





An editorial "cartoon" in a recent depicted a player of sports being offered hundreds of thousands of dollars by a certain team to play for them—while our nation offers \$25,000 for our nation's worst physical enemy, dead or alive. And the illustrations of misplaced values, some even more serious than this one, could go on and on...


In one Jesus' parable—actually in a cluster of them—He taught of the value of the kingdom of heaven. He told of a man who sold everything he had to buy a pearl of great price. And in application, the treasure, the pearl, was the kingdom of heaven.

have gained a day. What do you think?


