It is with a tinge of regret that I make the following statement: at the time I announced as a candidate for county judge, I thought I would be in a position to devote my undivided attention to the affairs of the office should I have been elected, but events which have happened since then have proved me to be wrong. I do not feel right in asking for an office without being able to devote the proper time to it. I am therefore withdrawing.

While it would have been a pleasure to have campaigned with you this summer, and much more, serving you should I have been elected, I believe a man's interest and obligations in the spiritual realm are duties which transcend all others. I trust that I may have your sympathy in this.

To all of you who encouraged me in this direction and offered me your support and cooperation I want to say "Thanks a lot" from the very depths of my being. Your good will and expressions of friendship will always live in my fondest memories and to all the citizens of Bailey County let me say "Take an active interest in public and political affairs, select the very best men available for leaders, give them your support and cooperation, and thus united under the proudest banner of all, The Stars and Stripes, and guided by the Almighty, Bailey County can yet be built into a better and happier place in which to live.

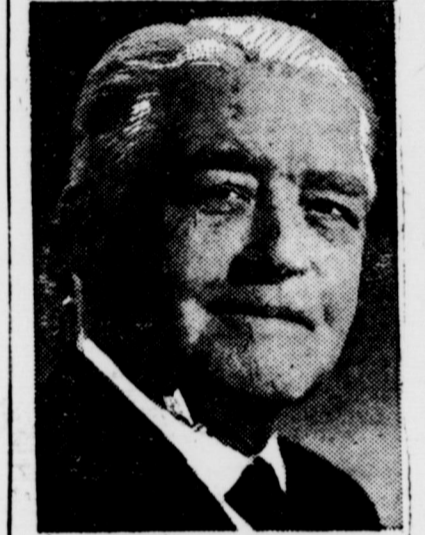

Mr. Power pointed out that, although the System is one of the nation's largest public utilities, with plant in operation of about a third billion dollars, the name "General Telephone" is known to relatively few people other than the parent company's 25,000 stockholders.

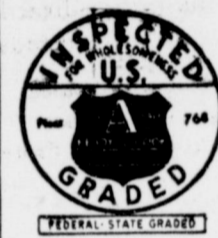

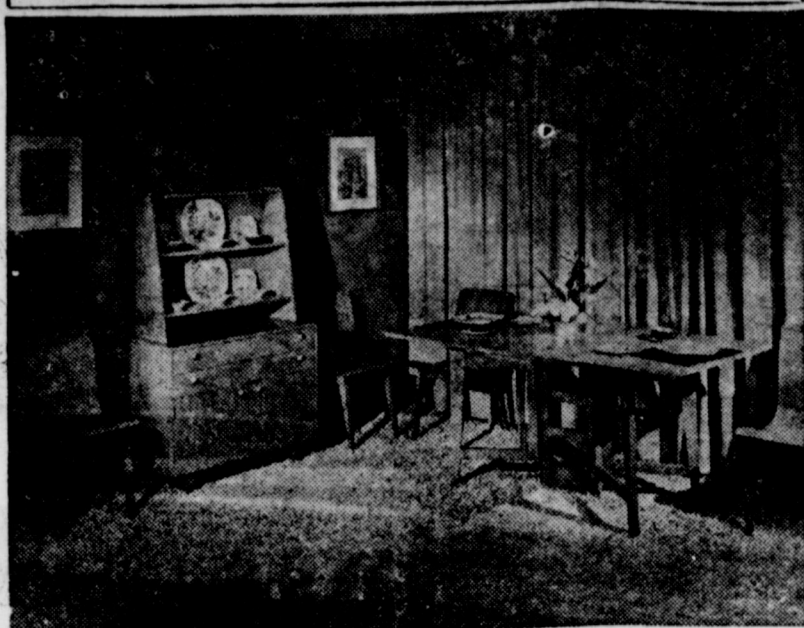
W. S. C. S. Banquet Is Successful

Five Area Schools To Participate In Vocational Guidance Day Here

Five schools in the Muleshoe area have already sent in the names of their seniors who will participate in the "Education for Citizenship Day" to be sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce on Tuesday, May 6. Five other schools remain to be heard from to complete the roster of those invited to attend. Muleshoe, Sudan, Three Way, Bula, and Bovina this week returned questionnaires filled out by 100 students indicating the profession or vocation each intends to follow, and giving the seniors' college or technical school preference.

