dows, get up on the dows, get up on the running window, catch hold of the top of window, catch hold of the top of "Course you couldn't get very far like that, but it sufficed to getcha from the farm to town. Once you got it to the top of the hill, you could cut the engine and just coast
the rest of the way home. Some the rest of the way home. Some
cars were relatively small; two in cars were relatively small; two in
the front seat and onc or two in the rumble scat in the back. Many Since those days the times a changing. And change they did. From the 30's and 40 's until 2003 a LOT of differences have occurred. Speeds of 25 to 35 m.p.h. are now considered very slow.
While most cars run 55 to 60 m.p.h., the speed on the highway is usually 70 to 75 ; farm to market roads 55 to 60 . Cars are however capable of running in excess of $100 \mathrm{~m} . \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{h}$. Depending on the size now will accommodate 6 people, 3 in the front and 3 in the back. The smaller cars and the infant seat must be strapped in the ve-
