My niece, Belinda fennel mixed into her scrambled eggs. Fennel is also good in stews, meat loaf and other mea dishes. The bulb of the fennel can also be washed, sliced and dish to meats. The branches of fennel can be used in cooking when substituted for celery in stews, soups, roasts, meat loave and also in fresh vegetables, sal ads or in fruit salad. The seed of the fennel can be used for head aches, as well as for a diuretic
Caution: Do not use herbs dicinally without first checking with your doctor Fennel can als be used to sweeten the stomach. Mint goes well with chocolate The leaves of the herb, sorrel are delightful when substituted for letuce in a sandwich or in green Salads. In fact, my husband,