Using these questionnaires as a guide, the chamber of commerce will arrange to have representatives of the various schools attend the vocational guidance day to meet, and confer, with the young people who have indicated an interest in their school or college.

Other counselors will be on hand to tell the seniors their experiences in the trade or vocation they are pursuing, and to answer all the questions possible. These counselors will include nurses, office secretaries, radio technicians, agriculturists and others who have shown marked success in their work.

In addition, chamber of commerce sponsors have invited the Armed Services to be represented by both a lady and gentleman officer to explain to the graduating classes, the opportunities available to those who choose to go into uniform. "We know that the boys will be particularly interested in finding out, first hand, the advantages of volunteering before they are drafted, and we intend to see that they, and the girls, get the best information it is possible for us to secure."

This same principal will hold true for all forms of vocational counseling, the sponsors believing that concrete information regarding the desired college or business college courses to pursue, and the opportunities for advancement offered by the different lines of business will not only interest the young people soon to graduate from the high schools in this area, but will also prove beneficial by showing them what to expect in the way of starting salaries, for frequency of job opportunities, and the rate of advancement prevalent in

each line of personal enterprise. In addition to the vocational counseling that will take place during the afternoon period, the sponsors have also invited outstanding speakers, that have proved popular with young people, to discuss such subjects as "The Responsibilities of a Good Citizen" and "Patriotism." These addresses will be heard during the morning session that will also feature a concert by the Muleshoe high school band and other entertainment features to be furnished by nearby schools and colleges.

Over 225 high school seniors are expected for the first event of its type to be held in Muleshoe, or any other small community under the sponsorship of a local chamber of commerce. The plan has proved its worth, when staged on a larger scale by the various regional chambers of commerce. "But we feel that smaller groups will get the same benefits from a program such as the one we are sponsoring," said a C of C spokesman. "We can save the youngsters a lot of traveling, and thus devote more time to offering them help in the subjects that mean so much to them at this point in their careers."

The Wildcats were triumphant in the pole vault, high jump, javelin and the mile relay. They also finished in a dead heat with the Mules in the half-mile relay.

Gene Gaume won the pole vault for the Wildcats, an event the Clovis team dominated, what with Jerry Lot grabbing second. Alvis Kelly, husky senior, tossed the javelin 140 ft., two inches to give Clovis the honors in this event. Lyle Walker of the Wildcats was second.

John Dickson, lanky sophomore, leaped 5 feet, 5 inches for Clovis' victory in the high jump. A. J. Mason and Bobby Snipes, Wildcats hopefuls, tied for second and third.

In the mile relay, the Wildcats nosed out the Mules with John Hamilton, Avis Kelly, John Dickson and Lloyd Norton lugging the baton.

On the strength of second, third and fourth places, the inexperienced Wildcats kept hot after Muleshoe until the final four events. Then the Mules scored heavily in the half mile run to break Clovis' back.

The meet was slow because of the track's condition. The Wildcat cinder paths were reconditioned this past week and were not suited to permit record performance.

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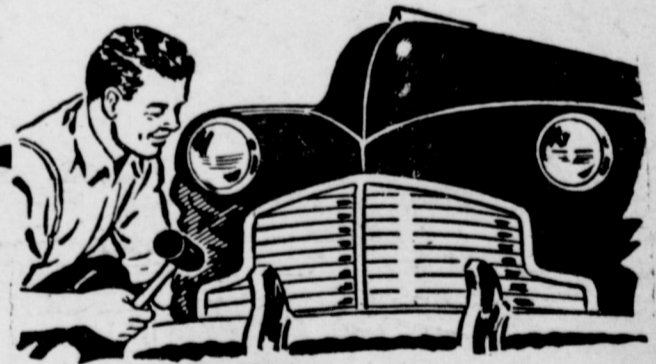

BABSON SHOWS

How To Reduce Taxes

Babson Park, Mass., April 4. — March 15, has come and gone. Gone, too, are the hopes of many for that new car or summer vacation, the redecoration of a few rooms, or a new spring outfit. While you are still smarting, perhaps it is a good time to ask, "Why do we let our Government take so much of our money to spend so recklessly?"

IS THE U. S. REALLY POORER TODAY THAN IN 1929?

I am inclined to believe most of us do not realize the economic facts of life; for if we did, I feel pretty certain that more people would get out to vote; — in the primaries, as well as in local and national elections.

How rich is this country when compared with 1929? The National Bureau of Economic Research has reported that in terms of 1929 dollars our total wealth has increased only 12% from 1928 to 1948. Yet this same period our population has increased 23%. This boils down to the fact that in 1951, a year in which all kinds of economic records were set, the per capita wealth was actually 8% below that of 1928!

