

"Let's Talk About It?"

Have you ever wondered why depression or manic depressive illnesses are treated like taboo?

A chemical imbalance in the brain creates the disorders. It isn't like anyone raised their hand and said, "I'll take that one!" Both are inherited and if you have the genetic makeup on both sides of your family tree, then you seem to get a double whammy.

These diseases are no respecter of age. Young children can suffer the same as adults.

I hope that during my lifetime people will become educated and stop the stigma. If you have other physical diseases such as diabetes, cancer, etc. you don't hesitate to treat them and you talk about them. The same should be true here.

Something you may not be aware of is that if your thyroid is not working properly you can become depressed. Your thyroid affects the function of your heart, too. This might explain why people sometimes experience racing or pounding heart beats when they are depressed.

Some depression appears to come in cycles of so many years. There doesn't have to be an incident that triggers the event. When you determine the pattern that also helps you prepare for the challenge. The last few years there have been many new prescriptions developed that have really helped people. There is no need for anyone to suffer from the overpowering feeling of despair, loss of appetite, physical fatigue, loss of motivation, etc. — all symptoms of depression. Drastic mood swings are typical of manic depressive. Sometimes the lack of knowledge about the disease results in people being mistreated by others. People who haven't experienced depression often think a person can just "pull themselves up by the boot strap". Of course a good attitude toward getting well always promotes healing. I can share this with you because my family has experienced both. Personally, I was mistakenly diagnosed with manic depressive. The symptoms were brought on when I took 6 diet pills in one day, thinking they were sinus medicine. 

for late October, Mr. Ode Strahan came strolling into the gymnasium, struggling under the weight of a giant black diamond watermelon that he carried on his shoulder.





The climate in what is now known as Callahan County certainly is different than what it was 10,000 years ago after a mastodon tooth was discovered east of Baird.

Ralph Thompson, who owns a ranch between Clyde and Baird discovered the mastodon tooth while digging a stock tank on his property. Thompson lives just south of Shady Oaks Golf Course halfway between Clyde and Baird for the past seven years.

Thompson uncovered the artifact some four years ago while building a stock tank. At the time, Thompson just cleaned up the mastodon tooth and put it away, not knowing what it was. He said he was unable to locate any other portions of the mastodon.

Just six weeks ago, he decided to have Dr. Tommy Lee, a biology professor at Abilene Christian University, look at the object. Dr. Lee identified the artifact as a mastodon tooth.



Mastodons teeth had blunt cones. Mastodons probably used these teeth to browse on herbs, shrubs, and trees.


Saving part of an ancient mastodon's partially digested meal in an office refrigerator has led to a scientific discovery by a group of Ohio Wesleyan University students.

Using sample of digested plant food, which also includes cells from the animal's intestinal lining, the group has been able to reconstruct about one-third of a mastodon gene.



The American mastodons (scientific name Mammut americanum) roamed North America from about 3,750,000 years ago to about 10,000 years ago. Adults stood between 8 to 10 feet tall at the shoulder and weighed between four to six tons. Compared to the modern-day elephant, a mastodon was shorter, but long in the body, had coarse, reddish brown hair. Mastodons became extinct animal, but sufficient enough to begin making comparisons to modern-day elephants. The group's report will include

a finding that one of the gene fragments was 83 percent to 95 percent identical to the same gene structure in the African elephant. Similar evolutionary comparisons have been made but were based on bone structure and appearance, not on DNA analysis.
