Panhandie Area Making Progress In Agriculture

College Station, Jan. 2 — Pan-handle farmers made excellent use of wheat land this year for growing grain serghums, points out Knox Parr, district Extension agent at Amarillo,

Wheat has been the one crop in this area for more than 10 years. However, extremely low wheat yields were produced in 1950 and 1951 because of the disastrous effect of drouth, severe cold, insects and disease. Wheat farmers turned to grain sorghum as a crop for their bare land.

In 1951 approximately 65 per cent of the wheat land in the area was planted to grain sorghums. Hansford and Ochiltree counties each planted approximately 225,000 acres to grain sorghums. Moore county pro-