GOVERNMENT OPINATES

The policy of our own Federal Government has been to keep us in the dark on such facts. The size and power of our governmental machine, our formidable commitments both at home and abroad, full employment and standard-of-living propaganda — all have dulled

our senses to what has really been going on. Many people even now subscribe to the idea that high taxes are good for the country as a whole!

Who gets most of the tax money? Uncle Sam now takes 81% of all taxes collected in this country. This leaves only 19% of the tax money for state and local governments, which is less than one-third of the percentage these organizations had at their disposal in 1929.

What does Uncle Sam do with all of this money? Get a digest of the Hoover Report and find out if you don't know. Here are a few facts: — In 24 years, the Government has increased the number of employees from 570,000 to almost 2,500,000. The total national budget has increased from less than \$4 billion in 1928 to approximately \$70 billion. From another view the Federal Budget expense has gone up from \$240 per average family, per year in 1928 to \$1400 today. Here is a sample of where the money goes: — 29 different agencies make loans; 28 handle welfare projects; 16 are engaged in wild-life preservation; and 50 agencies compile statistics, which often disagree with each other! The Veterans' Administration takes five times as long to pay a death claim, and uses four times as much manpower to do the job as do private companies.

These are but a few samples of what has been going on to cause the demand for more and more dollars in taxes from you and me. The Hoover Commission, an impartial, non-partisan committee appointed by President Truman, made over three hundred recommendations to bring about a more efficient Government. Hard-hitting, interested citizens who have made their wishes known to their representatives have been able to bring about legislation adopting less than half of the Commission's recommendations.

OUR OWN FAULT

Our Government, at local, state, and national levels, is as good as we make it. If we remain complacent or silent or fail to vote, our Government will continue to squander our tax dollars. But if we make good Government our business, just as we would the handling of our own personal

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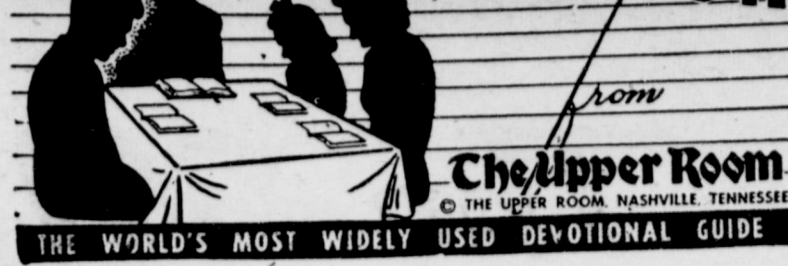

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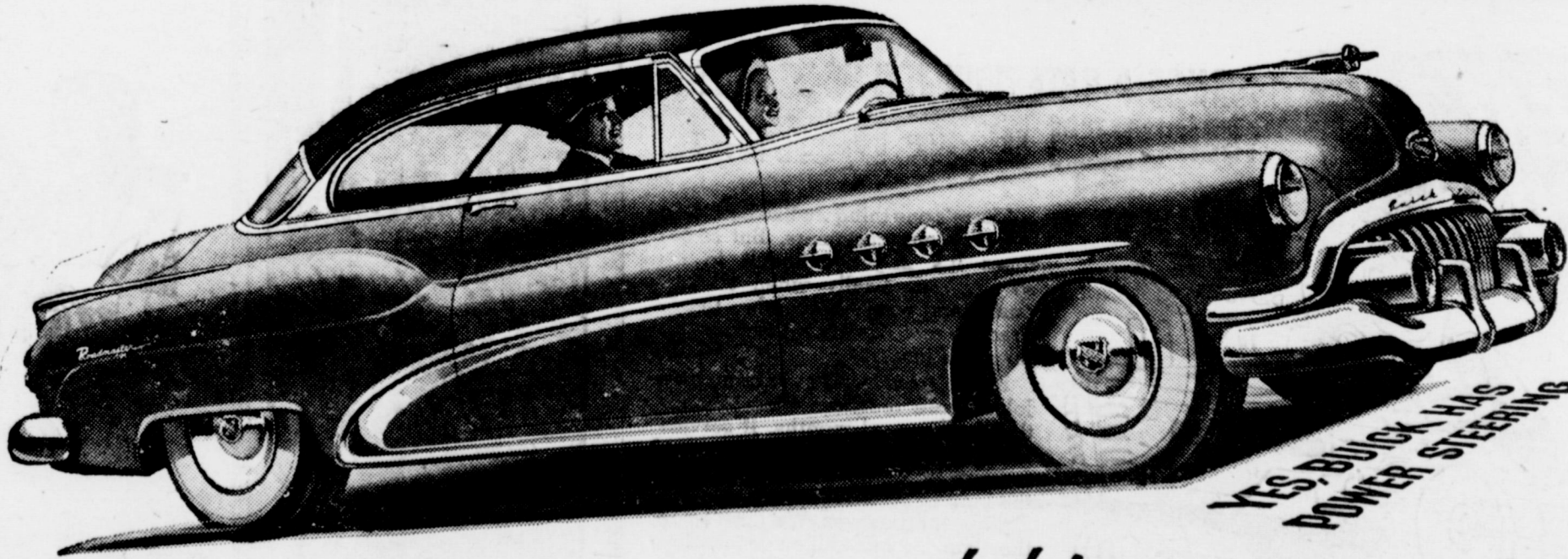

