

SOIL CONSERVATION



Now is the time to plant winter legumes for best results.

Many cooperators with the Central Colorado, Lower and Middle Clear Fork Soll Conservation Districts have made definite plans to plant a legume on a part of their land this fall. A coper crop on the land will afford soll improvement and protection against wind and water erosion. Cover crops enable the soil to take in and hold more moisture, increase production of succeeding crops, furnish grazing for livestock and can be used as a cash crop by harvesting seed.

Adapted winter legumes are hairy vetch and Austrian Winter Peas or Dixle Wonder Peas. Hairy vetch drilled with small grain has given good results and has prevented the soil from blowing on our sandy land. Austrian Winter Peas are Dixle Wonder Peas have been used successfully on heavier land. 
