

The more you read that, the more you wonder if a ten year old wrote it — not only from the standpoint of its masterful construction and superb thought, but I just don't remember ten year olds being that interested in hugin' and kissin' - maybe giglin' and grinnin' and even winnin', but not a huggin' and kissin'!

On February 6, 2003, VALOR Telecommunications of Texas, LP (VALOR) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to establish surcharges to recover lost revenues and increased costs associated with seven hundred thirteen (713) Expanded Local Calling Service (ELCS) routes implemented in and between VALOR's Texas telephone exchanges and in many instances, exchanges of other local telephone companies. The application is filed based on the Commission's Substantive Rule 26.221 titled, "Applications to Establish or Increase Expanded Local Calling Service

ELCS expands a local calling scope to include one or more additional telephone exchanges, if customers in a petitioning exchange approve by ballot, the payment of an ELCS fee in lieu of long distance charges. The costs and lost revenues associated with VALOR's surcharge application are those not recoverable through the ELCS fee

In the application, VALOR proposes to implement on an interim basis a monthly per line surcharge of \$.99 for residential customers and \$1.98 for business customers beginning with the April, 2003 bill cycle. This proposed surcharge will apply in addition to any monthly ELCS fees. If rates at or above the level of the interim surcharges are not ultimately approved by the Commission, VALOR will refund all or part of the interim surcharges, as directed by the Commission. Ultimately, VALOR seeks approval of monthly surcharges of \$3.38 for business lines and \$1.69 for residential lines to replace the interim surcharges. Additionally, the application proposes that customers currently billed ELCS fees lower than \$3.50 per residential line and \$7 per business line, will have those fees raised to \$3.50 per residential line and \$7 per business line

The net annual effect on the revenues of VALOR will be zero since the requested surcharge replaces lost revenues and reimburses VALOR for the increased cost of service associated with ELCS. The estimated total lost revenues and increased costs VALOR seeks to recover through this proceeding is \$7,601,145 annually.

Columbia shuttle debris field

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) continue seeking assistance of individuals, foresters, farmers and landowners from California to New Mexico and parts of West Texas in reporting suspected shuttle material finds.

"We are attempting to inform the public in the states and counties that potentially contain Space Shuttle Columbia debris of the extreme importance of reporting suspected finds to the toll-free 866-446-6603 number," said Federal Coordinating Officer Scott Wells.

The possibility exists that there may be material in California, Nevada, Utah, Arizona and New Mexico and in 28 West Texas counties. The counties may contain material that came off the shuttle before the break-up occurred, which could be important to the accident investiga-

"NASA is particularly interested in Columbia material that may have fallen from the craft prior to the break-up over East Texas. We are hoping that some of the possible early material may reveal important information about what happened to Columbia and her crew," said Astronaut Dom

NASA asks for help from Columbia debris

LUFKIN, TX-The search for Columbia shuttle debris continues to intensify as more than 3,000 searchers representing 38 states trek daily through field, forests and farm lands attempting to find any pieces that may help the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) determine the cause of the Columbia accident.

Ground crews are combing the primary search area, which consists of a 10 mile wide by 240mile long swath that extends from Ellis County, south of Dallas; to Hemphill; on the shore of Toledo Bend Reservoir in deep East Texas.

"These people are doing a tremendous job especially in light of the adverse weather conditions they face and the wet, dense terrain they are covering " said Federal Coordinating Officer Scott Wells, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)

NASA Astronaut Dom Gorie, at a Lufkin news conference Monday, issued a plea to those living near the flight path of the Columbia to "continue to search for and report anything that will help us determine the cause of our loss of Columbia and her crew.'







year, and I suggest you read it immediately, considering our possibility of war with Iraq, read The Two Faces of Islam, The House of Sa'ud From Tradition to Terror by Stephen Schwartz. I have read three other books on Islam and this is by far the most complete and best one I have

Islam has been hijacked by a group of extremists who have used the enormous oil revenues of Saudi Arabia to create a terrorist operation to kill Muslims who do not agree with them and to use terror to achieve their idea of governing the world so that it all looks like the Taliban operation in Afghanistan. They are behind all of the suicide bombings in Israel as well as the September 11 attack on the United States. Ben Ladin is only one small piece of the picture.

Their branch of Islam is called Wahhabism after a bandit who joined up with the Sauds to create an offshoot of Islam that rejects all early teachings of Muhammad and developed their own interpretation of the Koran to reject music, architecture, any learning other than their teachings, enslave women and teach dying as a martyr as the ultimate goal for

Schwartz's book gives a better history of Islam than any I have read. He developed his interest when he moved to Bosnia for a few years to study the conflict there. Bosnian Muslims have rejected the Wahhabism, but it has spread through the Arab world and is being pushed into Europe and the United States. He documents the history and is up to date as of late 2002.

One quote from the book: "In this way, they sought to introduce extremists activities based in the


If you only read one book this Middle East into the American heartland. Indeed, the functional center of the system was located in Richardson, Texas, in the form of the Holy Land Foundation." He explains how they work to complain about injuries allegedly done to Muslims purporting to speak for all Muslims. He names the organizations in Washington and around the country pumping big bucks into their propaganda.

> He urges President Bush and the U.S. to help Saudi Arabia change their government to reject the terrorist approach and restore Mecca and the historic sites of Islam to all who claim heritage to Abraham. He states, "Saudi dissidents say there are three kinds of Muslims in the kingdom: Those who want to kill everybody (the most extreme Wahhabis); those who wish to kill all non-Wahhabi Muslims but also seek to maintain good relations with the Christian powers (the royals); and the rest, who are traditional Muslims and do not want to kill anybody. The way out of this nightmare can only be found by Muslim believers."

He proposes a multi-religious university in Jerusalem for the study of comparative religions around the world, supporting research in the history of the Abrahamic faiths and preserving archives and structures. A fascinating book that made me support the statements by President Bush when he said that terror backed government will not be permitted anywhere in the world. Things will definitely change in the year

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
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
