GARDEN TIP OF THE MONTH **BY WANDA HAMMEL**

It's planning and planting garden time again. Cold crops should be planted now. Onions, spinach, beets, carrots, early peas and turnips do best.

Companion planting is the growing of two crops on the same area at the same time. With this method a greater yield may be secured from any garden. For example, when any early-maturing crop is planted between the rows or hills of a crop that matures later, the early one can be harvested before it interferes with the other.

A good guide for planting potatoes and green bean crops is: potatoes on St. Patrick's Day and beans on Good Friday. We have used this method for over 50 years in this area with great success





A clock on an old English tower lost its hands and for some reason they were not replaced. Every week, however, the sexton wound the clock and it went right on "ticking." It "kept time" but it kept it to itself, not benefiting anyone because nobody could 'read its mind.'

Our life can be a lot like that rather useless clock if our "hands" are lost or missing. I don't mean "lost or missing" literally, of course, and I don't mean just hands. It may be our arms or legs or our smile or kind word that's missing - in other words, the help that could come from our life but doesn't because something is "missing in action."