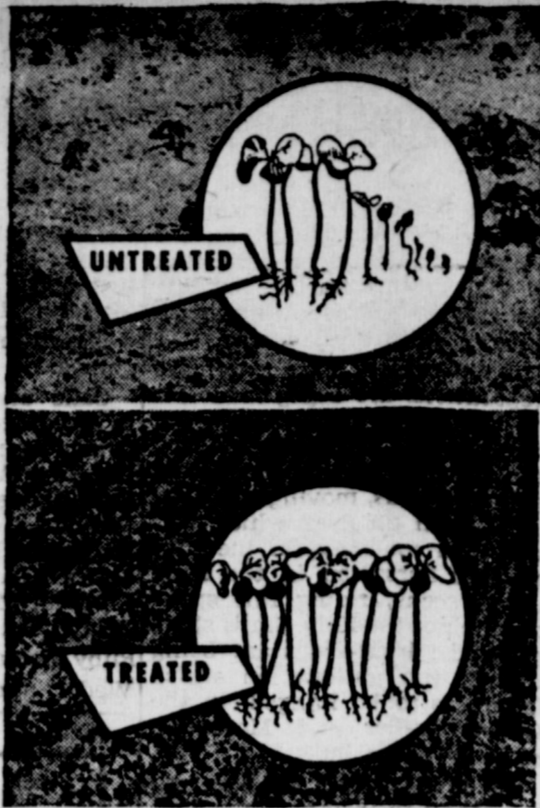

Here are some "tips" from the seed testers in the state laboratories:

Pay particular attention to the germination percentage given on the Tested Seed Label. The seed may be of high or low quality, and you will save disappointment later, perhaps even loss of crops, by turning down seed labeled below standard for germination.

Don't buy seed which contains Dodder, the parasitic plant most common clover, alfalfa, and flax. Dodder may kill the host plant, and the Eastern States, comprising about 70% of the market for Texas growers of alfalfa and clover seed, will not accept seed containing Dodder. If

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More Grain Said Needed On Texas Farms This Year

The State Agricultural Mobilization Committee last week discussed the problem of getting more acres of feed grain planted. The situation was pointed up by figures recently released by the Crop Reporting Board of the USDA's Bureau of Agriculture Economics. These figures indicated that farmer's tentative planting plans for the nation will fall about nine million acres short of the 1952 goals for the principal feed grain crops. It was indicated that corn planting alone would be more than five million acres below the goal level.

B. F. Vance, chairman of the State Committee, pointed out that Texas farmers have indicated they will plant about 92 per cent of the state's corn goal and only about 93 per cent of the grain sorghum goal.

Pose A Real Problem

In view of the large number of livestock and poultry on the farms and ranches of the state and nation, Vance said such curtailments in feed grain production pose a real problem in maintaining these

seeded by the committee on the herds and flocks. Information on the national situation points out that with current feeding rates and last season's short production, feed grain stock may be as much as one-third less by harvest time than one year ago. If the presently indicated corn acreage produces average yields, the reserve about normal working stock could be virtually exhausted during the next 18 months.

Without plentiful supplies of feed grains, it will not be possible to maintain the production of meat, eggs and milk that will be needed by our increasing population, says the committee. They urge farmers to reexamine their planting schedules and where possible, make every effort to increase materially their plantings of feed grain crops. The committee fully realizes the seriousness of the drought situation in Texas but the same time suggests that farmers obtain planting seed or at least line up prospective seed supplies of grain for immediate planting should rains come.

