"A Howardian Remembrance
By Rusty Burke
Jack Scott of Cross Plains, died in an Austin hospital on January , 2003. His passing was a loss Plains, but also for his many iends in Robert E. Howa tudies. Cross Plains residents may not know that it was young Jack Scott who raced over to the Howard House on June 11, 1936 to cover the tragic story of Howard's death for the Cross Plains Review. That event began between Jack and the admirers of Robert E. Howard.
As the years went by, that relationship only grew stronger. Jack's eye for anything that might benefit Cross Plains economically led him to recognize eost famous an the town' frequently interviewed about Howard for books, magazines, and newspapers, and Jack himself wrote a number of Howardrelated articles for the Review. I first met Jack in 1986, when I led several members of the Association on a visit to Cross Association on a visit to Cross the time, and I became a frequent visitor to Howard's home town, seeking to talk with anyone who could help me learn more about the Howards and the history of Cross Plains. Jack was enor mously helpful. He patiently questions I sent him about people and events mentioned by Howard in his letters. Many of the annotations in Howard's two volume Selected Letters were based on information supplied by Jack.
One time Jack cut short a gol same in order to keep an

Howard House. He didn't tell me about the game, he just said he had come straight from the golf course. But later I sure heard about it from the other fellows whose game had been cut short! But that was Jack-he had e'd meet me, and he did.
