## Spray

Schedule for
Pecan Nut
Casebearers
Through
May 24th
Time is approaching to start
scouting for one of the most scouting for one of the most important nut-infesting insects of pecans, that is the pecan nut
casebearer. The adult casebearer is a gray almost black moth about $1 / 3$ inch long.
The moths are active The moths are active at night,
when they lay etgs on pecan when they lay eggs on pecan
nuts. From research and
working with producers we are working with producers we are
confident that egg lay will occur 7-10 days after the first catch of the moths using pheromone
traps. In Callahan County our first significant catches were made around May 7-10. Eggs
are oval, flat and tiny, just large are oval, flat and tiny, just large
enough to be seen with the enough to be seen with the
unaided eye. Nut clusters with eggs can be tagged with a piece of ribbon and checked each day to determine exact hatch date. Insecticides need to be applied
$1-2$ days after first egg hatch. With catches on May $8-10$, nut entry is predicted to occur 12 -
16 days after this catch which 16 days after this catch which
would give us the spray would give us the spray
schedule of May 18-24. Proper scheduting is suggested to determine the best time for
insecticide applications. insecticide applications.