Save Time And Labor

They also urge farmers to use the best known methods of production in order to save time and labor. The farm situation is expected to be tight especially during the harvest season. This is an item that farmers should consider before all plantings is completed. Crops that can be machine produced and harvested may prove to be more profitable than those requiring lots of hand labor, believe the committee members. And they add, price supports have been announced for corn and grain sorghums.

They urge farmers who live in areas where fertilizers can be used to use them liberally to increase yields. And finally, they point out that local agency representative are ready to assist farmers in every manner possible to help get more acres of feed grain crops planted.

MAY CAST ABSENTEE BALLOT

Rules Governing Voting By Service Men On Active Duty Are Outlined

Rules governing absentee voting by servicemen of Texas have been sent to all county clerks by Secretary of State John Ben Shepperd.

The instructions list the various qualifications servicemen must meet to vote without a poll tax and outline the procedure to be followed.

Shepperd said he hoped the instructions would eliminate the

confusion prevailing for the past few years.

The instructions point out that any member of the reserve on extended active duty, selective service draftee of members of the National Guard, on duty with Federal forces, and members of the Maritime service and Merchant Marine is qualified to vote without a poll tax receipt or exemption certificate provided he

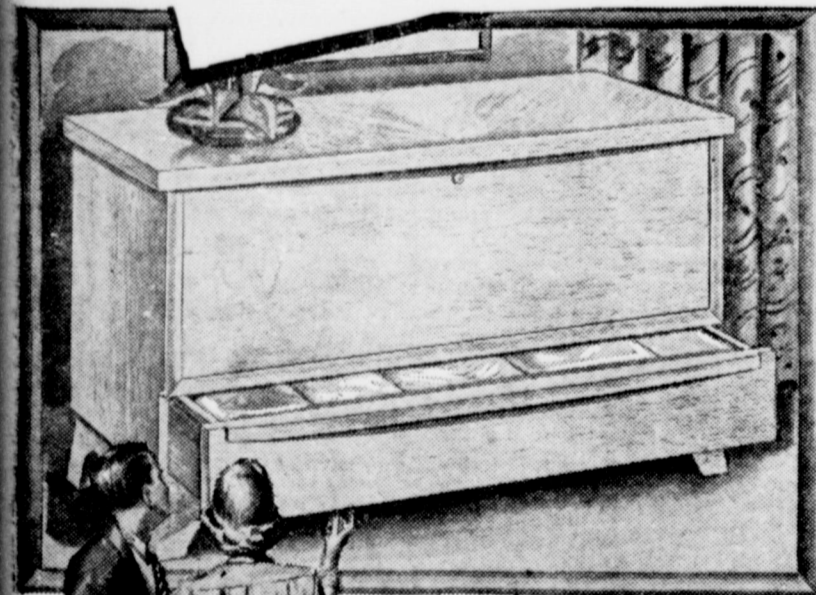

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was at least 21 years old on the day of the election, a citizen of the United States, has resided in Texas at least a year next preceding the election and for 6 months within the County in which he offers to vote. Time spent in the military service after the beginning of the above periods may be counted in determining if these time limits have been met.

"Regulars" Can't Vote

To qualify to vote a serviceman cannot be a member on active duty of the regular or permanent military establishment of the Army, Navy, Air Force or Marines.

The Democratic Primary in Texas will be held July 26, run-off August 23 and the General Election November 4.

Details of how servicemen can determine whether they are eligible to vote without a poll tax are as follows:

Armed service personnel who are qualified to vote in Texas and who are on extended-active duty may vote during 1952 without paying their poll tax and without obtaining a poll tax "Exemption Certificate." Whether the poll tax is levied by the State or any political subdivision, the serviceman need not pay it to vote in any election.

Any person who, at the time of the election, or within 18 months prior to the date of the election, was on extended active duty as a member of any of the reserve components of the armed force, a selective service draftee, a member of the National Guard, the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, may vote even though he has not paid his poll tax or obtained a certificate of exemption. To vote without paying his poll tax, the serviceman must be or must have been on extended active duty and not merely on active duty; for example, a reservist on active duty for a week-end or for several weeks during the summer must pay his poll tax to vote.

Poll Tax Is Waived

The Constitution waives the requirement of payment of the poll tax as a condition precedent to the right to vote for these servicemen.

