, Jr., stated. "We hope that our six month record of accomplishments will justify the continued support of our business and professional men, and encourage them to take a more active part in the activities of the chamber."

"We constantly strive to demonstrate the advantages of community cooperation in countless small ways that receive little or no publicity. On many occasions our staff does mimeographing and other details for clubs and organizations that are striving to perform community service without the benefit of equipment or staff workers."

"Our facilities are always available and whenever our staff members have the ability and time, their services are at the disposal of any club or group engaged in civic activities of any nature."

"We are at the half way mark, we either go forward or we fail. In chamber of commerce programs there can never be a stalemate. Through the continued cooperation of our clubs, business firms and individuals we shall endeavor to promote the principals of good business, good government and good citizenship to make Muleshoe a prosperous and progressive community."

Formation Of Association To Secure Farm Labor Underway By C. of C.

The formation of an association to secure an adequate supply of farm labor in 1952 was endorsed by a unanimous vote of the board of directors of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce Monday night.

After a three hour discussion of the farm labor problem, a discussion that pushed all other matters off a crowded agenda, the directors instructed the chamber of commerce staff to get the movement underway as rapidly as possible.

Almost a score of interested farmers, business and professional men crowded the chamber of commerce offices as the board convened to study the pressing problem. Interest in the discussions ran high as the multiphased problem was thoroughly screened by the voting members of the board.

At the close of the meeting, Directors F. L. Shelby and Ray Morrison recommended that the formation and organization of a non-profit labor procurement association be adopted as a chamber of commerce project. Their recommendation was approved by other members of the board and President Myron Pool, Jr. instructed the staff members to proceed immediately with the organizational details.

Action of the board came as a climax to months of study, surveys and farmer meetings throughout the Muleshoe trade territory. It was based on the urgent need for seasonal farm hands evidenced by numerous questionnaires, and conferences with employers in this area.

The initial study of the project was authorized in November. Since that time, volunteer workers by the dozens have assisted staff members in gathering the information necessary to draft a program to meet the needs of this community.

Major points emphasized by the board action included the stipulations that the association adhere strictly to the provisions of the current labor agreement and existing work contracts and the provision of any subsequent agreements or treaties; that the association be operated on a strictly non-profit basis; that any overages at the end of the season be returned on a pro-rata basis to the members of the association; and that every possible assistance in keeping records, housing and transportation of workers be given association members.

Various speakers during the evening pointed out the falacies and weaknesses of other organization of this type now in existence. It was on the recommendation of well qualified advisors that the board voted