Servicemen's wives and dependents and civilians serving with the armed forces must either pay their poll tax or obtain an "Exemption Certificate," in order to vote. A poll tax receipt, "Exemption Certificate," or affidavit that the receipt or certificate has been lost or mislaid must accompany the application for absentee ballot made by these persons. Except for these differences, these persons may vote by absentee ballot in the manner here described for voting by servicemen.

Shepperd's instructions also detailed how servicemen can make applications for ballots and the procedure for voting: Servicemen may make application for absentee ballot at any time. Application should be made to the County Clerk of the County in which the serviceman has his residence. However, the Armed Forces, Air Mail, "Application for Ballot" postcard will be accepted by the Secretary of State and will be forwarded.

promptly to the appropriate county Clerk. The postcard application for an absentee ballot seems satisfactory except that is has no space for the serviceman to indicate whether he is a member of the regular or permanent military establishment.

Time Limit Is Set

As soon as the ballots are ready, the County Clerk may mail the absentee ballot to the qualified applicant who has made application. However, no absentee ballots may be mailed by the County Clerk later than three days prior to the day of the election. As members of the regular military establishment are not qualified to vote and as the applicant is a qualified serviceman or not, it seems advisable for County Clerks to take steps to obtain that information. It is suggested that the statement, "I am not a member of the regular or permanent military or naval establishment of the United States; be added to the application for absentee ballot or to the statement which the serviceman makes under oath and returns with his completed ballot.

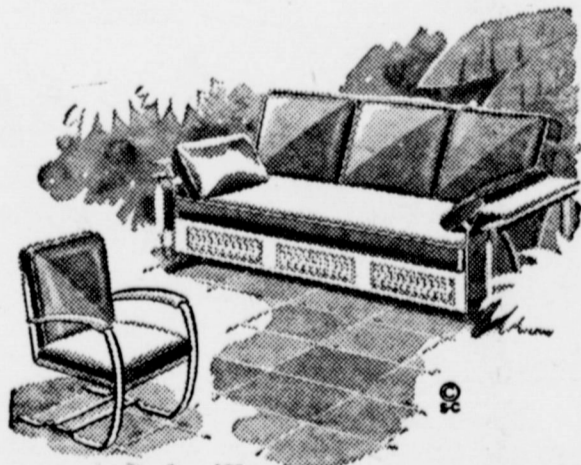
The ballot must be marked by the voter in the presence of a notary public or other person qualified under the law to take acknowledgements, and the affidavit on the ballot envelope must be filled out, signed, and sworn to by the voter and certified by the officer.

The ballot cannot be marked sooner than 20 days nor later than 3 days prior to the day of the election, and the completed ballot must be received by the county clerk by 1 p. m. on the day of the election.

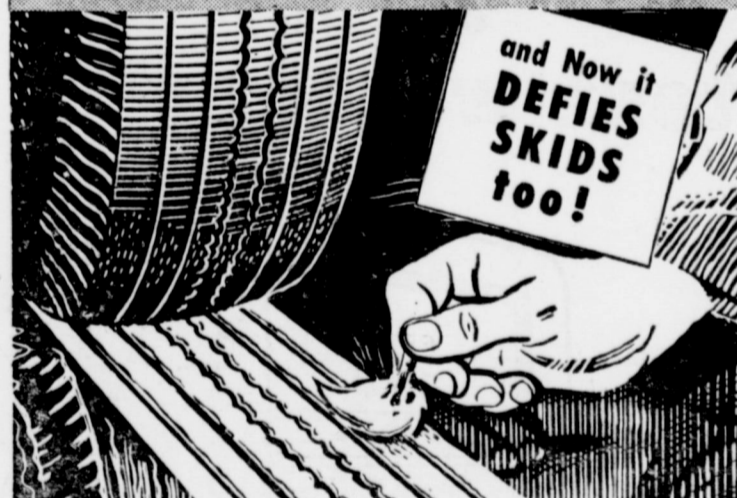

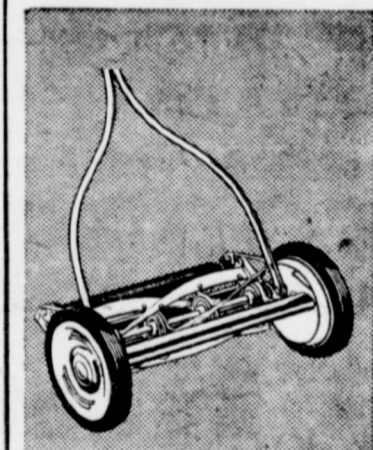
